HERALD REPORT SCHOOL DISTRICT 17 HICKSVILLE

The School Board passed a resolution to apply for Title I federal funds for the purpose of continuing a non-public remedial reading program. Outlined in the program is a plan to purchase a remedial reading mobile unit for two schools in the district. The program will be discussed again after the State's approval of use of federal funds.

The Board voted unanimously to renew its membership in the National, New York and Nassau- Suffolk School Boards Associations. However there was disagreement on joining The Education Council. TEC is the research arm of BOCES and serves as their research and development center. The cost to our district for membership is \$4700. The following Board members voted to continue membership in TEC: Messrs. Kershen, Muratore, McCormack and McManus. Those voting against: Messrs. O'Donnell and Zindulka. Mr. Clark abstained.

The Board approved the raise in cafeteria prices from 45 cents to 50 cents for a student lunch. But they turned down a raise in milk prices. In past years, the federal government has provided a subsidy for milk. However, this year there were no funds, so the price was raised from 3 cents to 10 cents. The Board has agreed to take on some financial responsibility of the cafeteria (in addition to the \$23,500 it currently subsidizes) so that milk prices will remain the same. It is possible that Congress will re-enact the milk subsidy bill.

Health Education Program

An explanation of the Health Education Program for 1970-71 was presented to the Board and the public at Tuesday's meeting. Under state law, schools must include education about cigarette smoking, drugs and the excessive use of alcohol in their curriculum.

Mrs. Betty Garrison, Supervisor of Nurse-Teachers, explained the elementary curriculum. Health will be taught as it has in the past, but by the classroom teacher, (who will receive in-service training. The nurse-teacher will now serve as a resource and work with the teacher. Drugs will be discussed.

In Junior High, science teachers will present two phases: "traditional material" (emphasis on nutrition) and thirteen weeks of the new program. Dr. Browne, Assistant Principal, said approximately four weeks would deal with smoking and health, three weeks with alcohol and its usages and six weeks with drugs and narcotics (emphasis on misuse.)

The summer program of the Children's Room of the Hicksville Public Library was brought to a happy conclusion as three separate parties were given for participants in the Art Program, the Story Hour and the Summer Reading Game.

Until September 12th, there will be on display in the small auditorium adjoining the Children's Room, many remarkable examples of art work done by local youngsters under the dedicated tutelage of Mrs. Irene Ziolkowsky, a local artist. Eighty-three children, ranging from the second grade through the sixth, enrolled in this program to learn techniques involving the use of water colors, oils, crayons, inks and yarn collage. The finished products display a knowledge of the basic principles of color harmony and composition in a wide variety of techniques. On Wednesday, August 12th, the young artists and their parents viewed the exhibit and socialized for an hour while ice cream and cookies were served.

On August 14th the Story Hour group was treated to a showing of films entitled Hercules and Frog Went A-courtin'.

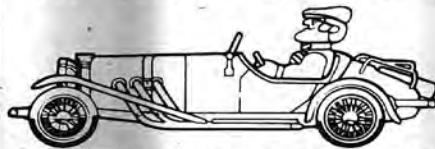
On August 25th, young people

who put their free hours to good use in the Summer Reading Game by reviewing at least six books, including one on oceanography, were rewarded with a field trip by bus to New York City's Aquarium at Coney Island. The 73 youngsters, accompanied by 8 adults, supplemented their book knowledge by observing many hundreds of living undersea creatures ranging from playful white whales to tiny guppies, including sinister sharks and piranhas and friendly dolphins and seals. The written reviews will be evaluated, and the best, among them will be reproduced in a flyer to be distributed by the Library. Miss Cadi Nones read and wrote reviews for an amazing total of 48 books, and Miss Eileen Quinn did 42.

Tying in with the topic of the Children's Room for September, "Time for Biography", Mrs. Mildred McLaughlin has created a spectacular bulletin board featuring a clock motif that will dramatize the reading of biography by young users of this room.

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SET PRIORITIES NOW

The need for setting priorities in federal spending becomes critical with each roll call in Congress. This warning has been repeated so often, it's in danger of becoming a political cliché rather than the standard practice it should be.

It is obvious in setting priorities that not every spending program is necessary. Some projects must wait for more favorable times. Others must be cut back.

To do this, we must insist on maximum efforts on the part of the Administration and Congress to:

- Stay within budget requests or find other areas of saving when this cannot be done;
- Phase out doubtful and outmoded programs;
- Resist making commitments for future spending until the fiscal situation has improved.

House actions to July 9, 1970 on all spending bills have exceeded the President's budget authority requests for fiscal 1971 by \$7,486,977,000.

On the Senate side, similar actions through the same date have exceeded the President's requests by \$4,335,950,000.

It is time someone starting worrying about the taxpayers who have to come across with these vast billions. The spending spree has got to stop if inflation is ever going to be controllable.

