The Hicksville Olympic Committee held its third meeting at the Hicksville Elks Club on at the Hicksville Elks Club on September 20 and the following officers were nominated and elected to the Board of Directors: President, Peter Collins; Vice President, James Leibold; Recording Secretary, Rosemary Walsh; and Treasurer, William Henne.

Councilman Warren Doolittle informed the committee that the State of New York would not permit the name Olympic to be used in the corporation charter. It was suggested that the names Olympix, Olympiad or Olympia be used. The final decision as to what name will be used will be decided at a later date.
