Mrs. Zimmerman suggested as an alternate route that children be remanded to private hospitals with the hospitals with the county picking up the tab.

"In my professional opinion," said Mrs. Berley, who is a psychiatric social worker, being a child in an adult ward is a traumatic experience that could result in permanent psychological damage." In answering Mrs. Berk's request for a speedy reply County Executive Ralph G. Caso stated that he would look into this situation which "might admittedly be very bad," and would get back

bad," and would get back to the PTA certainly before November 15th.
