Hicksville Water District Answers . . .

The Board of Commissioners of the Hicksville Water District, with reluctance, finds it necessary to reply to the recent article in the HERALD concerning the fire hydrants in Hicksville.

The Hicksville Water District is uniquely fire department oriented. Two of the three Commissioners are former Chiefs of the Hicksville Fire Department and the third is a former fire Captain of the Hicksville Fire Department. The superintendent of the District is a former Hicksville Fire Department Commissioner, and the field man on hydrants is also a former Chief of the Hicksville Fire Department, having served very recently. A good rapport has always existed between the Fire Department and the Water District, with mutual problems being solved by means of joint meetings. An outstanding example of this mutual co-operation is the Hicksville Fire Department Training Course located at the Bethpage Road Site of the Hicksville Water District. This was a result of special legislation obtained by the Hicksville Water District to facilitate fireman training.

Mutual co-operation between the two special Districts has always been in rule. Therefore, the necessity to publicly reply to certain inaccuracies in the Fire Department's article in the

HERALD of February 4, is prompted only by a desire to keep the citizens of Hicksville properly informed. Neither the Board of Commissioners of the Hicksville Water District or the personnel of the District have been favored with the alleged "recent request for additional hydrants" neither has the alleged report or survey of the fire officials on hydrants been sent to or given to the District or its officials.

A constant hydrant program has been in progress in the District these many years. The "steamer" connection alluded to in the newspaper account, are being applied to the hydrants at a steady rate. Recently two large and costly programs have replaced many hydrants located at strategic locations within the Hicksville area. The area now contains over fifteen hundred hydrants, a number far in excess of any similar District in the State of New York. The last report of the Fire Underwriters, which examines both the Fire and Water Districts, resulted in a decrease in the fire insurance rate for the area.

Although no official report as to the recent fire on Charlotte Avenue has been delivered to the Water District, this industrial area is presently undergoing the construction of an underpass under the Long Island Railroad tracks by the State of New York. The Hicksville Water District at great expense has contracted with the State of New York to increase the mains in that area to twelve inch transmission main capacity to afford the maximum fire protection to this area. When the construction is completed the area will be more than amply supplied with hydrants capable of delivering a maximum flow of water. New construction and the vandalism by young people cause stones to be lodged in the mains. For many years after mutual

consultation between the Fire Department and the Water District, it has been standard operating procedure to blow out or flush the hydrants to spring out these occasional stones and to prevent damage to the strainers in the pumps of the Hicksville Fire Department. Numerous conferences with other Water Districts, the manufacturers of hydrants and the Fire Department officials, reveal that the problem of occasional stones in the mains is by no means unique to the Hicksville area. The Board of Commissioners being cognizant of this problem makes certain the hydrants are flushed regularly by the District and that a maintenance program is rigorously followed. The flushing program must be somewhat curtailed during this period of freezing weather in order to prevent hazardous conditions in the streets of the District. When the weather allows, the hydrant program is a daily concern of the Hicksville Water District.

There is no area of the District, within the jurisdiction of the District, (private property excepted) that is not covered by hydrants in accordance with the recommended standards of the Board of Fire Underwriters.

The Board of Commissioners of the Hicksville Water District hope that the mutual co-operation between these departments, which has so benefited the citizens of Hicksville in the past, will continue in the future.

Local Topics Coming Up At Tobay Meetings

A combination gas station / car wash in Plainview and a recreational day care center in Hicksville are among matters concerning residents of Mid-Island areas on the schedule for forthcoming public meetings of the Oyster Bay Town Board. Town of Oyster Bay meetings are held each Tuesday at Town Hall, starting at 10 A.M. This routine will be interrupted on Tuesday, February 23rd, when joint hearings between the Towns of Oyster Bay and Hempstead will be held at the Hicksville Annex, 65 Broadway, Hicksville.

Next Tuesday, February 16th, the Board will consider the awarding of franchise for Community Antenna Television (CATV) System on the Town Board's own motion by All-Towns Cable-TV. There have been other cable TV companies which have approached the Town Board for a franchise, and one which has

been granted by the Board. The granting of franchises concerning cable TV could affect the whole Town of Oyster Bay.

On February 23rd, as noted, the Town Board will hold a joint hearing with the Town of Hempstead at the Hicksville Annex to consider a proposed \$900,000 improvement to the Hicksville Water District, which lies partly in Hempstead Town. The joint Boards will also hear proposals to consider improvements to Levittown swimming pools.

