From Our Postmaster

The inauguration of the new United States Postal Service on July 1, will be celebrated in Washington, D.C. and in every Post Office across the country. Hicksville Postmaster, Ralph G. Cascardi announced that a souvenir envelope imprinted with the old and new insignia of the Postal Service will be available to any resident of our community who visits the post office on that day.

This envelope will also be made available in limited numbers as a

first day cancellation, for just the cost of a new 8 cent stamp which will bear the Postal Service Emblem. This will be the first time First Day Covers have been available in all U.S. Post Offices.

A photographic display of modern Postal Service jobs and functions, on view in the post office lobbies, will help visitors learn more about the men and women of the Postal Service and how each mail user can help them to serve the community better.

Industrial Business Uses Approved By Town Board

At its public meeting on Tuesday, June 15th, the Town Board of Oyster Bay approved, with restrictions, the installation of a portable asphalt plant near Duffy Avenue and a new construction business on Midland Avenue in Hicksville. At the same meeting, the board tabled the matter of the petition of John W. Merenda for a change of zone to build an office building on the corner of Old Country Road and Underhill Ave. in this community.

At the public hearing of Midhampton Asphalt Co., Inc. for a special permit use to install and maintain a portable asphalt plant on a parcel 125 feet in from Duffy Avenue on March 30th, opposition was expressed by residents of nearby residential streets. Greatest fears expressed were those of pollution, traffic, dust and dirt.

The eighteen restrictions placed upon Midhampton Asphalt centered on environment control, designed to keep to a minimum dust, dirt, odors and noise which would offend residents, including times of operation, means of delivery of materials, types of controls to be used.

The Town Board also asked Midhampton to submit a plot plan showing the location of installations on the property.

Midland Avenue
Construction Business
Although a night hearing was

held on the petition of John Thatcher & Son for a special permit use to use property on Midland Avenue for a construction business, only a handful of residents appeared to oppose the petition on March 9th. The petition was approved Tuesday.

The petitioner proposes to erect a new building on the property, purchased in 1970. In the construction business for some years in Brooklyn, the petitioner plans to use existing residence on the property for office purposes and the new building for storage of equipment.

Those in opposition, all

residents of Twin Lawns Avenue, protested over the increasing deterioration of the area by business and industrial growth on Midland Avenue.

Office Building Tabled

No reason was given for the tabling of the decision on the petition of John W. Merenda for a change of zone from Residence E to Business F. District for a corner parcel on Old Country Road and Underhill Ave. A small but staunch opposition was present to protest the zoning change at the public hearing on May 11th.

Biggest Fund Raising Dinner Held

The biggest political fund raising dinner in the history of Nassau County was held last Wednesday evening at the Garden City Hotel as more than 4,500 people attended the annual fund raising dinner of the Nassau County Republican Committee, according to Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta, Party Chairman.

The party faithful and their friends filled seven rooms in the hotel and the overflow was seated in a tent set up outside the hotel near the pool area.

Senator Robert J. Dole, (R-Kansas), National Republican Chairman, was guest speaker. He was joined on the main dais in the hotel's Georgian Room by Governor Rockefeller, Attorney General Louis Lefkowitz, and Assembly Speaker Perry B. Duryea, Jr.

Local Republican office holders on the main dais in addition to Margiotta are County Executive Ralph G. Caso, District Attorney William Cahn, County Comptroller Angelo D. Roncallo, County Clerk Harold McConnell and State Legislators. Local town Republican office holders were seated on daises in the other rooms.

For the \$125 price of the ticket, the diners were treated to filet mignon and a mixture of speeches by Senator Dole, Governor Rockefeller, State GOP Chairman Lanigan and County Executive Ralph Caso.

Assemblyman George J. Farrell, Jr. of Floral Park was the toastmaster.

Margiotta said that he was absolutely thrilled by the huge turnout of people for the dinner. He noted that the number of people who bought tickets was so great that the management of the hotel was forced to send all the way to Boston, Massachusetts for extra tables and chairs to seat them.

"This is just great," said a jubilant Margiotta. "Next year we have to move our dinner to the new Coliseum at Mitchell Field to accommodate all the people."

It was estimated that the Party would make more than \$400,000 on the dinner.

For the first time the tickets to the GOP fund raising dinner were raised to \$125 from \$100. Margiotta said that this was necessary because of the party's debt from last year's County Executive and State Legislative

campaigns.

