Mr. Siegfried Widder, president of the Hicksville Community Council announced today that the regular October meeting of the Council has been scheduled for Thursday, October 5 starting at 8:30 p.m. at the Hicksville Library on Jerusalem Avenue.

"The program this month should prove both informative and stimulating," Mr. Widder said. "As our Program Chairman, Mr. Elery Bean tells me that Mr. David Mafri, the TOB Director of the DPW's Division of Environmental Control will speak to us on 'Solid Waste', and the film presenting the present and future of Long Island is also scheduled to be shown."

"Questions will be permitted after each part of our program, of course," he continued. "And, as is provided in our by-laws, there will be part of our program devoted to questions, and announcements made by anyone present, providing of course, that they involve Hicksville. We all enjoy and benefit by this part of our meetings," he continued, and

## William Colvin and Stanley F. Meltzer Address Hicksville Democratic Club

William Colvin a Vice Chairman of the Democratic Party of Nassau County and newly elected Leader of the Democratic Party Town of Oyster Bay and Stanley F. Meltzer, 14th A.D. Democratic Assembly Candidate addressed the Edward J. Giannelli Regular Democratic Club of Hicksville on Thursday evening September 21, 1972 at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 45 Heitz Place, Hicksville, L.I. N.Y.

Mr. Colvin discussed the opening of permanent town headquarters at 67 Broadway, Hicksville, L.I. N.Y. and thanked the members of the Hicksville Democratic Club for their contributions of furnishings and staff

to the Headquarters. He then reviewed the town campaign strategy in the coordination of town candidates activities in seeking elective office on the town, county, state and federal level.

Mr. Meltzer, a former Assistant U.S. Attorney in addressing the club stressed the point that "Our School and Property Taxes have gone up 50 percent in the last four years because the Republicans who control the State would rather spend the money on Albany Malls and the Long Island Sound Bridge. We've got to re-direct our priorities to give the taxpayers some relief," he concluded.

## Hicksville Olympics

The Hicksville Olympic Committee held its third meeting at the Hicksville Elks Club on September 20 and the following officers were nominated and elected to the Board of Directors: President, Peter Collins; Vice President, James Leibold; Recording Secretary, Rosemary Walsh; and Treasurer, William Henne.

Councilman Warren Doolittle informed the committee that the State of New York would not permit the name Olympic to be used in the corporation charter. It was suggested that the names Olympic, Olympiad or Olympia be used. The final decision as to what name will be used will be decided at a later date.

Arrangements had been made for a representative from the AAU to appear but unfortunately he did not show. The committee hopes to have a representative

appear at the October meeting to explain the guidelines and rules of the olympic meet.

It was in general agreement to the committee that the events to be held will be individual sports and those selected were track and field, swimming, diving, ping pong, badminton and chess. Every child participating will be sponsored by one of the civic organizations. Three new organizations, Holy Trinity Episcopal Church, Trinity Lutheran Church and the Levittown Swimming Association were added to the original thirteen civic organizations that have agreed to participate in the event. They are: LIFE; Our Lady of Mercy Youth Council; Charles Wagner Post American Legion; HAD, VFW, William Gouse Post; Hicksville International Little League; Hicksville American Little

League; Hicksville Police Boys Club; St. Ignatius C.Y.O.; Hicksville Elks Club No. 1931; Galileo Lodge No. 2253, Sons of Italy and Knights of Columbus.

The olympics will be held in the summer of 1973 and will be open to all boys and girls between the ages of six and seventeen (may not be 18 years old before May 1, 1973 and live within the boundaries of School District No. 17.

It is estimated that 15,000 children will be eligible to compete in the Hicksville Olympics. The group is seeking not only civic organizations, but also private individuals who will be needed to organize the events. Any help will be appreciated and all are welcome. ## H.A.D. Offer Individual and Group Counseling

H.A.D. (Help-Aid-Direction), Hicksville's own youth counseling and guidance center, has just completed total reorganization of its program. H.A.D. will offer the following services to the youth and adults of the Hicksville area as of the end of September 1972:

1. Weekly discussion groups for Junior High School students, 13 through 15 years of age to be held on Mondays and Wednesdays, 3:30-5 p.m.

