"Not So", Says Board Prexy

PTA Council Outraged At 'Budget Misrepresentation'

"Rationale of declining enrollment" was one of the reasons given by School Board President, Harry Kersten, for the deletion of an assistant principal's job in the district. When John Mateer was appointed principal of Willet Avenue School, East Street School was left without an assistant principal. The position is currently being filled by Jack Meller, who also serves Old Country Road School in the same capacity.

Mr. Kersten's reason was in response to letters from Dutch Lane PTA and the Hicksville Council of PTA units questioning the reasons behind the Board's decision not to fill the assistant principal position. PTA Council was not only questioning the decision, but expressing its "outrage with the misrepresentation of the budget." The position in question was included in the budget when it was approved by district voters.

The Board directed the Superintendent to look into the matter—to see how the sharing of an assistant principal is working out. Administration is to ascertain whether this system is adversely affecting the students' education.

The Board of Education was asked why the district is advertising for job applicants for the position of personnel director, which was not included in the 1970-71 budget. In answer to this, Mr. Kersten said this position had not been advertised for—the job title and qualifications had been changed (now, someone to handle employee negotiations and grievances.) William O'Donnell disagreed with this statement. He felt the job description had changed very little and the position was essentially the same. He pointed out to the Board that most of the voters felt the position and its salary of \$25,000 had been deleted entirely from the 1970-71 budget. For this reason they were upset to find the district advertising for job applicants.

Mr. Kersten stated that the public votes on a budget as a whole—not each item. Therefore, the district was not responsible on such items as it feels necessary. Money was deleted from the budget before it was presented to voters a second time—not necessarily, job position, Mr. Kersten added.

Charles Petta of L.I.F.E. presented the following recommendations to the Board:

1. Children doing damage to school property be held responsible and liable.

Board's answer: This is being done now, when those children are caught.

2. No smoking laws on buses be enforced.

Board's answer: Disciplinary action is taken by principals when offenders are reported to them by the bus drivers.

3. All texts be made available for home study (mostly concerned with those texts used in Project PLAN)

Board's answer: There are enough available now, but Administration will check into it and make sure that provision is being made for all students.

The district is currently working on curriculum revisions for grades 1 through 8.

Development of the Health Education curriculum for all grades. Target date for the start of the implementation of the new curriculum is September, 1971. Before approving personnel to work on the new curriculum, the Board discussed the portion dealing with Health Education. Thomas Muratore moved that the

The total estimated cost of traffic accidents in this country during the first half of 1970 was more than \$7.2 billion. That's enough to build 360,000 homes costing \$20,000 each.

The dollar cost involves more than just the automobile. Lost wages, productivity, disruption of schedules, medical expenses, property damage (of others), service costs of insurance, must be considered too. The loss in human life and crippling injuries is incalculable.

The Insurance Information Institute has reported that during the first half of 1970 the number of traffic accidents was up 8.7 per cent over the preceding year. Now that winter is approaching with its shorter daylight hours, and more inclement weather, driving becomes even more hazardous. Simple common sense dictates that every vehicle should be carefully checked before winter driving becomes a reality.

Ice Skates Selling Service

Those outgrown ice skates gathering dust in the basement or attic may at last prove useful if residents take advantage of a service offered by the Nassau County Department of Public Works.

"We are aware of the cost of equipping children with ice skates that they rapidly outgrow", said Public Works Commissioners Edward Borysiewicz. "So we have set up skate exchange boards at the three county artificial ice rinks".

The boards available for use by County residents free of charge, are located at the Cantiague Park rink, Hicksville; Grant Park rink,

Hewlett; and at Christopher Morley Park rink in Roslyn-North Hills.

Anyone wishing to sell or exchange a pair of skates need only fill out a card and have it posted on the board. The cards will remain up for a period of two weeks or until the advertiser notifies rink personnel that the skates have been sold or exchanged. Those who wish to use the boards and not skate will not be charged rink admission.

Skates should not be brought to the rink since any transactions must remain on a personal basis between the owner and the person wishing to obtain skates.

Students Selected For Music Participation

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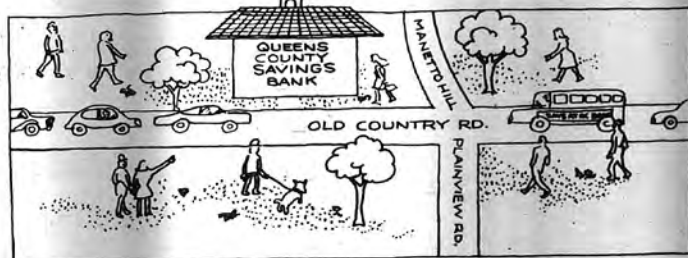

From Our Postmaster

A significant reduction in the time required for postal employees to reach their maximum pay step has been jointly announced by the seven exclusive postal unions and postal management.

The collective bargaining agreement covering postal employees in their respective bargaining units was made public today by Deputy Assistant Postmaster General Watt H. McBrayer, management spokesman, and James J. LaPenta, Jr., spokesman for the unions.

Agreed upon was a compressed wage schedule reducing from some 21 years to 8 years the time it takes for postal employees to reach the top of their respective

pays levels. The effective date of the new schedule is November 14, 1970, the first day of the current postal pay period.

While basically retaining 12 pay steps, the new schedule provides for accelerated advancement at a proportionately increased rate. Employees with 8 years or more service will not automatically go to the top pay step, but will be advanced in accordance with the compressed schedule.

Also to be effected is a one-time equity increase, equivalent to a step increase, for those postal employees presently in step 12 of their pay level.

Now that agreement has been reached on a compressed wage schedule both parties look for-

ward to comprehensive negotiations scheduled for mid-January 1971. At that time, overall collective bargaining with the exclusively recognized unions will take place on wages, hours and working conditions for postal employees.

A rare collection of antique Christmas cards will be shown at the public library in Plainview beginning December 1.
The exhibit includes historic Christmas cards, some of them more than a century old. The specimens are on loan from the Hallmark Historical Collection, the largest and most valuable collection of antique cards in the world, containing more than 70,000 items.

center, flanked by panels showing acts of Christmas charity. Cole had 1,000 cards printed and sent to friends in place of his usual Christmas letter.

Among the cards to be shown here is a replica of the first commercially printed Christmas card, published in London in 1843. The card was invented by Sir Henry Cole, a wealthy patron and founder of the Victoria and Albert Museum, who discovered himself behind in his writing of yuletide letters and asked a friend, John Calcott Horsley, to design a card that could be printed and mailed in volume.
Horsley designed for Cole a three-paneled card showing a friendly Christmas party in the

Originals of the 1843 Cole-Horsley cards are now extremely rare and valuable. Only a dozen are known to be in existence, and two of these are part of the Hallmark Historical Collection.
Other cards in the exhibit include several Louis Prang originals. Prang, known as the father of the American Christmas card, was the foremost 19th century American publisher of social greetings. From his shop in Boston in the 1880's he issued tasteful cards of consistently high quality, many of them reproductions of prizewinning paintings of his era.
The exhibit will be open to the public without charge during regular library hours which are 9:30 A.M. to 9:00 P.M. on weekdays and 9:30 A.M. to 5:30 P.M. on Saturdays.

charges made by Old Country
Road School PTA against one of
the Board members. At last
week's meeting, the Board stated
