Master Choral

The Hicksville Public Library Fine Arts Committee presents the Master Choral of Long Island on Sunday afternoon, April 9, at 3 p.m. in the Library auditorium, under the direction of Carl Druba, nationally renowned choral conductor.

The Master Choral of Long Island is well into its third concert season. Since its organization in October, 1969, it has presented the great compositions in many styles ranging from the Baroque to the present day. Eclectic in its taste, the Choral has featured compositions by Bach, Mozart and Handel on the one hand, and in its dedication to the contemporary scene, works by Pinkham, Dello Joio and Bernstein.

In a relatively short space of time, the Master Choral has earned a reputation as one of the most musically polished groups in the metropolitan area. Among its credits are the recording of a number of Jazz-Rock pieces and four concerts with the New York Philharmonic as part of that orchestra's regular season.

This year the Choral has once again demonstrated outstanding musical ability in a concert in January in which the Bach "Magnificat" and the challenging Orff "Catulli Carmina" were sung. March 13 and April 20, 1972 find the members back in New York City at Carnegie Hall and the New York Opera Orchestra.

The next regular concert for the Master Choral will be Saturday, June 3, 1972 at 8:30 at Walt Whitman High School, Huntington. The program will feature the Vivaldi "Gloria", the Mozart "Te Deum" and the works of Robert Washburn. The concert season ends on June 10, 1972 as the Choral sings in the bandshell in Heckscher Park, Huntington for the Arts Festival.

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Boy Scouts To Assist In Conservation Project

Congressman Norman F. Lent has announced that his District office, with the cooperation of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, has obtained 2,000 Japanese Black Pine seedlings for a major "reforestation" project along the south shore of Long Island.

Wind erosion along Jones Beach, a critical problem there, led to a quick response from the Long Island State Park Commission to Congressman Lent's request for possible planting sites, and an area alongside Meadowbrook Parkway and on the beachfront from Meadowbrook to Wantagh

State Parkways has been set aside to receive the seedlings, of a strain which is, itself, highly wind-resistant.

A man-power shortage prevented the L.I.S.P.C.'s offer of willing hands to do the actual planting, and Congressman Lent turned to James Davenport, Executive Director of the Nassau County Council, Boy Scouts of America, who has volunteered two troops of Boy Scouts to assist with the planting, scheduled for Saturday, April 29th. Workers under the direction of Jones Beach Superintendent Robert Ott will water and care for the seedlings following the planting.

New Training Course For CD Auxiliary Police

The Nassau County Police Department will begin a new 11-week training course for members of Civil Defense Auxiliary Police units on Wednesday evening, April 12th, according to an announcement today by Gen. Otto C. Van Exel, Nassau County Civil Defense Director.

The course will include programs on laws of arrest, an introduction to criminal law first

aid instruction, traffic control, communications, juvenile-police relations, civil and human rights, civil disturbances, narcotics control, the coordination of Auxiliary Police and Police Department activities, etc.

The CD Auxiliary Police is a volunteer service which aids the Police Department in protecting the public safety.

Ryan-Carinha Tragedy

On Monday Sept. 27, 1971, shortly after start of work, there was a tragic accident on the job at a Woodbury N.Y. building site. A small crane swinging a concrete-pouring bucket toppled striking one of our Local Carpenters, Brother Thomas Ryan across the lower torso severing his right leg below the hip. His partner, Brother Joseph Carinha of Local Union No. 516 was also hit by the falling bucket killing him instantly. This was 8:10 A.M.

Due to prompt first-aid administered by various tradesmen, a tourniquet was applied to the mangled leg, and the quick response of the Nassau County Police, Brother Ryan was taken to the Syosset Hospital

where emergency treatment was performed saving his life. He was so badly injured that it necessitated intensive care for a number of weeks.

At the next regular meeting of Carpenters Local Union No. 1772 Hicksville N.Y. it was decided to initiate a drive to financially help this unfortunate family, wife, child and "another on the way". Because of the circumstances, the Fund grew to \$4870.00 a tribute to the Brotherhood Committee, The Local Union and to all who participated. For this help and effort, Local Union No. 1772 is grateful as is the Ryan family. Additional contributions to date amount to \$5180.00.

Jones Fund: 136 Years Of Serving the Poor

At the regular meeting of the Nassau County Board of Supervisors this week, the Board approved a resolution to request the N. Y. State legislature to enact a Home Rule Measure for the county in relation to changing the position of Jones Fund Trustee from an elected to an appointed one.

Most people out of Hicksville, and many even in the community might ask: "What is the Jones Fund?" That reaction, plus the costs involved in balloting and campaigning are behind the Supervisors' request, according to those in a position to know.