On March 2nd the Board will hear the petition of Save Way Glenmore, Inc. for a change of zone from Business F to Business G District for a parcel on the south side of Old Country Road near Grohman's Lane and for a special permit use to erect and maintain a gas station and/or an automatic car wash. Save Way Glenmore is the contract vendee of the property, which is presently the site of a restaurant. The petitioner wishes to erect four 8,000-gallon gasoline storage tanks and a car / wash.

consisting of a 26x60 building on the extreme easterly side of the property.

An interesting aspect of the petition is the provisions for a 63' x 100' play area for a part of the property to the south which according to the map appears to have access on Grohman's Lane.

The property fronts 211.52 feet on Old Country Road, with a depth of about 230 feet.

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Top Student To Be Further Honored

Pamela Lambert Hicksville High School Senior, class valedictorian, and winner of the New York State Regents Scholarship with the highest score in the entire State has had another honor bestowed upon her.

Miss Lambert was selected by the William Randolph Hearst Foundation - U.S. Senate Youth Program - to participate in a week long internship program called Processes of Working Government. The Foundation invites 2 students from each State and from the District of Columbia to come to Washington, D.C. for an on-the-spot observation and study of the workings of our government.

Pam along with 100 other outstanding students spent this week of January 30th through February 6th at the Mayflower Hotel in Washington. They had military personnel from all branches of the armed forces, men and women, who served as escorts, and who provided transportation, housed with them at the hotel.

The students were given tours of the Capitol, Supreme Court, floor of the Senate, and House of Representatives. Senator Javits

met the N.Y. State students briefly. Senator Buckley spent an hour chatting with them and had his aides show them around his quarters and explain the function of his office.

Several luncheons were given in their honor. The speakers at these affairs included Attorney General Mitchell, Vice President Agnew, and Senator Mondale. Comment was made by these top law makers that the questions posed by these youngsters were more demanding than those usually asked by newsmen.

Secretary of Defense Laird spoke with the group at length during their tour of the Defense Department, and Bella Abzug, Congressman from the 19th District in New York City made a special point of visiting during their stay in Washington.

Each student, selected was awarded a \$1,000 scholarship by the Hearst Foundation to be used in any accredited college in the United States. The only provision of the scholarship is that the recipient take 2 full year courses in American Government or related subjects.

Aside from the educational experience, which according to Pam was more than considerable, another valuable aspect of the conference was meeting the other participants. Among her companions were the State of Idaho Champion Debater, and a Yale National Scholar, one of only thirty so honored in the entire country. Gary Kubeck from the Buffalo area was the other N.Y. State student chosen for the internship.

At long last Broadway - will get street lights

The one definite fact to emerge from a recent meeting of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce which I attended was that the hassle over the street lights on Broadway has ended. Contract preparation is in motion. So declared Councilman Warren M. Doolittle who was a guest at the Meeting.

As your article stated, the Hicksville Area project Manager for Raymond, Parish & Pine, Mr. Robert Geneslaw was the Guest Speaker, in the absence of Mr. George Raymond. Hicksville has been given top Priority in the study-plan of Tobay being made by this firm. Presently under way

are surveys of Traffic flow; land use; parking; population, retail, commercial and industrial areas; and the preparation of maps. Correlation of this data will be contained in a report to be submitted to the Town Board around the first of April. My question here is when does the average concerned resident and businessman get to see these suggestions?

There was considerable discussion as to the effect to Planning by the MTA on this study. Also, as to their right or authority of the MTA to condemn property for its use. Sub-Stations, office buildings, Air Rights, Station Extension, right-of-way Construction, are all

possibilities...we need a better rapport with the M.T.A. that's obvious!

It would appear that much duplication of effort is taking place in this study-plan. For almost three years the Hicksville Citizens Advisory Committee with the Nassau Planning Comm. conducted surveys, studies, prepared Maps and diagrammatic data on the Downtown area. One report was published, the final analysis and recommendations was completed but never released. In the Meantime, new Construction takes place all around the logical center - Hicksville. Why?

will be heard on March 9th. The petitioner, which has an address at 25 W. 43rd St., C/o Melville Shoe Corp., is the lessee of the property zoned Business G. The intention is to build a 44.83' x 78.5' building wherein the petitioner's agents and employees, included a psychologist, licensed teacher and other appropriate personnel, will provide day care for children between the ages of 3 and 9 for varying hours during the day in consideration of an hourly fee paid by the parent. Parking is provided for 25 cars. Children would be delivered and collected by parents.

