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Health Education Programs Explained At Board Meeting

The "witching hour" took on a new look Tuesday night as those in attendance at the School Board meeting were awakened by an enlightened explanation of the newly mandated Health Education curriculum and the 2½ week segment on family life which is taught in the High School Health Education course. Neither an already long agenda nor the stroke of midnight diminished the interest and the audience response stimulated by the presentation of Dr. John Cadden, Assistant Superintendent, and Mrs. Estelle Carter, Hicksville High Health Ed teacher.

Dr. Cadden outlined the various sections, or strands, of the state-mandated Health Education curriculum. Strands 1, 2, 4 and 5 are being incorporated into the science and health education courses in our schools. Strand 1 deals with physical

health (dental health, nutrition, biology). Sociological problems are covered in Strand 2, while environmental and community health (public health, ecology) are the subject matter of Strand 4. Strand 5 is education for survival (First Aid and safety). At the present time, none of Strand 3 has been incorporated into our curriculum.

Strand 3 deals with mental health (personality development, sexuality, family life) and to date, our district has received only one brochure explaining this subject. According to Superintendent Donald Abt, before action is taken to incorporate any of Strand 3 into the required Health Education courses, more information must be received from the State Education Department—it must be studied by Administration, discussed with interested parents and citizens of Hicksville and approved by the

Board of Education. Harry Kershen, Board president, directed that a broad-based committee of Hicksville residents be appointed to discuss plans for incorporating Strand 3 into our curriculum.

Following Dr. Cadden's general introduction to Health Education, Mrs. Carter gave a more specific outline of a portion of the course she is presently teaching in the High School. This is not a new course, but has been taught in our district for about 15 years—the only innovation this year being its availability to Juniors (previously only open to Seniors). The two and a half week segment which Mrs. Carter explained deals with family life, dating problems, problems of growing up-life as the students are experiencing it now and as they will have to face it in the future. A film dealing with premarital pregnancy was shown and discussed by the Board and public. Opinions—favorable and unfavorable—were voiced, and Mrs. Carter pointed out to those present (as she does to her students) that she does not try to tell the students what is right or wrong. Her intent is to give them as much information as possible so that they will be able to make responsible decisions for themselves. During the discussion, questions were raised about the law which mandates Health Education in our schools.

To clarify—the new law states that every student must take ½ year of Health Education, regardless of any biology course that he may have taken. In that Health Ed course, the district must teach about drugs, smoking, alcohol (this is the portion of the law referred to as the Speno bill). Our district has received a one-year, partial waiver of this law—for this year, if a student (Junior or Senior) has not completed a biology course before September, 1970, he must take a ½ year Health Education. Next year we will have to comply with the law as stated above.

Town Planner To Speak

The newly formed Hicksville Community Council has scheduled its first meeting of this season for Thursday, October 8, starting at 8:15 p.m. at the Hicksville Library on Jerusalem Avenue.

Guest speaker will be Mr. George F. Raymond, Senior Partner of the firm of Raymond, Parish and Pine, Inc., of White Plains, whose planning services are being used by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay. Mr. Raymond will explain what his firm is doing for the Town and specifically, what timing is involved as it applies to Hicksville.

A question and answer period will follow.

Rezoning Sought

There was no opposition at the Oyster Bay Town Board meeting Tuesday to the petition of Frank X. Mascioli for a change of zone from Residence A to Business G district for a pan-shaped piece of property, the tip of a peninsula fronting on Jericho Turnpike west of Simpson Street. The "pan" is about 500 feet in from Jericho Turnpike.

As attorney Donald Cappobianco, of Mineola, presented the petition, it became apparent that this case was a companion of a similar petition for an adjacent piece of property owned by Joseph Dowling which had been pending with the Town Board for

"several years." Mr. Cappobianco showed the development of the dual properties if both petitions were granted, and that of the single pan-shaped property, if that were granted.

