The firemen proceeded into the thick of the fire which by now covered an area of about 2 square miles. The girls kept up their fire-fighting on the edges of the area. They returned after the fire was out a very tired, dirty, and scratched bunch. The feeling of

A Busy Month For Vamps

The month of April was a busy one for Hicksville firemen. 56 alarms were received—total malicious false alarms received to date 1972 - 62. This past week Fireman answered 18 alarms, 4 malicious false alarms, 9 rescue calls, 2 building fires. A garage, attached to the house at 17 Hunter St. was gutted Sat., April 29. The alarm was reported at 12:35 pm. 8 pieces of apparatus responded under Asst. Chief Misturini. The

blaze of undetermined origin was confined to the garage. There were no injuries. On May 2, a basement fire at 38 Balsam Dr. caused considerable damage. 6 pieces of apparatus responded under Asst. Chief Misturini. The fire was just over the boundary and the Syosset Fire Dept. was called in to take over from Hicksville vamps. The family pet died of smoke inhalation. 2 men were injured

fighting the blaze. One, a Hicksville fireman suffered smoke inhalation, the other, a N.Y. Telephone repairman working in the area suffered smoke inhalation, was treated at the scene by the rescue squad and released. The officers and men wish to thank Robert Andretta of Hicksville (Telco employee) for his assistance in helping the occupants to safety. The alarm was received at 2:40 p.m.

In reference to School Bd candidate Mr. Loicano's 4/27/72 letter.

As clearly indicated, if the Board of Education lost confidence in our previous Supt., despite the some \$100,000 equity in his two unexpired contractual years (because of a previous McCormack Bd commitment), certainly, it was a sound business practice for the current majority Board to have reassigned him from that position! A position wherein the Board depends heavily on recommendations for the expenditure of a \$22,084,168 budget this year, and about a \$22,800,000 budget next year - or a total expenditure (and taxes) of almost \$45,000,000!!

In addition, the \$662,161 unprecedented reduction by our majority Board from the defeated June 71 budget, with no reduction in programs, should, alone, indicate a favorable degree of taxpayer-responsiveness and managerial ability of our majority Board.

Also, we find it difficult to believe that Mr. Loicano would

intentionally embroil himself in a "double standard" and should therefore familiarize himself with his running mate's (Board Member McCormack's) history: On 8/13/68 when Mr. McCormack chaired a Budget Hearing, and after acknowledging the proposed percentage expenditure increase, he was then left with over \$1,000,000 of a \$2,910,000 proposed total expenditure (and tax) increase in the budget which he could not, or would not, explain, or even indicate - he remained mute! That's the time that "Life" asked the Governor for a full investigation - to no avail.

Moreover, Mr. Loicano's futile extrapolation-exercise whereby the "patronage pot" could even be remotely associated with the majority Board (and the Commissioner's) decision was completely unjustified. In the future it might be wise for apparently earnest, but yet novice, Loicano to huddle with veteran McCormack before releasing a similar letter.

In order that we may have the widest choice on election day, it is hoped that hereafter all Board candidates focus on SUBSTANTIVE issues.

Van Raalte of Cedarhurst during the 2 PM ceremonies in the Roosevelt Field Mall. Caso was introduced by Mrs. Adelaide Attard, the director of Nassau County's Department of Senior Citizens Affairs.

The four "Senior Citizens of the Year" were chosen because of their years of devoted service to the causes of the elderly in Nassau. Mrs. Attard said that Ryan "has rendered exceptional service as an organizer of senior citizen action groups, particularly in the field of housing." Hardy, 89, has "distinguished himself as a fund-raiser to sustain programs for the elderly," she said. Gockley, who was a top executive before his retirement, has "devoted his efforts largely in the field of education for senior citizens, teaching and organizing pre-retirement workshops," while

REPORTS**

A few weeks ago, in this column, I commented on the popularity of boating in the waters on both shores of Oyster Bay Town. I stressed the importance of safety and consideration on the waterways, particularly with the tremendous increase in the number of boats in recent years.

There is another facet of this waterborne population explosion that is of concern, and that is the increased pollution which is threatening one of our most valuable natural assets.

Fortunately, most sailors are aware of this problem and do their share in keeping our waters clean.

The Town is taking a two-pronged attack on this source of pollution. Pump-out facilities have been installed at three Town marinas to service the holding tanks now required on all pleasure craft by state law. A fee of \$2 is charged for each pump-out, which includes flushing and replacement of clean water in the holding tank.

