PTA Asks Supervisors For Children's Psychiatric Facilities

The Nassau County Parent Teachers Association was the star of the regular meeting of the County Board of Supervisors on Monday, November 1st, as three PTA representatives arose after a more than routine calendar to make an impassioned plea for "children's psychiatric crisis in-patient facilities" in the county.

No such specialized facilities presently exist, said Mrs. Muriel Berk of Woodmere, District Director of the county PTAs, representing a membership of about 120,000 in the county alone. Mrs. Berk, who was

joined in her appeal by Mrs. Grace Berley, of Woodbury, mental health chairman for the Nassau County PTA and Natalie Zimmerman, of Malverne, associate director, described a visit with Dr. James F. Collins, superintendent of the Nassau County Medical Center, where children in need of diagnosis are now remanded by the courts. She said the facilities were dirty and ill cared for, and that young children were placed with adult psychiatric cases where they were in danger of corruption and sexual assault. Dr. Collins could not be reached on Tuesday (Election Day) for comment.

Plainview Cited
Mrs. Berk cited the Child Development Center, on Old Country Road in Plainview, which includes

one furnished but vacant floor, as an excellent "interim facility" for a children's psychiatric in-patient quarters until a permanent facility could be established.

"Dr. Collins assured us that in three years the Nassau County Medical Center would have an excellent facility," she said. "We can't wait three years."

Mrs. Zimmerman suggested as an alternate route that children be remanded to private hospitals with the county picking up the tab.

"In my professional opinion," said Mrs. Berley, who is a psychiatric social worker, "being a child in an adult ward is a traumatic experience that could result in permanent psychological damage."

In answering Mrs. Berk's request for a speedy reply County Executive Ralph G. Caso stated that he would look into this situation which "might admittedly be very bad," and would get back to the PTA certainly before November 15th.

"Life in Hicksville" welcomes you to our district and wishes you every success. Accordingly, in line with "Life's" policy of encouraging people to speak - out, and contributing to the benefit of all, we offer the following:

As reported to "Life", the people have not had an equal opportunity in the past to purchase district surplus. The practise of disposing "surplus" items has been far from equitable as indicated by the following:

On October 21, 1971, I and many of our neighbors received the latest issue of the "Bulletin Board" advertising a sale at the Quonset building on Newbridge Road. The same day, I discovered that "Adult" desks ADVERTISED WERE NOT AVAILABLE, but numerous "Art" desks were AVAILABLE BUT NOT ADVERTISED! Also, an inventory of the "sale" items was unattainable!

With equitable distribution and

strict accountability in mind, it is apparent that some changes are long overdue. We, therefore, offer the following recommendations:

1. The practise of the "ongoing sale", whereby unadvertised items can be sold, be immediately discontinued, and that this be substituted with specific "starting" and "closing" sale time and dates. Sale dates not to be extensive whereby employee services may be wasted.
2. Advance and accurate advertisement be published in the "Bulletin Board" of each and every sale of current specific surplus items, description, exact quantities, selling price etc. The "Bulletin Board" is the only known official school publication that is reportedly mailed to each and every resident of the district periodically.

3. Under no circumstances should any additional item(s), or increased quantities of item(s) be sold other than those

specifically advertised; nor should any item(s) be withdrawn from any sale unless a written acknowledgement is prominently displayed at sale outlining the item(s) and quantities, and the reason for withdrawal thereof, signed by Supt Niosi, or Asst in charge during your absence.

4. Under no circumstances should cash be accepted by an employee(s) unless a proper receipt is given to buyer, which is to include all necessary data commensurate with good business practices.

5. If any of the items are not sold at end of first sale, reduce items by 50 percent for the second sale; 75 percent for the third sale; and free of charge on fourth sale, all PROPERLY ADVERTISED; unless a method can be devised to bring a greater monetary and/or equitable return to the district.

Training Center Donated By A.H.R.C.

The 125,000 square foot Vocational Training Center will be dedicated by the Nassau County Chapter of the Association for the Help of Retarded Children on Sunday, November 14th in Freeport.

The facility which is the largest of its type in the United States will provide vocational training as well as testing and evaluation for over five hundred retardates and others who are functioning subnormally. Many of those who are processed at the Center will be placed in employment within the private sector. Others will be employed at the Center's Sheltered Workshop.

The three million dollar construction costs were shared equally by the private sector through A.H.R.C. and the state and federal governments. The facility, which is being named to honor Saul P. 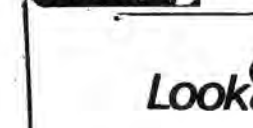

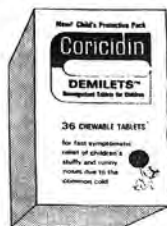