"As in all other areas of business, rising costs combined with inflation has forced the Committee to increase the price of a ticket," he said.

State Senator John Caemmerer, North Hempstead GOP Chairman, eulogized the late Senator Edward J. Speno and Duryea, Jr. made a special presentation to Mrs. Audrey Speno, the Senator's widow, of a bound edition of the remarks made by Assemblymen in the Assembly on the day of the death of Speno.

Comptroller Angelo Roncallo, Oyster Bay GOP Chairman, presented Salvatore Milone, dinner chairman, with a gift of a clock for "his outstanding service as dinner chairman over the past 14 years."

Milone, in accepting the gift, recalled that the first year he was dinner chairman, the affair was organized within a two week period and drew less than 1,000. "The dinner has grown each year," he said. "I hope to reach 5,000 next year if I'm still chairman."

Marino Asks Planting Field Arboretum Be Kept Open

State Senator Ralph J. Marino (R-East Norwich) call upon Sal Prezioso, New York State Commissioner of Parks and Recreation, to prevent the closing of the Planting Field Arboretum in Oyster Bay. The recreational and educational facility may be closed to the public as of July 1, when the Department of Parks and Recreation takes over responsibility for its operation.

Marino recognized that the first priority would be to maintain the plants and trees of the arboretum. However, he wanted to bring attention to the enjoyment people derived from visiting the area. "The beautiful horticultural resource offered by the arboretum," said Marino, "are unique. The collection of rhododendrons alone is

unequaled. Mr. Coe, who devoted his life to collecting rare flowers and shrubs from all over the world, left the land to the state as an educational facility to benefit and be enjoyed by all. People denied the opportunity to visit its greenhouse, gardens and nature trails are being deprived of utilizing the arboretum for the very purpose it was developed."

"When the land was recently transferred from the State University to the Department of Parks and Recreation," Marino continued, "we looked forward to an expansion and improvement of its operation, not its extinction as a public recreational area. The closing of the arboretum reduces the already too few sources of natural beauty open to the people."

Hicksville Community Council June 3 Meeting Report

At the meeting of the Board of Directors preceding the regular meeting, an annual dinner, picnic, block dance, or some event to raise funds for the Hicksville Community Council were discussed.

The entire meeting started out in a very informal way, by those attending just pulling up a chair, until before we realized, everyone was sitting in a circle. This was one of the most informal and delightful meetings which everyone attending agreed.

Councilman Warren Doolittle spoke of the parking conditions and the additional parking area for commuters the town had made available through negotiations with Stackler & Frank, owners of the Mid-Island Shopping Plaza. Warren stated it would be about one year before the parking area under construction would be completed, and hoped the people would please have a little patience during this time. There will be three levels, and can go higher than that if necessary. Special consideration will be given to our residents.

The Council was advised that no decision had been reached by the Town Board regarding the asphalt plant. However, the asphalt plant would be in a permissible zone. This is an ideal place for this type of operation because of the hole that is already there. The fact that the unit is portable has no effect on the tax they will pay. They will submit a plot plan and a traffic pattern of their operation. It is being considered to give them approval for an 18 month period, with the following special instructions, and allow them to reapply before the Town Board at the expiration of the 18 month period!

1. Air pollution - They have a self contained system, approximately 3.5 lbs. per hour emission.
2. Restrict them to the hours 7:00 a. m. to 5:00 p.m.
3. Liquid asphalt and gravel by truck, all the rest of the material to be handled by rail.
4. Trucks must be covered by a tarpaulin.

Councilman Warren Doolittle spoke of the proposed child care center where children would be under supervision for working mothers, etc. The area they were considering was in the worst possible section for this type of activity. They will probably withdraw their request and resubmit it within the year for another location for consideration by the Town Board.

Councilman Doolittle assured those attending the Council that the Town Board would defend our zoning ordinances, and stated this matter could very well go all the way to the Supreme Court. Emil Immersberger spoke of

Mr. George Raymond who was working on the "Master Plan" and giving Hicksville priority over some of the other areas. This plan is expected to outline the particular needs of the Township. Mr. Immersberger felt there should be additional meetings where the people could discuss what they want. The people need a little advance information to review it, so they can come to the meeting prepared, and feel the plan is economically feasible.

There was much discussion on the downtown section of Hicksville. It was generally felt we could go up six stories and still have sufficient greens (plant life). However, the parking plan for this concept would create a problem that would have to be resolved.

The possibility of the town giving up some of the parking areas to broaden the properties and make them bigger was also discussed.

