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Youth Activities Council Sponsoring Employment Service

Once again the Plainview-Old Bethpage Youth Activities Council is sponsoring a Youth Employment Service in conjunction with New York State Employment. Mr. Norman Feldman and student co-chairmen Glenn Bishop and Mitchell Rich are spending the next few weeks trying to find jobs for an estimated 500 students. The YES is going to have a telephone set up in the Little Red Schoolhouse to speed operations, and may be extended past the summer for the first time.

The Little Red Schoolhouse is now being used by Youth Council for meetings four nights a week. Youth Center Advisory Committee meetings are held every Tuesday night at 7:30; Board of Directors meetings every Wednesday at 7:30 and REACH meetings every Thursday.

Monday night, June 14 is the date for a meeting of all interested citizens and organizations regarding help for the Youth Center Complex. Youth Center Advisory Committee Chairman Dave Marcus Title has drawn up a tentative calendar of activities from July to December

and the youth of Plainview may have something else to do this summer than hang out at the bowling alley or the shopping center.

Plans are now being finalized for the Earth Day clean up to be held June 12th. There will be a clean up of Plainview-Old Bethpage that morning and a concert that night on the football field of Plainview-Old Bethpage High School. All those who participate in the clean up will be admitted free to the concert. The clean up is being co-sponsored by the Youth Center Advisory Committee and the Ecology Workshop of REACH. Recycling of papers, bottles and aluminum cans will be handled by Kennedy High School's Plainview Conservation Club at its regular recycling program every Saturday.

Mr. Norman Feldman, head of the Youth Employment Service, has been named as the Director of Activities of the Youth Center. The Board of Directors is about to hire a community youth worker, who will conduct weekly rap sessions and individual and group counseling.

Hicksville Youth Council Meeting

At the last meeting of the Hicksville Youth Council the program formulated by the council will begin with a job referral service for the youth of Hicksville. Help in locating summer and part time employment such as lawn care, odd jobs, for the boys and mothers helper, ironing etc., for the girls will be on the program. Mini courses in arts and crafts will also be started. The upper story of the old telephone building on Nicolai St. has been rented and will be the base of all operations after June 1.

The youth branch of the Hicksville Youth Council, is directed by a full time staff member of the Nassau County youth board. The youth branch will undertake their own fund raising, but will also receive financial support from the parent organization, the Hicksville

Youth Council.

One of the fund raising projects is, an arts and crafts fair to be held on the grounds of the Hicksville high school on June 5. In the planning stage is a trip to Bear mountain and possibly an overnight camping trip. The youth branch is also tutoring elementary school children in conjunction with Operation Out Reach. This service is free of charge.

Please support the ARTS and CRAFTS FAIR. Encourage these teenagers to keep up the good work.

Hicksville Postmaster Ralph G. Cascardo announced that the Hicksville Post Office and its branches and stations will observe regular holidays schedules next Monday, May 31, 1971 Memorial Day.

There will be no regular window or delivery services but special delivery services will be available. The main post office lobby will remain open for access to lock boxes and the self service postal unit.

Collections from street letter boxes will be on holiday

schedules and will include pickups from "airmail only" boxes. These boxes will be collected on Memorial Day and mail will be processed to meet the newly-established airmail service standards including deliveries next day up to a 600 mile radius for designated cities. This applies in about 500 cities participating in the program.

On the Saturday preceding the holiday - May 29 - regular Saturday schedules, including window and delivery services, will be observed.

Hicksville Community Council May Meeting

MINUTES
The Board of Directors met before the regular meeting of the Hicksville Community Council. The president opened the meeting and stated the motto of the Hicksville Community Council is "For a Better Hicksville". Those attending the meeting stood and introduced themselves.

Sheila Noeth urged all residents of Hicksville to make sure they are registered in order that they can cast their vote on June 8th on the budget and for the candidates running for office. The following men are seeking the two seats on the School Board: William J. O'Donnell, incumbent seeking to succeed himself; Albert E. Donor, Jr., 27 Peachtree Lane, Hicksville; Burton M. Roberts, 89 East Avenue, Hicksville; Omy Maier, 85 Sunnyside Avenue, Hicksville; Harold Satran, 2 Adelphi Road, Hicksville.

The deadline for registering for anyone interested in running for the School Board is May 25th.

