As the state and national congress passes volumes of bills during their last hours in session, so the Hicksville School Board attempts to complete half of its agenda in the last hour. Hurry up before someone votes not to continue at 11:30 or 12! To the audience it's similar to listening to a 33-1 3 rpm record played at 78 rpm. Although board president, Thomas Clark, made a concerted effort throughout Friday's meeting to keep the wheels of progress in motion, the many delays and the absence of two board members (Pappas and Zindulka) threw a cog into the works at midnight. The meeting ended and again fell short of completing the agenda. Im-

provement was seen by this reporter, however, because only three items remained. But we can't help wondering why the "no" the major reason for changing meetings to Friday was because board members would not have to get up early and go to work after long hours of discussion the night before.

A substantial amount of business was transacted during the evening, despite the difficulties. William Bruno's motion to cease all studies on a building program and state that the board is against any of these programs was defeated. The board approved the extension of time for a clerk to complete the district census. Also approved were bills for routine operating expenses of the district.

During the first public portion of the meeting, Mrs. Honey Skoinick, president of the High

School PTA, read a letter from the PTA's executive board requesting an immediate replacement for the assistant principal position vacated by Mr. James Jones.

Charles Fetta objected to the High School PTA's request, questioning its ability to make such a judgment. Mrs. Barbara Rosman said Hicksville Council of PTAs has been conducting a study on assistant principals, polling surrounding districts as to the population of their schools and the number of assistant principals in each school, the duties of the position, etc. She said the high school portion had been completed and the PTA Executive Board used this information in reaching its decision.

John Maniec, program director of H.A.D., announced plans for a bowling league which the organization will sponsor. Funds will be used for some community project and H.A.D. hopes this activity will help bring the community together.

Mr. Fetta also criticized H.A.D.'s proposal, asking how a bowling league could bring a community together. He asked Mr. Maniec for a list of H.A.D.'s accomplishments and a report of the money it has received from the state. Robert Pirrung objected to Mr. Fetta's remarks and said he should not take up school board time in arguments with H.A.D.

Mrs. Betty Fetta brought to the board's attention an editorial in last week's Comet, the high school newspaper. Her in-

terpretation was that the article condemned the school board for not letting H.A.D. in the schools.

The board defeated a motion to seek bids to replace an electric typewriter at the Junior High and a manual machine at Burns Avenue School. The vote was three for (Bello, Bruno and Pirrung), one against (McCormack) and Mr. Clark abstained, because he works for IBM and this is the company which makes the requested selective. He later explained that he abstained on this and similar motions because he doesn't want other companies in competition with IBM to have any grounds for claiming conflict of interest, favoritism or unfair bidding practices. Mr. McCormack felt both typewriters should be electric. However, Burns Avenue had budgeted for a manual and the additional money would have had to come from other needed supply funds.

The board of education approved various changes in instructional, clerical, building and grounds, cafeteria and school monitor personnel. Mr. Bruno said he objected to the monitors being treated like second-class citizens. He moved they receive benefits and the same four percent raise as other district employees, even though they are not organized into a bargaining group. The motion was defeated due to a lack of four positive votes. Voting yes: Bello, Bruno, Pirrung; no: McCormack; abstain: Clark. Mr. Bruno then moved that the monitors be paid.

Report From Hicksville Chamber of Commerce

The Hicksville Chamber of Commerce has been proceeding with plans and suggestions for improving our community. At a meeting on October 31st, the Board of Directors of the Chamber discussed and approved a procedural plan of action for the orderly development of the Triangle area of downtown Hicksville. The plan, developed by a sub committee under the chairmanship of Lawrence Scalers, calls for a three point program.

- 1) The immediate creation of a special Parking District for the area as suggested by the several advisory agencies that have worked on this problem.
- 2) A pilot project developed by the existing property owners. A site would be selected, interested owners contacted and a preliminary site plan prepared taking into consideration the real interests and concerns of the people most immediately affected - the owners of the property. The Chamber is willing to use its good offices to bring the land owners together, provide research data and furnish an architect and engineer for technical advice. The committee, however would be almost entirely composed of land owners and technical advisors. If the plan as suggested by the land owners, was approved by the Planning Advisory Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, an interested developer be sought to take over the project from there.
- 3) A park area with a community center, including any possible future expansion of TOB facilities.

