Sets Hofstra Record

"The Other Long Island Quarterback", Jeff Doolittle of Hofstra, has moved ahead of the highly publicized Gary Wichard in the latest release of the NCAA statistics. The NCAA bases its rankings on completions per game. Doolittle, a senior from Hicksville, has completed 140 of 231 passes an average of 15.6 a game. He has also compiled a 60.6 percentage, which is best of the small college passers. Wichard, meanwhile, is two

completions short of Doolittle, with 138 completions in 249 attempts for a 15.3 average. Doolittle is ranked fourth in the nation, Wichard fifth.

Doolittle has set two Hofstra records this season. His 140 completions broke Don Gault's old record of 138 set in 1965. He also completed 29 passes against Kings Point, breaking his own record of 23 set against Bridgeport.

Local Members Return From PTA Convention

Among the 1000 PTA leaders from all over the state attending the 74th annual convention of the New York State PTA at Grossinger's this past week were the following Hicksville members: Mrs. Barbara Rosman and Mrs. Heney Skolnick, representing the high school; Mrs. Adele Weiss, from East Street school; Mrs. Shirley Smith, Fork Lane School; Mrs. Laura Bodnar, Burns Ave. school; Mr. Sid Fein from Dutch Lane school; and Mr. Jack Meller, representing Hicksville Council of PTA. Also among the delegates were many students representing high school PTAs from all over the state.

PTA IN THE AGE OF ACCOUNTABILITY was the theme of the convention which was presided over by Mrs. Oscar Willet of Syosset, State PTA president.

Delegates supported an emergency resolution rejecting the concept of balancing the state budget by reducing aid to local school districts and took a stand to support necessary taxation, other than real property taxes, for the support of schools. Ronald Dutcher, of Newburgh, sixth vice president and legislative chairman, commented: "Our governor, upon assuming office, called for the pursuit of excellence in education. This excellence cannot be achieved by cutting away the financial support necessary for proper maintenance of the schools."

Among the more than three dozen resolutions passed were those recommending counseling for youth concerning draft regulations, military obligations, choices in military service, etc.; recommending control and limitation of the manufacture and distribution of amphetamines; and asking for the inclusion of the study of environmental education at both the elementary and secondary levels.

All of the delegates attended various workshops and learned much of great interest. Senator Clinton Dominick gave some background on the Fleischman Commission such as the strengthening of BOCES and retention of local control. In the New Role of Administration, Dr. Edwin Hunga, Superintendent of Schools in Poughkeepsie, defined today's administrator as more like handy-man or expeditor than the traditional concept. In their new roles teachers and administrators have become pressure groups. This leaves the PTA with the responsibility of becoming a pressure group with the students and PTA must serve as a bulwark against political interference and power struggles. Mrs. Elizabeth

Mallory, National PTA president, spoke on the change in interpretation of the PTA non-interference policy because we must all be more involved than ever before. The most important thing learned by all those attending was that PTA means People Taking Action...and take action they did, on just about every issue that affects children and youth. The seven delegates from Hicksville are grateful to the units which gave them the opportunity to attend the convention and all feel they have returned with a greater knowledge of PTA, its hopes, its aims and its progress.

Old Country Road School Presents Accababac Indian Dancers

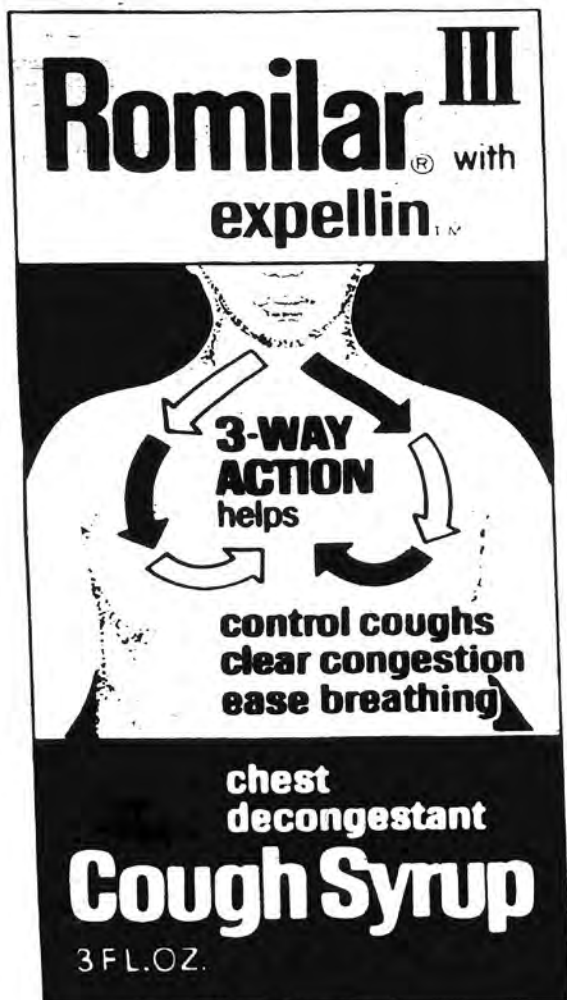
an extensive background in both Indian culture and Indian dancing.