It was announced that on June 2nd at 8:00 P.M. at the Hicksville Junior High School, all of the filed candidates for the School Board were invited to participate in a forum. This will give the residents an opportunity to meet and hear what the candidates have to say before they go to the polls.

Mr. Kenneth Barnes was the first speaker of the evening, discussing the proposed budget of the Hicksville Public Library. A copy of this budget and the annual report of the library had been distributed for those attending the meeting. Mr. Barnes advised a copy was mailed to every resident of Hicksville. Mr. Barnes spoke of the tremendous resources of the library and how it is used by students from both our public and parochial schools. The annual report gives an account of what we did last year and what the library proposes to do this year. Mr. Barnes spoke of the concerts, the film programs, the services to the home bound, the handicapped, and the many services available through the library. The library circulates approximately 325,000 books each year. Mr. Barnes urged your support of the proposed budget when you go to the polls on June 8th.

Our Superintendent of the Hicksville Public Schools, Mr. Donald Abt was the next speaker, discussing the proposed school budget of \$22,245,329. Mr. Abt stated the work in preparing a budget is not an easy one. State aid and transportation are two major areas that must be reflected in our budget, also the cost for the services of B.O.C.E.S.

The Board of Education is aware of the economic pressure upon us and upon our schools, and have budgeted within a reasonable means. The increase representing salaries for the next year amounts to \$1,536,000. A teacher with a BA will now receive \$8,744.00, instead of the previous \$8,000.00. We have entered into a two year contract with our personnel.

We are adding three speech teachers to our staff at a cost of \$45,000.00. There has been a reduction of staff totaling eighteen. The average class size is 28, with a maximum of 31. Transportation is up this year approximately \$15,000.00, and the contract for this year allows a 1.25 per cent increase in the cost of the bus next year. Bus companies refuse to bid on a multi-year contract.

Fire insurance, free lunches,

attorney fees, postal rates, and B.O.C.E.S. are all costing more.

More and more of our students are going to B. O. C. E. S. for a technical education, rather than go on to the colleges.

Mr. Abt explained that our recreation program amounting to \$51,000.00 would be put on a separate referendum for the people to vote on.

Mr. Abt explained that at the present time the number of students attending our schools is going down, which affects our state aid, and consequently causes the public tax ratio to go up.

Mr. Abt also explained that we supply the nursing services for the parochial schools and are reimbursed for this.

Mr. Abt mentioned some of the areas that would be affected by an austerity budget, — textbooks, library books, cafeteria, interscholastic activities, etc.

Mr. Abt answered many questions from the floor.

Q. Will we ever get to the point where we have the fixed items separate?

A. State law directs that we must keep everything together.

Q. Individual referendums — Will we probably see more of this?

A. The Board of Education is interested in knowing what the people really want on the transportation issue.

Q. If the school and busing referendum are not passed, will the Board of Education come back with another referendum?

A. It is costly when the budget is put up additional times.

Q. I understand each election costs \$4,000.00. Suggest a central located place to cut down this cost.

A. Mr. Abt stated he would present this to the Board.

Q. Do the Board of Education have any idea from the survey on what the people really want?

A. They were satisfied with it.

Q. What would you say is the high across the board increase in function No 200?

A. Function No. 200 which consists of teachers, administration, clerical and billing staff, etc., I believe would run about 9.3 per cent.

Mr. Abt advised administration have been examining ways on how they can utilize money we already have available to reach those children that have reading difficulty at an early age. This program would focus on reading and place the emphasis in this area in the lower grades.

Mr. Abt advised the summer school going on at Lee Avenue is supported by federal funds. The parochial schools are invited to send their children to our summer schools.

Mr. Joseph McCarthy, incumbent running for the Library Board, thanked the people for the privilege of serving on the Library Board for nine years, and hopes the people will show their confidence in him and lend their support when they go to the polls on June 8th.

Mr. Wm. O'Donnell, incumbent to succeed himself on the School Board was not able to be at the Hicksville Community Council meeting as previously planned.