In cooperation with the Long Island Lighting Company, the Town will shortly begin distributing over 10,000 plastic litter bags supplied by Lico to boosters at Town marinas and boat launching ramp sites. It is hoped this will encourage

residents to keep their trash on board until it can be deposited in a suitable shoreside container. Please make use of these facilities so that we can all continue to enjoy our waterways and beaches.

Despite continued press reports which would make it seem that violent crime is on the rise across the nation, there are hopeful signs. Fifty-three major U.S. cities have reported a decrease in serious crimes for 1971 over 1970.

The District of Columbia, which was so badly crime-ridden when President Nixon first took office that I used to warn Long Island visitors to take precautions, has now turned the corner. Crime is off 27.5 per cent for the first quarter of this year, compared with the same period in 1971.

Although the signs are generally hopeful, there is much

more which needs to be done. A good deal of our work must be performed, incidentally, inside of the prisons, rather than out.

Because of broad-ranging efforts on the part of Congress and various state legislatures - particularly since the Attica uprising - the public is becoming aware of the role of prisons in rehabilitation and the need for more funding for rehabilitative purposes. The deterrent aspects of prison life have always been emphasized but the rehabilitative is just coming into focus.

Two years ago, in one of these reports, I pointed out that our prisons were failing in their rehabilitative work and that,

indeed, they were failing to screen out those convicts who were poor prospects from those who should be allowed back on our streets. Former Teamster President James Hoffa, a parolee, told a Congressional Committee recently of the inadequate and antiquated procedures which our penitentiaries employ in their stated goal of salvaging human lives.

The recidivism rate - the rate at which parolees return to crime and jail - still stands at 75 per cent. We must find new and intelligent approaches to reduce this still sorry record if we really want the good old days of safe streets and unlocked doors.

From Our Postmaster

Ralph Cascardo

The "instant" post office is alive and doing well in the U.S. Postal Service.

Instant? Almost. New mobile post offices which have been deployed around the country in recent months can be on the scene of a disaster or local emergency within a matter of hours.

Forty-two of these temporary post offices were purchased as a means of providing continuing postal service in areas where post offices are destroyed or damaged by fires, floods, storms, earthquakes or other disasters.

Their value was illustrated most recently when one of the moveable units was dispatched to the flood-ravaged area of Logan County, West Virginia, where three post offices were swept away by flood waters. The mobile retail unit had been assigned to Charleston, West Virginia.

The mobile post offices also are available for use in non-disaster situations, supplementing existing facilities during peak mailing periods such as Christmas, at resort areas during peak mailing periods such as Christmas, at resort areas during vacation time, and at state fairs

and large conventions. They can also be used when existing facilities are being remodeled or expanded.

The design of the 40 by 10 feet mobile units provides for all customer services - purchasing stamps and mailing parcels, for example - plus carrier delivery if necessary.

With attachment of a generator, the unit is self-sustaining and provides power, water and sewage disposal through hook-up with existing facilities.

All-weather climate control is provided for the comfort of customers and postal employees.

The first of the new units was used as the official post office of National Postal Forum V, a gathering of top postal officials and major mailers, at the Washington Hilton Hotel last September. A special cancellation was designed and used in the Forum Post Office.

The New York Region currently has two units in use, one replacing the St. Johns Station in Brooklyn which was destroyed by fire on February 6, the other assigned in the Bronx to provide postal service to 68,000 in Co-op City.

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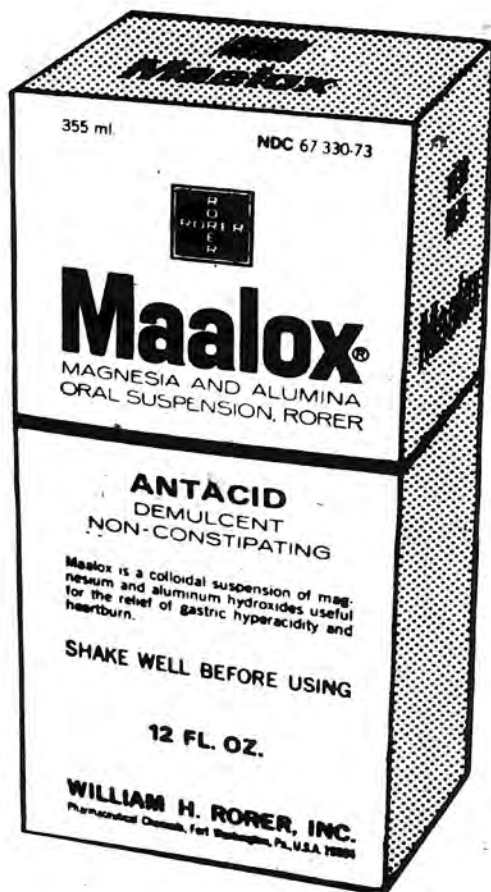
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Recreation News

BOCES Distributes

The Nassau Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) recently distributed \$2,743,440 in state aid reimbursements to the local school districts of Nassau County.

