C of C Works For Action

At the recent well attended meeting of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, President Kingsley Kelly outlined to the members action programs, developed by the Executive Committee which meets every other week.

Always in the forefront of the Chambers efforts is cleanup and beautification. The Chamber has embarked on a project called E.E. (Eyesore Elimination). Surveys have been made and areas earmarked for attention. This will be a continuing endeavor, not just a temporary venture. Already progress has been made and with the cooperation of property owners and business people it will proceed without interruption.

Another problem which is receiving the Chamber's attention is need for improved street lighting for Broadway and Newbridge Road. It is surprising that more serious accidents have not occurred since the road widening was completed, without adequate provision for good lighting a most important factor to traffic safety.

It was noted that before a heavy snow storm cripples all traffic, blocks streets and generally disrupts business and other community activities, members would like to know what steps have been taken to provide standby equipment with the necessary labor force to cope with snow removal.

At Town Hall

Permit from Tobay Keeps the Doctor Away

No one spoke in opposition to the petition of Dr. Howard Burger, who just moved out of his professional residence at the intersection of Marilyn Boulevard and Plainview Rd. in September. Mr. Burger's attorney claimed the neighbors wanted the house rented so that it would be looked after during Dr. Burger's absence. The ordinance does not allow occupancy of the premises by anyone but the professional and his family. In both cases, the Board reserved decision.

"Clean Hands"

In order to organize a busy day, the Board scheduled two of the hearings for an afternoon session. One of these, presented by attorney Abby Katzman, of Syosset, brought some humor. It was a request to have the special permit use by Dr. Gaspar A. Oliveri of Colony Lane, so that he would be covered if at some time in the future he might like to practice dentistry and live elsewhere. He and his family presently reside in their professional residence, a procedure which requires no special permit, whereas the other professionals applying for permits have actually been practicing in violation of the town

ordinance. "We're the only ones with clean hands," said attorney Katzman. Mr. Katzman said that Dr. Oliveri's son, also a dentist, is now in the service. On his return, expected within the year, the elder Gaspari would like to take the younger into his practice.

There was no opposition to the petition of Dr. Harvey Amsterdam and Dr. Phyllis Turtel to continue their practice on Old Country Road in Plainview. The Board again reserved decision. Councilman Warren Doolittle, of Hicksville, said that the Board plans to institute an ordinance requiring only the filing of requests for special permit uses for professionals to be begun before the end of the year, as the calendar between now and December 31st cannot contain the number of hearings requested. In that way, some hearings may spill over into next year, but no more requests may be filed.

On the docket for Town Hall on December 21st are hearings on requests for special permit uses by Bruce T. and Judith D. Michnick to continue the practice of dentistry in Hicksville; that of Howard L. and Barbara Apley for the same permission in Hicksville, and others.

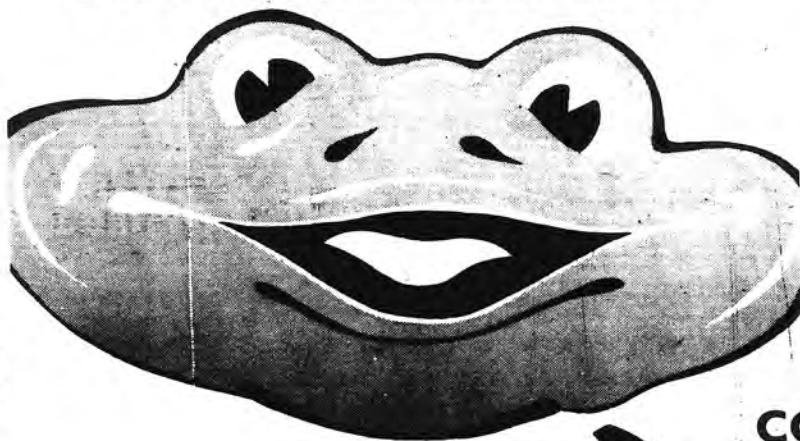
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Prisoners To Be Home For Christmas

Approximately 80 to 90 men and women, now being held in the Nassau and Suffolk County Jails will receive an early Christmas present on December 22nd. They will be released on bail provided by the St. Dismas Committee of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul assisted by the Diocesan Task Force so they will be home in time to spend the holidays with their families.

