# 'House Fire Kills woman 56'

An early morning fire took the life of 56 yr. old Mrs. Marian Frankel of 84 Brittle La., Hicksville. On Sun., June 4 neighbors were awakened by the noise of shattering glass. What they saw were flames roaring out of the almost all the windows of the Levitt house. Several alarms were received, the first call was received at 12:28 a.m. Approx. 65 men and 10 pieces of apparatus responded under Chief Louis Mertz.

Minutes later, the first arriving engine co. found the home fully involved. Firemen, beating back flames coming out the front door, discovered the body of Mrs. Frankel. It is the first death from fire in Hicksville in over four years. The fire gutted the 6 room house to the extent that even the contents were reduced to a pile of ashes. The family pet also died in the blaze.

The fire started in the living room and burned undetected for a considerable time before anyone noticed it. It was ironic that the room that suffered the least damage was the bedroom Mrs. Frankel was sleeping in. Apparently, when the victim was awakened, and due to the very poor design of the Levitt homes

very small and very high bedroom windows, she was forced to leave the room and attempt to escape through heavy smoke and fire, and in doing so her life was lost. The fire marshals office was called to investigate, which is routine.

### False Alarm Turned in During Blaze

Firemen fighting the house fire were hampered when some sick individual turned in a malicious false alarm at Rim La. & Link La. Several fire units were diverted to that alarm.

### Stable Fire Kills 36 Horses

Hicksville firemen were called out Thursday June 1st to assist Westbury & Jericho firemen fight a blaze that killed 36 racing and show horses in a stable on Jericho Tpk. in Old Westbury. They were on the scene for several hours.

### School Bus Accident And Fire.

Last week a small school bus carrying several handicapped children was hit by an auto on 5th Ave. in Hicksville. The bus caught fire. It was reported that the driver of the bus, Mrs. Russel Lewis, who herself was injured, ignored her injuries and very calmly & quickly removed the

children from the vehicle. One child suffered a minor injury. Firemen wish to commend Mrs. Lewis, who is the wife of a Hicksville fireman, for her swift actions in preventing a tragedy.

The officers and men of the Hicksville Fire Dept. received the 1972 Annual Community Service Award which was given by the Hicksville Community Council. Chief Mertz, on behalf of all the officers and men wishes to thank the Council for their recognition and pledges to continue to strive to provide Hicksville residents with fast, efficient, and dedicated service and to keep our residents aware of the need to always be alert to the dangers of fire and the best ways to prevent them.

As space permits in coming issues of the Herald, we will run excerpts of a very interesting article from a national magazine to point out that many homes are designed and built with faults, the most serious fault being the lack of guaranteed exits from the home, which a tragic fire last week in Hicksville illustrates. We assure you, you won't want to miss this valuable information.

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## Dist Superintendent Presents Summary Of Professional Objectives

The Board of Education heard a summary report last night from Dr. Robert F. Savitt, District Superintendent, identifying some major directions of professional objectives that have been carried out this year.

Dr. Savitt, speaking at a public hearing at the John F. Kennedy High School here, told of efforts to define "open education" in the districts schools. He noted the "openness" of teachers and students to new educational concepts, the "openness" of physical facilities. He cited the District's ongoing programs with the "school environment built around the student rather than the reverse".

The District Superintendent told of the "team teaching"

approach at the Pasadena School to refine existing programs. He reported that progress with learning disabilities classes was so successful in two classes as to warrant expansion to the rest of the district, to offer the kind of help beyond the ordinary classes needed by the disabled.

Dr. Savitt reported that the "recognition of students' rights and responsibilities, a landmark policy adopted by the Board in 1971, has encouraged deep student involvement in programs". With regard to budget control, he praised the Board's efforts this year in providing direction for tightened budgetary procedures.

Harvey Brickman, President of

the Board, on hearing the report, asked that the specific recommendations be presented to the Board for evaluation and possible implementation during the coming year.

In concluding his report to the Board and community, Dr. Savitt paid tribute to the Plainview staff for their continuing efforts to find new and innovative approaches to education. He predicted that the "new Modular Scheduling Program at Kennedy High School, the Alternate Education Programs being investigated in the Junior High Schools, and the Open Education Programs in the elementary schools, will serve the children of this community well in the years ahead".

