Town Board Appoints Two Members To Planning Advisory Board

Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced today that the Town Board has appointed Caleb Hornbostel and reappointed Harvey E. Chappell to the Town Planning Advisory Board for full three-year terms.

The Planning Advisory Board is composed of nine Town residents who serve without compensation to develop a comprehensive master plan to guide the future growth and development of the Town.

Caleb Hornbostel, a Hicksville resident for 18 years, is a distinguished architect practicing in Garden City, whose designs range from private residences to university buildings. A native-born Long

Islander, Hornbostel received his professional education both in the United States and abroad.

He received his B.A. degree from Carnegie Institute of Technology in 1929, graduating with highest honors. He also studied at Ecole des Beaux Arts, France, receiving this D.P.L.G. in 1933.

His career has been marked with numerous awards and honors in the field of architectural design; he has instructed and lectured at a number of East Coast universities and has authored books and articles on design, building codes and structure.

Harvey E. Chappell, first appointed to the Planning Ad-

visory Board in June 1970, is a resident of Syosset and is active in the community as a member of the Syosset Park Advisory Committee, Central School District No. 2 Advisory Committee and the Syosset-Woodbury Planning Advisory Committee. He is also a Charter member of the Syosset Rotary Club and United Syosset Fund.

Mr. Chappell, a graduate of Union College, owns a real estate business in Syosset and is president of the Long Island Board of Realtors, Inc. He is also a member of the Long Island Home Builders and a member and director of the Syosset Chamber of Commerce.

Elect Directors To Fill Vacancies on L.I. National Bank Board

The president of the Long Island Builders Institute, and a widely-known industrialist, have been elected directors to the Long Island National Bank to fill vacancies created by the deaths of two veteran members of the 54-year-old bank's board.

Robert W. Stackler, of Huntington, a partner in the building and development firm of Stackler & Frank, who heads the L.I.B.I., and Sidney Horowitz, of East Hills, Chairman of the Board of P & F Industries, Inc., were named to replace William E. Koutensky and Norman C. Godfrey who died recently. Mr. Koutensky, who was also president of the bank, was succeeded in that office by James C. Dinkelacker of Cold Spring Harbor.

According to Long Island National's Board Chairman, Charles R. Carroll, "the two new directors will help to further diversify the business and professional representation on the bank's eight-man board". The bank now has 11 offices, in Nassau and Suffolk Counties, with resources exceeding \$125 million.

Mr. Horowitz, a former president of Horowitz Brothers, a large plumbing and heating supply firm in Syosset, now heads P & F Industries, Inc., in Great Neck, a diversified company with 12 subsidiaries engaged in mechanical contracting; graphic arts; and the manufacture of modules, heating and air conditioning equipment, chain link fences, steel pipes, and above-ground swimming pools.

A graduate of St. John's University, who flew 67 missions as a fighter pilot with the 9th U.S. Air Force, during World War II, Mr. Horowitz became head of P & F Industries when it had but \$5 million in sales in 1962. It now does more than \$65 million annually and has over 8,000 stockholders.

The P & F chairman is a Governor of the Albert Einstein

Medical College and is active in numerous other philanthropic and civic causes which have, on several occasions honored him for his leadership.

He is married to the former Grace Nelson. They have two children, Richard and Joanne, who are attending American University in Washington D. C.

Mr. Stackler, joined the Stackler & Frank organization in Hicksville, in 1953, after receiving an Associate of Science Degree from the State University of New York where he majored in construction engineering. He is responsible for the construction of several large scale housing developments and urban renewal projects on Long Island. His firm is best known for building and developing the Regional Shopping Center - Mid Island Shopping Plaza where they organized, and now operate, several retail businesses.

An active leader, since 1963, in

the Long Island Builders Institute, the New York State Builders Ass'n, and the National Association of Home Builders, Mr. Stackler was co-chairman of a special committee which built and donated a playground rest shelter in Albertson, Long Island. It is used by the physically handicapped children attending the Human Resources School in the community.

He is also a partner in the firm of Stackler, Frank and Gold which has offices in Rockville Centre, and which developed Urban renewal projects in Rockville Center and Glen Cove.

A past president of the Babylon Rod & Gun Club, Mr. Stackler is the immediate past president of the Hicksville Kiwanis Club. He was elected president of the L. I. Builders Institute last month.