Using photographic blow-ups, Mr. Cappobianco showed various arrangements of module units with under-grid parking which would provide about 500,000 square feet of office space if both parcels were utilized. If only the subject property were used, an office building about 4 stories high providing 150,000 square feet of space would be constructed.

The Town Board reserved decision on the petition.

MRS. MARY CORDIER, 31 Kuhl Ave., Hicksville - "Of course, we have a problem. Why should Hicksville be different from other communities? A lot of people will admit we have a drug problem, but what are we going to do about it?"

MRS. PHOEBE KLEIN, 12 Hicks Circle, Hicksville - "I have no knowledge other than what I hear as a member of H. A. D. I can't say that I know any addicts, but I have heard ex-addicts speak at meetings of H. A. D. and they say that Hicksville has a very large problem. There must be a problem, otherwise why would this organization have started. Every town has some problem, why should Hicksville be any different?"

MRS. JOHN SCHUFF, 54 Abbot Lane, Hicksville - "We very definitely have a problem. The younger children have not yet been victimized by it, so it is imperative that they be taught by their parents and the schools about drugs and the dangers resulting from drugs. 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Highway Deaths Reported Dropped

Nassau Police Commissioner Francis B. Looney today reported that highway deaths in the eight precincts of the county department dropped 14 percent during the first eight months of 1970 - from 77 in the same period of 1969 to 66 this year.

For the same period, drunk-driving arrests rose from 1,013 in 1969 to 1,347 this year.

"It is difficult to know with certainty," Looney said, "exactly why highway deaths went down, but it is our feeling that our continuing drive to remove the drunk-driver from the highways has to be effective."

The department has 19 breathalyzer machines available around the clock for checking drivers suspected of being impaired by alcohol.

In addition to the drop in highway deaths recorded by the department, a drop in highway injured was also noted - from 8,404 in 1969 to 8,169 in 1970 - although accidents increased from 14,009 in 1969 to 14,357 in 1970.

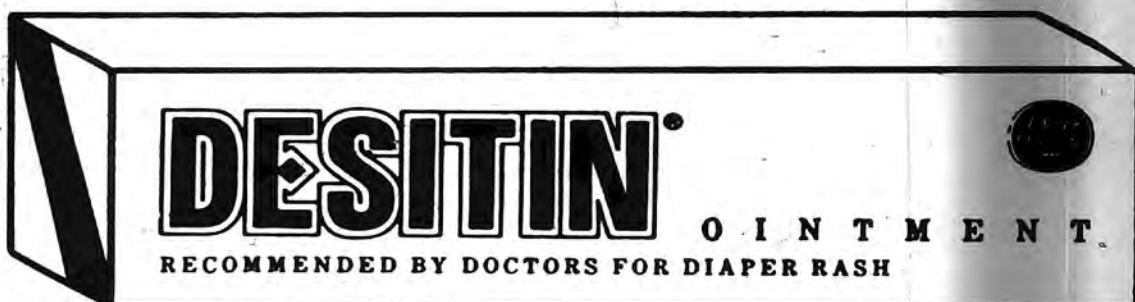

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FROM OUR POSTMASTER

Chief Postal Inspector William J. Colter characterized the stiff sentences levied today against three men convicted of the largest holdup in the history of Washington, D. C., as an indication of the government's intention to make postal crimes an unprofitable business.

The trio was convicted after a two-week trial June 15 for the armed robbery of a U. S. mail truck carrying \$382,000 last December 23.

Sentences by Federal Judge John H. Pratt were:

Arthur B. Knight, 34 who was assessed 3 to 10 years for mail robbery and 4 to 12 years for armed robbery.

Haywood T. Kirkland, 23 and Robert L. Johnson, 23 both of whom drew 3 to 10 years for mail robbery, 10 to 30 years for armed robbery and 3 to 10 years for

assault with a deadly weapon. Sentences are to run concurrently.

The big robbery precipitated one of the most extensive manhunts initiated by the Postal Inspection Service in recent years. Cooperating in the effort were Washington, D. C., police, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Canadian authorities and police in numerous other areas of the United States.