Most Hickvillians are familiar with the stately, spacious-looking Georgian building set on 20 acres on the corner of West John Street and Charlotte Ave. Few, perhaps, are aware of its interesting past and present operation.

Classified as an "adult home," the Jones Institute now houses seventy indigent residents, of which ten are women, all judged to be in financial need and referred by the Nassau County Department of Social Services. It all began in 1836 with the will of Samuel Jones, believed to have been a resident of the Syosset/Laurel Hollow area. The good Mr. Jones, while leaving only chattel and \$200, in cash to his wife, left the then fantastic amount of \$30,000 in trust for the care of the poor.

Through the years, this \$30,000 left in trust has swelled to \$200,000, in insured deposits, much of it acquired with the taking of Jones Institute land for the widening of West John St. The total cost of operation, about \$300,000 annually, is paid for by the monthly rate of \$315 per resident and interest on principal, which basic sum can only be touched for capital expenditures.

Under the somewhat unusual provisions of the will, the N. Y. State legislature was given the task of deciding how the trustees were to be selected and the operation of the institute was to be overseen by the then state Chancellor, now the Department of Audit and Control. What the Jones Fund amounts to is a private trust with state supervision. "There's nothing like us anywhere," says Robert C. Michaelis, of Massapequa, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, who says he's all in

Championship High School Sports May Use Coliseum

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso and coaches of the Section 8 Athletic Council met to map plans to bring championship high school sports to the Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum.

Caso and the coaches, along with coliseum manager Earl Duryea, met for more than an hour in the county executive's office, making tentative plans to stage tournament basketball, wrestling and track into the new arena next year. The session with the council, which is the governing body for all high school sports in Nassau, was the outgrowth of a discussion which Caso and high school coaches had more than a month ago to find ways to book the schools into the county facility.

"Flexibility is the key to our plans," Caso said during the meeting. "We will work it out, and while it is, of course, not possible to get regular high school games into the coliseum

Stuart Levine Nominated To State Assembly

Stuart R. Levine of Bethpage has officially been nominated by the Nassau County Republican Committee as its candidate for the State Assembly in the 10th Assembly District. The district includes all or parts of Plainview, Bethpage, Old Bethpage, Farmingdale, Hicksville, Syosset and Wyandanch.

Levine, 24, received the committee's unanimous endorsement Friday night, March 24, at the nominating convention held at the Malibu Beach Club. Prior to the Committee vote, Levine's candidacy was unanimously recommended by the Oyster Bay Town Republican Committee. On Thursday, March 23, the Suffolk County Republican Committee endorsed Levine.

Levine teaches environment and ecology at the Plainview-Old Bethpage Junior High School. He devised and developed the curriculum for the course, which was one of the first full-time mandatory courses on environment on Long Island. In addition, he conducts an in-service ecology course for approximately 100 teachers in the Plainview-Old Bethpage School District. The course was accepted and financed by the Board of Cooperative Educational Services as an accredited college course.

Levine grew up in the Plainview-Bethpage area, attending Bethpage High School where he was class president and editor-in-chief of the school paper. He received his bachelor's degree from C.W. Post College, where he is presently pursuing a master's degree in political science. While at Post, he was a reporter for WCWP, the college radio station.

He became active in politics as a teenager, serving as chairman of the Young Republican organization in Oyster Bay Town. For the past six years, he has

been active as a coordinator in various phases of Republican campaigns in the town. He was in charge of Assemblyman Martin Ginsberg's successful re-election campaign in 1969. Levine is running for the seat being vacated by Ginsberg, who has been nominated for a Family Court judgeship.

Levine is vice president of the Theodore Roosevelt Republican Club, Bethpage. He and his wife, Laura, live at 42 Burton Ave., Bethpage.

Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:

The Hicksville Board of Education, through the efforts of its President, Mr. G. Thomas Muratore, and its vice-President, Mr. Tom Clark, have given the people of Hicksville a means of displaying their views on three subjects which we have been deprived of displaying in other areas of Representative Government. And that is "Prayer in Schools, which was snatched from us, "Busing, which Albany is ready to spring on us, and "Equal opportunity for quality education, which is always promised by never achieved. I am naturally referring to the three "straw votes" that our Board, by a 4-1 decision, enacted on the evening of March 28th, which in part states:

"Do you favor an amendment to the U.S. Constitution that would prohibit forced busing, and guarantee the right of each student to attend the appropriate school nearest his home?"

"Do you favor providing an equal opportunity for quality education for all children, regardless of race, creed or color?"

"Do you favor an amendment to the U.S. Constitution to allow prayer in the Schools?"