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# Kiwanis Honors Frank Chlumsky

Last week the Hicksville Kiwanis Club honored one of its past-presidents Frank Chlumsky, with a surprise, "This Is Your Life" program, under the direction of Murray Margolis, a fellow Kiwanian. Over 200 friends, fellow Kiwanians and neighbors attended this luncheon which was held at the Milleridge Inn.

The invocation was given by Al Heuer, a long-time friend of Mr. Chlumsky.

Mr. Margolis presented the following facts of Mr. Chlumsky's life: He was born to Czechoslovakian parents, Marie and Frank Chlumsky, on Dec. 3, 1885, in New York City. He attended public school in New York City, but dropped out before graduating. At fourteen he received his working papers and obtained his first job, which lasted only one day. However, his second job, as a roofer, lasted for four years. While working for the firm of Nicholson and Galloway, Roofers, he accidentally broke a large piece of glass while delivering it to the home of John Jacob Astor. The firm charged him \$3.00 (a tremendous sum at that time) to compensate for this breakage. However, Frank Chlumsky was pleasantly surprised last week, when Dave Walters of Nicholson and Galloway presented him with a plaque and returned the \$3.00 (minus interest) to Frank, 72 years later. Frank thanked him and tried to collect the interest, but in the language of the present, "No Way".

His next job was with an educational supply company where he worked as an errand boy.

Mr. Margolis went on to tell about Frank's next job in 1906 when he went to work for the J.E. Linde Paper Company. Here he worked his way up to salesman and lasted for 45 years.

One of his fellow commuters on the LIRR was Jack Ongania, who was present at the luncheon and told about their years "on the railroad".

On April 20, 1907 he married Caroline, and two daughters, Frances and Ruth were born to the Hicksville couple. Frances is now Mrs. F. McKillop, and Ruth is now married to Mr. George McIntosh, who were all there at the luncheon to honor their father and brought greetings from the grandchildren and great-grandchildren in California.

In 1913 he moved permanently to Hicksville. He became the first secretary of the first Chamber of Commerce of Hicksville. In 1919 he was elected to the Hicksville School Board and served as secretary and president at various times during the 25 years that he served Hicksville in this capacity. Present at the luncheon was Mr. Henry Bregel of Empire Roofing, a fellow Kiwanian and a fellow member of the school board at that time. Mr. Bregel told of moving Frank from New York to Hicksville for \$20.00.

Mr. Chlumsky also served as Councilman of the Town of Oyster Bay for thirteen years. Former TOB Supervisor Harry Tappan, was present and spoke of Frank's many accomplishments. Mr. Walter Stackler, Sr. also spoke of the problems he had dealing with Frank when he had to get building permits years ago...

Mal Pierce, popular Pontiac dealer and long-time friend, recalled a trip with Frank to Snoo Squallani Falls (a likely name)!

Mr. Margolis resumed his commentary, recollecting that during World War I he was made chairman of servicemen and women's comfort committee, and took care of 120 soldiers. Many years later during World War II he chaired the same committee administering to 830 soldiers. He was made a Four-Minute Man by President Wilson.

During World War I, Frank was connected with civic groups instrumental in erecting a World War I Memorial for our service men on railroad property where the present railroad trestle passes over Broadway. Frank paid \$1 a year lease to the LIRR for this.

The memorial is presently at the Junior High School. He was also instrumental in erecting the World War II Memorial at the Junior High School.

Present was Fred Sutter of Sutter Monumental Works who reminded Frank of the erection of these monuments.

Dr. Phil Rubenstein, a past president of Kiwanis spoke on the fine job that Frank did as secretary of Kiwanis in the past and complimented him upon the fact that he is reassuming this job as Kiwanis secretary this year.