It was suggested the town call a meeting of property owners to endeavor to get a block of property. The possibility of the town condemning property to get this thing going was also discussed. If we don't do something, or make decisions in the right direction, it was felt the moratorium which was extended would certainly expire, and we would have the "hamburger stands", etc.

The "Master Plan" is a zoning plan. If we approve it, then it is going to help us. Mr. McManus requested the "Master Plan" be made available to the school district.

Sheila Noeth announced that the Hicksville Community Council is now one year old, and the officers had agreed to accept their duties for another year. We plan on doing more things this

coming year.

The officers for the following year are: Sella Noeth - President; Emil Immersberger - First Vice - President; Warren Doolittle - Second Vice-President; Anne Gregory - Recording Secretary; Iris Widder - Corresponding Secretary and Steven Weinblatt - Treasurer.

Mrs. Noeth thanked the following committee chairmen for their cooperation: Civic Associations - Joseph Catalano and Emil Immersberger; Religious - Siegfried Widder and Rev. Roland Perez; Industry and Commerce - Kingale Kelley; Cultural Arts - Kenneth Barnes and Anne Gregory; Recreation - Joseph Madden and Rosemary Walsh; Education and Related Activities - Shirley Smith; Governmental Agencies - Joseph Giordano; Youth Activities - Steven Weinblatt; Senior Citizens - Rev. Douglas R. MacDonald; Service and Fraternity - Vernon Wagner; Program Chairman - Elery Bean; Membership - Jerry McManus; and Patriotic Committee - Dick Evers.

An invitation was given to everyone to attend the Knights of Columbus meeting, 45 Heitz Place, Hicksville, on June 15th at 8:30 p.m. when Pastor James J. Benson would receive the Hicksville Community Achievement Award for this year. Pastor Benson was one of the organizers of HAD among his many contributions to the people of our area.

Rev. MacDonald spoke of his work with the senior citizens, and hoped that this endeavor could be expanded into other churches and public areas where facilities could be utilized, hopefully with federal funds to help, would like to see a Senior Citizens Center.

Fireworks Are Prohibited

YOUR COOPERATION IS REQUESTED

SECTION 270.00 of the Penal Law, State of New York, prohibits the sale, distribution and possession of fireworks.

Definition of "fireworks": The term "fireworks," as used in this section, is defined and declared to be and to include any blank cartridge, blank cartridge pistol, or toy cannon in which explosives are used, firecrackers, torpedoes, skyrockets, Roman candles, bombs, sparklers or other combustible or explosive of like construction, or any preparation containing any explosive or inflammable compound or any tablets or other devices commonly used and sold as fireworks containing nitrates, chlorates, oxalates, sulphides of lead, barium, antimony, arsenic, mercury, nitroglycerine, phosphorus or any compound containing any of

the same or other explosives, or any substance or combination of substances, or article prepared for the purpose of producing a visible or an audible effect by combustion, explosion, deflagration or detonation, or other device containing any explosive substance.

PUNISHMENT: Any person offering or exposing for sale or possessing, selling, furnishing, using exploding, or causing to explode, any fireworks is guilty of a Class B Misdemeanor and may be punished by a fine of not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

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

Assist School District Recreation Programs

Town Supervisor John W. Burke said that the Town would continue to provide financial assistance to school district recreation programs despite a loss of 50 per cent in anticipated matching funds from the State of New York.

Burke said the Town Board has voted to continue its program of providing financial aid despite budgetary cuts enacted on the State level that have a direct bearing on municipalities and local programs.

He said the Town has been informed that the State's contributions toward these cooperative programs will not be forthcoming this year.

"This represents a loss of

\$60,000 in anticipated matching funds," Burke said. "Due to this reduction in State aid the Town cannot continue to underwrite the entire cost of the programs without imposing an additional tax burden on its residents. But, the Town will continue to make available its share of recreation aid to school districts as it has in the past."

Burke said the Plainedge, Farmingdale, Hicksville, Jericho and North Shore school districts will be hit the hardest and would lose \$7,500 in anticipated aid while the districts of Massapequa, Bethpage, Plainview, Syosset, Locust Valley and Oyster Bay would have their financial assistance reduced by \$3,750.

Town Councilman Salvatore Mosca announced recently that the Town Board has approved a schedule of performing arts events geared for children utilizing the Town park facilities in the Plainview, Old Bethpage and Bethpage areas.



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