Also on March 9th, the Town Board will hear the petition of John Thatcher for a special permit use to erect and maintain a building for storage of equipment and materials and to use an existing residence at 10 Midland Avenue for office purposes.

The petitioner took title to the Industrial H zoned property in September, 1970. The 60' x 150' parcel is on the east side of Midland Avenue about 362 feet north of the corner of Bethpage Rd. In the general contracting business, petitioner uses small equipment and a 2 1/2-ton flatbed truck.

Fire Dept. Cites Fire Hazard

Hicksville Fire Chief Melvin Voorhies, prompted by a few serious oil burner fires in recent weeks issued a warning to home owners who reside in the Levitt Built Homes in the Southern sections of Hicksville. It seems a large amount of Levitt homeowners are removing the protective metal covers from their oil burners, and replacing them with nicer looking insulated wooden covers. Homeowners have reported that oil burner service companies state the wood covers are safer.

If you stop for a moment and think, metal, is by all means the better protective cover to confine a fire. Most of our oil burner fires occur in the Levitt built homes. The oil burner is located in the

kitchen at the only exit from the ground floor bedrooms. In the recent fires the wood covers became severely involved in fire. Chief Voorhies points out that a bad fire in this area would prevent safe exit from this portion of the home.

A check with the Town Building Dept. found that the building code states non-combustible material is to enclose an oil or gas heating unit. It must have one ft. to eighteen inches clearance around the unit.

For your own safety, do not replace the protective metal cover on your oil burner. It is self evident that the strategic location of the oil burner warrants the Best protection - metal. Also it (Continued on page 10)

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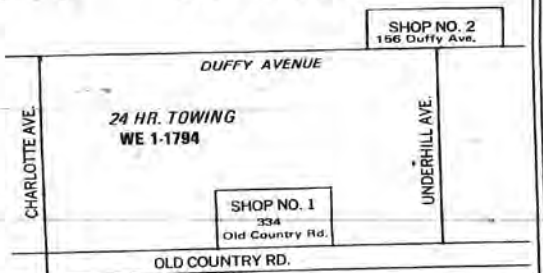

Meet Larry LoScalzo, the charming, boyish proprietor of the Eastsider Pub, located on Manetto Hill Road in Plainview. Beneath this youngish exterior lies a shrewd businessman whose youth belies his capabilities. This amazing entrepreneur, at the age of 27, is already worth in excess of a half million dollars.

As you open the double doors leading into the Eastsider Pub, it's like stepping into another world. Your eyes are taken with the Spanish-Moorish decor from the stucco walls, the black leather banquettes and the slate-topped tables, to the magnificent, 57-foot-long Belgian block bar, an original creation of the owner. Not only did Larry LoScalzo conceive and design this 2500-square-foot pub, but he literally built most of it with his own hands. The Pub caters to a lively lunch trade because of their proximity to the industrial park. After 9:30 the Pub takes on the atmosphere of a supper club. Another facet is the catering of small parties. The Pub is open seven days a week to 3 a.m. with dancing on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights. They cater to an over-21 crowd. Monday nights are dedicated to the Key Club; a private-party type atmosphere pervades with free food, dancing and entertainment. Admission is by front-door key only. Dues are \$25.00 a year for men, with ladies free. At present there are 150 members, who must be at least 24 years of age.

Larry's plans are to franchise pubs, but in a unique way: each one he builds will be one of a kind. He will design them, locate them, completely set them up and have a going business; a complete-for-sale package deal.

In July of 1970, when the pub was opened, he had already spent 16 of his 27 years on Long Island.

Jericho Library Board Subpoenas School Board

On Monday evening, January 25, the Jericho Library Board held a special, open meeting. The purpose of this meeting was to pass a resolution requiring the Jericho School Board to hold a special open meeting in March, at which time the members of this community would be asked to vote on a bond issue for \$110,000.

The \$110,000 bond issue would cover the cost of condemnation of 36,500 sq. ft. of additional land adjoining the present library property, to be used for parking for the new library. The \$110,000 would cover the cost of the land and the necessary improvements.

The laws of New York State are such that library boards cannot call public meetings to vote on bond issues. Only the school boards may do this. But the law states that the library board may pass a resolution requiring school boards to call such meetings.