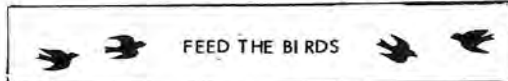

From Congress

Rep. James R. Grover, Jr.

This is a fast-changing world, but there are unchanging principles by which most residents of the Second Congressional District are guided. After tabulating more than 13,000 responses to my annual opinion survey of the district, I find indications that we continue to be a cautious, economically orthodox, law-and-order area which overwhelmingly supports the President and has, if that's possible, been swayed further to the right by young demonstrators.

If I was not surprised by the results of the survey, I was certainly struck by the depth of the support enjoyed by the President on his Vietnamization efforts and his Cambodian move. If anything, the President's popularity seems to have increased on Long Island since his strong performance at the polls here in 1968. Two questions which dealt with campus unrest produced an overwhelming reaction to demonstrators, following the national trend of concern and dismay over the actions of campus militants, but those responding certainly are not prejudiced against young people. For example, where last year's survey showed 63 per cent of respondents opposing the lowering of the voting age to 18, this year's sampling showed that opposition had shrunk to 55 per cent.

I believe these results suggest a Congressional District whose people have worked hard to win a good life for themselves and their families, people proud of their country and grateful to it. I believe the results show that residents of the Second District are willing to make sacrifices to preserve their environment and keep their country secure, if such sacrifices are needed. But they are also opposed to social experiments and lawlessness.

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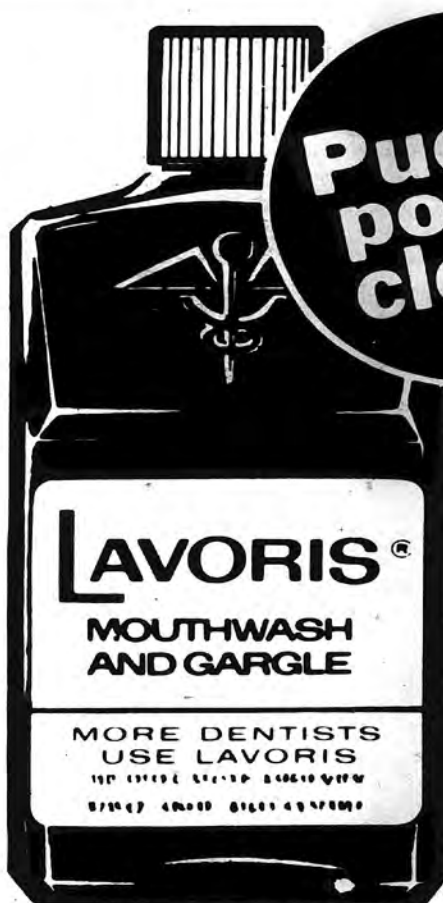

