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Where Were You?

Where were you Wednesday night? - Were you one of the 75 to 80 Hicksville residents at the PTA Council forum for School and Library Board candidates? Were you one of the people—whether PTA members, district employees, current School Board members, candidate supporters, or interested citizens—seeking information on possible School and Library Board trustees? Were you one of the candidates seeking election as a trustee? Maybe you couldn't be at the meeting—you were working, you were taking care of your family, you were ill, you had other plans, you weren't aware of the forum, you didn't care.

Four School Board candidates were at the forum—Omy Maiers, Harold Satran, Al Donor and Bill O'Donnell. Four were not—Joseph McCarthy, Library Board candidate, was ill; George Pappas, School Board candidate, had a previous engagement; Roy Sluder, Library Board candidate, did not respond to the invitation to attend the forum; Ed Bello, School Board candidate, had said he would attend but did not show up.

Where were you when the candidates were presenting their qualifications for serving on the School Board? Where were you when the four candidates answered questions from the audience?

Where were you when the candidates gave their position on having all aspects of a Health Education program in the district?

Mr. Maiers said he is in favor of a full curriculum of health education. He approves of the present community committee which is reviewing and commenting on curriculum suggestions.

Mr. Satran prefers to know what is being taught and by whom before supporting the family living aspect of Health Education. He feels this should be taught at home.

Dr. Donor is in favor of Health Education, but there should be controls. The personnel teaching "sex education" should be trained, parents should have rights and the curriculum should be a constructive program.

Mr. O'Donnell is generally in favor of Health Education, but he has reservations about the family living program at the elementary level. He would take a hard look at the curriculum and staff.

How do you feel about a student serving on the School Board in a non-voting capacity? Do you know how the School Board candidates feel about it?

Mr. Maiers would permit this. He feels eventually the student should have a vote.

Mr. Satran is not in favor of this. He feels it's a waste of time, because it's not fair unless the student is a voting member of the Board. He feels that students have the knowledge but not the experience necessary.

Dr. Donor is against this concept; it is "tokenism." If we respect youth enough to allow them to sit on the Board, then it should be as a voting member.

Mr. O'Donnell says no. We should listen to the students, but not permit them to sit on the Board.

What are your feelings about vandalism in the district? What are your ideas for reducing this destruction of public property?

Mr. Maiers feels we should educate the parents as to the dangers to their children and the waste of money involved.

Mr. Satran recommends apprehending those responsible for vandalism and making the parents pay the costs, as is now allowed by State law.

Dr. Donor says vandalism is symptomatic. We must do away with the cause. Those guilty of vandalism should be apprehended because their parents should be aware of a problem that exists. He added that vandalism is not limited to youths.

Mr. O'Donnell feels we must instill the responsibility in our children to respect our own and others' property.

Were you present to hear the candidates' views on resubmission of the budget, if it should not pass on the first vote? And what cuts, if any, they would make.

Mr. Maiers would resubmit because the kids suffer on austerity. He feels the present proposed budget is a tight one and he would be guided by Administration as to what cuts could be made.

Mr. Satran would resubmit as is. He would make no cuts unless he could be shown that the proposed budget is not a tight one.

Dr. Donor would also resubmit. If the proposed budget is re-examined and there is new evidence, cuts may be possible. But he doubts if many could be made.

Mr. O'Donnell "couldn't buy austerity" - he would resubmit. It may be possible to make some cuts, but he feels there is no fat in this budget. It is a sound budget.

Many other questions were asked Wednesday night. Many other viewpoints were expressed. Many opportunities were available for you to obtain information about your School Board candidates.

Where were you? These men may be establishing the educational policies of our school district. They may be affecting your child's education. Are you willing to give up your right to also control your child's education? You are, if you do not inform yourself about those candidates seeking to serve on our School Board.

Remember these men may control your tax dollars. They may affect your child's future. Would you let your child go off with strangers? Why let their education be controlled by strangers?

Where were you? You have a responsibility to yourself and your children to be an informed voter. If your children are out of school, your responsibility has not ended. The children in our schools today may be your neighbors tomorrow. What kind of neighbors do you want?