Mr. Albert E. Donor, Jr. of 27 Peachtree Lane, Hicksville introduced himself, spoke of his background and qualifications, and stated he was an independent running for Mr. O'Donnell seat. Since John McManus is not planning to run for reelection, this seat also will be open, and the following men seeking Mr. McManus's seat on the School Board, introduced them — selves

and spoke briefly of their families, background and qualifications:

Mr. Omy Maier, 85 Sunnyside Lane, Westbury

Mr. Harold Satran, 2 Adelphi Road, Hicksville

Mr. Burton M. Roberts, 89 East Avenue, Hicksville

Tom Nagle announced that HAD has now been funded. Mr. Nagle also stated that parents with a problem can call him at home or at the store front which is open at night. New Meeting Building Sought by VFW Post

There was moderate questioning by residents but only mild objection to the petition of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 5942 to erect a new meeting hall behind the present one on Old Country Road, which was presented to the Town Board and the public on Tuesday, May 25th by Hicksville attorney Eric A. Roeckl.

Although the Town Clerk read off a telegram received from the Greater Plainview Community Association to the effect that many residents wanted to speak out on this petition and requesting a night hearing, no GPCA representative stood up to speak. The Town Clerk had informed Mrs. Carol Fishman, who sent the telegram in behalf of GPCA, that requirements for a night hearing included the receipt of a petition containing at least 100 names at the Town Clerk's office no later than five days prior to the scheduled hearing.

A letter was read from Mr. and

Mrs. Lewis Hemminger, nearby residents, who feared potential rowdyism in the parking lot, and requested that the board deny the petition.

The Building Dept. recommended widening in the parking area for better ingress and egress.

Mr. Victor Larson, of 531 Old Country Road, said that the VFW had been good neighbors up to the present, but questioned whether this expansion might cause a nuisance to the neighborhood in late evening noise, traffic, etc.

One-story building

The VFW proposes to erect a one-story, 12-foot high building, with dimensions of approximately 43' x 46'. It would consist primarily of a meeting hall, with small kitchen, washroom and cloakroom facilities.

Joint use of the two buildings for any one function was not planned, Mr. Roeckl said. Present parking would be sufficient to accommodate the new building, he added.

The VFW Post No. 5942 now has 160-175 members and is growing, he said. When functions are held in the present meeting hall, formerly the residence of the Murphy family, people must be accommodated both upstairs and downstairs, with a cumbersome problem of running up and down. In the new meeting hall, all could be accommodated on the one floor.

There are about 30 homes within a 300 foot radius of the property, which is adjacent to the Bethpage Parkway property on the south side of Old Country Road.

Opposition Voiced to Broadway Office Bldg.

Several people were present at the Town Meeting in Oyster Bay on Tuesday to object to the petition of Carnation Property, Inc., for a change of zone from Residence D to Business G District for a corner parcel which could put a major office building on Broadway and Burke Avenue, Jericho.

Presenting the petition was Joseph J. Catania, Esq., of Woodbury, who did not present a proposed building plan for the site. He stated that the residential zoning of the property had been declared unconstitutional.

A communication from the Nassau County Planning Commission recommended that the petition be approved on the condition that the building had no ingress or egress on E. 18th Street, which is a residential street parallel to Broadway.

Rene Maulfrey, a resident of Burke Avenue for 22 years, said he was concerned about the property which abuts his side yard, fearing noise, traffic and fumes from parking.

Kathy Torquato, of E. 18th Street, representing her parents, inquired what parking provisions would be made.

Joseph Cannon, of 14 East 18th Street, directly behind the subject premises, had three objections. He said that an entrance onto Burke Avenue would be impractical because of the width of the street, causing traffic problems; the two homes left on the block would be surrounded by commercial development; the petitioner does not state exactly what type of building would be erected.

Mrs. William Breidenbach, of 15 Burke Avenue, said she did not receive proper notice. Some notices were addressed to residents of 20 or 30 years ago, she said.

The unpredictability of Congress these days is perhaps most aptly illustrated by the SST incident of last week. This program was instantly revived by the House, instantly slaughtered once again in the Senate and then subjected to a quarrel between the two houses of Congress over the circum-

stances of its burial.

This unpredictability could be considered humorous if it weren't such a clear indication of the troubled mood of Congress. A good deal of the flip-flopping can be traced to the instability of leadership in Congress at a time when great crises confront us at home and abroad.

I had predicted that this Congressional year would be one of utter partisanship on the part of Democratic leaders in their eagerness to upstage the President and be certain that he should have no record of legislative accomplishment to carry into an election year. But who could have predicted that certain solons in the Senate would for personal whim imperil the security of an entire continent?

Sen. Mansfield will find many a sympathetic ear, including mine, if he merely suggests or

recommends reductions in our military commitments abroad for purposes of strengthening our balance of payments. But to use the legislative meat ax, rather than to permit diplomatic negotiations with our NATO allies and the Russians, indicates a petulance and cavalier approach to European and American national security which is incomprehensible to me.