2. Weekly discussion groups for Senior High School students, ages 16 through 19. These sessions will be held on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday nights, 8 p.m. to 10 p.m.

3. Weekly discussion groups for Senior High School students, ages 16 through 19. These sessions will be held on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday nights, 8 p.m. to 10 p.m.

3. Weekly discussion group for young adults, ages 20 through 30. This group will meet on Wed-

nesday night, 8 p.m. to 10 p.m.

4. Weekly parent discussion group will be given on Monday nights, 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. This group will give parents an opportunity to share common problems, experiences, and ideas on effectively dealing with their adolescent children.

5. Regular 10-week "all-male" and "all-female" groups for teenagers to be held on Monday nights, 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. These groups will be lead by very competent, skilled group leaders. The major purpose of these two particular groups is for its teenage members to talk about their own personal hang-ups and develop logical ways to solve their own problems.

In addition to these five major areas of group counseling, the H.A.D. organization also offers the residents of the Hicksville area individual counseling, family counseling and referral services to other highly qualified professional and psychological

agencies in Nassau County.

H.A.D. is now developing a "hot-line crisis-intervention"

program for use by people in trouble who live in the Hicksville area. If any youth or adult would like to help H.A.D. set up and run this aspect of our program, please come down to the H.A.D. offices, 87 Broadway, Hicksville or call WE 5-6858, to arrange for an interview. Participant volunteers in this hot-line service will be carefully screened before they enter our intensive training course. After training has been completed, they will be assigned times when they will man this emergency crisis service.

H.A.D. exists in Hicksville to serve the various needs of the community. If you have a problem or just want to talk to someone, call or come up to H.A.D. We listen, we care, and we can help you in your time of need.

The Department Ambulance was requested to respond to Sweet Hollow Road where a simulated School Bus Accident was staged. Rescue Squads in the Local Area took part in the drill. First Aid problems were assigned and "Victims" were transported to Central Ge. Hospital in Plainview. The drill was held Sept. 21st the call for assistance was received at 7:56 PM.

**"FIRE PREVENTION WEEK OCT 9-14th"**  
Make every week Fire Prevention Week. Invite Edith to your home (more on Edith next week) In your home it is your job to point out fire hazards and correct them. Small hazards cause big fires. Stop fires at their source. Go over your house. Check stoves. Heating units. Check the electrical system. Is

the Right Size Fuse in every fuse socket? Smoking-matches. Keep matches out of reach of children. Good housekeeping-Get rid of excess papers. Boxes and other old things that gather in Basements, Attics, and Garages. Know what to do if fire strikes. Know how to safely evacuate your home, know how to call the fire dept. Are there two exits from each room? If your normal exit through the door is cut off by fire, can you get out the window, or do you have a built in fire trap. No one was present to oppose the petition of Galileo Gali lei Lodge, Inc., for a permit use to operate a private club (Sons of Italy of America) and center for social activities at its headquarters at 200 Levittown Parkway, Hicksville.

Presenting the case for the Sons was well known Hicksvillian Joseph Giordano, who described much good done by the group since its purchase of the building, which is located in the midst of a shopping center built by Levitt & Sons more than twenty years ago.

Peggy O'Connor, who operates a dancing school

in one of the store of the shopping center, wrote a letter describing harassment and vandalism by loitering teenagers before the Sons of Italy moved in. After what Mr. Giordano described as a "polite talk" with the youngsters, they no longer came around. In addition, the Sons of Italy have been doing a good job keeping the grounds looking nice, according to Mrs. O'Connor.

One resident, a Mr. and Mrs. O'Donnell wrote that another Bingo hall was not needed in Hicksville, and feared some traffic congestion.