Where were you? You should make sure you know who you're voting for. You should insist that candidates be presented to the public—

School Board Candidates

Seeking re-election to the School Board for another three years is William B. O'Donnell. Mr. O'Donnell has been a resident of Hicksville for 18 years. He has five children who have attended, or are attending, Hicksville public schools. Mr. O'Donnell is a graduate of St. John's University with a BBA in Accounting. He is presently employed as Controller of the Arma Division of AMBAC Industries Inc.

The School Board position currently held by John McManus is being contested by three candidates—Ormus Maiers, George Pappas and Harold Satran.

Mr. Maiers has three children attending Burns Avenue, Junior High and Senior High in Hicksville. He has lived here for nine years. Mr. Maiers has a BBA from the City College of New York. He is self-employed as a manufacturers representative.

George Pappas is an electrical engineer with a BSEE degree from Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute. Mr. Pappas has lived in Hicksville for sixteen years and has two children in the Hicksville public schools.

Mr. Satran is a fourteen-year resident of Hicksville and has two children who have attended, or are now attending, Hicksville schools. He is a graduate of Brooklyn College with a BA in economics. Mr. Satran is an independent insurance broker.

CONTRACT AWARDED

At its regular meeting on Tuesday, June 1st, the Town Board of Oyster Bay approved a resolution awarding a contract to excavate the 16-acre town-owned site adjacent to the present land fill area in Old Bethpage for additional refuse disposal.

The contract was awarded to Joseph Zanghi, of Hauppauge at an amount of \$296,000. The new landfill area, which will hold 350,000 cubic yards of material, will be good for about 30 months, according to Supervisor John Burke. He said that this is a favorable outlook compared to what many other municipalities face.

The town is currently burning about 300 tons of refuse out of 1100 tons taken in daily. In a year to fifteen months when work is finished on the incinerators, he estimates, the town will be burning 900 tons a day. The goal is to burn more and bury less, he said.

In June the Ernest F. Francke Republican Club will hold its 2nd Annual Flag Day Tribute in Hicksville at the Kennedy Memorial Park (Broadway & Barclay St., No. of LIRR).

The school childrens contest held each year in connection with the rally had been well received. There were over 800 entries in the slogan, essay and poster categories on the theme "A Flag - 185 Years". The judges for the contest, William E. Koutensky, Hon. Judge Michael M. D'Auria, Murray Duncan, John Maher, Fr. Patrick Young, Frank Burke and Weldon Endorf have selected the many winners. Gov't Bonds and plaques are to be presented to the winners and runners-up at the Tribute, 2:00 p.m., Sunday June 13, 1971.

In retrospect our flag day ceremony goes back two years ago at which time I introduced to the club members a resolution to have flag day designated a State Legal Holiday. At my request local representatives of our area, State Senator Caemmerer, Assemblymen Martin Ginsberg and Joseph Reilly prefilled this resolution jointly as a bill in the State Legislature in Albany. It did pass both Houses and was then sent to Governor Rockefeller for his signature to become law. However, Governor Rockefeller vetoed the measure. If he had signed that bill into law, proper respect for our countries

emblem would again be realized; we would not now be witnessing the ignominious desecration of Old Glory as evidenced in our apparently anarchistic society. Last January the flag day bill was again prefilled by the joint sponsors and at present is in the Houses of both the Senate and Assembly in Albany.

Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower said "Patriotism is good for the soul" and it sure is, for you certainly must feel proud every time you see "Old Glory". President Nixon speaking in defense of the Uniformed Police and Workers of our country spoke "that every citizen has the right to display the American flag in a respectful way and that the display on a police uniform is a respectful display of the flag".

Our stars and stripes do mean more to us than any one person for it is representative of all the hardships and wars our ancestors have been through and the toils and setbacks yet to come. We are experiencing, at present, an aura of fear that has been permeating through our great nation these past few years. It started slowly as a pendulum with the sit-ins on the university campuses; to the invasion of our legal system of law and order; to the destruction of government property; to the disruption of our educational process. This is not, anymore achieved, by peaceful means but rather by violent and brutal

methods that now our nation is gripped in fear for its very existence. The next plan of this mob rule apparently is to commit sacrilege upon all we hold dear and cherish followed by the devaluation of human life. It is time we acted.