He is married to the former Tea Holmberg. They have four daughters, and reside at 468 Woodbury Road in Huntington.

Consumer Affairs News

Consumers trying to stretch their dollars by buying "3 cents off" or "10 cents off" specials frequently don't get the savings at all, according to a survey just completed by the Nassau County Office of Consumer Affairs.

"Buying a cents-off special is like playing Russian roulette," said Consumer Affairs Com-

missioner James E. Picken. "Maybe you'll get it and maybe you won't."

Frequently you won't the survey revealed. A check of major grocery chains in Nassau County showed that stores did not mark the items to show the customer whether she is getting the cents-off allowance or not. In

addition, many stores did not pass along to the customer the full amount of the manufacturer's cents-off special. These are misleading and deceptive practices, claims Commissioner Picken.

The survey team, consisting of a Meat Specialist, a Consumer Affairs Investigator and a Weights and Measures Inspector also checked such store practices as blockage of cash registers from customer view, proper labeling of store-packaged meats, fat content of ground meats and availability of scales for customer's own use.

In these areas the picture was generally good. Only one store was found to be blocking cash registers, and another was blocking the customer scale. Violations were issued to these stores.

Said Commissioner Picken: "It's obvious that vigilance makes the difference. We regularly inspect for short-weighting, mislabeling and cash-register blockage, so consumers tend to get their money's worth. But in such areas as cents-off promotions, stores are extremely lax."

He plans to call in executives of each chain for conferences, during which he will demand tightening up of these misleading trade practices in Nassau.

No Garbage Collection On Thanksgiving Day

Town Supervisor John W. Burke issued a reminder to Town residents that no collection of garbage or rubbish will be made on Thursday, November 25 (Thanksgiving Day) by the Town's Sanitary Services Division. In addition, all Town facilities at the Sanitary Services Division, including the incinerator, landfill and sanitary treatment plant will

close for the holiday observance. Collection of refuse and garbage will resume on the next regular scheduled day.

Residents are asked to contact the Sanitation Division at 921-3850 if a problem arises. A similar modification of the pickup schedule will apply on Saturday, December 25 (Christmas Day) a legal public holiday.

Caso Meets With Business Leaders On Hiring Of Handicapped

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso today met with Long Island business and industrial leaders to sell them on the value of hiring handicapped people through a program administered by the Nassau Department of Labor.

Caso and other county officials described the program to representatives of companies who have not yet participated in it. Caso said that he was not asking employers for a handout for the handicapped. "These people are as productive as the average worker," Caso said.

"This past summer the county employed some 25 handicapped workers in various positions and the reports on their work performance have been excellent."

The handicapped worker employment program has been in existence for four years and has contracted with more than 130 local companies to hire approximately 300 handicapped workers. The federally funded program pays an employer \$30 per week for 26 weeks to train a handicapped person in an existing job.

Nassau Labor Commissioner Robert W. MacGregor asked the business leaders to set aside

certain jobs in their companies for handicapped workers and to maintain these positions as ones specifically designated for the handicapped.

Howard Glazer, president of Gedco Associates, Valley Stream, and Florence Callahan, employment manager of Doubleday Inc., Garden City, described employment experiences with the handicapped. They said that they have found such workers to be conscientious, eager to learn and as productive as their fellow workers.

George Jones, program director for the Labor Department, told the business leaders that he would be in touch with them within the next few weeks to discuss openings in their companies for handicapped workers.

The meeting was attended by representatives of the following companies: Litcom-Division of Litton Industries; Lundy Electronics & Systems, Inc.; George Malvese & Co., Inc.; R. Dixon Speas Associates, Inc.; Costagna & Son; Robert J. Harder, Inc.; State Bank of Long Island; Franklin Ribbon and Carbon Co., Inc.; The Hallen Construction Co., Inc.; Hendrickson Brothers, Inc.

Suggestions for Publicity Chairmen

Some of you may be familiar with the job of publicity chairman. Some of you are new at the job. So, let's take it from the very beginning with a series of suggestions that will help you to do a successful job as publicity chairman, as this is one of the most important jobs in every organization.