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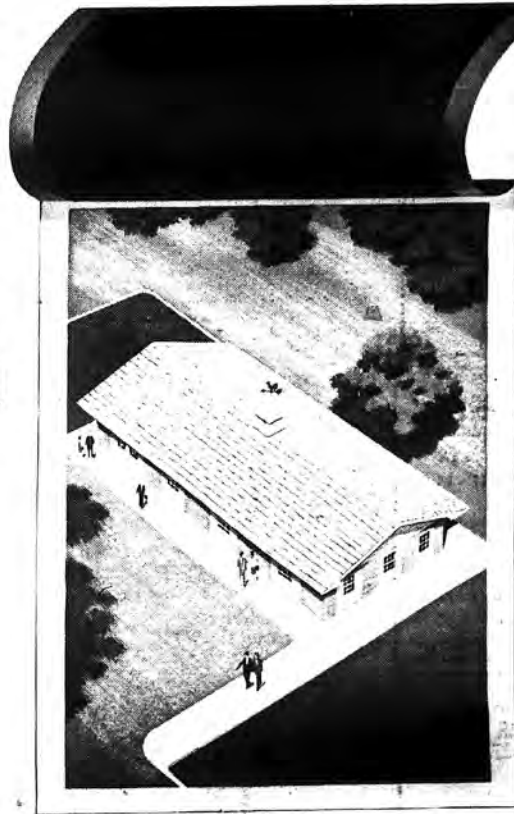

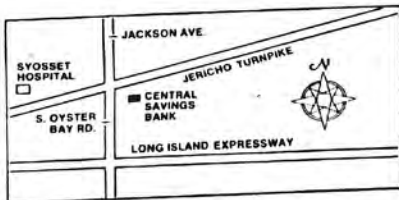

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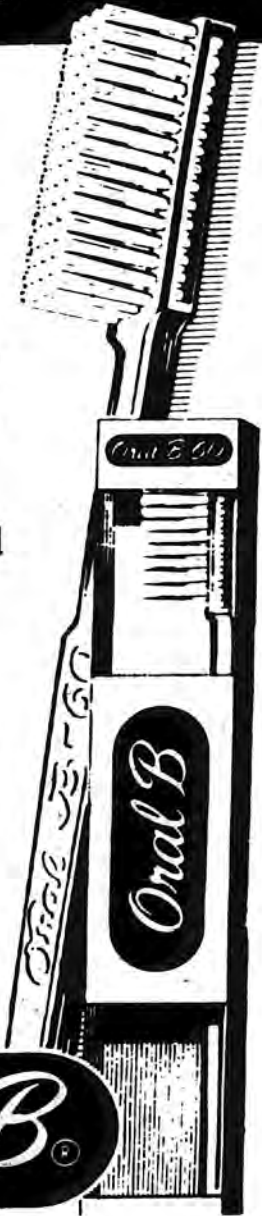

**AN ORDINANCE DEFINING AND REGULATING THE DISTRIBUTION OF COMMERCIAL HANDBILLS IN THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.**

**Section 1. Description:** This ordinance shall be known and designated as the "Commercial Handbill Ordinance of the Town of Oyster Bay."

**Section 2. Prohibitions:** It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, cast, place or distribute or cause or permit to be thrown, cast, placed or distributed any commercial handbill, circular, card, booklet or other similar commercial or advertising matter or publication whatsoever upon any places in or upon any public place or in or upon any dwelling or in any letterbox or receptacle on said premises unless the name and address of the distributor thereof are clearly and boldly printed thereon and unless duly permitted by the owners or parties in possession of the properties thereof, provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to prohibit the distribution of such matter by the United States Postal Service, or prohibit the distribution of sample copies of newspapers regularly sold by the copy or the annual subscription. This section is not intended to prevent the lawful distribution of anything other than commercial or business matter or material.

**Section 3. Definitions:**  
 A. "Commercial Handbill" shall mean and include any printed or written matter, any sample or device, dodger, circular, leaflet, pamphlet, paper booklet, or any other printed or otherwise reproduced original or copies of any matter or literature:

1. Which advertises for sale any merchandise, product, commodity, or thing; or
2. Which advertises for the employment of any service; or
3. Which directs attention to any business or mercantile or commercial establishment, or other activity, for the purpose of either directly or indirectly promoting the interests thereof by sales or employment; or
4. Which directs attention to or advertises any meeting, theatrical performance, exhibition, or event of any kind, for which an admission fee is charged for the purpose of private gain or profit, but the terms of this clause shall not apply where an admission fee is charged or a collection is taken up for the purpose of defraying the expenses incident to such meeting, theatrical per-

formance, exhibition, or event of any kind, when either of the same is held, given or takes place in connection with the dissemination of information which is not restricted under the ordinary rules of decency, good morals, public peace, safety and good order. Provided, that nothing contained in this clause shall be deemed to authorize the holding, giving or taking place of any meeting, theatrical performance, exhibition, or event of any kind, without a license, where such license is or may be required by any law of the State, or under any ordinance of this municipality; or

5. Which, while containing reading matter other than advertising matter is distributed or circulated for advertisement purposes, or for the private benefit and gain of any person so engaged as advertiser or distributor.

