Sheet Metal Union Assists The Gregory Museum

Volunteer workers from the Sheet Metal Workers Local Union No. 55 have installed most of the duct work for the heating and air conditioning at the Heitz Place Court House in Hicksville. The former court house, built in 1895, will be the future home of The Gregory Museum, presently located at 207 Cottage Boulevard, Hicksville. The Gregory Museum is Long Island's Earth Science Center.

Mr. Lou Mertz of Hicksville is foreman of the group of sheet metal workers donating their time and skills. Mr. Edward Young, President of Sheet Metal Workers Union No. 55, made the preliminary arrangement for assistance with Mr. Mertz.

Mr. Irwin Botto of Botto Mechanical, Hicksville, is donating his time to supervise the installation of the heating and air

conditioning system at the future home of The Gregory Museum. Benjamin H. Silberstein Associates, Hicksville, donated the mechanical plans for the installation of the heating and air conditioning. The following companies donated the materials to fabricate the duct work: Regal Metal Products, Inc., Deer Park; Bass Sheet Metal Co., Lake Ronkonkoma; Anron Air Systems, No. Babylon. Employees from these companies donated their time to fabricate the materials.

As soon as the heat is installed, certain of the operations of the Museum will be moved to the new site.

Donations of money or materials and labor are needed to build, and install the display cabinets at the Court House to exhibit the museum's specimens.

Oppose Business Zoning

Two residents spoke strongly against the rezoning of a parcel belonging to Roberts Chevrolet and located behind its showroom which fronts on Broadway and backs up on Grand Street.

Dorothy McPartlin, owner of a 70-year-old house deplored the rezoning of the entire area and the resulting traffic, which, she said, is heavy from the Roberts Chevrolet operation. She also noted the expansion of the East Nassau Medical Center (HIP) at the other end of Grand Street, which she feels is destroying the character of the neighborhood. Gertrude Burgess, who lives adjacent to the subject parcel, declaimed the petitioner's statement that Grand Street was not in use, as she had noticed it being used for testing brakes and for night deliveries of cars.

The petitioner's attorney said a fence could be put up closing off Grand Street from the subject parcel, if necessary.

It was noted that a special permit for the subject property, the only portion of Roberts land not zoned business, had been granted to allow parking by the Board of Zoning

Appeals on May 28th. Councilman Warren Doolittle, of Hicksville, wondered why a rezoning was necessary if the petitioner wished only to use the property for parking, as it now is doing.

At the close of the hearing, the Board reserved decision.

Esther Scharer



Esther Scharer, a school nurse-teacher with the Hicksville Public Schools since 1954, died on November 2, 1971, after a long and courageous fight against cancer. She is survived by a son Robert of Levittown, who is with United Parcel, and a daughter Nancy, a nurse on the north shore.

Mrs. Scharer was born in Sunbury, Pennsylvania, on March 23, 1908, attended the public schools there and graduated as a registered nurse from the Philadelphia General Hospital in 1929. Her career as a nurse included positions as a public health nurse in Brooklyn and work at Kings County Hospital and Flushing Hospital. Just before coming to Hicksville, she was a substitute nurse in the Levittown Schools.

In 1937 Esther Barahart married Harry Scharer, a chemist and lawyer. In 1954 she received a bachelor's degree with a major in psychology. After graduate work at several universities she received a Master's degree from C.W. Post College in 1969.

Mrs. Scharer was a skilled nurse and a highly intelligent and immensely practical person. For many years she accompanied the senior class on its annual trip to Washington. Her passing is mourned by the Hicksville Senior High School staff where she will always be remembered as a

dedicated nurse-teacher. A memorial scholarship is being established in her honor under the sponsorship of the local school nurses. If any one in the community wishes to contribute to the scholarship that will be awarded to a deserving senior planning to become a nurse, he may send his money to any local school nurse-teacher in the Hicksville Schools. From Our Postmaster Ralph Cascardo

A public offering of \$250 million of 6-7 8 percent U. S. Postal Service Bonds was announced today by the managing underwriters.