The Necessary Tools

To do the job of publicity chairman effectively, right from the start you will need the following tools:

- a typewriter (or the use of one)
- a ream of 8½ X 11 (standard size) white typing paper
- a year's supply of envelopes (which you may address in advance if you wish)
- stamps
- carbon paper (we don't mind receiving carbon copies, and you should keep at least one for your own records)
- a list of the full name, address, title in the organization, and telephone number of your officers, board of directors and committee chairmen.
- a list of the name, address, telephone number and name of the person you usually contact, of each daily newspaper, weekly newspaper and radio station to which you submit your news releases and pictures.
- a scrapbook (if your organization doesn't have one, an inexpensive one is a good investment). Keeping a record of what you send out and clippings of what is printed and where it appeared is important.
- a jar of rubber cement and a pair of scissors
- copies of the newspapers in which your news releases and pictures appear.

News Deadlines

Make certain of the news copy deadline of each newspaper to which you submit your publicity. Then, be sure that your publicity is always submitted in time. This is very important.

Our news copy deadline is Wednesdays at noon at One Jonathan Avenue (Southeast corner of Old Country Road), in Hicksville.

How to Prepare a News Release

Using a full size sheet of typing paper (no matter how short the news item), type in the upper left hand corner, single space:

- the name of your organization
 - your name, title and telephone number
 - the date you are writing and mailing the release.
- Then, drop down about 2 or 3 inches, change to double and triple space, and type your news release. It should contain the following information, presented accurately, with full names of anyone mentioned, and, hopefully with the enthusiasm you feel for the fine meetings and projects of your organization and the people who are working together on them:
- What is the event?
 - Who is giving the event?

In Hicksville

Community Council Met On Thurs., Nov. 4

Council meeting was in competition with the PTA first meeting at the Hicksville Junior High School, and because of this, finding a parking spot was not easy.

A very outstanding and dedicated group of speakers were present to acquaint the community of Health Services that are available. This proved to be one of the most worthwhile and enlightening programs presented by the Hicksville Community Council.

Our first speaker of the evening was Mrs. Janet Gosnell from "The Easter Seal Society", having their headquarters in Albertson, New York (tel. 747-2700). This Society is a Human Resource Center representing the crippled and handicapped children and adults in Nassau County. They believe and work toward the goal "the physically handicapped can function as well as normal people, given the right help" and assume the task of preparing these people to live full and able lives.

Mrs. Gosnell spoke of the numbers of children and adults that are handicapped and need attention. We don't see them, because they just don't get out. In our architectural planning of our communities, no provision is made for these handicapped. Even our libraries and churches are not constructed so that the handicapped can attend.

Mrs. Gosnell spoke of some of the activities in which this group play a vital part. The wheel chair basketball games have been so successful it had made it possible to enlarge on the physical therapy program.

Mrs. Gosnell requested we support the Hicksville Auxiliary through the efforts of Mrs. Jerry Danziger, (tel. 747-3553) and spoke of the very active youth organization "Torch of Hope" comprised of kids from Junior High, Senior High, etc. which are involved in increasing the understanding and communication between the normal and the handicapped. This is a project for any youth group, student council, key club, etc.

Members of the Hicksville Community Council were invited to make a tour of the Human Resource Center in Albertson. Our next speaker of the evening was Bob Kushner, Assistant to Superintendent Nassau County Medical Center, accompanied by his wife, and Anne K. Collins, public relations assistant, and Ted Jospe, Administrative Resident.

Mr. Kushner spoke of the large complex of services and facilities at Meadowbrook Hospital which is 19 stories high, the largest in Nassau County. They are self sufficient, having their own power plant, most modern equipment, housing for their resident staff so their families can be with them, and also garages which are available for patients.

At present there are 630 beds, and with the expansion there will be a capacity of 1000 beds available to meet the responsibility of the Nassau Community. It is the aim of the medical center to be the "best". Many letters from former patients attesting to the care and services at the Nassau County Medical Center have been received.

The following are some of the accredited functions and services available at this location:

1. Inhalation Therapy Dept run by the hospital
2. Nurses invited from

anywhere to come for up - to - date training, just to keep up with current practices

3. 4 dimensional microscope (very advanced)

4. emergency ward - is the largest and very active

5. Emergency Services Technician Training

6. Teaching center - nurses come to study from all areas

7. food sent to the floors on conveyer belt within minutes, piping hot

8. closed circuit TV

For any volunteers that might be interested in donating time at the hospital, call 542-2055. Volunteers do an important job every day of the year.

