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Library Down By 35 Votes

School District 17 Elects Officials - Passes Budget

"You won't have Kershen to kick around anymore," was Dr. Harry Kershen's remark to the press, after the official voting results named William A. Bruno to succeed him. Legality of the vote was questioned - whether a 40 per cent plurality is necessary for election. School attorney, Harry Goebels, said no. Those who checked with Albany later found this to be correct.

School Board president, G. Thomas Muratore, was defeated by Robert Pirrung. Coming in third in this race was Rudy Reichert, a 21-year old graduate of Hicksville High School. Mr. Muratore congratulated Mr. Pirrung and thanked the voters for not reelecting him. Incumbent Cornelius McCormack, a 12-year veteran of the board of education, defeated Mary E. Carton. The school budget school budget and transportation referendum passed and the "straw vote" propositions on prayer in public schools, forced busing and quality education for

all received a resounding "Yes" from Hicksville voters. The library budget was defeated by 35 votes and Abraham Fishman was re-elected to another five-year term on the library board.

The Hicksville Board of Education held its regular meeting before accepting the vote tally. A small group of people turned out for the meeting, in contrast to the hundreds jammed into the High School Cafeteria to cheer and jeer the outcome of the day's voting.

Dr. Jerome Niosi reported on the recent hepatitis scare in Hicksville. He said no new cases have been reported since Tuesday, June 6 and the Nassau County Health Department, says the peak has passed and the possibility of more outbreaks is unlikely. Mr. Muratore said a special board meeting had been called last week, at which Dr. David Ross, Deputy Commissioner of Health for Nassau County, spoke to board members

and administrators. During the outbreak, Dr. Ross' staff had set up a special task force to answer calls from Hicksville residents and district personnel. Everything that could be done was done, he said, and Hicksville was on top of the situation all the while. Dr. Niosi also reported that the State Health Department concurred with this opinion.

The board approved various bills for routine expenses of the district. Also approved were new textbooks for foreign language, science, social studies and health, and social studies films and filmstrips.

It was announced that the State Education Department is sending an inspector to review the health classes - the district has been using some teachers not certified in health. The State had given permission for this, but only for the school year 1971-72. Dr. Niosi said all health teachers will be certified in that field by September.

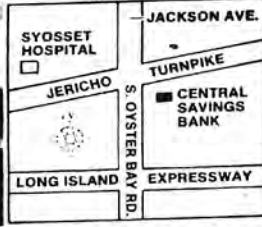

Tobay Decisions

Oil/Gasoline Terminal Denied; Meters Passed

A near capacity audience of women and children came to hear, then applaud the decision of the Oyster Bay Town Board to deny the application of Northville Industries requesting what it terms a "satellite" oil and gasoline terminal involving underground pipelines on a 6½ acre parcel adjacent to the Plainview Industrial Park near the Long Island Expressway.

The vote was five in favor of the denial, one "nay" from Councilman Saladino of Massapequa, which means yes in this case for the oil terminal, and an abstention from Councilman M. Hallett Christ, who said a client of his law firm was a Northville customer.

The decision was put at the top of the calendar, ahead of many other important decisions, including the approval of meters for some stalls in town commuter lots and the denial of a shopping complex and a garden apartment development in Woodbury.

The Northville decision was prefaced or sufficed by statements by Councilman Saladino, and by Supervisor Burke, who said the partisans against the terminal "exceeded the bounds of decency and good taste" in their personal harassment of members of the Town Board.

The harassment included a parade of noisy oil trucks dispatched to the homes of the councilmen early one Sunday morning, as well as anonymous telephone calls, to which he and his family were "helplessly" subjected, he said.

Among those in the audience was Mrs. Carol Fishman, of the Greater Plainview Community Association, a leader in the opposition, who said she was happy over the decision, but displeased with the Board's remarks surrounding it.

"If they had come out to see us, last Tuesday, we wouldn't have done it," she said.

Councilman Saladino said he voted on the basis of his own conscience, rather than "succumb to emotional appeal." He approved the tank farm on the basis of ecology and on the conviction that safety measures as described at the April 11th

hearing "would be more than sufficient."

Councilman Yevoli, the only democrat on the Board, put himself squarely on the side of the residents and at odds with the other members of the Board. He deplored what he felt was a state of affairs where residents had to picket and carry on in order to be heeded by the Board.

Meters Passed

Another big item on the calendar Tuesday was a double resolution which would authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$200,000 for the purchase and installation of 1,765 parking meters in the town's 22 commuter lots, which include 3,743 parking stalls in all.

Mrs. Judy Jacobs, of Colgate Lane, Woodbury, was one of several women present to object to the meters. She and others, apparently primarily Massapequans, said they would prefer an increase in the sticker rate, which is presently \$1. a year.

A Mrs. DeLucia, of Massapequa, who held the rostrum for about 45 minutes, fairly pleaded with the Board to keep costs down and seek other means of revenue for maintaining the parking lots. It was mentioned that the Hicksville parking garage is not used to

capacity.

