His awards were received by his mother, Mrs. Mildred E. Cain of 7 Astronomy Lane, Levittown, at a presentation ceremony in the Chapel at Fort Hamilton, Brooklyn. Also present were Cpl. Cain's grandparents Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Baumann of 43 Hilltop Road, Levittown.

In addition to his mother and grandparents Cpl. Cain leaves two brothers, Army PFC Edward E. Cain and U.S.M.C. Lt. James J. Cain.

He said, "SCAN and HAD both deal with people, not necessarily those involved in the drug scene. Drug abuse is only the symptom. A kid or an adult who turns to drugs as an escape from problems is only encapsulating himself. The prob-

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BOCES State Aid

The Nassau Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) has again distributed a total of \$720,652.10 received as State Aid to the 56 component school districts in the County. This BOCES State Aid represents about 1/12 of the estimated amount due each district as reimbursement for services performed by BOCES during the 1969-70 school year.

This second payment, combined with the first payment made in September, totals \$1-4 million paid during the current school year for BOCES aid to Nassau's 56 component school districts.

The State's policy is to pay an estimated amount until complete financial information is calculated during the 1970-71 school year, at which time payments will be adjusted to an actual basis.

The money paid to the School District of Plainview was \$24,140.95.

There is a community group of concerned and helpful people who give of themselves to make this information available to you. This is the dedicated people of HAD (Hicksville Against Drugs).


All they can be expected to do is be there when needed. They are definitely needed in our town of 52,000 persons.

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

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
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J.F. Kennedy Sports Report

Student Standpoint

The Jericho school system has rightfully been, throughout the last decade, a source of pride of the district residents. Educationally, it is among the finest systems on the island; economically, it is the reason a house in Jericho is worth up to 5 percent more than a similar model across the border in Westbury. Ironically, it is this feeling of satisfaction with the status-quo that has nurtured an attitude of negativism towards change and an ultimate distrust in any educational innovations within the system.

A case in point is Dr. Paul McKee's arrival as principal of Jericho High School. While his new proposals and non-restrictions were greeted with anticipation by students, there was a cloud of apprehension over most of the community. New rules pertaining to off-campus lunches, early dismissals and the newly-built Senior Lounge inspired students to converse about new freedoms but numerous parents and administrators alike disdained the new approach and growled that the school was turning into a country club.

Unfortunately for the administration, the advent of the proposals was accompanied by a wave of bomb-scares. An exorbitant amount of the time-consuming scares meant almost daily evacuations of the building. Again, the administration's actions were neither disciplinary nor even admonitory but, in fact, congratulatory to the students for the orderly evacuations of the building. Some parents fumed about the scares in frustration while others had no qualms about placing the blame squarely on Dr. McKee's permissiveness. "Back-to-School Night" in early

October had all the friendly and inquisitive qualities of a pack of sharks smelling fresh blood.

Mercifully, the bomb-scares were stopped and with them the more dangerous slanders on the administration. Yet, it is interesting to note that only a slur as damaging and encompassing as the scares aroused the genuine interest of the community.

Consummately, what is happening is that the only associations many residents have with the school are those born out of anger and frustration. The voting down of the budget was an annual (and costly) function until students actively campaigned for its passage last year. The student strike of last year brought a significant negative reaction from the community. Yet, never have district residents shown a capacity to be caught up in the progress of the school comparable to their willingness to react in a derogatory fashion when they feel the system is at fault.

Perhaps the answer lies in the Tuesday Night Meetings; an informal forum open to parents, students and teachers, held bi-weekly, where shortcomings, advantages and proposals are discussed in small groups (ranging from the "Rules and Regulations Committee" to the "Interpersonal Relationships Committee"). These could be the first real connection many residents have with the improvement of the school. In any case, it is better to investigate change than to merely react to it.