The prisoners are all being held for trial on relatively minor charges. They have been unable to obtain release because they are too poor to be able to guarantee bond for bail.

The Rev. Arthur J. Kane, Diocesan Director of the St. Vincent de Paul Society said that "there has been a lot of talk about prison reform but many people are still in jail just because nobody is interested in them."

"Deploing this miscarriage of justice," Father Kane said, "is not enough. Action is demanded."

Francis K. Zimmermann of Patchogue, President of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul in Nassau and Suffolk, said that assistance to the poor has always been the traditional work of the Society and since the prisoners to be released were being held solely because they were poor and unable to put up collateral for bail bonds, it was more appropriate for the Society to

provide the collateral.

Mr. Zimmermann said it was an example of the Society's continuing effort to respond to current social problems.

The Rev. Patrick J. Armshaw, Catholic Chaplain at the Nassau County Jail in East Meadow pointed out that this release of a large number of inmates from the jail was, in addition to being of assistance to the prisoners themselves, also, a positive contribution to the entire community.

Father Armshaw said it would result in a substantial saving to the taxpayer because it costs over \$18.00 per day for each person housed in the jail. Besides saving this direct expense, many of the released prisoners will be able to go back to work, thus removing their families from the welfare rolls.

The Sheriff of Nassau County, Michael P. Seniuk, said he was extremely pleased that a group of volunteers like the St. Dismas Committee was taking action on behalf of these prisoners. "There is something wrong with a system that holds a person in jail, simply because he is poor."

"This is a positive act, particularly appropriate at Christmas time, which not only demonstrates charity but also shows the world your sense of justice," he told the members of

the Dismas Committee.

In Suffolk County, Sheriff Philip F. Corso also expressed support for the action of the Dismas Committee in gaining release for the prisoners.

The Co-Chairmen of the Dismas Committee are William Feil of Floral Park and James Grant of Patchogue. Mr. Feil said that in addition to a preliminary screening done by the committee, the list of prisoners to be released will be examined by the parole authorities of the two counties to insure against the possible release of any potential dangerous individuals.

Mr. Feil also said that the involvement of the Society with the prisoners gave its members an opportunity to offer additional assistance both to them and their families, with a view toward a void in future legal involvement.

Mr. Grant said that he wished to express the Dismas Committee's appreciation to the authorities in both Nassau and Suffolk Counties for their cooperation in arranging the release of the prisoners. "Without this generous support from the Sheriff's Offices, the Diocesan Task Force and the Legal Aid Societies of Nassau and Suffolk Counties the St. Dismas Committee could not have made 'Christmas at Home' for all these prisoners possible."

A meeting was held at the library on Dec. 8, 1971 for the Hicksville American Little League managers. Presided over by our Pres. Bob Willis & Vice Pres. Dick Eaton. The topic of discussion was the forming of a new league, the Senior League. It will consist of four (4) teams, 12 or 13 players on a team ranging in age from 13 to 15. All boys who register for the league will be subject to try outs, which will determine the capabilities of the boys. If at the end of this period the boy does not qualify, his registration fee will be refunded. We talked about the problems facing a new league. In order to obtain a Franchise a written request is made to Williamsport Pa. This request is screened and presented to the Franchise Committee for action. Requirements are: You must have at least 48 boys to start a senior league and you are required to have each boy covered by insurance like our lower leagues. How many of us realize that in Little League the distance between bases is 60 feet. In the Senior League the distance between bases is 90 feet. So the caliber of boys in the field, hitting, catching and throwing will have to be greater. Another problem is the fields. Not many 90 feet fields in our area. Another

possibility of joining forces with International League & Jericho League, but it is only in the discussion state and will have to be voted on by its members. We talked about the cost of running this league next year as compared with last year, the extra cost of uniforms, baseballs, bats and related equipment. It takes a lot of preparation before the season starts.