Electrical union involved on the new building are sponsoring a Thanksgiving party for the youngsters.

Mr. Kushner spoke of the equipment available in Nassau County, police ambulances, fire department vehicles, etc. There are 4 mobil cardiac ambulances set up with electronic gear enroute to the hospital with an electronic scope to monitor the heart beat of the patient before he arrives at the hospital. All this information relayed before the patient reaches the emergency door.

"With respect to the kidney disease, there will be a brand new facility opened. We hope to set up a rental and credit type agreement with the Kidney Foundation, - also run an out patient service. We would like to train next of kin to run machines so that they can be run at home. We also plan to have a "kidney bank" and start a transplant function," Mr. Kushner explained.

Mr. Kushner spoke of the A. Holly Patterson home for the aged, where plans call for a 900 bed capacity at this facility.

Mr. Kushner stated the Carman Avenue entrance to the hospital is equipped with a ramp. New building will also be equipped with this facility.

Mr. Kushner stated further they have an alcoholic ward and a recovery house. With narcotics - we have a special "detox ward" for children when they come we receive them and they get immediate medical treatment. Methadone clinic two weeks ago was expanded.

A helicopter facility is available for emergency use.

The doctors and staff are always reaching out to improve and constantly request new equipment as it becomes available.

There are two branches of the Meadowbrook Hospital, - one in Inwood, which is for out patients, and other in Plainview, which is for both in and out patients.

Our next speaker of the evening was Mrs. Margaret Hemgen, Nassau County Chairman of the National Foundation for Ileitis and Colitis. This foundation is comparatively new, three years old in its research project, and they want to educate people to the dangers of these two diseases.

"The purpose of these foundation is to bring these diseases out into the open and discuss them. Doctors have become very interested in the subject. It was a group of doctors that got together and started the foundation, who were principally interested in gastrointestinal diseases of the "gut", and they have agreed to affiliate with us," Mrs. Hemgen explained. "If these diseases are not discussed and treated when the first signs are detected they may lead to cancer," she con-

cluded.

Our next speaker of the evening was Mr. Ernest Howell, representing the American Cancer Society, which has been in existence 58 years, largest society in the country, dedicated to the eradication of cancer throughout the world.

In a survey taken 12 years ago, they estimated that one out of every four people would die of cancer. Today these attitudes have changed, and in many cases cancer can be cured, and there is hope for others if treated promptly and properly.

Mr. Howell spoke of the many areas of the body where cancer was most likely to strike:

1. lung cancer - prevalent among smokers
2. skin cancer - in many cases caused by too much exposure to the sun
3. breast cancer - periodic check up recommended - a rehabilitation program is available for those who have had this operation
4. oral cancer - caused by both smoking and alcoholism
5. Colon - rectum
6. Uterus cancer

There are early detecting devices if people would stop burying their head in the sand and face facts and not wait until they are beyond the point of preventing or correcting.

Mr. Howell stated that we can now save one half of the people so afflicted. There are volunteers that take people to the hospital, and home care is provided where needed. Even when a larynx is removed, we teach them how to speak again.

Mr. Howell had available at the meeting two lists of films, - one listing of films are free for presentation to children 1 - 12, the other listing of films for clubs, organizations, etc. on the adult level, including literature.

The audience participation was last and Marjorie Giannelli of Opportunity High School stated there were 12 courses going with 102 students participating, - 56 from Hicksville, and 36 from other areas. This year the students involved appear to be more stable and quiet. Marjorie Giannelli spoke of the plaque of appreciation given to the principal from the kids.

Sheila Noeth read a letter she had received from a family that desperately needed help, and who was given the names and telephone numbers to call where possibly help may have been forthcoming.

Hicksville Library Director Kenneth Barnes announced several of the library programs scheduled that people should be interested in. Mr. Barnes stated that Irving Faust, noted author, would be visiting the library and felt there would be very interesting discussions of great interest.

Suggestions for Publicity Chairman

- Why are they giving this event?
- Where are they holding this event?
- When are they holding this event? (the day of the week and the month, NOT the year unless it is different than the year of the newspaper's deadline.)

