

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## If A Fire Chief Built Your Home Part II

The most serious of the faults by design and alteration is the lack of guaranteed exits to the outside according to a survey of some of the nations top fire of-licitals. The ideal situation would be to have an exit door to the outside from each room, and in the direction of exit (ravel. Chief the direction of exit travel, Chief Dewey Yates of Miami Fla. stated

stated. In the view of Myrle K. Wise Cheel of the Denver Colo. F.D., exit lacilities are of course the primary consideration and merit detailed study. Each and every floor level should be provided to means of exit. This is most im-portant for bedroom facilities in the basement area, 2nd and 3rd floors (in some homes the ground floors (in some homes the ground floor (oo.) At least one useable window in each room which could be utilized in an emergency is

ideal. Actually, many modern homes have only ONE EXIT DOOR, or lorce you to pass through areas which would possibly be cut off by lire to reach others. This is a CATAL FORM by line to reach others. This is a FATAL ERROR. Tests by the Federal Gvt. have shown that you have only about 6<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> minutes after a fire starts to get out of a bur-ning room before it becomes unbecarably hot. After that your unbearably hot. After that your chances of escape are practically zero. Because it isn't always possible for each room to have its own outside door, windows then take on critical importance. But their value as easy escape routes is often nullified according to R.H. Ellison Asi. Chief of the

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


