Yevoli: Question On Proposed Substations

The lack of communication between the Metropolitan Transportation Authority and local government was underscored by Councilman Lewis J. Yevoli at the Oyster Bay Town meeting on Tuesday, January 11th.

His comments arose from the understanding that five electrical substations were to be built between Hicksville and Farmingdale, without the prior knowledge of local residents. The substations, as others which have gone up in the Town, would be built with federal funds.

Councilman Yevoli deplored the erection of an electrical substation in Massapequa in the midst of a residential area. A suit is now pending by residents against the construction of the

substation, purportedly to cost \$1,000,000. Mr. Yevoli, in private conversation, also mentioned the erection of a substation in New Hyde Park which was to have been about 14 feet high, and which will go to about 35 feet he said.

He said transportation agencies should be in touch with local government agencies and, when considering a construction which would change an area, should be required to have a public hearing on it and advertise it in public notices in local media. He said that he had directed the Town attorney's office to research the law. "I am hoping the State legislature will amend some of the power that they (the transportation agencies) have."

Councilman Yevoli showed a

map of proposed substations for the Long Island Railroad. An authority spokesman said that one such substation was to be in the vicinity of East Nicholas and Cherry Streets in Hicksville. A second would be on Old Country Road.

Supervisor John Burke said the board would consider Mr. Yevoli's proposals, and that they were in keeping with the Town Board's previous actions in supporting residents against unwarranted intrusions of the M.T.A.

Councilman Yevoli, the only Democrat on the all-Republican Oyster Bay Town Board, said he didn't think the board would have any opposition to his request of the town attorney's office. "It's a non-partisan thing," he said.

Bd. Extends Liberal Tax Exemptions To Area Senior Citizens

Following a public hearing in December, the Syosset Board of Education voted unanimously to liberalize its tax policy on exemptions for senior citizens.

According to Board of Education President Simeon Wittenberg, the new policy provides a fifty percent exemption on school taxes if either a husband or wife is 65 years of age and income does not exceed \$5000. Under previous policy, both husband and wife had to be over 65, with a total income not exceeding \$3000 to qualify for the tax exemption.

"We are indebted to our senior citizens who through the years have contributed substantially to

the building, development and support of our educational system," said Mr. Wittenberg. "This is a time when many of our senior citizens are experiencing difficulty in coping with rising costs of living while on limited or fixed incomes. Their support of our schools in the past has earned them this consideration."

Mr. Wittenberg noted that the exemptions are not automatic and will be granted only upon application to the Department of Assessment at the Nassau County Office Building, 100 Old Country Road, Mineola, New York, 4th floor. Applications must be filed each year between January 2 and June 2.