# - Guest Editorial - A Memo From The Hicksville C. of C.

A TRIBUTE TO FRED NOETH... a criticism of what is not being done at present in Hicksville... and an implied criticism of all of us who are working for a better Hicksville, in many areas... is made in the Guest Editorial this week. It is actually a memo from the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce, and contains the opinions of its latest guest speaker, Paul Townsend. Mr. Townsend, who is the editor and publisher of a small business weekly newspaper, and a paid publicist with many good ideas and many bad ones, has a right to his opinions.

WE CERTAINLY AGREE with him when he praises Fred Noeth. However, when someone as gifted as Fred passes on, we, who may not be as talented, carry the torch gladly, and do our best to make his town and ours now too, the very best that it possibly can be. We have a great team working with us, as anyone who comes to the monthly meetings of the Hicksville Community Council knows... a team, covering a wide spectrum of Hicksville activities and governing bodies... all working together to make a better community. If you are a resident who hasn't joined us, come on down on the first Thursday of every month, Oct. through June, and listen and also contribute your thoughts and ideas... All organizations and interested Hicksvillians are invited to attend... we meet at 8:30 p.m. at the Hicksville Library... next meeting is Thurs., Oct. 5, as you can see on page one of this issue.

NOW WE HAVE digressed somewhat, but our Council deserves to know, as we said at its first annual dinner in June, that EACH of you plays a very important part on this Hicksville team... come and, by your presence and participation, make it possible for our elected representatives and those who work for us in many areas, to serve the entire community of Hicksville... at least those who are willing to work together for its good.

Back to Mr. Townsend's expressed opinions... (1) it doesn't take a genius to know that downtown areas, not only on Long Island, but throughout the entire country, have had to meet the challenge of small and large shopping centers, built with adequate parking nearer to the area's homes. Incorporation would not have changed that... and hasn't, at least at present, anywhere in our country.

(2) Mr. Townsend at least in his expressed opinions according to the Chamber of Commerce, considers Hicksville as only a downtown area! You are very wrong, Mr. T. And very wrong when you criticize as follows "Hicksville residents and businessmen permitted an emotional irrational few hundred to block the professional planners who called for high rise apartments and offices that would rejuvenate this deteriorating but still sound downtown?" Even granting that those who attended these meetings were "emotional"... they were far from irrational... they were homeowners and believe it or not, Hicksville is not just a downtown... it is a community of homeowners who care just as much as what happened to their 100 X 100, as our neighbors in Upper Brookville care about their larger homes and estates. It is possible that they were not particularly well spoken or articulate... but God bless them for coming out to differ with the professional planners! They have opinions... just as you have, Mr. Townsend. And neither you nor the planners are always right! Your major problem is your complete disregard for the small homeowner, when advocating plans... and it is for this reason mostly that I take issue with you.

THE RESIDENTS of Hicksville will listen to you and the planners to... and then they will make up their minds as to whether they will accept what you think you know is best for them. In my opinion, this is democracy at work and up "til now I don't know a better form of government!! As to the way downtown Hicksville looks at present. It is taking as long as Fred told me it would take, when he was alive. But so did the Village of Hempstead! So did many other areas that are now on the road to recovery. Perhaps Hicksville will not do exactly what the planners say is best for them... but when it comes take longer to reach a downtown improved area... but when it comes about, hopefully it will be a result of the best thinking of the residents of Hicksville... their elected representatives... and to some extent the professional planners.

THERE ARE no easy answers to our problems. But the best answers are always the results of working and thinking together for the mutual good... in this case, the entire hamlet of Hicksville, not just a downtown area. Very little if any thing is gained by one-sided criticism.

WE INVITE YOU to attend any one of our Council meetings, my dear Mr. Townsend. Some of your ideas may be helpful and we'd be glad to consider them. Also you might like to hear how people who live in Hicksville feel. You'd be amazed.

FRANKLY, a community may be affected to some extent by professional planners, but it is, and should be, affected by the opinions of its people. Concerned people come before professional planners. You are not putting the right "P" first. But then, don't feel badly... we all make mistakes.