The payment was the sixth of eight installments on an estimated \$11,462,239 that will be distributed to the districts by BOCES during the 1971-72 school year. Of that total, BOCES has paid \$7,302,485 to the county's school systems since September.

This payment, and those made previously, are reimbursements for BOCES services purchased by Nassau's school districts during the 1970-71 academic year.

Under the BOCES state aid system, local school districts pay tuition and fees to send pupils to special and occupational education programs and to subscribe to data processing and other services provided by the cooperative board. The state then reimburses the districts, through BOCES, under a special formula.

Reimbursements average about 60 per cent of the district's original cost, and are paid in the year after the costs are incurred.

BOCES aid payments are in addition to the regular state aid that local school districts receive directly from Albany.

Payments made this time to each of the school districts in our areas, were: Syosset, School

District 2, \$51,851.02; Jericho, School District 15, \$22,770.55; Hicksville, School District 17, \$232,918.06; and Plainview, School District 4, \$51,302.33.

Tobay Adopts New Identification Procedures

Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced recently that effective Thursday, June 1, all vehicles licensed for the transport of cesspool or scavenger wastes within the Town must comply with the following rules and regulations covering said vehicle identification.

1. On the door of the cab, in letters of two (2) inches minimum height, the name and address of the firm or individual shall appear.
2. On both sides of the tank, the designation "cesspool wastes" or "scavenger wastes" shall appear in letters a minimum of six (6) inches in height.
3. On both sides of the tank, the maximum capacity of the tank (in gallons), shall appear in letters a minimum of four (4) inches in height.

Supervisor Burke said that the color of the letters should be sufficient to contrast with the

background color of the vehicle and tank in order to provide easier visibility and identification.

In accordance with Section 11-40 of the Town of Oyster Bay Code of Ordinances "any person who cleans or removes the contents, or transports cesspool wastes within the Town, must first obtain a permit from the Town Clerk and shall agree to conform to the rules and regulations established by the Superintendent of Sanitary Services." Furthermore, the Supervisor noted the new requirements will assist in providing the Town's mobile patrols with visible identification of vehicles illegally transporting or discharging waste contents in the Township into lots or catch basins. It will also facilitate truck identity and disposal fee (based on the maximum capacity) for removal at the town's Scavenger Waste Disposal Plant.

Bridge Only Part of A 'Monster-Plan'

Opposition to the proposed Oyster Bay-Rye Bridge has, to date, been led primarily by north shore residents who foresee the adverse effects the bridge could have in terms of downzoning, condemnation and construction inconveniences, as well as increased traffic and air pollution. At the same time, however, many south shore residents appear to favor the bridge as a simple "escape route" to New England. I am unalterably opposed to construction of the bridge at the Oyster Bay (Bayville) site, and

believe all of my constituents should know the reason why. The bridge was first envisioned in a 1966 Report of the Tri-State Transportation Commission (then chaired by William Ronan) as one of two critical links in a "Beltway" through New York City and its suburbs similar to those which currently encircle Washington and Baltimore. Even then, the bridge was planned to connect two other links in this "loop" system - the Cross Westchester and Seaford-Oyster Bay Expressways - which are both now virtually completed.

The second critical link on the drawing boards in 1966 was the infamous 8-12 lane "Atlantic Expressway", along the present route of Sunrise Highway, connecting the Seaford-Oyster Bay route with the Verrazano Bridge. As a State Senator, I fought this Sunrise Highway Superhighway, which would decimate the south shore of Nassau County, as we beat it - temporarily. Construction of the bridge at Oyster Bay would raise anew claims for the "need" for the "Atlantic Expressway", and the enraged cries of south shore residents at that point would, I'm sure, make

the north shore voices currently raised against the bridge seem like a whisper!!!
The answer is quite simple. To prevent renewed pressure for the Atlantic Expressway's construction, the bridge at Oyster Bay must NOT be built. As an added note, the convenience which the bridge might provide for our north-bound trips could hardly match the convenience it would provide New England and Westchester residents in gaining access to our already overcrowded Atlantic beaches!!!
While opposed to the Oyster Bay-Rye proposal, I am not opposed to the Oyster Bay-Rye proposal, I am not opposed to the idea of a bridge spanning Long Island Sound. I believe that some currently less-populated areas in Suffolk County would welcome the span, as a boost to industry and that county's economy generally.