Supervisor Burke said that metering was arrived at as a means of solution because it would not affect the property tax. While those parking near the stations would have to pay 25 cents for a 12-hour stay, a commuter could elect to park in an unmetered spot for free under the present plan, which nearly cuts in half the expenditure and the number of meters to be purchased from the original proposal \$350,000, and 3,148.

It is estimated that a commuter parking daily in a metered spot would be paying about \$60 a year to store his car in the lot.

The meter measure was passed 6-1, with councilman Yevoli voting nay.

Meenan Approved

In other business, the Town approved the petition of Stanley P. Darnel for a special permit use to continue the practice of dentistry in a residence while living elsewhere, and gave the go ahead to Meenan Oil Co. to relocate its main offices on a site near Duffy Avenue in Hicksville.

The petition of Franchise Realty Interstate Corp. (Mc Donald's) for a drive-in restaurant on Jericho Turnpike in Syosset was also approved.

Can America Survive?

Posing the question "Can America Survive?", New York State Supreme Court Justice Sol Wachtler delivered the commencement address to over 1,600 graduates at the State University Agricultural and Technical College at Farmingdale on June 6th.

Well over 6,000 persons attending the graduation ceremonies heard Judge Wachtler note that "America is not so much in need of heroes as it is in need of men and women who will concern themselves with the problems which exist in their own communities."

He expressed dismay at people who concern themselves only with the war in Viet Nam; or civil rights in the South; or hunger in Appalachia, and said that "Often when these people come to the problems of housing in their own municipality; the problem of discrimination in their own community; or when it comes to supporting the local day care center, they suddenly disappear."

The Judge expressed concern as to whether or not "their commitment isn't restricted to those causes and matters, even though worthwhile, for which they are not responsible and for which they cannot be blamed."

Justice Wachtler was presented with the State University's highest citation, its Commission of Honor. Dr. Charles W. Laffin, Jr., President of the State University said, "The citation is in recognition of unselfish performances on behalf of others, and the important role the 42 year old Supreme Court Justice has played as a public-spirited citizen, always deeply involved in community affairs."

Library To Aid Home-Bound

To officially announce a new library service in Nassau County, County Executive Ralph G. Caso presented a copy of a MAIL ORDER LIBRARY BOOK CATALOG to Mrs. Marion Checkett of East Meadow on June 5. The catalog is the latest effort in a 1972 public library effort to locate and serve the homebound patron. The information in the catalog about books and other library services serves as a guide for homebound patrons who may request them from Hicksville Public Library or other public libraries in the County.

With the catalog, patrons receive instructions for ordering and returning books at no cost. Order cards and mailing materials are also provided free of charge. Accompanying the catalog is a brochure, "It's All Yours . . .", that outlines library services for the homebound and handicapped available through the Hicksville Library.

The MAIL ORDER LIBRARY BOOK CATALOG is made available through a federal grant to the Nassau Library System. A 92-page publication, it was prepared for the use of those

Nassau residents of all ages who are physically unable to come to the library. The publication may be obtained by calling the Hicksville Library.

Scores of titles, for sighted persons, classified for adults, young adults and children, are listed in more than 30 subject areas. Line drawings, jacket illustrations and other pictures enliven the pages.

Use of the catalog is one of a number of services that compose a County-wide public library program designed to reach the homebound and handicapped. Earlier this year, the Hicksville Library participated in an intensive campaign to locate patrons who might profit by these services. One such service provides Talking Books (recordings of books) for patrons with visual or other physical handicaps.

Providing library service to the homebound and handicapped is an ongoing project under the leadership of Kenneth Barnes, Director of the Hicksville Public Library, and Muriel Javelin, Adult Services Consultant of the Nassau Library System.

Dear Editor:

Having never attended a candidates' forum before, I decided to go to Dutch Lane School on June 5 and see for myself what's going on. I came away from there sick to my stomach.

Aside from Mr. Fishman (a sterling gentleman) and Mr. Reichert, the performance was most wretched. Here was a handful of educated men talking to their neighbors about their neighbors, some of whom weren't there to defend themselves. (Bad show, "LIFE", where were you?) All this meanness just to win a non-compensated post, subject to constant public abuse? Something reeks!

One of these men is an "independent" running on his "record". The other three are running together on a "slate", two of them with conflicts of interest as big as all getout, and the third a seemingly nice guy, honest almost to a fault. They all claim to "seek the will of the people", but feel the people ought not be polled on the referendum because it is "political". These are our children, we can't separate them from this political football. They are where it is.

There's something immoral and unethical about slates, power politics, and money campaigns when we're dealing with the education of our children. We've heard a lot about "patronage plums". There's nothing more suggestive of expected patronage than the solicitation of campaign funds. In this election, ads were run telling where to send money. Campaign buttons, bumper stickers and public advertising cost a lot, and are sickeningly out

of place in a school board election. All trustees ought to be totally independent.