At the monthly meeting of the Jericho School Board on Thursday evening, January 28, this resolution, asking for a public hearing by the library board, was defeated by a 2-2 vote of the school board (one member was absent).

The legal counsel for the school board informed the members that the law states the board is required to call this meeting. In

spite of this, Mr. Greenberg and Mr. Mayhew of the School Board decided to vote no, therefore denying the taxpayer his right to vote on this issue. These members felt that it was not a prudent step at this time to expend money for this land. A positive vote by these two members would not have approved any expenditure (other than the cost of a district meeting). Only the taxpayers may approve the expenditure and no one is able to foresee the outcome of such a vote until the final tally.

The only alternative available to the Library Board at this time was to seek redress in the courts to force the School Board to call a public meeting. As a result, the School Board was served with a subpoena. At a special, open meeting held by the School Board on Thursday evening, February 4, the board voted not to defend the subpoena, but to wait for the results of a hearing by the judge set for Tuesday, February 9.

At the time of this original 2-2 vote by the school board, Mr. Mayhew said that he felt that he was voting no because it was an "unconscionable" expenditure of funds at this time. Is not the additional expenditures for legal fees for a law suit an "unconscionable" expenditure?

Letter To The Editor

Dear Sir:

Enclosed is a copy of a letter sent by The Friends of the Jericho Public Library to Mr. William Mayhew, a member of the Jericho Board of Education, censuring him for his negative vote at the meeting of the School Board on January 28. This is in reference to the Library's request to hold a public meeting for the condemnation of property. We would appreciate it if you would print the letter in its entirety. Also, we wish to point out that, contrary to the article which appeared in your paper last week, Board Member Samuel Springer was not present for the meeting.

Friends of the Jericho Public Library

Dear Mr. Mayhew:

At a special meeting of the executive board of The Friends of the Jericho Public Library, held on February 2nd 1971, a motion was passed recommending that a letter be sent to you and to Mr. Greenberg, censuring you both for your deliberate attempt to destroy the Library by your vicious action at the School Board meeting on January 28th 1971, when you voted "NO" to a request submitted by the Library Board for a public meeting. The purpose of this open meeting, as you well know, was to enable the people of Jericho to vote on a bond issue of \$110,000, which will allow the Library to acquire land to be used as off-street parking for the new building. The amount of this bond issue would add less than one cent to the library tax rate, or approximately \$1.00 per family per year for a house assessed at \$10,000. Your "NO" vote, along with Mr. Greenberg's, did not allow this proposition to pass. In other words, you took it upon yourself to deny the people of Jericho the right to vote.

As a member of the Board of Education you were required to take an oath to uphold the laws of New York State. Education Law Section 260, subdivision 10, states in part:

"The board of trustees of a public library... shall have the power to determine the necessity for construction of library facilities, to select a library site or sites, to select the architect, and to require that the board of education call and conduct a special district meeting... for the purpose of designating and acquiring a site or sites..."

Your legal counsel advised you that you were acting improperly and that the Library Board may appeal this matter in the courts. You put yourself above the New York State Education Law. What have you and Mr. Greenberg accomplished for Jericho by forcing a lawsuit against the Board of Education? How much will this cost the community? Aren't you always watching for "needless," "capricious" expenditures?

Is this not going to be a needless expenditure? Or are you waiting for Mr. Springer's vote to bail you out? You cynically remarked that when Mr. Springer returned your vote wouldn't count anyway.

In the guise of "champion of the rights of the people" you have once again attempted to deny the people the right to make their own decision; i.e., a vote on the condemnation of the property in question. The Friends of the Jericho Public Library cannot stand by quietly and allow you to do this.

Mr. Mayhew: you are not an architect! You must stop trying to take over the duties of one. You are not a member of the Library Board of Trustees! You must stop trying to take over their duties. It is not in your province to suggest location or expenditures. You must stop playing to your audience.

We resent your disenfranchising action by not allowing this proposition to go to the public for their vote. You have already short-changed Jericho because of your delaying tactics. How much more do you want to cost us?

Since the inception of the Library you have been against it and, by various methods, have impeded its progress. You have finally found an ally in Mr. Greenberg who, to all good purposes, doesn't seem to realize that little children, adults, and older people read books. His hammering away at having the Library on the high school grounds (which was probably at your suggestion) infers that only high school students read books. Enough Mr. Mayhew! Stick to the Board of Education - you can do enough damage there without going on to the Library.
