Budget, (MRS. KLEIN) ment Occupy Bd. of Supervisors

Concerns of the settlement between Nassau County and its civil service employees and for the proposed county budget superseded other business and news to come out of the Board of Supervisors' activities this week.

During the course of Monday's meeting calendar, otherwise routine, the supervisors voted in approval of the addition of one cent to the county sales tax by a unanimous vote. This budget item was approved in advance of the budget itself to meet a December 1st filing date in Albany in order for the tax increase to become effective on March 1st, 1972.

As explained by County Executive Ralph G. Caso, at the completion of the vote, which also included "ayes" from minority members Costigan (Long Beach) and De Paola (Glen Cove), a messenger would be on his way to Albany with the necessary papers. Missing this important deadline would mean missing a full quarter in increased tax revenue for the county. Caso said

CSEA Speaks Out
After the calendar, Irving

Flaurbaum, president of the Civil Service Employees Association, rose to ask the Board to intervene in settlement efforts on the civil service employees contract, affecting 13,000 county workers. The contract, he said, remains unresolved after about 30 meetings of the bargaining committees for both sides since July 2nd.

The most recent offer by the county's bargaining committee was unacceptable, he said, citing three points which he said were in the county's offer. These points included the elimination of the step system for civil service employees; elimination of regular increments; and a very low wage offer. Supervisor Costigan said he was unaware of the proposal to eliminate the step system, and said he was personally opposed to its elimination. At a press conference later, Supervisor Francis Purcell said that much thought and deliberation would have to go on before the elimination of such a traditional practice could be considered.

Budget Hearings
Attendance was low and not

much excitement was generated at two public hearings on the proposed \$426 million county budget for 1972, the first hearing at 2:00 P.M. and the second at 8:00 P.M. Inclement weather with torrential rains and the holding of the line on the real property tax were credited for the low attendance.

At a press conference following the hearings, Supervisor Purcell said the Board of Supervisors were expected to vote on the budget on December 13th, and that by all indications it would be approved as is.

At the same time the budget hearings were in progress, a case was being heard by Judge Kingsley Smith of the New York State Supreme Court on a suit brought by the Democrats charging that the proposed county budget did not conform to the county charter in its means of designating numbers of jobs and expenditures for salaries, and in effect, leaves the matter of fixing salaries to the department heads. The Democrats are requesting that a new budget be drawn up to conform to the charter. The judge reserved decision on the case.

Fire Destroys Auto Dealers Showroom

A fire, which burned unnoticed for an estimated two hours, before being reported by a passerby, heavily damaged the building occupied by Hicksville Rambler Inc and the AMX Auto Body Shop at 40 Newbridge Rd. near W. Marie St.

The blaze, which caused an estimated damage of \$35,000.00 was reported at 6:05 P.M. 100 men and ten pieces of apparatus responded under the direction of Chief Melvin Voorhies. At the

height of the blaze, a false alarm (172 so far for 1971) was turned in at Ronald Street and Moeller St. The heavy smoke condition closed down traffic on Newbridge Rd. 2nd Pct. Police detoured all traffic. Firemen used air masks to gain entry to the building. The fire was brought under control by Hicksville firemen in about thirty minutes. But not before considerable damage was incurred.

Five cars in the building were also damaged. Three firemen were injured. Fireman Gil Cusick

of Ladder Co. 6 was hospitalized for smoke inhalation and held for observation for 2 days. Fireman Arthur Piper of Engine Co. 7 was treated at the scene for smoke inhalation and released. Fireman Richard Ficcarelli of Ladder Co.

1 suffered a leg injury when a portion of the roof caved in trapping him momentarily. He was treated at Central General Hospital and released. The fire dept sponsored explorer post assisted firemen at the scene.

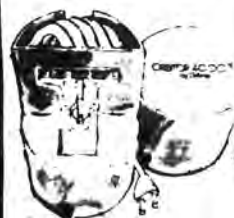

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Day-Night Public Hearings Scheduled

Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced recently the Town Board will conduct day and evening public hearings on Tuesday, December 7, to offer interested parties an opportunity to be heard on a request to rezone a parcel of land in Woodbury for construction of apartment buildings.

The Board will meet at 10:00 A.M. and continue hearings again at 8:00 P.M. in the Hearing Room, Town Hall, Audrey Avenue, Oyster Bay. Interested parties may be heard at both meetings; however, the attorneys for the applicant will detail facts on the rezoning request at the evening hearing.

The petition, by Acade Co. and Crestwood Country Day School, Inc., seeks a change of zone from Residential B-1 (one acre) to E-1 Apartment House District on a 34-acre parcel of land south of Jericho Turnpike.

The site is located on the northerly side of Woodbury Road approximately 275 feet east of the easterly side of Piquet's Lane, (South Woods Road), with dimensions of approximately 900 feet by 1,500 feet. The frontage along the northerly side of Woodbury Road is 976 feet.

Plans filed by the applicant indicate a desire to provide 542 apartment units in 35 buildings. The number of apartment units per building ranges from 10 to 18.

Mortgage Burning At St. Stephen's

On November 25, 1971 at a special Thanksgiving Day service, St. Stephen's Lutheran Church in Hicksville celebrated the burning of the mortgage on the Ernest F. Francke Memorial Educational Building.

It was in 1960 that plans were completed and a new educational wing erected to accommodate the growing membership at St. Stephen's. The building was constructed by Arthur W. Funfgeld Associates Inc. at a cost of \$204,000 with furnishings consisting of another \$10,000. In October 1964, \$40,000 was added to the original debt for the purchase of additional property adjacent to the church.