I sat there in a sea of campaign buttons and listened to these educated men cut each other up, cheered on by their supporters. How degrading of one's own dignity and destructive of life's purpose.

I have held up sending in this letter a few days so that it couldn't be published until after the election and be construed as some kind of campaign pitch. I just wanted to show how repulsed I am. This exercise in irrelevance was but a prelude to what we can expect at board meetings. God help our children - they are going to need it, no matter who wins.

Dear Mrs. Noeth: In the wake of the library budget defeat, the following should be noted:

1. The increase in the budget (\$41,000.00 or 11 percent) was due in large part to an improved New York State Retirement Plan adopted by the Library Board in January 1971. This plan, a substantially more beneficial program, was responsible for nearly 80 percent of the total increase, the costs of which are arbitrarily set by the State. Our budget, aside from this item, increased less than 5 percent for books, materials and operation of the library.

2. The Retirement plan was adopted by the State of New York for all of the Civil Service employees within their jurisdiction and by the Hicksville School District, as well as many other districts and municipalities throughout the State.

From Our Postmaster

Hicksville Postmaster Ralph G. Cascardo suggests that the next time you lick a postage stamp, give it more than just a glance.

You may not realize it but these colorful little rectangles of paper we place on envelopes do not come about just by happenstance. New stamps are most carefully planned, both as to subject matter and design.

The prime function of a postage stamp has not changed since our first stamps were issued in 1847. This is to pay for a service to be rendered.

Stamps do, however, have another function. This is to capture, in miniature, the stirring saga of America. What we were, what we are and what we hope to be has been captured on our postage stamps.

The men and women and events that fashioned our national destiny are here on stamps to rekindle our memories.

A postage stamp can exert a tremendous impact on the national consciousness. It can inform. It can reawaken interest.

It can carry a message.

There was a "Crusade Against Cancer" Stamp, carrying the message that early diagnosis saves lives. None of us know how many Americans responded to the warning on the cancer stamp. Certainly, more than a few did.

We are aware, however, of the results from one public service stamp.

We issued a stamp carrying an appeal, "Giving Blood saves lives", was the message on the stamp. The American Association of Blood Banks said that this stamp helped to produce enough blood to end blood bank shortages for six months. Naturally we are proud of the job this stamp did.

The Postmaster General makes the final decision on new stamps. He turns for guidance to his Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee. This is a group of experts in art, printing, history and philately. They help the Postmaster General determine which people, ideas, and events should be the subject of a commemorative postage stamp.

Last winter, as some of you remember, we provided right here in this city an opportunity to purchase all the commemorative stamps issued during 1971.

The Mini-Album was very well received.

You'll be interested in knowing that most of the albums purchased were by youngsters and others desiring to enter the fascinating field of stamp collecting. Thousands of requests were received by Philatelic Affairs Division in Washington for more information.

As a result, the Postal Service is making available one of the finest publications I have ever seen. This book contains, in full color, a complete history of the United States as told in stamps. With each stamp series an illustrated concise historical sketch is provided.

By no means should the average or advanced collector overlook this publication as it will add immeasurably to their hobby. It's a true stamp catalog with identification numbers and even values for each stamp.

School District 17

The school board approved the attorney's recommendation to accept the state's offer of damage award for district property taken in the widening of Newbridge Road. The district will retain ownership of this land behind the High School, but the state will have easement rights. We are responsible only for the maintenance of the land portion of the property, not any of the roadway portion.

The board approved moving of the central switchboard from the High School to the Administration Building. It will be located where the guidance office is now and guidance will move back to the High School. There will be some savings, due to reduction of personnel. We will be using a centric system which requires only one clerk now - eventually none. There was some question as to whether training of adult education students for switchboard operation could be continued after the switchboard is moved. Alternate training plans will be investigated.

The board approved various personnel changes and appointments. They voted to have the current contract for the Hicksville Classroom Teachers Association continue in force until the language for the new contract is finalized.

When asked to approve a \$7000 expenditure for the printing of

special curriculum materials for individualized instruction classes, the question arose as to whether the program is to be continued. Dr. John Cadden, Assistant Superintendent, said the printing must begin early this summer if the materials are to be ready by September (the district is doing the printing itself to save the expense of an outside printer.) Dr. Niosi encouraged the board to approve continuance of the program for one year so that they can test 3rd and 6th graders with the PEP reading and math tests. After an executive session the board voted unanimously to continue the present cycle of individualized instruction through the sixth grade and start one new cycle (incoming 1st grade in September), and evaluate the 3rd and 6th grade students' PEP test scores. Approval was then given to print the curriculum materials necessary to continue the program.

The board voted to raise school physicians' fees the total for 1971-72 was approximately \$3000 and it will be about \$6000 next year. School physicians in Hicksville have been receiving a much lower rate of pay than those in surrounding school districts with this raise, they will still be receiving less. A list of school physicians was also approved.

The next school board meeting is Tuesday, June 27 at 8 P.M. in the Administration Building.
