## Fire Report

Hicksville Firemen answered 20 alarms during the last period, 3 false alarms, 10 rescue calls, 7 misc. calls. Included in those alarms were a mutual aid call to Westbury F.D., a bedroom fire, and 3 houses hit by lightning within five minutes.

Hicksville Firemen assisted the Westbury F.D. on June 30, when fire gutted a block long warehouse at 96 Bond St. off Old Country Rd. Westbury Chief James Kennedy requested Hicksville's 85 Aerial Platform truck. Hicksville firemen responded at 9:39 PM and returned at 2:00 AM.

The bedroom fire occurred at 6:44 AM on July 2 at 29 Alpine La. Damage was confined to the one room. No injuries were reported. Shortly after 6:30 PM a severe thunder storm (7 3 72) and lightning struck 3 Hicksville houses within minutes. The first alarm was at 77 Scooter La., where a hole 2 foot in diameter was caused by a direct hit. While firemen were checking that call, a house across the street at 82 Scooter caught fire. Also from a

lightning strike which caused a surge of energy throughout the dwellings electrical system. The 3rd alarm was located at 8 Bridge La. Firemen were back in quarters at 7:30 PM.

## Victor In Law Suit

Dr. Joseph Madden of Chestnut St., Hicksville, former Supt. of Health, Education and Recreation, who was discharged without notice on June 30, 1971, but the Hicksville Union Free School District 17, when the resident of this district voted down the Recreation Proposition, was the victor in a law suit against this District.

A decision was rendered on June 29, 1972, by Justice B. Thomas Pantano of Nassau County Supreme Court, holding that the Board of Education had

acted illegally in failing to give 90 days notice and further held that the matter should be set down for a hearing in Sept. to determine the exact amount of damages to Dr. Madden as a result of this illegal discharge.

Dr. Madden was represented by co-counsel Lawrence L. Wolfson and Stanley F. Meltzer, both of Westbury. The school district was represented but its council Harry H. Goebel.

In Sept. of 1971, Dr. Madden obtained a similar position with the Roslyn School District.

Mr. Art Sherif presented the Lions Club Eagle Ring to Eagle Scout Ronald Hagedorn.

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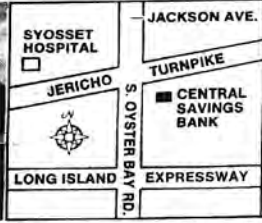

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# If A Fire Chief Built Your Home Part II

The most serious of the faults by design and alteration is the lack of guaranteed exits to the outside according to a survey of some of the nation's top fire officials. The ideal situation would be to have an exit door to the outside from each room, and in the direction of exit travel, Chief Dewey Yates of Miami Fla. stated.

In the view of Myrtle K. Wise Chief of the Denver Colo. F.D., exit facilities are of course the primary consideration and merit detailed study. Each and every floor level should be provided to means of exit. This is most important for bedroom facilities in the basement area, 2nd and 3rd floors (in some homes the ground floor too.) At least one useable window in each room which could be utilized in an emergency is ideal.

Actually, many modern homes have only ONE EXIT DOOR, or force you to pass through areas which would possibly be cut off by fire to reach others. This is a FATAL ERROR. Tests by the Federal Govt. have shown that you have only about 6 1/2 minutes after a fire starts to get out of a burning room before it becomes unbearably hot. After that your chances of escape are practically zero. Because it isn't always possible for each room to have its own outside door, windows then take on critical importance. But their value as easy escape routes is often nullified according to R.H. Ellison Ast. Chief of the

Cedar Rapids F.D. Iowa. "Many of the modern designed homes have windows high off the floor, especially in the bedrooms", he said. "The advantages are that the housewife can rearrange furniture and there is some security. But they also eliminate an escape or means of egress in the event of a fire. This I certainly would not condone in a house of my own." In a fashionable N.J. Beach Resort, 3 adults died because flames cut them off from their only exit. The 30 x 20 inch horizontal windows, five feet off the floor were obstructed by awning-type shades and the panic stricken people couldn't squeeze out the small openings.

