Career Day, Moratorium Top Town Board Business

It was an orderly day at Town Hall, Oyster Bay, on Tuesday, May 4 as the Town Board observed "Career Day" in which several high school youngsters of the Town participated, and carried on the regular business of the Town meeting, much of which was of interest to Hicksville and Plainview residents.

The big story for Hicksville residents was a vote by the Board to extend the nearly ended six-month moratorium on the issuance of building permits in the downtown area for another three months. The Board voted 6-0 with one abstention (Councilman Lewis J. Yevoli) in favor of the moratorium after hearing about a half-dozen property owners in the moratorium area object to it and question how long it would continue.

"Nothing is certain," Supervisor John Burke told Alton Giese, of 84 Lee Avenue, who owns property on Old Country Road in the moratorium area. However, he said he felt that three additional months would be sufficient time for Raymond Parrish & Co., who will submit a plan for the area, to come through with recommendations.

Mr. Giese said that he pays nearly \$100. in taxes each month

on the property, which has been under contract of sale for a year. He said he might as well "give it away" in later conservation.

Mrs. Eleanor Miller of 220 Sackett St., was concerned about the effect of the moratorium on her home. Others who expressed concern were Judge Joseph Lebkeucher; Joseph Masel of 31 James St.; and Edward Jablonski of 84 Raymond St.

Judge Lebkeucher described difficulties suffered by a tenant of his on Jerusalem Ave. in getting a permit for construction allowable in the zoning designation on the property.

In other business, the Town Board directed the Town Clerk to advertise notice of a rescheduled hearing on Carnation Property for May 25 to erect a major office building on Burke Ave. and Broadway, Hicksville, and of a hearing on the same day on the

petition of 5942 Corporation for a special permit use to erect, operate and maintain a private club (VFW Post No. 5942 Meeting Hall) on Old Country Road west of the Bethpage State Parkway land in Plainview.

The Board also resolved to declare Tuesday, May 11 Senior Citizen's Day in the Town of Oyster Bay and May Senior Citizen's Month; and authorized two of the staff to attend a Solid Waste Disposal Program sponsored by the New York State Dept. of Environmental Conservation at Hofstra University in June and July.

What television viewer could fail to be moved by the sight of young veterans demonstrating against the war in VietNam? Well, had you been there, you would also have been moved by your emotion might not always have been sympathy.

Included in these veterans groups were fine, decent, dedicated young Americans totally against the conflict and very responsibly demonstrating their views. And then there were the others, many calling themselves "veterans" but their service quite obviously had been performed in one of the various hippy communes. The former engaged in intelligent discussion and dialogue with their representatives while the latter marched on the Pentagon, singing cadence with obscene four-letter words and holding aloft the clenched fist of revolution.

And this is the group which presented to Congress not resolutions, not petitions but "demands." These "demands" included amnesty for every young American self-exiled or imprisoned for refusing to serve his country. And these self-proclaimed diplomats demanded that American influence be removed not only from Viet Nam but also from Africa, Europe, Latin America and South America. These "demands" were the sort one might expect to

read in the Daily Worker or hear from Hanoi.

While a group of "veterans" was disrupting a Congressional hearing, one Congressman requested that all members of the group give their names and the details of their service. A demonstrator showed the true colors of this particular group when he admitted that there were many non-veterans present. "What the hell does that mat-

ter?" he asked.

From Our Children's Room

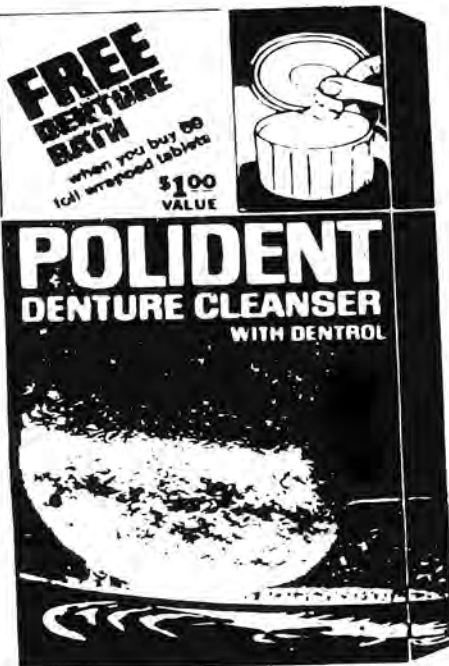

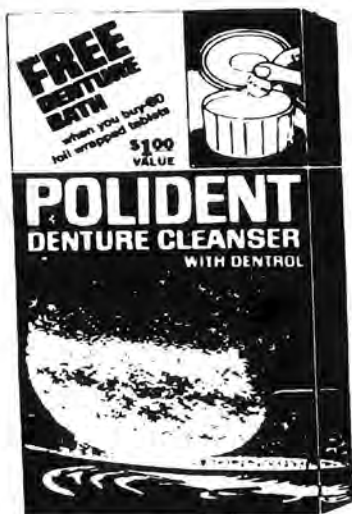

Fire Report April 25 Thru May 1

Total Alarms received for April - 83
Rescue Calls - 15, False Alarms - 9, False Alarms to Date - 58
Totals alarms for 1971 to Date - 289.

This past week Hicksville vamps answered 17 calls for assistance. 6 of them were Rescue calls. For the first time in many months, the Fire Department got through one week without a false alarm. Wonders will never cease!!!

A house fire on April 29 at 6:12 am at 187 B Cantigue Rd. Caused considerable damage. The smoke was visible from the heart of Hicksville. 5 pieces of apparatus and 50 men under Ast. chief Mertz responded. The occupants - parents and 4 children - Barely escaped with the clothes on their backs. The only exit, a kitchen door, was blocked by fire. The family escaped through a rear window unharmed. I regret to report that the family's pet dog, after a fast search by yours truly, couldn't be saved. Losing a dog in a fire may not seem like much to some people but a family pet means a lot to the family involved. Our members always try when possible to protect the safety of the pets just as much as the family.