The Series A Bonds, to be sold Feb. 1, will mature in 25 years. Net proceeds from the bonds sale will be used to help finance the Postal Service's capital expenditure program.

The bonds are not guaranteed by the United States Treasury.

However, they will be secured by a first lien in Postal Service revenues and receipts.

They will also be exempt from state and local taxes, except for estate, inheritance and gift taxes. Managing underwriters for the sale are: Salomon Brothers; Dillon, Read and Co. Inc.; Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith, Inc.; Morgan Guaranty Trust Co. of New York; and Kidder, Peabody & Co.

Dear Editor:

Last Tuesday night the people of Hicksville witnessed once again their well-informed, intelligent, polite school board in action. The citizens behaved badly. Two hundred angry parents crowded into a hot, stuffy room certainly should have behaved more sedately. To expect answers from the Board was asking too much. How can the people expect the board to know what apparently was common knowledge to everyone else? Just because every resignation passes through their hands, just because it is they who ultimately hire and fire, just because the board sets policy regarding class size, are no reasons to expect intelligent answers. It is evidently unnecessary for them to keep in touch with each other, with the Superintendent of Schools to keep them informed or for the citizens, the taxpayers, the voters who put the board where they are, to know what is happening to their schools and their children's education.

Two teachers leaving the high school at the end of January will not be replaced. This is only the beginning. A reduction in teaching staff can only lead to the reduction of Programs. Right now our schools offer a good, basic education—no frills, no luxuries. This will be reduced to the 3 P's and we want more than that for our children. Are you going to stand by and do nothing? Or will you get out and let the school board know how you feel?

Soccer

Now about the game of Soccer. What do we know about it? How did it all begin?

Soccer in some form or other is one of the oldest sports known to mankind. The Chinese about 2500 years ago played a game called Tsu Chu which means to kick a ball made of leather with the foot. The goals were bamboo poles 10 ft high or more with a silk net between them. The object of the game was to kick a ball which

was stuffed with hair over the net or thru a hole in it. The winners were handsomely rewarded with fruit, wine, silverware and other gifts especially when playing before the Emperor. There also was a story about the origin of Soccer in England & sports historians are fond of quoting it. In medieval times the marauding Danes staged a raid on the town of Kingston which was an ANGLO Saxon stronghold, the townspeople held out, fighting desperately until help arrived from London and the Danes were beaten. The Danish General was killed & his head cut off & kicked around the village in triumph.

The game came to the shores of the United States in 1830. A soccer field measures not more than 130 yds. nor less than 100 yds. long. Not more than 100 yds. nor less than 50 yds. wide. The ball is a leather sphere (it can be made up of other material not harmful to the players.) It is 27 to 28 inches in circumference and weighs 14 to 16 ounces. It is not changed during a game unless authorized by the referee. Teams consist of not more than 11 players, one of them is a goalkeeper. A regulation game lasts 90 minutes in 2 45 minute halves. Officials consist of 1 referee & two linesmen. A goal is scored when the ball passes over the goal line between the goal posts or under the crossbars ...

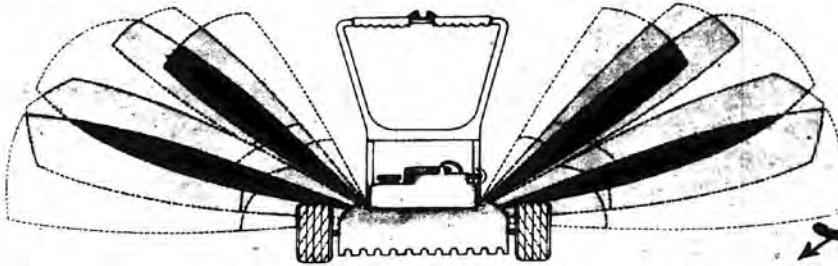

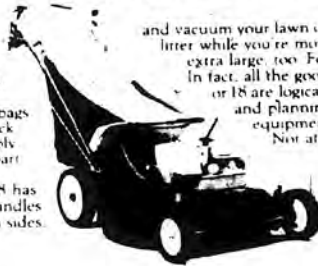