• Full name of both your organization's president and full name of committee chairmen working on the event you are reporting. (possibly you may use these names for quotes in the news release itself)

If this news release takes more than one page NEVER NEVER type on the reverse side, but type the word "More" on the lower right hand side of page one, and take another full size piece of typing paper to complete the release. When your release is completed, indicate this with a thirty mark, (-30-) or an ending mark such as this (-). Typesetters discard copy from their machines when each page is completed, and do not turn pages over. If the news release is marked "more", they will look for another page...if there is a -30- mark they know that the article is ended.

We ask that you do not type in all caps or capitalize some words for emphasis as it make extra, unnecessary work for the editor.

How To Prepare a Picture Caption

Picture captions must also be on full sheets of typing paper...not on small bits of paper and not on the bottom of a news release. Type the same three lines of identification in the upper left hand corner, drop down a couple of inches and double or triple space the caption which should contain a brief explanation of what the people in the picture are doing, plus their full names, and their titles, if any, from left to right. Use upper and lower case type, not all caps, here also, please.

A picture doesn't have to be taken by a professional, but it should be very clear. We suggest that you do not have more than four, or, at the most five, people in one picture so that all the faces are recognizable. Study your daily and weekly newspapers each week and you will see what type of pictures and poses are most acceptable for use on newsprint. When you have typed your picture caption, fold it double around your picture and attach a clip onto the paper. Never attach a clip directly onto the picture.

The Contents of a News Release

What is in a news release is one thing. How it is presented by the writer is another. As each artist paints in his own way, so will your news releases and picture captions be different than anyone else's. Ask questions of others working in your organization about each meeting program and project about which you will be preparing news releases. We know you are all enthusiastic workers for good community causes. Don't be afraid to let some of this creep into your news releases. Strive to make them both informative and interesting. More people will read about your organization, and be encouraged them to join your organization and become active. See how all the different committees work together in this way...and how important the job of publicity chairman really is! Now don't let that worry you. You will improve with practice. Just be sure to consult those in charge of various projects, so that can quote them, and, slowly but surely, you'll be please with the results, as will all those who are working with you in your organization.

What Percentage of Articles Will Appear

There are two reasons why all of your news releases and pictures will not make the newspapers to which you submit them. One is lack of space. The second is that occasionally copy is lost (of course this is rare but it can happen). That is why we suggest that you keep an extra carbon copy at least until after the release appears in print. This is also why we prefer full size sheets of typing paper... they are much less apt to get lost. But, if you do your job faithfully, at least 75 per cent of your releases and pictures will appear in THE HERALD. And this brings us to the next item...

Your Organization Scrapbook

An important part of your job as publicity chairman is a record of your year's work. So you need a scrapbook, a jar of rubber cement, a pair of scissors and copies of the newspapers in which your publicity appears. Cut them out, plus the date line and name of the publication and paste them in chronologically. Take plenty of space. Do not crowd too many items on a scrapbook page. We suggest that you do this as you go along. It is easier for you that way. Then, at the end of the year you should turn this scrapbook over to your incoming president. It will not only serve as a record of

your own accomplishments, but will also serve as a guide for next year's publicity chairman.

In Conclusion

We know that this "Advice to Publicity Chairman," is lengthy. We have tried to explain every detail, from the beginning, as if you have had no previous experience in the job of publicity chairman. If you have, so much the better. If not, don't be discouraged. It is really simple. If you follow it step by step, you should do an excellent job. If you have further questions, by all means phone me at WE 1-1400. If I'm out leave your number and I'll be glad to call you back. Remember, we want to help you to do your job effectively for the benefit of your organization, the community, and THE HERALD, your community newspaper.

Congratulations to Joanne Fitzpatrick, Joan Priestly, Mary Ann McDonald, and Mary Priestly, members of the Plainview High School Girls varsity swimming team, for the excellent performance in the Long Island Girls Championship Meet held at Farmingdale High

School on November 12th. These girls placed first in the 200 yd. medley relay with a time of 2:09.6. They also placed first in the 200 yd. free style relay and established a new league time of 1:51.1. Mary Priestly placed second in the 50 yd. free style - 28.5; Joan Priestly placed third in the 100 yd. Individual medley - 1:12.7; and Joann Fitzpatrick placed second in the 100 yd. backstroke - 1:11.3. Joann Fitzpatrick presently holds the league record in the 50 yd. backstroke with a time of 31.7.
