

The 45 disaster "victims" will include 40 Boy Scout and Girl Scout volunteers, plus five adults. The bus disaster will occur at 7:30 p.m. at the continuance of Winding Road, about one block east of the Suffolk boundary in Melville. Melville

Melville. Members of six volunteer fire departments will assist police in removing the victims and rushing them to Central General where a telephoned "alert" will bring in those extra persons needed to accommodate the victims. victims
