Tempers Flare

School Board Meeting Short But Explosive

HICKERICKE BUILTE L HICKENICE BY IIP

The meeting was brief but probably the most explosive in the Hickaville Board of Education's history. Tempers flared in the hot, smoky and overcrowded room where over 150 people gathered. For one bour and litter minutes they say in people gathered. For one bour and fifteen minutes they sat in chairs and on the floor, stood in any available spot or spilled out into the hall, aiready bulging with people. They had heard that two teachers' were leaving the High School at the end of this term and were not being replaced. They came to find out why.

Dr. Dr. Harry Kershen set the tone of the evening when he

Dr. Dr. Harry Kersner set the tone of the evening when he derænded to know why he had not heard about this situation until he came to the Board meeting. He resented the lack of communication.

Mrs. Rita Greenstein was the first to bring up the subject of rehiring teachers during the twenty-minute public portion of the meeting-twenty minutes which Board president, Thomas Muratore, said would not be extended. Mrs. Greenstein explained that most of the people had come to the Board tweeting, because they understood an English and a Science teacher, leaving the High School January Rita Greenstein was the English and a Science teacher, leaving the High School January 31, were not to be replaced. Both teachers are instructing regents courses, the English teacher having advanced placement classes. Mrs. Greenstein asked the Board its policy regarding replacement of teachers at mid-term.

Mr. Muratore did not answer her question directly, but wanted to know where she had heard that the teachers are not being replaced. He reminded the audience of the "chain of comaudience of the "chain of com-mand" in getting information about the schools: first, contact the building principal; if you do not get satisfaction, contact the Superintendent; if you still are not satisfied, come to the School not satisfied, come to the School Board. Mr. Muratore asked Mrs. Greenstein if she had done thische had contacted Mr. Rusch, High School principal. Mr. Muratore then wanted to know why Mr. Rusch had not come to the Board with this problem—if he felt it was a problem.

he felt it was a pro Muratore said he had received only one letter, which seemed to be "written by a student." Other Board members had not been contacted. Dr. Niosi had not been contacted. Dr. Noss said only-one parent had seen him about the teachers. The School Board president stated that the people should call the Board members if they have questions.

Dr. Kershen reminded the Board that it is not at a principal's discretion to replace or not replace. This must be done by the School Board, at the recommendation of the Superintendent. "I am incensed at the lack of communication, Dr. Kershen stated and added that he "did not know about this until tonight."

Mr. Muratore announced that the Board would not answer Mrs. Greenstein's question yet since they were unprepared and needed to get more information. At this point came the explosion. The people had come with questions and were not willing to go away without the answers. Everyone became loud and discourteous—the public to the board, the Board to the public, the Board members to each other, members of the public to each pther.

Mr. Muratore reminded the people that "we are dangerously class to violating the first of occupants in the room." He haid unless the crowd was quiet and calm, he would clear the room. Dr. Kershen said questions can't be answered at this time, until the Board gets information from Administration. He said the School Board assumes a teacher will be replaced unless otherwise

High School Student Council, asked for the opportunity to speak for the students. During her allotted. five minutes she explained some of the difficulties explained some of the difficulties for students in not replacing the teachers (especially the English teacher): possibility of repetition of books, overcrowding, disruption of friendships of students who have been in the same class together, having to get used to a different teacher and different teaching methods. "Don't throw us around like insignificant things," she pleaded. "We are the reason the school is here." She asked the Board if a full year's salary was budgeted, and when answered sfirmatively, suggested the Board use this to hire replacements for the remainder of the school year.

Mr. Muratore said he "appreciates all the public statements, but the Board will not be pressured into answering this question tonight." They will have a study session and let the public know their decision shout thiring replacements at the next

public was not happy about this decision, but the Board moved on to the rest of its business. They approved bills for routine expenses of the district and the replacement of an Opportunity High School teacher who is resigning. A request from Administration to approve personnel for writing of curriculum materials for the Junior High was tabled until the next meeting. Also tabled, was a reassignment of district supervisors as of February 1. The Board will study this in executive seasion before taking action. In answer to a question from Mrs. Barbara Rosman, Dr. Niosi stated that he had received a "minority report" from members of the Health Education Curriculum Committee regarding their objections to certain parts of Strands 1 and 5 of the Health Curriculum, which the Board approved in November. Dr. Niosi said the Board and other members of the Health Committee will receive copies of







I discovered that despite the I discovered that despute the tax increases, there was a surplus of \$404.52 as of Dec. 31st 1971 after all obligations of the year had been paid out. Furthermore, I noted that there was acceptance in the second acc. no shortage in the escrow ac-cumulation necessary to meet any bill when it fell due (see

On Dec. 1st, I wrote to the bank asking for an explanation of claimed shortages which, they say, accounts for the increase. I

was contacted on the telephone and told that it was difficult to explain this in writing. Escrow monies, he explained, are divided into three accounts: (1) In-surance (2) Town Tax (3) School surance (2) Town Tax (3) School

Physical Education Elective Program

Over the past several years, ne students and staff of the John Kennedy High School have felt a strong need for changes in the a strong need for changes in the physical education program. Members of the teaching staff, under the direction of Mr. Daniel Martinsen, Department Chair-man, and Mr. Michael Bennardo, District Director of Physical Education, developed an elective program in physical education. In September 1970 an elective

In September 1970 an elective program for seniors was instituted on a trial basis. The program met with such success that it was expanded to include grades 10 and 11. The program was also expanded beyond the contines of the school. To this end horseshark riding solf and contines of the school. To this end horseback riding, golf and bowling were included in the clective program. There is a possibility that iceskating and sking will also be added. Several sking will also be added. Several areas of the elective program include archery, tennis, softball, basketball, volleyball, bad-minton, football (boys and girls), baseball, gymnastics and minton, football thoys and girls), baseball, gymnastics and slimnastics (weight control). Every effort was made to allow students to choose those electives in which they were most interested in participating. The major limitation in allowing the students totally free selection of electives were availability of staff and or facilities.

As a result of this curriculum change the complexion of many

As a result of this curriculum change the complexion of many of our physical education classes changed. Every Friday, during the fall semester, all students went to Plainview Bowl to participate in student bowling leagues. Several classes attended horseback riding School at the Bethpage Stables. During the last

three weeks of the golf season, students attended the Huntington Golf and Putt Rånge. Those classes which did not choose outclasses which did not choose out-of-the building activities par-ticipated in an in-school elective program. In addition all 10th grade students participated in a ten-week unit in swimming. The unit in slimnastics was most successful Mrs. Karen Baker led students in running and jump rope exercises which benefitted

rope exercises which benefitted the entire body make-up of the students. In addition, Mrs. Genevieve Eaton, school nurse, worked with the students on proper nutrition.

Future plans for the program involve the teaching of elementary games. In this program students will leach elementary games in physical education to their peer groups. As a culmination of this unit it is hoped that our students can work in the elementary schools and hoped that our students can work in the elementary schools and instruct these students on how to play various games. The entire program has been most suc-cessful todate. Our student body is now highly motivated and interested in our physical education program. The department received a high department received a high degree of cooperation from the John F. Kennedy High School administration in developing this program. The physical education staff has demonstrated a realization of the need to change in order to meet the needs of our students. 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