Windows should be of the one pane type and counter balanced to operate easily, according to George A. Powell Jr. a Baltimore MD. Battalion Chief. "Windows and especially bedroom windows should be large enough and low enough to be easily used as alternate escape routes". Generally, this means the safest windows still are the old reliable double-hung windows - easily operated by children and adults, the chiefs said. Double hung windows have the advantage of being able to be opened at top and bottom at the same time. People can escape in cooler, safer air at the bottom, while the dangerous smoke, gases and heat can be vented at the top.

Because of this, we feel it is unfair to Mr. and Mrs. Sauer to criticize the Lions Club by intimating we were indiscreet in sponsoring the performance.

We sincerely regret that they and another couple (who appeared to be their friends) did not approve of the play and left during the second segment. Their personal judgment is certainly their prerogative, but we do not think that the judgment of one or two individuals should be publicly aired as an overall general public opinion. No other adverse comments were received concerning the play, to the knowledge of the Hicksville Lions Club, and no member of the audience (which included youngsters of all ages) saw in the performance any "Vulgar", "blasphemous", "lewd" or

## Supervisor JOHN W. BURKE REPORTS

A Special Commission on the Financing of Mass Transportation has recommended sweeping changes in the funding of mass transit that could have a significant impact on the solution of Long Island's problems in this area. The commission was organized by Governors Rockefeller, Cahill of New Jersey, and Meskill of Connecticut to investigate long-range solutions for the New York Metropolitan Region.

The following recommendations were developed as the result of an 18-month study:  
Each city in the region would impose a mass transportation tax on everyone who lived or worked in that city. In turn, the Federal

government would grant a 100-percent income tax credit on the transportation tax.  
The Federal government and each of the participating states would establish a General Transportation Fund, with appropriate revenue sources being credited to that fund.  
The states would have the right to use funds from the Federal Transportation Fund for capital outlay and also on debt service for capital outlay.  
The Federal government's share of capital improvements, which are part of a coordinated regional mass transportation plan, would be increased to 90 percent instead of the present 66 2/3 percent.  
New York, New Jersey and

Connecticut would assume responsibility for maintaining the rights of way of mass transportation facilities.  
A continuing Tri-State Mass Transportation Financing Advisory Panel should be created to study and make recommendations on problems relating to all aspects of financing public mass transportation.  
Transit users should pay a reasonable share of the mass transportation system's operating costs.  
These recommendations, currently under study by the three governors, are encouraging in their fresh outlook at a serious problem and hopefully will provide a good basis for future action.

## Dem. National Telethon July 8 - 9

Joseph E. Crangle, State Chairman of the Democratic Party, announced that the New York State Committee will participate fully in the Democratic National Telethon, July 8th and 9th, which will be broadcast over nine ABC affiliates throughout the State.

Mr. Crangle said "Not only will telephone centers be set up near all the television hook-ups, moreover, in a spirit of cooperation thousands of Democrats will go door to door in every New York community throughout the State asking

donations for our Party. This momentous event will take place during the week of July 4th."

"I believe the future of the two party system is dependent on the party of the people, the Democratic Party, getting out of debt so the Democrats can run campaigns this fall that give the voters a fair look at what both parties offer."