We can expect a Congressional year of continuing partisanship and we can deal with that. But foolhardiness such as Sen. Mansfield's and irresponsible

demagoguery on the part of some Presidential aspirants make it difficult for many of us who try to put our nation's security above political convenience.

Foreign Language Supervisor Awarded Grant

Mrs. Vera Galante, Foreign Language Supervisor of Hicksville Public Schools, has been successful in her application to participate in a six-week study program to be held at Columbia University this summer.

Her admission to the program is particularly pleasing in view of the large number of qualified candidates who applied, (25 people accepted out of several thousand hopefuls.)

The grant covers tuition and fees for six points of academic credit and a \$50 allowance for books and travel.

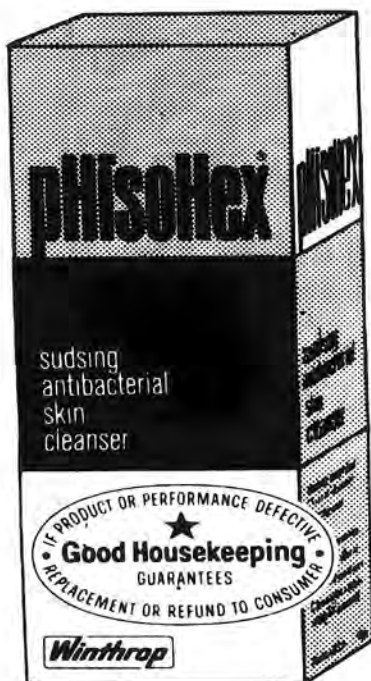
Annual Spring Concert Held

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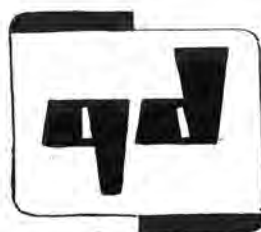

- The appropriation of the necessary funds to meet the estimated expenditures of the School District for the 1971-72 school year for school purposes in the sum of \$22,145,329.
- The appropriation of the necessary funds to meet the estimated expenditures of the Hicksville Free Public Library for the period July 1, 1971 to June 30, 1972, in the sum of \$399,963.19.
- RESOLVED that the Board of Education is hereby authorized:
 - To continue the existing student transportation policy by expending funds estimated at not to exceed \$550,000.00 to supplement funds provided in the School Budget (Proposition No. 1), so as to provide transportation:
 - a Kindergarten through third grades: Instead of over three miles (budget as submitted) to begin at over one-half mile;
 - b Fourth grade through sixth grade: instead of over two miles, to begin at over three-quarter miles;
 - c Seventh grade through ninth grade: Instead of over two miles for the seventh through eighth grades and over three miles for the ninth grade, transportation shall be furnished to each of said grade to begin at over one mile;
 - d Public and non-public schools, within and outside District ninth through twelfth grades;

Instead of over three miles limited to ten miles, to begin at over one mile for ninth grade, and at over one and one-half miles tenth through twelfth grades up to twenty-two miles.

- Handicapped: Instead of to educational facility located within distance up to twenty miles, to nearest such facility approved by the Board, offering appropriate training, not exceeding twenty-two miles.
- RESOLVED that the Board of Education is hereby authorized:
 - a. To expend funds estimated at not to exceed \$51,000 for the purpose of recreation programs within the District benefitting students, public and non-public, and adults.

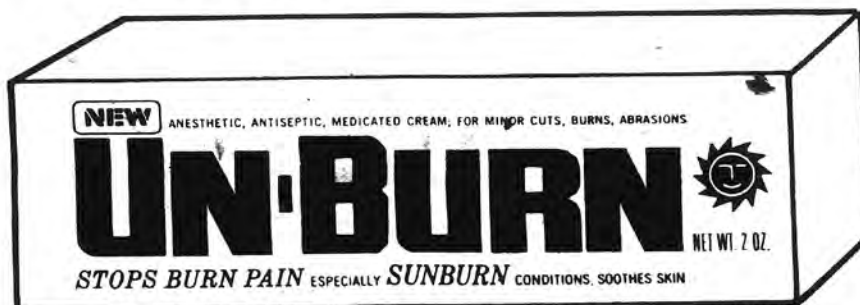