Within a few weeks of the heist, four men were arrested for complicity in the robbery and seven others were arrested for unlawful possession of some of the stolen currency. The latter seven are awaiting trial.

The \$382,000 stolen in the robbery was mutilated but usable currency which was being shipped in a registered pouch from Frankfurt, Germany, to the U. S. Treasury Department.

Hicksville Recreation Department and as Ramblin' Rose of the HERALD.

Applications for the use of district buildings and grounds will still be handled by Mrs. Walsh. And she will assist in the Recreation Department when needed.

Mr. Abt explained why this reassignment was recommended—the district needs a public information coordinator and he feels Mrs. Walsh is qualified for the position. He does not feel the Recreation Program will be hampered by this shift in personnel. Also, this move permits the best use of District funds for the good of the district.

Joe Madden, Director of Recreation, gave his reasons for opposing the personnel change. If, in addition to his new duties as Chairman of the Health Education Department, he also loses an assistant, he will have to work with Recreation. Those activities that Mrs. Walsh organized and coordinated will be difficult to handle without her assistance (she organized and chaperoned the Recreation Department trips, handled payroll and public relations for the Department.)

Other items on the agenda: The Oct. 13 School Board meeting has been changed to Oct. 12.

Discussion of a proposed public opinion survey by the Community Relations Advisory Committee was postponed until the Oct. 12 meeting.

Lists of recommended textbooks, library books and films will be sent to Board members two weeks prior to the meeting at which they will be approved or disapproved. This will give the Board members more time to familiarize themselves with the material.

LILCO Obtains Additional Revenues

The Public Service Commission today ruled that Long Island Lighting Company is entitled to obtain a maximum of \$10,840,000 additional annual revenue through higher electric rates. This is about 24 per cent less than the amount which LILCO'S proposed rates would have produced, based upon the test year (Nov. 1968 through Oct. 1969) used by the PSC in this proceeding.

"LILCO has proven itself to be an efficient company in providing reliable electrical service to its customers and in taking advantage of the economies of scale which are necessary for the proper operation of an electric utility company.

The utility's plan to put its higher rates into effect as of December 1, 1969, was stayed by the PSC pending the outcome of an investigation into LILCO'S financial needs. That inquiry involved public hearings which spanned a six-week period and in which about 970 pages of testimony and 53 exhibits were received.

By this order, LILCO is directed to cancel by September 29 the proposed tariff which has been the subject of the investigation, but is allowed to file a new tariff schedule incorporating rates which will hold the revenue increase to the prescribed level.

Whatever substitute tariff the utility may file will be subject to Commission scrutiny and will not become effective until given PSC approval.

Pesticides Banned by Town

At its public meeting on Tuesday, the Town Board of Oyster Bay approved an ordinance against toxic pesticides which do not disperse when released into the ground or the environment.

About ten pesticides are listed, the most common of which are DDT, Lindane, Aldrin and Eldrin.

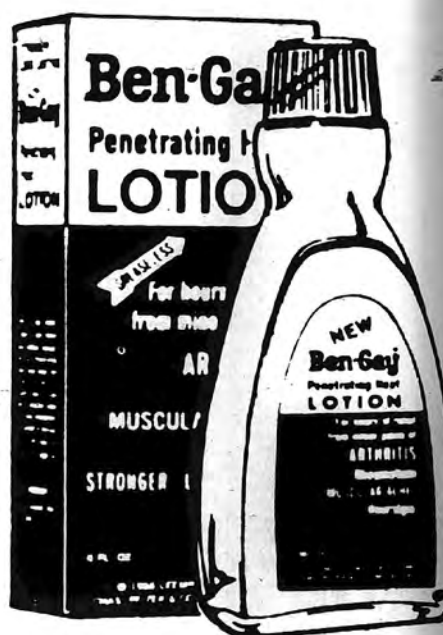