REPORTS

Another harbinger of the changing seasons is the activity at the Town's Department of Public Works. Highway Department vehicles, busy the past several weeks collecting fallen leaves, are being fitted this week with snow and ice control equipment. A number of the department's drivers recently completed a special training program to qualify as grader operators and this piece of road building equipment is kept busy during the winter months on snow removal operations.

Snow plows also are being

fitted to Sanitation and Parks Department vehicles, and sand spreaders for icing conditions have been mounted on dump trucks. All in all, some 120 Town vehicles stand ready to keep our 750 miles of roads open, and 12,000-cubic yards of sand have been stockpiled at strategic areas throughout the Town.

As in previous years, our Snow Alert Center has been reactivated. In the event of an emergency, Town residents can reach the center by calling 921-6030. But please use this number only when there is a need to clear snow-blocked roads for fire

vehicles, ambulances or under similar circumstances. For other snow removal information, contact the Highway Department at 921-1030.

To facilitate clearing of streets in the residential areas, please park family cars off the road in the event of warnings. If your car becomes stranded in a traffic lane, it should be left unlocked so that Town employees can move it to one side when the plow comes through.

Your cooperation will greatly assist us in keeping our roads open in the snowy days ahead.

A Long Island daily newspaper columnist revealed in an angry piece not too long ago that some of the staunchest advocates of busing to achieve school integration have their children attending private schools. To those of us in Washington who have become cynical over certain liberal programs and postures, the news came as no surprise.

Actually, to many leading spokesmen for the liberal view, busing has become an end in itself. But not for their children. To those of us who are a bit more realistic about what government can and cannot do, it has become obvious that busing has not and will not achieve its goal of equal opportunity in education, im-

provement of local schools should be given precedence over transporting children long distances. No child learns anything from spending hours each day on a bus, unless desks and libraries are moved onto the buses.

Time, understanding and changing neighborhood patterns will some day eliminate the purposely designed segregated school. But mass busing to secure some arithmetic racial balance has yet to prove that it performs any service toward solving racial problems or improving education.

The columnist who revealed that many top advocates of busing were transporting their

own youngsters - via limousine - to private schools quoted them again and again as saying that they would not sacrifice the education of their children for daddy's principles. Yet children of the poor, of course, can be sacrificed for sociological experiments. Such hypocrisy, incidentally, is no respecter of political parties because, included in this group are the political chameleon mayor of a large eastern city and the blue blood scion of a New England family, both of whom keep saying, during appearances, throughout the nation, that they have no plans to run for President.

during which the county unanimously passed its somewhat controversial budget. Mr. Fried addressed the Board, speaking for 26 independent drug programs. He pointed out that the contracts for many of these programs will run out in 18 days, and that the programs are in danger of collapsing if the promised funds from New York State are not forthcoming.

Mr. Fried illustrated the growth of the network of drug prevention and treatment programs within the county and presented an illustrated history of difficulty in State funding of youthful drug abuser programs dating from August 1970.

According to Mr. Fried, 82 programs applied for funds in

November under a state agreement requiring matching, or "in-kind" funds, which means the supplying by the community of facilities, equipment or services which can be equated with funds.

Tuition Raised

In other business, the Board voted to increase the tuition fees at Nassau Community College to \$215 for Nassau residents and out of county but residents of New York State, and out of state residents to \$430. The Board also voted to provide additional funding in the amount of \$42,672 in the Nassau County Legal Aid Society for operating expenses for the balance of 1971.

An urgent plea to the county of Nassau to urge the New York State legislature for more county control of the distribution here of state funds for local drug programs was lodged with the county Board of Supervisors at its regular meeting on Monday, December 13th by Richard Fried, of Richmond Road, East Meadow.