B. "Distributor" shall mean any person, firm, partnership, association, or corporation, company or organization of any kind who actually delivers or causes the delivery of any commercial handbill as herein defined.

C. "Person" shall mean and include any person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, company or organization of any kind. It "Private Premises" shall mean and include any dwelling, house, building, or other structure, designed or used either wholly or in part for private residential purposes, whether inhabited or temporarily or continuously uninhabited or vacant, and shall include any yard, grounds, walk, driveway, porch, steps, vestibule or mailbox belonging or appurtenant to such dwelling, house, building, or other structure.

E. "Public Places" shall mean and include any and all streets, boulevards, avenues, lanes, alleys or other public ways and any and all public parks, squares, spaces, plazas, grounds and buildings.

F. "Permitted" shall mean recognizable acquiescence of the owner's or lessee's approval prior to the distribution of "Commercial Handbills".

G. "Newspaper" shall mean and include any newspaper of general circulation as defined by general law, any newspaper duly entered with the Post Office Department of the United States, in accordance with Federal statute or regulation, and any newspaper filed and recorded with any recording officer as provided by general law; and, in addition thereto, shall mean and include any periodical or current magazine regularly published with not less than four issues per year, and sold to the public.

H. "Handbill Distributor" shall mean and include any person engaging or engaged in the business for hire or gain of distributing commercial or non-commercial handbills, other than newspaper distributed to subscribers thereof, and any person receiving compensation directly or indirectly for the distribution of such handbills. 1. Words singular in form may include the plural, and any words plural in form may include the singular, and words in the masculine gender shall include the feminine and neuter genders.

**National Boat Safety Week**

Nassau County Police Commissioner Louis J. Frank asked the boating public to observe National Safe Boating Week, July 2 through July 8, this year with special attention to safe procedures.

He pointed out that safety on the water "should be a continuing effort, but this week is set aside for a special effort."

Boaters were urged to leave word with a relative or friend indicating the general location where they expect to be boating. The information should include registration numbers, a description of the vessel and the expected time of return.

With his safety message, Frank announced that during the boating season, special investigative teams from the Air Bureau and Marine Bureau will work in the area of special enforcement and patrol of waterfront areas to prevent larcenies. Persons living on waterfront property and marina managers were asked to cooperate by reporting suspicious persons. Boat owners should record the identification numbers on marine equipment and maintain lights, when possible, where the boat is docked.

Boating enthusiasts were also reminded that the New York State Navigation Law makes "defacing or removing serial numbers or identification marks on outboard motors a class 'B' misdemeanor." Before purchasing any used marine equipment, the buyer should make sure the serial numbers haven't been removed or defaced.

### SAMPLE BALLOT

Swing the Handle of the Curtain Lever from the Left to the Right as far as it will go, and leave it there. (This will close the Curtain around you, and unlock the machine for voting.)



### A FEW WORDS OF EXPLANATION

If the voter wishes to vote for any person whose name does not appear on the ballot, he may do so by raising the slide above that office column. This exposes a portion of the paper on which the voter may write the name of his candidate. No name of a candidate printed on the ballot may be written in for the same office.

Once a write-in slide has been raised all levers for candidates in the same column are automatically closed and cannot be used.

No votes are registered until you swing the Curtain Lever to the Left to open the Curtain. You can therefore make as many changes in your ballot, except

write-in's, as you wish while the Curtain Lever is at the right (curtain closed).

Each candidate's voting Pointer is above his name. Each proposition has its own voting lever over YES or NO. No vote will be registered for any candidate or proposition except those that have Pointers left in the down position.

There is no danger of anyone knowing how you vote, as the movement of the Curtain Lever from right to left returns the voted Pointers to their unvoted position before Curtain begins to open.

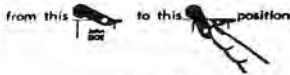
