SED Emphasizes School Bus Safety

With the start of another school year, the State Education Department today issued reminders to the public, to school administrators, and to school bus drivers about their responsibility to insure the safety of children involved in school transportation. The Department estimated that more than two million children are transported over one million miles daily in New York State alone. This requires more than 20,000 school buses to be on the road.

In commenting on the need for increased safety, Stanley L. Raub, associate commissioner for educational finance and management services, described the "safety of our precious cargo" as a top priority item. He suggested that administration plan transportation routes and stops with great regard for safety and efficiency. Administrators were reminded "to avoid, if possible, unprotected railroad crossings in developing bus routes."

"The safety of the pupils in your bus is in your hands," drivers were told and they were asked to consider the three C's of defensive driving - concentration, control, and courtesy.

They were reminded that a safe, defensive school bus driver keeps alert in order to recognize accident producing situations far enough in advance to apply the necessary preventive action.

Raub noted that parents of children can play an important role in pupil transportation safety. He urged parents of pupils coming to school for the first time to instruct their children to use caution when crossing streets and roadways, and to accompany them to and from the bus stop at least during the first week of school.

Raub cited the low school bus accident rate in New York State. In the 1970-71 school year, New York State bus fatalities averaged 2.4 pupil deaths per 100 million vehicles miles. National figures indicate a rate of 4.17 fatalities per 100 million miles for all types of vehicles.

Of the six pupil passenger deaths in New York State reported for 1971-72, four were killed while riding inside a school bus that collided with a train. The other two children were fatally injured when struck by other motor vehicles.

"The small, but tragic, loss of life in school bus accidents un-

derscores the need for competent bus drivers," Raub said. The State Education Department encourages districts to provide driver training and supervision in order to upgrade the competence of their drivers. During the 1971-72 school year 1,094 New York State bus drivers were awarded certificates for the successful completion of the Basic and Advanced Bus Driver In-Service Training Program. "The proper training of school bus drivers is the cornerstone of a good pupil transportation program," says Raub. "School bus drivers have a tremendous responsibility. Each day they carry cargo, the value of which cannot be measured in dollars and cents."

Uppermost among the traits contributing to this excellent safety record is what is described by Education Department officials as "mental attitude." This attitude, derived partly from the driver's personality, and partly from intensive training that he receives, keeps him from feeling that the person sitting at the front of the familiar large yellow bus is the "king of the road."

RESOLUTION NO. 780-1972 BOND AND CAPITAL NOTE RESOLUTION DATED AUGUST 29, 1972.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$5,866,000 SERIAL BONDS AND \$289,000 CAPITAL NOTES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY, NASSAU COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE ACQUISITION AND IMPROVEMENT OF CERTAIN LAND IN THE VICINITY OF ROUND SWAMP ROAD, IN PLAINVIEW, NEW YORK, FOR USE AS A SANITARY LAND FILL.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The specific objects or purposes to be financed pursuant to this resolution, by and for the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, are as follows:

a) The acquisition of approximately 64.66 acres of land in the vicinity of Round Swamp Road, in Plainview, New York, for sanitary landfill purposes as hereinafter provided and for

ultimate development as a park and recreation area, at a maximum estimated cost of \$5,500,000; and

b) The original improvement of said land for use as a sanitary landfill including original equipment, machinery and apparatus therefor at a maximum estimated cost of \$465,000.

Section 2. The total estimated cost of the aforesaid specific objects or purposes is \$5,965,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

- a) By the issuance of \$5,666,000 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the Local Finance Law, of which \$5,225,000 serial bonds shall be issued for the specific object or purpose described in paragraph a of Section 1 of this resolution and \$441,000 serial bonds shall be issued for the specific object or purpose described in paragraph b of such Section;
- b) By the issuance of \$289,000 capital notes of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the Local Finance Law, of which \$275,000 capital notes shall be issued for the specific object or purpose described in paragraph a of Section 1 of this resolution and \$14,000 capital notes shall be issued for the specific object or purpose described in paragraph b of such Section. Such capital notes shall be sold at private sale and all further powers in connection with the

Fights For No-fault Automobile Insurance

Stuart R. Levine, Republican candidate for the Assembly in the 10th A.D., today urged an all-out fight for passage of a strong no-fault automobile insurance bill in the next session of the legislature.

After meeting with Republican Senatorial and Assembly candidates, Levine said it was the general opinion of the Republican candidates that a strong no-fault insurance measure will be one of their prime legislative targets in the next session of the legislature.

"In view of the heavy expense of automobile insurance, both liability and property damage, a system of no-fault automobile insurance should be instituted in

this state," Levine stated. "The plan should be developed so that the cost of insurance will be reduced, yet persons who have sustained serious injuries will be compensated."

Levine vowed not to be swayed by any special interest groups and said he will work to persuade other legislators to walk away from the special interest groups who are opposed to enactment of a no-fault bill.

"While some special interest groups may oppose no-fault insurance, I believe the people of Nassau County and the state want no-fault insurance and it is the duty of a legislator to be responsive to the views of all the people," he said.

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**ROSH HASHANAH
FESTIVAL OF TRUMPETS**

**SEPTEMBER 9-10, 1972
Hebrew Date: Tishri 1, 5733**

This painting by Morris Katz depicts a rabbi blowing a shofar (ram's horn), symbolizing God's summons to the people for self-judgment. The sound of the shofar heralds Rosh Hashanah—the Jewish New Year. This scripture from The Living Bible is the authority for Rosh Hashanah.

"The first day of the seventh month (of the Hebrew calendar) is a solemn time for all the people to meet together for worship; it is a time of remembrance, and is to be announced by loud blowing of trumpets. Don't do any work on the day of the celebration, but offer a sacrifice by fire to the Lord." (Leviticus 23:24-25)

Now the Lord said to Moses, "Make two trumpets of beaten silver to be used for signaling the breaking of camp. When both trumpets are blown, the people will know that they are to gather at the entrance of the Tabernacle. But if only one is blown, then only the chiefs of the tribes of Israel shall come to you. Different trumpet blasts will be necessary to distinguish between the summons to assemble and the signal to break camp and move onward. When the travel signal is blown, the tribes camped on the east side of the Tabernacle shall leave first, at the second signal, the tribes on the south shall go. Only the priests are permitted to blow the trumpets. This is a permanent instruction to be followed from generation to generation. When you arrive in the Promised Land and go to war against your enemies, God will hear you and save you from your enemies when you sound the alarm with these trumpets. Use the trumpets in times of gladness, too, blowing them at your annual festivals and at the beginning of each month to rejoice over your burnt offerings and peace offerings. And God will be reminded of his covenant with you. For I am Jehovah, your God." (Numbers 10:1-10)