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Supervisors Approve 925G Settlement For Medical Center

In the process of a pretty routine calendar for the thirty-second meeting of the Nassau County Supervisors on Monday, the question of sewers in Wantagh and Merrick came up, as did the settlement for \$925,000 of a claim by Nassau County Medical Center against the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company to cover costs of damages sustained as the result of a fire in the Dynamic Care wing in June, 1970.

Residents in the southern part of Merrick, roughly between the Merrick Canal and the Meadowbrook Parkway, and south of Merrick Road to the bay, can expect sewer digging to commence in their area sometime next spring as the result of a resolution approved by the super-

visors to advertise for bids on the project.

In Wantagh, present digging south of Jerusalem Ave. will be extended north to Duckpond Dr. N.

In other business, the supervisors voted to appropriate additional funds to Children's Safety Town, a federally sponsored coordinated national highway safety program at Eisenhower Park; voted to renew the Hofstra University upward bound preparation program "designed to aid and assist educationally disadvantaged youths in selected areas of Nassau County" and voted to advertise a public hearing on a local law proposed by Oyster Bay Town Supervisor John Burke relating to the collection of

taxes by the sale of tax liens. The hearing will probably take place on December 13th, according to the county clerk's office.

Seniors Speak Out

At the close of the stated agenda, a group from "Senior Power" represented by Philip Stone of Port Washington, addressed the Board of Supervisors with a request for improved public transportation in the county, the lack of which, he said, poses a particular hardship for the county's 170,000 elderly persons. He presented a resolution drafted by Senior Power, and two sheets of paper full of signatures in favor of the resolution. He said that more signatures would be forthcoming to the Board from the various senior citizen groups in the county.

Baby Sitter, 14, Does Her Job Under Fire

Patricia Campbell, 14, of West Nicholas St., Hicksville, was babysitting for the four children of Mr. & Mrs. Robert Magee of 27 Grape Lane, Hicksville on Saturday November 20, when fire broke out in the living room at 7:10 P.M.

Patricia, according to the report of Hicksville Fire Chief Mel Voorhies acted quickly by evacuating the house immediately, closing the doors as they left, took the children to a neighbor and calmly called the Fire Department. 105 men and eight pieces of apparatus, under

the direction of Chief Voorhies, arrived to find heavy smoke coming from the house. Fireman Robert Perchinski of Co No. 5 was treated for smoke inhalation at the scene.

The fire started in a T.V. set and spread to the wall and stairs. The living room sustained slight damage. Chief Voorhies commended Patricia for her swift actions in preventing what could well have been a tragedy.

While it is fresh in everyone's mind Chief Voorhies wishes to remind all parents on the importance of choosing a competent sitter, and instructing her on how

to evacuate the house and care for the children properly in case of fire.

Roger Savoy In USAF

Airman First Class Roger W. Savoy, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. X. Savoy of 11 Knickerbocker Road, PLAINVIEW, is a member of the 432nd Tactical Reconnaissance Wing at Udorn Royal Thai AFB, Thailand, that has earned the Presidential Unit Citation for a second time.

The 432nd was cited for its distinguished aerial action against hostile forces in Southeast Asia from Nov. 2, 1968 to Oct. 31, 1969. The award is the highest U.S. honor accorded a military organization.

The 432nd equipped with F-4 Phantoms and C-130 Hercules aircraft, is the only wing in the

USAF to have a reconnaissance, fighter and command and control mission. The unit's unarmed Phantom reconnaissance crews fly against enemy targets to obtain vital photo intelligence information. Phantom fighter-bombers pilots use the data to find and destroy the targets and Hercules Airborne Command Posts direct the reconnaissance and strike operations.

Airman Savoy, a weapons control systems mechanic in the 432nd will wear a distinctive service ribbon to mark his affiliation with the wing.

He attended Plainview-Old Bethpage High School.

REPORTS

Students 17 years of age and who have completed a minimum of two years of college are invited to apply for appointment to the Oyster Bay Town Supervisor's Intern Program for 1972. This will be the third year for the program which has generated a tremendous response from the young citizens of our town.

