Oppose Business Zoning

Two residents spoke strongly against the rezoning of a parcel belonging to Roberts Chevrolet and located behind its showroom which fronts on Broadway and backs up on Grand Street.

Dorothy McPartlin, Dorothy Mcrar-old owner of a 70-year-old house deplored the house rezoning of the entire area and the resulting traffic, which, she said, is heavy from the Roberts Chevrolet operation. She also noted the expansion of the East Nassau Medical Center (HIP) at the other end of Grand Street, which she feels is destroying the character of the neigh-borhood. Gentrude borhood. Burgess, who lives ad-jacent to the subject parcel, declaimed the petitioner's statement that Grand Street was not in use, as she had noticed it being used for testing brakes and for night deliveries of cars.
