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Board President Suggests Plans For The Future

Approximately twenty-five community and education-minded citizens attended a public relations meeting Tuesday afternoon in the Junior High faculty cafeteria. Dr. Jerome Niosi, superintendent of schools, welcomed representative from the PTA and religious and educational institutions in Hicksville. Mrs. Vera Galante, public relations director for the Hicksville School District and invited the group to exchange ideas about plans for the educational future of Hicksville.

Thomas Clark, president of the board of education, explained his ideas for converting the Junior High into a technical college and for additional floors to the one-story elementary schools in the district, thus allowing for grades K-9 in the local schools. Mr. Clark said moneys saved from bus

transportation for Junior High students could be used towards the building program he has suggested.

His plans are being discussed and investigated by Hicksville school administrators as to their feasibility. Although the buildings would have to be reinforced, Dr. Fred Hill, Assistant Superintendent, said a second story may be a possibility in a building program.

Another idea discussed was that of the 4-4-4 plan, suggested by school board trustee, Neil McCormack. This would provide for grades K-4 and 5-8 in different schools, with two high schools of grades 9-12.

Erwin Rozran, Administrative Assistant, spoke on enrollment figures and said although the school population is decreasing as had been expected, there is a

possibility that by 1975 it may begin to increase again. Changes in population trends could be anticipated earlier members of the community would report noticeable changes in their neighborhoods to the school district.

Ideas were exchanged on other subjects dealing with private and parochial education in Hicksville. Dr. John Cadden, Assistant Superintendent, said that constructive criticism of education is always in order and that the district takes it into consideration, sifts through it and uses this information to formulate policies.

Mrs. Galante, announced there will be other opportunities for Hicksville residents to meet and discuss the educational system and its future.

Dear Parents:

Thoroughbred Donated to BOCES

Youngsters who enjoy working with horses should be encouraged, believes an avid horse enthusiast. Robert J. White of Upper Brookville, a man who acts on his beliefs, accordingly has just donated a 16-month-old thoroughbred filly to the Nassau Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) to be used by students in a new course in large animal care.

"My son and I have long been aware of the value of such courses," said Mr. White. "We can think of no better way to demonstrate our attitude than to donate the first horse to the program."

Mr. White, who owns a horse-breeding farm in Virginia, has served on the BOCES Agricultural Advisory Committee for the past year. A member of the sub-committee on animal care, he has been instrumental in helping to develop the new course which will prepare for employment at riding stables, breeding farms, racetracks, and related industries.

The horse, Primo, "is just the right age for pre-track training," said Mr. White as he made the presentation to Nassau BOCES Board President Richard L. Ornauer. "Your students will be getting real experience with a

typical racing thoroughbred." The nearly seventy students enrolled in the large animal care course will use eight horses of varying types at SUNY in Old Westbury where the Nassau BOCES is using a 15-acre parcel of land, stables, and paddocks. The students will learn a bout the care and maintenance of horses including grooming, nutrition, recognition of basic relating to racetracks, diseases, anatomy, and training

Large animal care is one of sixty occupational preparation courses offered by BOCES to Nassau's high school students. The students pursue their academic work at their home high schools half of each school day and attend a BOCES center the other half day. More than 5400 Nassau high school students are enrolled at BOCES centers in Westbury, Syosset, North Bellmore, Mineola, and Freeport.

It is one of the very few events that utilize the standard fire dept. pumper instead of the souped up trucks now used in tournaments.

BOCES Aids Ecology

In cooperation with the Nassau County Department of Recreation and Parks, conservation students of the Board of Cooperative Educational Services - Nassau County are waging an environmental battle armed with pruning shears, grass seed and tractors on the remaining 40 acres of historic Hempstead Plains. These plains once covered 70,000 acres of Nassau County and are still visited by small animals and birds searching for food. Holy Family Church in Hicksville was the object of picketing last Monday night (Sept. 11th) by Bill Baird and a dozen followers. I was blocked momentarily by one of their cars at the entrance to our own parking field (a minor harassment). The apparent cause of their presence was the topic of our program, Abortion. The protesters came inside for our meeting, and only one or two of them snickered as it opened with a prayer by our pastor.

Our guest speaker was Mrs. Eleanor Tener, Exec. Sec. of the New York State Right to Life Committee. Her presentation included a lecture and graphic slides showing the development of the fetus and the results of various methods of abortion. Though they came armed with questions and comments prepared to monopolize the discussion period, I must admit Mr. Baird and most of his group sat quietly and politely through the lecture. A couple of his more exuberant supporters had to be verbally subdued by him a number of times.

Mr. Baird accused me of violating every rule of fairness in not allowing him equal time to present his views, though I had not been aware that our organization was governed by FCC rules and regulations on equal time. Our Society always schedules a Lecture - not a Debate. When we presented a speaker whose topic was "Frauds and Swindles" we did not consider it necessary to invite a swindler to present an opposing view!

Though their presence at our meeting was not warmly accepted by all (Mr. Baird hired members of our audience when he suggested that many of our

own daughters might be coming to him for "help"), the group was treated hospitably. They accepted our invitation to join us in the cafeteria to partake of free refreshments.

Mr. Baird's attempt to force his opinions on our audience may have produced something other than his desired effect. His presence stirred many to vow that they plan to work more tenaciously than ever in opposing his philosophy.

Dear Editor:

The ability of Nassau and Suffolk police and fire departments to work together will get a test today (9/21) when they rush "victims" of a simulated bus disaster to Central General Hospital in Plainview.

Purpose of the drill is to test the effectiveness of disaster plans worked out by the hospital on Old

Country Road in Plainview.

I understand this also is the first time police of the Nassau and Suffolk forces have been called on to work together on a disaster drill of this magnitude.

The 45 disaster "victims" will include 40 Boy Scout and Girl Scout volunteers, plus five adults. The bus disaster will occur at 7:30 p.m. at the continuance of Winding Road, about one block east of the Suffolk boundary in Melville.

Members of six volunteer fire departments will assist police in removing the victims and rushing them to Central General where a telephoned "alert" will bring in those extra persons needed to accommodate the victims.

Hospital personnel have been well coached in disaster emergency procedures and is "excited" about the plan to test the program.