At our initial meeting of the membership for the 72-73 season - we were treated to an outspoken, frank, unreserved opinion as to why Hicksville is in its present stagnated condition. Those of you who attended, heard it, and thanks for your support. To our absentees - a summary follows.

President Kelly read a letter from the Town Board stating that the installation of the street lights on Broadway would be started by the end of September. Business of the Chamber was tabled and our guest introduced - Mr. Paul Townsend, Ed. Pub. of the L. I. Commercial Review.

Speaking of the HICKSVILLE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE at a luncheon this week, this column confessed to being an old Hicksville watcher both directly & thru the eyes & typewriter of Mid-Island Herald's late outspoken editor FRED NOETH. Why has the potential of this

mid-Nassau hub been blocked & why should this historically vital retail transportation services center be decaying with blight spreading from the rr plaza.

Hicksville stood pat while Levittown & other communities mushroomed around them & then built their own shopping centers with lots of parking.

Hicksville was first decimated 2 decades ago by the LIRR elevation, then by the widening of Edwy plus the straightening of Newbridge Rd.

Hicksville is being bypassed with the office jobs & the apartments needed to revitalize this rail & bus hub going to nearby communities.

And just this year the Oyster Bay Town Bd & most of Hicksville residents & businessmen permitted an emotional irrational few hundred to block the professional planners who called for high rise apartments & offices that would rejuvenate this deteriorating but

still sound downtown.

A great part of the problem came when Fred Noeth & other Hicksvillians lost their battle after WWII to incorporate into a large village. No unincorporated LI hamlet gets the kind of self-serving government of self-incorporated villages... look at Garden City, Hempstead, Patchogue... then look at Hay Shore, Levittown, Roosevelt.

Our archaic local government structure should be modified for efficiency & responsiveness to combine the town & village layers... 65 or so small towns or large villages with about 40,000 residents... & the 700 special districts should all be combined in the same layer of government... 65 units of local government instead of 800.

The Regional Plan Assn projects 50,000 new office jobs in Nassau County within the next few years. The Bi-County Planning Bd says that Nassau is short over 24,000 dwelling units. Nassau County is going to take over ownership & operation of its near-bankrupt bus companies. Nassau County is going to spend hundreds of millions on new public facilities in community colleges, old age homes, clinics, etc.

WHY NOT PUT SOME OF IT TOGETHER IN HICKSVILLE & REVITALIZE IT LIKE OTHER TRADITIONAL DOWNTOWNS ARE BEING REBORN?

Buses & railroads will only be viable if there are wider concentrations in jobs & apartments. And our suburban character can only be preserved if we concentrate the necessary offices & dwellings at railroad stations rather than scattering them all over our dwindling landscape. My name is PAUL TOWNSEND. Any questions?

# Roncallo Blasts McGovern's "Desperation Politics"

Angelo D. Roncallo, Republican candidate for Congress in the Third Congressional District tonight charged that Sen. George McGovern has "fallen victim to desperation politics in his effort to gain votes."  
 At a speech delivered before the Conservatives for Effective Government, Roncallo noted that McGovern said in a speech that President Nixon is more concerned with keeping South

Vietnamese President Thieu in his Saigon Palace than in returning American Prisoners of War. "Perhaps McGovern must be reminded that part of the President's peace offer to Hanoi provides that Thieu would resign from office," Roncallo stated. He noted that under the President's peace proposal Thieu would be required to quit one month after a cease fire and that free internationally supervised elections would then be held in South Vietnam.

"McGovern's charges are outright lies - and he knows it," charged Roncallo. "He has fallen victim to desperation politics in his effort to gain votes."  
 The Republican candidate reminded his audience that the only solution McGovern has proposed to free U.S. prisoners is "to crawl to Hanoi and to beg for their release."  
 "If Senator McGovern would only interest himself in something beside peace, we might be able to achieve it," Roncallo concluded.