A Capital Fund Campaign, under the direction of the Lutheran Laymen's Movement for Stewardship, and a Memorial Fund to Mr. Francke headed by Henry Elsemann, was adopted to raise the necessary money. On December 4, 1960 the building was dedicated to the glory of God and in loving memory of Ernest F. Francke.

Dept. Expects Budget Balance of \$7 Million

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso today disclosed that the Social Services Department expects to have a budget balance of approximately \$7 million at the end of the year. He also revealed that the county taxpayers' share of total welfare expenditures for the year will be about \$8 million less than anticipated.

In making the announcement prior to today's Board of Supervisors' hearings on the 1972 county budget, Caso said he intended to blunt criticism that the welfare department budget proposed for next year underestimates expenses.

"Social Services Commissioner James Stuart and his staff deserve compliments instead of criticism for the job they're doing," the county executive stated. "They have made major procedural and administrative changes to make possible a

brighter end-of-the-year financial picture."

Caso said total welfare expenditures as of Nov. 22 amounted to \$132.5 million. Estimated expenditures for the balance of the year should raise the total to \$148 million, which is about \$7 million less than the department's authorized expenditure for 1971.

He also disclosed that the county has not found it necessary to issue budget notes to cover the \$22 million supplemental welfare budget appropriation authorized by the Board of Supervisors last August.

"An improved rate of state and federal reimbursement and administrative changes that resulted in additional savings have enabled the county to pay its share of the supplemental appropriation with existing funds," Caso pointed out.

He said that welfare revenue

for 1971 from state and federal sources will amount to \$123 million, which is \$9 million more than anticipated. He credited this to the department's initiative in seeking additional aid.

"The difference between the total expenditures of \$148 million and total revenue of \$123 million... \$25 million... is the amount county taxpayers have to pay," Caso said. "This is \$8 million less than anticipated at the beginning of the year when it was thought the county's share would be \$33 million."

Caso said the Social Services Department effectuated savings during the year by reducing the number of welfare cases in motels from a high of 347 at the beginning of the year to the current count of 208; reducing the monthly caseload increase of more than 500 to less than 300 and reducing the number of work eligible single people on the rolls.

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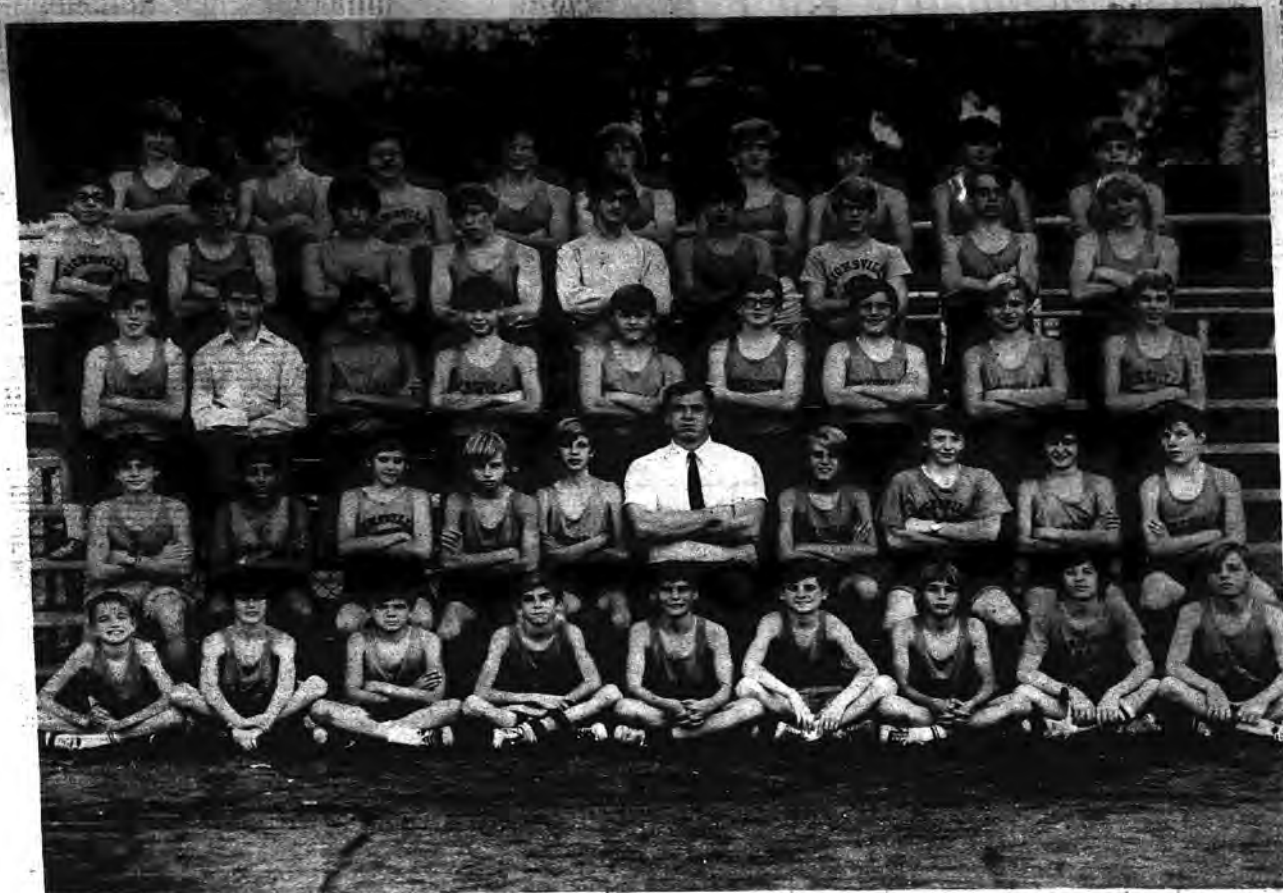