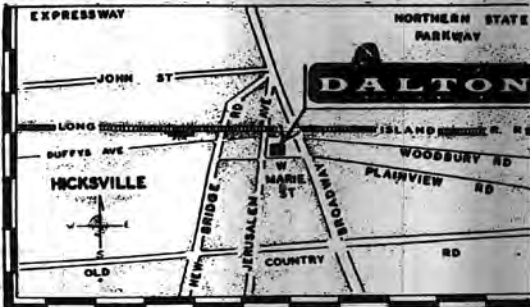

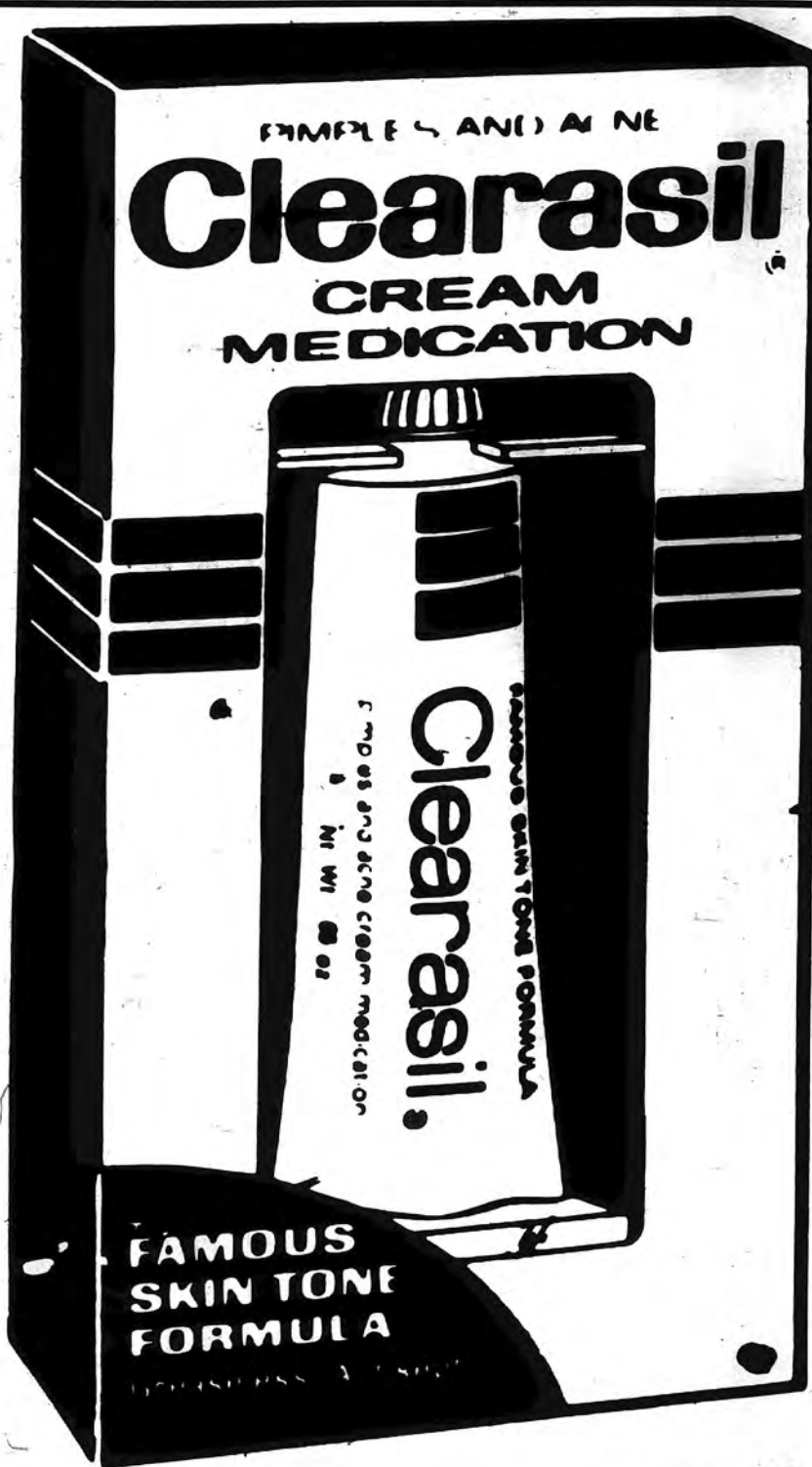

WHY A WELFARE FUND

Any non-profit organization needs a certain amount of money to meet operating expenses. The Jericho Volunteer Fire Department is no different, and for this reason, is presently in the midst of its annual Welfare Fund Drive. Although the Jericho Fire District is supported by revenue from the Town of Oyster Bay, the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department receives only a small portion of these funds for internal operations. The rest of the necessary operating funds are attained through contributions from the residents of the fire district.

One may ask why does a volunteer fire department need operating capital when the fire district purchases all firematic equipment such as fire apparatus, turnout gear, hose, ladders, etc. and pays for the maintenance of fire district property. The answer is that there are many expenses incurred that are not supported by taxation, and for this reason, the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department turns to the community for its financial aid.

No member of the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department receives any compensation for his time either in the form of money or tax reimbursement. All volunteer firemen are covered by the New York State Workmen's Compensation Law. This coverage and the supplementary policy carried by the Jericho Fire District are the basic coverages provided in the event of injury or death to a volunteer fireman in the performance of his duty. Additional accident and life insurance is a major expense. The premiums for these policies are derived from Welfare Fund contributions.

Last year, as in previous years, the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department played host to thousands of residents during its annual Fire Prevention Day Open House. Those children attending were given rides on the apparatus, refreshments and souvenirs; mainly paid for out

of the departments Welfare Fund. On the 11th of October the department once again plans to hold its Annual Open House and is expecting a sizeable turnout. Throughout the year the Department supports other community activities through contributions to scholarship awards, charitable organizations, public and school demonstrations, etc.

In order to maintain the Jericho Fire Department's high standards and proficiency, membership in numerous firematic organizations are necessary so as to keep abreast of the latest techniques of fire prevention and firefighting. The Department maintains subscriptions to various training publications, pays membership dues and provides representation at State Firematic Conventions.

It is necessary to maintain a supply of emergency provisions for use during extended firematic operations and in the event of natural catastrophes such as snow emergencies. Through these emergency supplies the Department is able to feed and house many stranded persons who come to the Jericho Fire House for shelter. The Welfare Fund provides the money to maintain these emergency supplies.

Although only a few of the major expenses incurred by the Welfare Fund revenues have been mentioned there are numerous additional areas requiring financial support by the Department such as competitive teams, work clothes and administrative expenses.

A vast amount of time and effort is expended by the members of the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department to provide the community with first class fire protection. In order to support the Welfare Fund a mailing has been made to all residents asking for their contribution to the Departments Welfare Fund. This support is greatly appreciated and helps to maintain the high standards of the Jericho Volunteer Fire Department.