Steven R. Saunders, an aide to Oyster Bay Town Supervisor John W. Burke, has been elected Treasurer of the Nassau County Economic Opportunity Commission. His election marked the first time in the six-year history of the commission that a government representative has served in an official elected post.

A resident of Oyster Bay, he has been with the E.O.C. since becoming an assistant to Burke two years ago. He is Director of the Town's Office of Governmental Planning & Research and is Secretary of the Tobay Planning Advisory Board.

Other newly elected members of the Anti-poverty commission who were elected last week are Mrs. Pauline Washington, Chairman; Malachy Mahon, Dean of the School of Law, Hofstra University, as Vice Chairman and George Jackson, a member of the Rockville Centre Diocesan Task Force on Poverty, Race and Allied Problems, as Secretary.

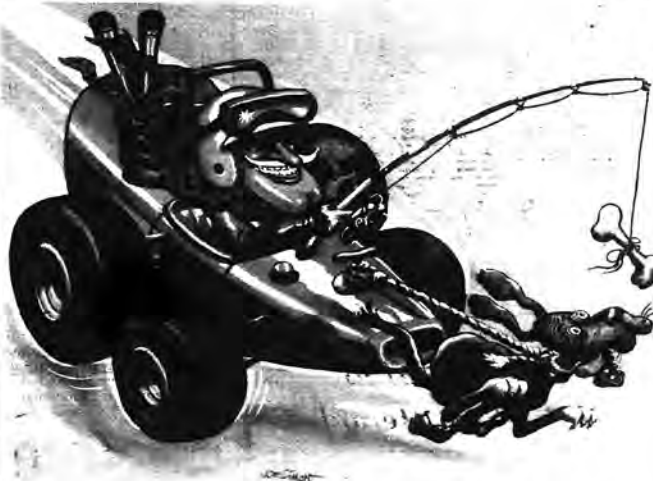

Mr. Davis distributed several pamphlets describing the current welfare system and one special article entitled "Facts and Myths About Welfare." Immediately the students were alert to two of the most popular myths. One, that most AFDC families contain men who won't work, and two, that more and more welfare children are illegitimate, particularly blacks. Both of these statements

the representative proved are not true, and then proceeded to show that a lower percentage of recipients are getting welfare in Lakeview in West Hempstead (a predominantly black middle class community) than in Plainview.

Several points were brought up and many were thought to be valid by the Deputy Commissioner of Welfare. One, that Nassau County proceeds to train and hire a larger number of blacks for social service jobs. Two, that the Welfare Department should attempt to treat its recipients as human beings, men and women, with human respect and dignity. Third, that the department push for increased benefits for its clients, something in line with the amount of \$5500 per year for a family of four which the president's commission and the National Welfare Rights Organization have set as the minimum amount of money for a family of four to live adequately in these United States.

The discussion proved fruitful and interesting to those who attended. Mr. Davis conducted himself with an air of sophistication which at times alienated the students, but at other times greatly added to the information presented.

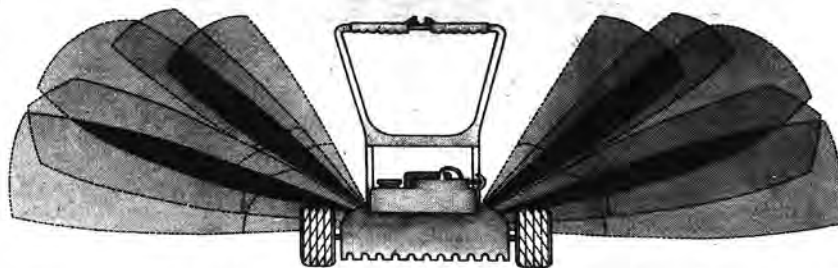

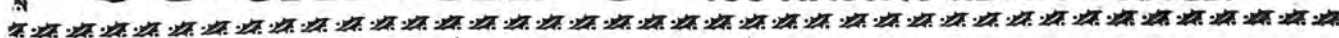