The "pros," who have underestimated the influence in the Democratic Party of its left wing, feel that the vast majority of working people and middle income businessmen will either stay away from the polls or turn

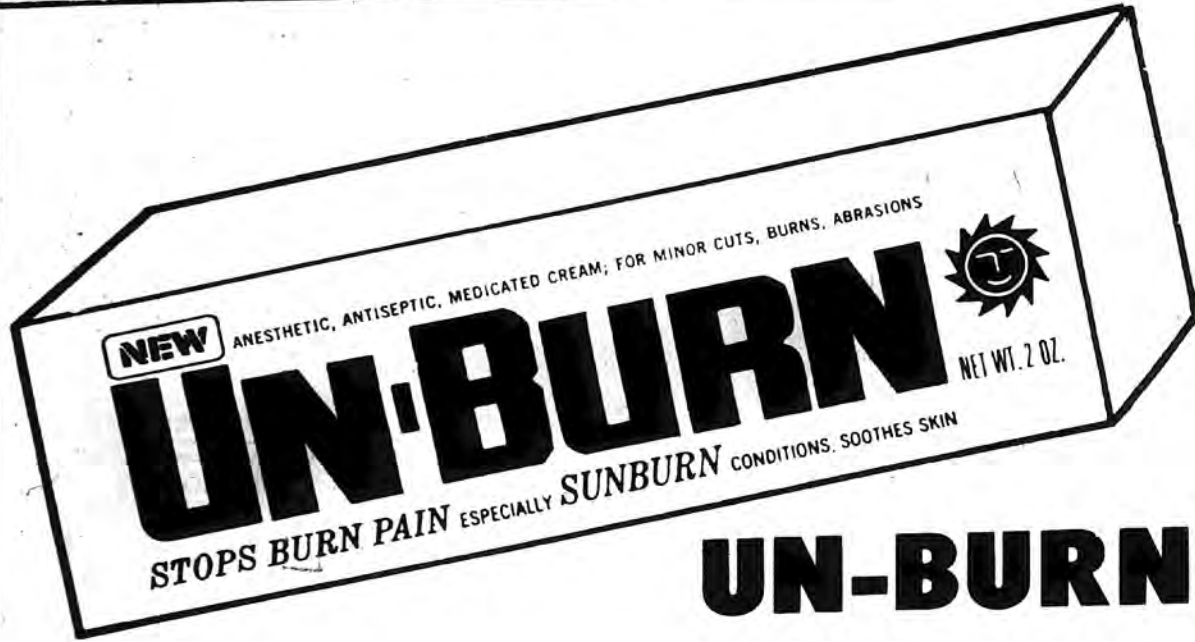

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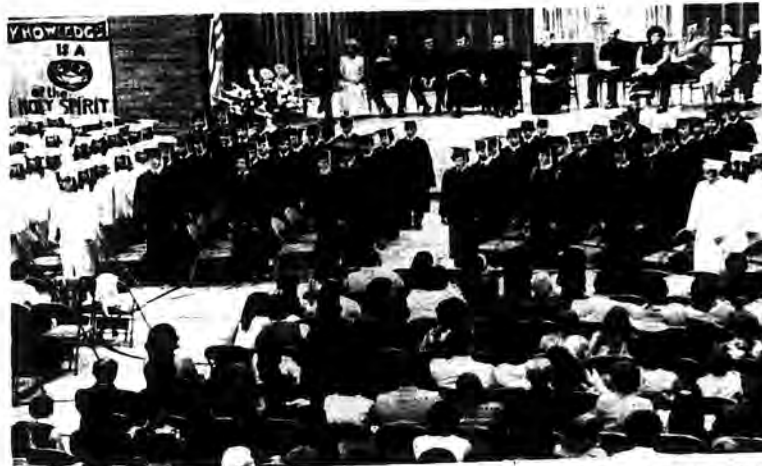

## New Expanded Services

Dr. Robert H. Niebling, Acting

Nassau County Commissioner of Health announced recently that the Nassau County Health Department is expanding its services for women, offered at the Plainview and Hempstead Health Centers. According to Dr. Niebling, the two centers will be providing the new services in conjunction with existing clinic activities.

But Mid-Island Plaza has become more than just a shopping center. It has become an integral part of community life. Built in 1956 by Walter G. Stackler and Leonard L. Frank, the Plaza now employs over 2500 people from this mid-island area.