We must start the pendulum swinging the other way toward peace and domestic tranquility as drawn up by our forefathers 195 years ago. Let you and I, the silent majority, begin by showing the proper respect for our country and our flag that was handed down to us by the patriots who fought and toiled hard to bestow upon us a free nation.

Participate in the 2nd Annual Flag Day Rally that was first launched by the Ernest F. Francke Republican Club of Hicksville. Among those to be present will be Congressman James R. Grover, County Executive Ralph Caso, Supervisor of the Town of Oyster Bay John Burke, Councilmen Christ, Doolittle, Diamond, Mosca, and Saladino. Then too there will be the joint sponsors of the flag day bill Senator Caemmerer and Assemblymen Ginsberg and Reilly. Also Hon. District Court Judge Francis J. Donovan, Receiver of Taxes Sol Newborn, Town Clerk William "Bud" O'Keefe, Deputy County Clerk William Anderson and Deputy

OUR ELECTED REPRESENTATIVES

SENATE PASSES LEGISLATION AGAINST HAZARDOUS TOYS
Legislation designed to prevent the manufacturing of hazardous toys, sponsored by Senator Ralph J. Marino (R-East Norwich) today passed the Senate. Marino explained, "Every year many children suffer injuries from a predictable misuse of toys. Such injuries could be eliminated or minimized if manufacturers were forced by statute to reconsider the design of a toy which might present electrical, mechanical or thermal dangers."

Marino continued, "While federal regulations governing toy safety do exist, as a result of faulty enforcement, they have only a minimal impact. A prime example is the present toy fad, the two plastic balls connected by a cord, known under several different brand names. A child holds a ring on the cord and as he rhythmically pumps the cord, the two balls swing and clack together. Few parents know that the Food and Drug Administration has called the toy dangerous and has warned against buying it. The plastic balls can shatter on impact or, as

a result of built up centrifugal force, can fly off the cord. The inherent danger such a toy presents warrants something far stronger than the federal government's poorly publicized warning. The legislation I am seeking would empower the Attorney General to prohibit the sale of toys which potentially jeopardize a child's safety. When toy manufacturers realize that their merchandise will not be sold in New York State unless the product is free from structural dangers, they will develop safer toys."

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Town of Oyster Bay Proposes:

A Local Law Relating to Abortion Facilities

After careful study, the Town of Oyster Bay has scheduled a public hearing for June 29, 1971, on a proposed local law relating to abortions and pregnancy termination facilities within the Town.

Town Supervisor John W.

Burke, in announcing the hearing date, said Town Attorney Bernard McCaffrey and his staff recently completed a five-month study of various abortion control laws and the Town was now prepared to act.

The Supervisor said the

proposed law was prompted by the Town Board's concern for the health, safety and welfare of Oyster Bay's 360,000 residents.

"It is not an attempt to circumvent the law of the State of New York as it relates to abor-

tions," Burke said. "What we are doing is seeking enforcement measures to see to it that abortions are performed only by those having the proper accreditation from State and County health authorities."

The proposed law would

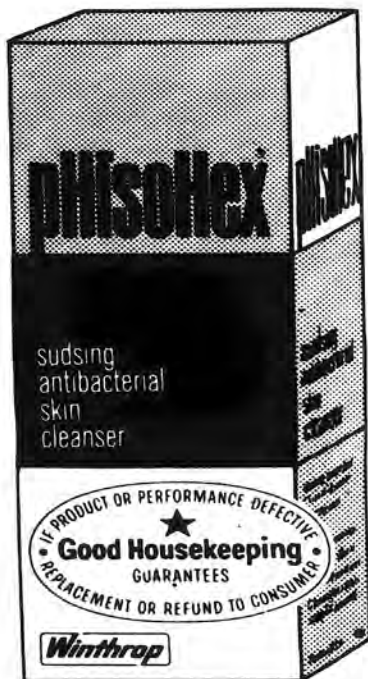
provide that no person perform a justifiable abortion act (as defined by State Penal Law) other than at a hospital duly licensed and accredited under the State Department of Health and having equipment and facilities acceptable to the State Hospital Review and Planning Council. Nor shall such an abortion act be allowed to be performed at any site other than one meeting the standards set by these organizations.

Burke said the penalties in the proposed law call for fines of up to \$1,000 and/or imprisonment for not more than 15 days or both.