Last year we received over 350 applications following the announcement of the program. With so much interest being shown, it was indeed frustrating to be able to offer only ten intern positions. We wish we could accommodate more of these young men and women who want to participate in their local government structure.

The Intern Program provides a valuable training ground for the community leaders of the future. It also enables the Town to take advantage of the heretofore untapped brain power of a highly

intelligent group of Town citizens.

Besides seminars with Town and County officials, the interns involved in last year's program participated in a number of research projects such as a Townwide environmental survey, college development plans, boat septic tank pumpout stations, outlined provisions for an oil pollution control ordinance, reported on Youth Council activities, and answered resident complaints.

A number of these projects have since been put into practice, including the boat pumpout station and the oil pollution control ordinance.

For the 1972 program seven students will be selected for appointment and will be paid at the rate of \$100.00 per week for a 10-week period beginning next

June. The interns will be assigned to departments and agencies based on their particular interests and the ability of the governmental department to utilize them.

Mr. Richard H. Hague in recognition of his outstanding work in music education and dedicated work with youth, has been appointed to membership on the National Board of the American Youth Symphony & Chorus.

Mr. Hague was a scholarship student of the New England Conservatory of Music and a graduate of Boston University School of Fine and Applied Art. B.M. 1949. M.M. ED. 1954. 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Tobay Seeks Federal Funds For Major Waste Recycling Project

Plans for one of the most comprehensive solid waste disposal projects were disclosed by Town Supervisor John W. Burke this week when he announced that the Town is seeking a \$1,289,233 grant from the Environmental Protection Agency for the development of a complete system and the facilities for the recovery and recycling of materials from solid wastes.

"The proposed project will attack two of the major problems in solid waste management—newspapers and incinerator residue," Burke said.

"Waste paper constitutes the major portion of solid waste collected in the Town, and recycling that material will provide a large saving in terms of natural resources."

The proposal calls for the design and fabrication of a prototype vehicle to permit separation of the paper from

garbage at the point of collection. Bundled paper will be loaded into a removable bin on the truck which will be removed at the collection depot. The paper will then be transferred to a storage building or directly into trailer bodies furnished by a paper recycling contractor.

"Since approximately 30 to 40 percent of the solid waste collected in Oyster Bay Town is paper," Burke noted, "the removal of even as low as half the present amount will markedly reduce the incinerator load and avoid the necessity for additional capacity."

The incinerator residue recovery system is based on a pilot plant developed and operated by the Bureau of Mines at College Park, Maryland. The Oyster Bay Town proposal calls for the design, installation and operation of a modified system to recover ferrous and non-ferrous

metal residue from the Town's existing incinerators in forms suitable for resale. Concurrently, a market analysis will be undertaken to determine the marketability and economic return on the recovered materials.

"The successful completion of this project will lessen the need for additional incinerator capacity and reduce the rate of consumption of land for landfill operations," Burke predicted. "It should also provide a financial return of a magnitude that will substantially off-set operating costs as well."

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Social Security Question Box

Ques: I have paid the maximum social security contributions since 1940. I am now 67 and still working. When I applied for social security retirement benefits, I was told that because my earnings for the year would be too high, I was not entitled to receive any checks. This doesn't seem fair to me. Why was the law set up this way?

Ans: The primary reason for an earnings limit under social security goes back to the original purpose of the program as passed by the Congress. Social Security retirement benefits are a partial replacement for earnings that stop when you retire. And, until a worker has retired or had his earning power sharply reduced, there are no lost earnings to replace. However, Congress also realized that some people never retire but continue to work long past 65. To completely deprive these workers of social security benefits would not be fair either. Therefore, regardless of the amount of his earnings, an eligible worker can get a full monthly social security retirement benefit at 72. Earlier, he can get full benefits if he earns \$1,680 or less in a year. If he earns between \$1,680 and \$2,880 a year, his benefits are reduced \$1 for every \$2 earned. If he earns over \$2,880 a year, his benefits are reduced \$1 for every \$1 earned over the \$2,880 amount. Regardless of his annual earnings, however, he can get his full social security benefit for any month he earns \$140 or less.

Ques: I'll retire in a few months and start collecting social security retirement benefits. Will I have to pay Federal income tax on these monthly benefits?

Ans: No. You do not have to pay Federal income tax on social security benefits.

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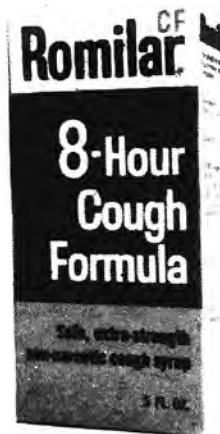
