Tobay Roads Are Scheduled For Beautification

County roads in the Town of Oyster Bay are scheduled for a beautification treatment, according to Town Supervisor John W. Burke, who is also a member of the Nassau County Board of Supervisors.

Burke said County Executive Ralph G. Caso has approved a \$4,915 contract to plant a total of 944 trees along various county roads in Nassau's three towns. Most of the trees are required due to attrition of trees already planted over the years.

Thirteen species of trees, including Norway Maples, Flowering Dogwood, Honey Locust, Flowering Cherry, London Plane, Red Oaks, Pin Oaks, Linden and Mountain Ash, ranging from eight to 16-feet in height, are included in the contract.

The locations scheduled for planting in the Town of Oyster Bay are: West John Street - Wantagh Parkway to Broadway - Hicksville - South Oyster Bay Road - Broadway to Jericho

Tpke. - Hicksville - Plainview Road - Old Country Road to Broadway - Bethpage - Cold Spring Harbor Rd. - Jackson Ave. to Northern Blvd. - Syosset - Syosset - Woodbury Road - Cold Spring Harbor Rd. to Southwood Rd. - Syo. - Underhill Blvd. - Jericho Tpke. to Jackson Avenue - Syosset - Washington Avenue - Manetto Hill Rd. to L.I. Expressway - Plainview - Old Country Road - South Oyster Bay Rd. to Round Swamp Rd. - Plainview - Old Country Rd. -

Wantagh Pkwy to L.I. Railroad - Hicksville - Jerusalem Avenue - Old Country Rd. and Hempstead Tpke. - Hicksville - Woodbury Road - Broadway to South Oyster Bay Road - Hicksville - Woodbury Road - So. Oyster Bay Rd. to Northern Blvd. - Woodbury - Washington Ave. - Long Island Expressway to Jericho Tpke. - Plainview - Manetto Hill Rd. - Old Country Rd. to Woodbury Road - Plainview - Park Blvd. - Sunrise Highway to Merrick Road - Massapequa.

Drainage Project

Town Councilman Warren M. Doolittle said that the Town Board awarded a Department of Public Works contract to Ralph Jannotta, Inc., P.O. Box 176, Glen Cove Road, Roslyn, low bidder for construction of storm drains and appurtenances on certain streets in Hicksville.

Doolittle said the work will commence early in July on Roosevelt Avenue, Lawnview Avenue, Ernst Avenue, Henry Avenue, Grand Avenue, and Fifth Avenue, as well as the east side of 5th through 10th Streets, south of Old Country Road.

The recommendation to award the contract to the low bidder, Ralph Jannotta, Inc., in the amount of \$194,537.35 was made by Gerard P. Trotta, Commissioner of Public Works and Harold R. Kraft, Superintendent of the Drainage Bureau.

Work is scheduled for completion this year.

Plainview High School News

The annals of Plainview - Old Bethpage High School have received a major addition, as the three plaudited trio of Mike Young, Jody Simon and Andy Berson, captured the championship of the Metropolitan New York II's Academic competition. The team, under the coaching of Mrs. Yves LeMay and Mrs. Eleanor Carlson, fought its way through three run off matches to reach the Grand Finale, where the three strongest teams from a field of over seventy - five public, private, and parochial schools in the Metropolitan area met in the ultimate struggle. Plainview, who had previously defeated Fort Lee, Locust Valley, Chaminade High Schools, met Flushing High School and Oceanside High School. Flushing proved Plainview's toughest adversary, as they led at the end of the third round, 255 to Plainview's 210. But a strong showing in the "Grab Bag" portion hurtled Plainview into first place and the Championship trophy, as the team picked up 140 points to triumph 350 to Flushing's 325 and Oceanside's 210.

The team is notable for its wide coverage. Andy was responsible for Math and Science questions, Mike for History, Current events, and sports questions, and Jody, the high scorer of the team, for English, Ancient History and general knowledge. Each participant often answered outside of his field of concentration, and therefore strengthened the team's scoring ability.

Long practice sessions, often taking as many as nine hours a week, were equally responsible for the victories. These periods found the team and the alternate team, composed of Peter Scott, Rae Ellis and Alan Kashdan,

working hard to prepare for the competitions. The efforts of the alternates, whose roles are only minimally recognized publicly, are not at all to be played down, as their many sacrifices helped, as their many sacrifices helped the team's performance immeasurably.

The producers of II's Academic have rewarded Plainview's achievements with over \$800 worth of encyclopedias and Harvard Classics for their library. The team also won a handsome trophy, and the general praise and acclaim of both the faculty, administration and student body.

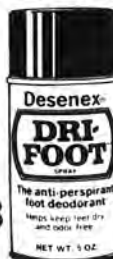

National Atlas At Library

The Plainview-Old Bethpage Public Library has just received the "National Atlas of the United States". The National Atlas is a monumental work which took 20 years to prepare. It features 765 maps which present, in visual form, the principal characteristics of our country, including its physical features, historical evolution, economic activities, and socio-economic conditions.

The government, in undertaking this project, had intended it as a practical tool for government and business planners, research scholars and others needing a country-wide view of physical phenomena and human activities. However, it is an important work for everyone who is curious about the United States.

The Atlas features detailed

maps of the states with special attention to urban centers. It has maps of landforms, geophysical forces, marine features (with tides and wave heights), climate, water use and water resources. Maps and charts show agricultural use, mineral and energy resources, manufacturing and business statistics and means of transportation. The maps also show population distribution and trends, vital statistics of marriage, divorce and births, medical services and pollution. It is comforting to note that our area ranks low in air pollution and high in medical service, low in infant mortality and high in income and educational achievement.

This engrossing volume will be an important reference source for many years to come.

The Fortune Society's basic purpose is to create a greater public awareness of the Prison system in America today. They also hope to help the public realize the problems and complexities confronted by the inmates during their incarceration and when they are released to society. The Fortune Society does this by sending out teams of speakers (ex-convicts) to talk to varied groups in churches, schools and libraries and also on radio and television. In this way they try to relate first-hand experience of prison life and to help create a greater understanding of the causes of crime in America.

Syosset To Submit Revised Budget, June 23

Following a special meeting attended by some 110 residents, the Syosset Board of Education has voted to submit a revised 1971-72 school budget for district vote on June 23.

The board's decision was reached after a meeting which went into the early hours of the morning. The new budget which will be submitted to voters is \$18,295,426, a reduction of \$339,904 from the original budget twice rejected by residents in voting on May 5 and June 2. Under the revised budget, the tax rate is estimated at \$11.834 per \$100 of assessed valuation, an increase of \$.88 per \$100 of assessed valuation. This is 32 cents less than the \$1.20 increase previously proposed.

In order to effect this reduction in the school budget, the school board has reduced or curtailed services in the following areas:

- TRANSPORTATION
- EQUIPMENT
- SUPPLIES
- MAINTENANCE

According to Mr. Simeon Wittenberg, President of the Board, "This reduced budget and the last one which was defeated on June 2 provides only for

the regular operation of the schools. It does NOT include propositions for the high school addition and a recreation program."

Syosset Lab Aide Develops Exercise

A science exercise developed by a Syosset High School lab assistant has been featured by a national science magazine as a model exercise recommended for testing by high school science teachers and students throughout the country.

The experiment is an exercise on reproduction of the sea urchin, which was worked out by Polly Herzer, a lab assistant in the biology department of Syosset High School. Details were highlighted in an article published in the May issue of Ward's Bulletin, a national monthly science publication.

The exercise permits observation of eggs and sperms of sea urchins, fertilization of eggs, formation of fertilization membranes and first cell divisions that occur as the embryo begins to form.