I don't want to sound like a broken record, but a fire such as this illustrates how swift a fire can start. Be prepared, have an alternate means of escape, you never know when the normal way will be blocked. The fire marshals office is investigating the possibility that the fire may have started in the kitchen from a faulty toaster.

ALSO ON April 29 at 9:41 AM Hicksville firemen responded to a gas leak at 127 N. Broadway the vamps were on the scene for one hour. No fire occurred and Lilco crews stopped the leak.

"Whats Cooking?"

During the course of the year many fires occur in the kitchen here are a few hints for fire safety in the kitchen.

1. If a fire occurs on top of the stove in a pan - turn off the heat - try to smother the flame by covering the fire with the pan cover. Caution - Watch out for yourself and your clothing.
2. If covering the fire doesn't work, try your fire extinguisher - you should have one (Dry chemical or carbon dioxide only).
3. If fire occurs in the oven - turn off the heat - keep the oven door closed for a few moments.
4. Again, if this doesn't work, crackopen the door and use your fire extinguisher BUT

If fire ignites nearby combustibles, (curtains, kitchen cabinets) or threatens to:

- Get every one out of the House
- Close the kitchen door on the way out to prevent the fire from spreading
- AND - Call the Fire Department!
- NEVER Risk carrying out a burning pan
- NEVER - Put water on grease fires. It will splatter and spread flames.

And never try to fight anything but a SMALL FIRE.

Where is your Kitchen Extinguisher?

It should be located where you can get it in a hurry

Know how to use it. Review the instructions occasionally

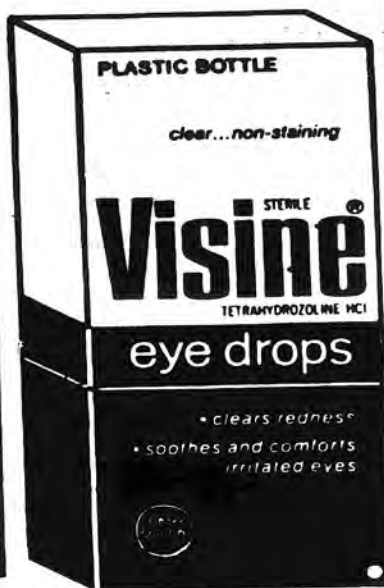
HS Theatre Society To Produce 2 Plays

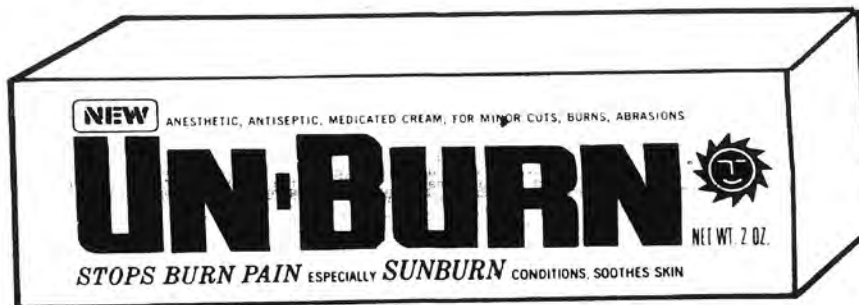

Mr. Paul Ettenson of our English Department is providing a very interesting approach to poetry for his students. Following are quotes from his introduction to poetry interpretation through essays on criticism. "The thoughts and almost involuntary visions of the young critics reflect a number of things about poetry, themselves and their conceptions of society as seen through the watchglass of literary imagination. They further point to Archibald Macleish's dictum that a poem 'must not mean, but be,' which ultimately reveals the

fact that poetry's most useful objectives seems to be in its effort to delve into the amorphous imagination in order to boost us toward an overall realization of particulars.

The world is a metaphor. Even our fundamental thesis of learning is based upon the identification of similarities and parallels. Thus, when we discard the superficiality of each object and idea carrying its own weight of significance and see it within its matrix, we rise above the self-imprisonment of of Macleish's "meaning."

In interpreting a relatively unknown, "reputationless" poem by Jon Stallworthy, "The Trap", my students had the valuable though by no means novel experience of realizing that through poetry language could be released from its mathematical confinement so as to grasp at the common nature of society and its collective experiences. They found that in the words of poet Robert Bly, the poet was 'a deep-sea diver trying to levitate.'

The interpretations made were social, political, ecological, pathological, and psychiatric - no two were the same. However, their formulators felt, as does this writer, that all of the explanations are logical, imaginative and that somewhere in each there is the incandescent glow of awareness and recognition. Above all, the "non-meanings" take us deep into the territory of each writer's concern for his and his society's condition."

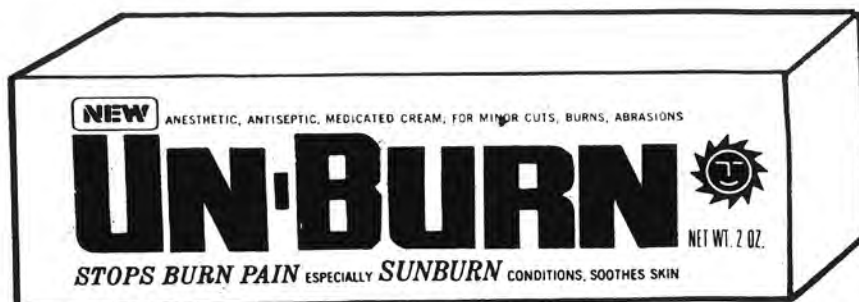