The Supervisor said the Town Board supported the Nassau County Medical Society's view that abortion is a medical procedure with the possibility of complication. "Therefore," Burke said, "only hospitals which have met certification requirements found in the State Public Health Law, and are subject to inspections, should be authorized to perform pregnancy terminations."

Burke and McCaffrey agreed that, based on a similar law in other Towns and recent court decisions, the Town could expect the law, if it is passed, to be tested in the courts.

"However," Burke said, "after much research we feel we are on firm ground in establishing a measure such as this for the protection and safety of the people of our Town."



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Grant to M.T.A.

A \$7,709,887 federal grant to the Metropolitan Transportation Authority will allow upgrading of 50 miles of Long Island Rail Road track, Congressman James R. Grover, Jr. of Babylon announced.

The grant, from urban mass transportation aid funds, will enable the railroad to improve track between the Sunnyside yards and Mineola, Huntington and Northport and Hicksville and Pinelawn. Ties will be replaced and a railwelding plant will be set up by the Railroad.

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Top Legal Firm Retained By Town in N.A.A.C.P. Suit

OYSTER BAY - Supervisor John W. Burke, in carrying out his pledge to defend Town zoning laws, today announced that the Town Board will retain the law firm of Simpson, Thacher and Bartlett of New York City to represent the Town in responding to the law suit instituted by counsel for the N.A.A.C.P. on March 30, 1971. The Board adopted a resolution on Tuesday, June 1, retaining the firm as special counsel.

Payment of the firm will be on a system of periodic billing, with no definite fee set, Mr. Burke said.

He also said that the firm's first action would be an immediate

application for a postponement of the June 4th deadline for an answer to the complaint in order to have time to prepare a defense.

The law firm, headed by Whitney North Seymour, was established in 1884 and has more than 150 attorneys on its staff. Mr. Seymour is a former assistant solicitor general of the U.S., and has argued numerous appeals before the U.S. Supreme Court and the lower courts. He is past president of the American College of Trial Lawyers and past president of the American Bar Association and the Association of the Bar of the City of New York.

Supervisor Burke said he was very pleased that the firm had agreed to undertake this legal assignment to represent the Town and to assist Town Atty. Bernard McCaffrey in defending its zoning laws. "We have retained one of the leading law firms in the country to represent us in dealing with the grave constitutional questions which will inevitably arise from the suit, and which will be of major importance to the Town. As Supervisor, it is my sworn duty to uphold the laws of the Town, and the retention of this law firm to aid the Town, in my judgment, is another step in the fulfillment of that responsibility."

The fee for issuing a passport is twelve dollars, two dollars of which is returned to the Postal Service to cover clerical costs in processing the application.

The plan to process passport applications at post offices was conceived to provide additional service and to relieve pressure on court and state department facilities resulting from a rise in demand for passports.

Applications for passports are processed at the post office and forwarded to the State Department which actually issues the document.

Checks or money orders accompanying the application should be made out to the U.S. State Department. Cash or checks made out to the U.S. Postal Service will not be accepted.

Swimming Pool Warnings

If you're thinking of having a swimming pool installed in your backyard, check carefully before you take the plunge, warns the Nassau County Office of Consumer Affairs.

The annual deluge of complaints has begun, says Commissioner James E. Picken, as consumers confront the swimming season with half-completed installations or warranties that no one will honor.

"Both the advertising and selling techniques of some of these operators are clearly deceptive," asserts Commissioner Picken. "We are now in the process of investigating the problems."

Ads lure the buyer with promises of large savings and special features, according to Commissioner Picken. But when the customer shows an interest he is frequently told that the sale-priced pool is unsuitable for his property and only a higher-priced one will do. Or they neglect to mention the installation costs that swell the price far beyond what the customer intended to pay. Liners, motors and other parts are said to be guaranteed, but when

damage occurs and the consumer tries to get repairs, vendors are suddenly unavailable.

Consumers should shop around carefully, recommends Commissioner Picken. "Get referrals from satisfied customers. After you have decided, keep the

contract for a few days and understand the fine print. Insist that equipment, delivery, plot preparation, assembly, permits, any maintenance charges and guarantees on labor and material be included. Know what you are signing."
