G.I. 18, Boy 7, Die In Fire Woman 75 Rescued

Fire, for the second time in 3 weeks, took the lives of an 18 year old soldier home on furlough and the 7 year old boy he was baby-sitting for. The fire, first reported by alarm box pulled by a passing taxi cab driver, was received at 3:13 a.m. on June 18. 10 pieces of apparatus and 65 men responded under direction of Chief Louis Mertz.

Three Hicksville firemen arrived on the scene before the apparatus and rescued Mrs. Antonino Badalucco 75, from the attic. Fireman William Thunell of Engine 4 found the woman in the attic and assisted by Lt. Gerard O'Brien Ladder 2 and probationary fireman Richard Magee of Engine Co. 7 removed her after she collapsed. Further efforts to search the ground floor were thwarted by heavy smoke and heat.

The fire started in an attached garage which was converted into a den. Firemen were hampered trying to open the permanently closed garage door. Flames leaped out the rear of the Cape Cod home at 322 New South Rd. neighboring houses had to be wet down. Firemen wearing air masks discovered the victims, the 7 yr. old boy Wayne Avzaritti of Massapequa, a house guest, was in bed. 18 yr old Pvt. First Class Lawrence Miller was apparently in the shower when the fire started and was killed the moment he opened the bathroom door by heat and gasses. The Fire Marshal office suspected a faulty

TV set may have started the fire. But officially the cause is still listed as undetermined. The fire two weeks ago at 84 Brittle La. in which a 59 yr. old woman died was caused by a cigarette, according to the Fire Marshals report.

FIRE DISPATCHER WAS HARRASSED DURING FATAL HOUSE FIRE

As the Hicksville Fire Dispatcher was answering the phone and radioing instructions to responding apparatus, an unidentified female called to complain about the fire whistles disturbing her sleep. The woman tied up the emergency line and refused to hang up. It really is a sad thing to see a resident interfere with fire operations when a serious fire was in progress taking the lives of 2 people. Let it be known that such selfish and arrogant acts will not be tolerated. Interference with firemen or fire operations is punishable by law and anyone caught will be promptly arrested. Authorities are attempting to trace the origin of the call. The air horns on Fire Hdq. on Marie St are in operation 24 hrs a day.

The sirens in the residential areas are shut down by time clock at 10 pm to 6 am. The firemen are alerted by radio also, but this has proved on too many occasions not to be sufficient. The radio system is subject to failure at times just like a TV set etc. The back up system of audible alarm systems is still necessary, also the 225 firemen in Hicksville are volunteer and cannot be expected to be tied down to an alert radio. No matter where the fireman may be he has a good chance of hearing the air horns and will then respond. Until science can come up with a new idea we will all have to cope with the occasional 2 minutes of noise to alert our firemen. Just think, after 2 minutes, you can fall back to sleep, while the fireman must get up at all hours and in all weather to protect your lives and property. For the service, the price is small!

Volunteers answered 21 calls during the past week. Three malicious false alarms and four rescue calls plus fourteen misc. calls including the house fire at 322 New South Road.

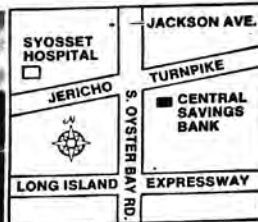

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, by proceedings heretofore duly had and taken pursuant to Section
