First Annual Jack Aaron Memorial Concert March 7

On Sunday, March 7, at 3 p.m. the Hicksville Public Library announces the first Jack Aaron Memorial Concert to be held in the library auditorium. The late Mr. Aaron was chairman of the Music Department in the Levittown/School District. Mrs. Aaron is a member of the Hicksville Library Board of Trustees. This concert, in Mr. Aaron's memory, was planned by the Hicksville Library Fine Arts Committee and the Tri M Society of the Hicksville High School. The Hicksville Library houses the Jack Aaron Music Collection, acquired by donations from friends and colleagues of Mr. Aaron. This collection of chamber music is designed for use of churches, schools, and interested musicians throughout Nassau County.

The program on Sunday is unique for the participants are not only from Nassau, but there are several young people included from Suffolk County as well. The purpose of the presentation is to promote useful participation in chamber music

groups for young musicians.

Included on the program will be a String Quartet, a Woodwind Quartet, a Baroque Concerto for four violins, a pair of prize winning compositions in a premier performance (won by a student from Northport who received this award from New York State Music Educators), a special group from the Levittown Schools performing a Handel Concerto Grosso on the harpsichord and there will also be a Madrigal Singers group.

The students in the groups range from Junior to Senior High School. The school districts represented besides Hicksville and Levittown are Syosset, Jericho, Port Washington, East Northport and North Shore. Some of Mr. Aaron's former students are performing, but because of limited space and time many of his students who have graduated will not be able to perform.

Two groups will be taped in a rehearsal by an educational TV station, to be seen on television later in the spring.

'See you, cookie,' says Heather. 'Bona Sera, Mrs. Campbell,' says Columbus and he leaves.

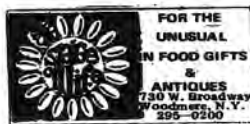

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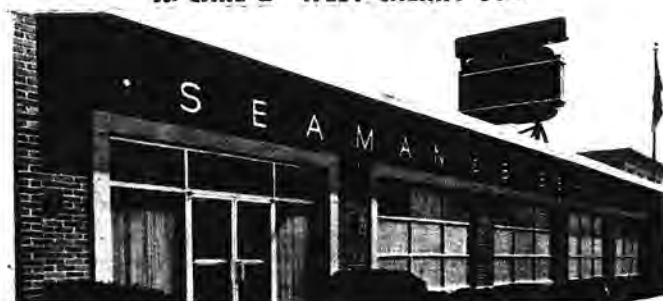
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Plainview High School In Cinema Program Jazz Festival-Competition At Library

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Dear Friends

This week we received some new statistics from the Census Bureau that we thought would interest you.

Nassau County's official population in the 1970 census was 1,422,905, up 9.4 percent from the 1960 figure of 1,300,171. The Bureau of Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, reports.

The official populations of the state was 18,190,740 up 8.4 percent from the 1960 population count, which was 16,782,304.

The 1970 census counted 1,350,884 white persons in Nassau County, 94.9 percent of the total; 65,416 negroes, and 6,605 persons of other races. In 1960, 96.8 percent of the population was white.

The census showed 97,735 children under 5 years; 397,126 in ages 5 through 17; 816,290 people 18 through 64; and 11,754 who were 65 and older. The population 14 years and over included 684,404 married people, 74,618 who were widowed, 15,000 divorced, and 285,063 never married.

Nassau County's 1970 population was classified as 99.7 percent urban, and 0.3 percent rural.

There were 399,542 Households, with 1,407,027 persons, including 37,846 one-person households. In addition 15,878 persons were living in group quarters.

The 1970 census counted 408,637 housing units in Nassau County, 322,954 of them occupied by owners, 76,588 occupied by tenants, and 9,095 vacant. These included vacant units for seasonal use. The proportion occupied by owners in 1970 was 79.0 percent, compared with 80.0 percent in 1960.

Among year-round dwelling units there were 326,743 single family houses, 78,749 housing units in multi-unit buildings, and 239 mobile homes or trailers. The percentage of occupied units with more than one person per room was 4.0, compared with 4.7 in 1960. Of all the occupied housing units, 395,805 had piped water, toilet, and bath, while 3,737 lacked some or all plumbing.

The Median value of owner-occupied houses in Nassau County was \$30,200, compared with \$18,500 in 1960. The median rent paid by tenants in 1970 was \$159 per month, compared with \$106 in 1960. Half were over and half below the median figures.

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Doctors Shortage

State Assemblyman Martin Ginsberg (R-Plainview) has called upon the medical profession to come to the forefront in seeking solutions to end New York State's growing doctor shortage.

In an address at the annual convention of the New York State Medical Society, in Manhattan, Ginsberg, who is Chairman of the Assembly Health Committee, asked the doctors to consider the merits of shortening the medical students' curriculum, from the present 8 years to 6 years and establishing evening enrollment similar to programs offered in most law schools.

"The medical profession should be in the forefront of change in establishing new policies to meet our own doctor shortage and a national shortage of an estimated 50 thousand doctors," Ginsberg stated.

The Plainview lawmaker, who has been meeting the deans of New York's 11 medical schools to discuss problems of financing and enrollment procedure, said he planned to introduce legislation this year calling for increased state assistance to both the medical schools as well as to prospective students.

In a brief session held at 65 Broadway, Hicksville, on Tuesday, February 23rd, the joint Town Boards of Oyster Bay and Hempstead approved an expenditure of \$900,000 for improvement to the Hicksville Water District, which lies partly in both towns.

Included in the proposed improvements is the construction of two wells at Plant No. 9 Alicia Street, and of one storage tank. The two wells will have a capacity of 1400 gallons per minute. They will be 550 feet in depth each 20' x 12' double casing.

The storage tank will rise fifteen feet above ground and be sunk 10 feet below ground with a 2 million gallon capacity.

A pumping station is also recommended.

The improvements are designed to meet the continuously rising demand, according to Water Commissioner Harry Borley, and to provide for future industry and expansion.

The Hicksville Water District serves an area of approximately 7.67 square miles, with a population of about 60,150.