This is an opportunity for the people of Hicksville to express their sentiments on the very topics that face the lives of their children and family within our communities. Forced busing directly involves us, if it is enacted, we must pay for it from our tax dollars, not mentioning the prospect of having our children bused out of the district, which I for one would fight to the end.

It was said at the Board meeting that by enacting these straw votes, "The Board has no business introducing federal issues on a local level." Prayer in schools was a local issue and it was the "Federal Level" that took prayer out of the schools. So, lets put it back via the local level route.

As a people, in this Great Republic, we do have the right and the means to change our Constitution, and that is by influencing all levels of government, starting in Hicksville, then Nassau, to Albany and across grass routes America.

The Prayer Amendment "Sen. Dirksen's effort, missed by a whisker from being a reality, and could very easily be revived. Once a Constitutional Convention is called by two thirds of our State Legislatures in all our fifty states, than any topic could be acted on amending our Constitution, and the amendments on the Hicksville ballot this year would certainly be brought up for action.

We in Hicksville thank our Board of Education for the privilege of participating during this election year on issues that affect every family in America. It is our hope that other communities will join us in this endeavor.

Dear Dr. Niosi:

On Friday morning, November 5, 1971, I, along with Mrs. Eileen Jackson and Dr. John Cadden, met with you to discuss the problems of reading in Hicksville. Among other subjects, we talked about a reading supervisor. At that time we were told that Mrs. Johnson, our present reading supervisor, would be retiring at the end of this school year. We were assured by you that she would be replaced and also, to be sure that we would get the best replacement Hicksville could afford, the position would be advertised outside the district.

At a special meeting of the board of education on March 27, 1972, the public was told there would be no reading supervisor for the year 1972-1973 and that the principals and teachers would supervise this most important department throughout the district. When Mrs. Jackson questioned this and reminded you of our talk in November you answered with a reminder of the three reading consultants hired by the district. Dr. Niosi, Mrs. Jackson was talking about ONE supervisor who would coordinate all reading at all grade levels in all schools, not three consultants who will give a total of 30 hours of an "in-service" type of training to the teachers (and don't misunderstand-I believe this, too, was needed). The public was also threatened at a later time that if the budget fails in June, we may lose our assistant principals. This leads me to believe that reading programs will depend largely, then, on how much time an already over-burdened principal will have to devote to this most important problem.

The losers here can only be our children. Without the ability to read no child can do well in any other phase of his learning. Without proper supervision and coordination we can only expect to fail even further. I beg you, therefore, to reconsider a replacement for Mrs. Johnson so our children will not be short-changed in their over-all education.

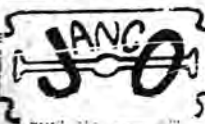

favor of changing the trusteehip to an appointed position. "I don't think the position is one which warrants the elective process. We don't deal with the public at large," he said.

The five trustees are divided among the Towns of North Hempstead and Oyster Bay and the City of Glen Cove. They receive annual stipends ranging from \$1,000 to \$2,000, dollars, the largest going to treasurer Michael J. Vittorino of North Massapequa. Other trustees are Grey Mason, vice chairman, of Glen Head; Grace Allen of Sands Pt. and Rosemary Falbee, of Mineola.

Happy Calmness

The atmosphere, if not exciting at the Jones Institute, is a calm and happy one of acceptance. With its daily operation under the direction of John Bertone, of Glen Cove, Superintendent, and a staff of 17 employees, the ladies and men, in their separate facilities, enjoy TV in their dayrooms, play cards, do handicrafts, or look out the window at busy West John Street. They sleep dormitory style, ten to a room, with individual night-tables next to each ladies bed plentifully endowed with cosmetics and creams.

Residents partake of their meals together in a common dining room fitted out with blue dinette tables.

With an average age of 64 (one is as young as 32; the oldest is nearly 90), some residents are emotionally disturbed, some physically or mentally handicapped, some just old. The resident of longest vintage Margaret Griffin, greeted as she watched TV in the dayroom, has been at the Institute since 1942.

The Institute has a chapel for religious services, conducted weekly in different faiths by visiting clergy.

Colorful crocheted afghans at the foot of several ladies' beds are evidence of a program of recreation under the direction of the staff nurse, Mrs. Stella Miliello, of East Norwich. On certain days each week, personnel from the county Recreation Department conduct art classes or poetry sessions at the institute. Some of the poetry has been quite remarkable such as this one by Frank Evans:

And when the sun glow sets in the West
And all of nature's creatures have gone to rest
I am glad to be alive, I must say, and hope to see
The wonders of another day,
....and who can wish for more?