The Chamber President, Kingsley Kelly and Mr. Scalers are most anxious to get community reaction to these suggestions from property owners in the critical triangle area of Hicksville. Mr. Scalers can be reached at WE 1-0114 and Mr. Kelly at WE 1-0600.

The Chamber also heard from David Mafici, Director of the Environmental Control Commission of the Town of Oyster Bay discuss the proposed Landfill Park project, the subject of a referendum on November 7th. The Town garbage disposal (some 1,200 tons daily) is a real problem, according to Mr. Mafici, who gave a brief talk on the critical need for additional land fill area and the reason for choosing the proposed site.

Don't stay home from voting because you have "little ones." Bring them with you and the Girl Scouts will keep them busy while you vote.

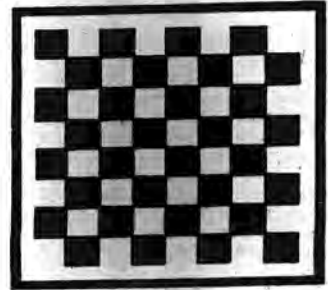

People on Welfare Decreased by 4%

Attention A.A. of Retired Persons

The number of persons receiving public financial assistance in Nassau County continues its downward trend, County Executive Ralph G. Caso reported.

In a caseload report covering the first nine months of 1972, Caso said the number of persons on welfare has decreased by 2,212, a reduction of nearly 4 per cent. He noted that it is the first time in 11 years this has occurred.

"The most significant aspect of this latest report is the apparent leveling of the soaring caseload increases of the past decade," the county executive observed.

In the year prior to Caso taking office, the caseload increased 40 per cent. Last year, the rate of increase slowed to 12.5 per cent.

Caso praised Nassau Social Services Commissioner James M. Stuart for his innovative approach to the complex welfare problem, including a major reorganization of the Social Services Department.

"No one can fully explain what makes a caseload stabilize," Stuart said. "While more efficient management controls contribute to such a condition, there are other factors such as the unemployment rate and the general economy of Long Island."

Stuart said employment is most reflected in the Home Relief category — which has dropped 29.1 percent since the first of the year. In 1970, the Home Relief category jumped 64.3 per cent. The largest increase this year has been in the Aid to the Disabled category. That has risen by 1,114 persons or 33.9 per cent.

Caso cautioned that the declining public assistance caseload cannot be readily translated in terms of dollar savings because of upturns in categories which have the greatest need for medical and hospital assistance.

"The increased caseload for the disabled and aged is the major contributor to the rising cost of Medicaid," the county executive said. It has involved an increased usage of hospitals, clinics, medical personnel and home aid services, he added.

Senior citizens are increasingly being relocated into health related facilities such as nursing and residential homes. Caso

noted that this year, for the first time, approximately 800 beds are being made available to senior citizens who require some care and medical attention, but not enough to require placement in a nursing home.

The cost of home aid services for the homebound — the ill, disabled for aged — also has risen this year.

Earlier this month, Caso announced that the number of public assistance cases housed in motels and hotels has dropped to 147 — the lowest since early 1969. The county's emergency housing population hit a peak of 347 in February, 1971.

Another aspect of Nassau's social services operation — the "no-check" plan — has received

nationwide attention as the solution to problems associated with mailing welfare checks. In the pilot areas of Rockville Centre and Lynbrook where persons in the Home Relief and Aid to Dependent Children categories receive their bi-monthly allowances at a bank of their choice instead of in the mail, the problem of duplicate payments and lost, stolen, forged and raised checks has been completely eliminated.

Plans are underway to expand the "no-check" system into the Hempstead and West Hempstead areas.

Supervisor JOHN W. BURKE REPORTS

Throughout the month of October, a concerted effort was made to bring the facts concerning the proposed landfill-park program to the attention of all Town of Oyster Bay residents. I cannot stress too strongly the seriousness and urgency of the solid waste disposal problem and its potential impact on the health and welfare of the entire Town.

On Election Day, November 7, Oyster Bay Town voters will decide on whether the Town can proceed with this important phase of its long-range solid waste management program. The ballot is labeled "TOWN OF OYSTER BAY PROPOSITION" and is the last box on the top line of the voting machine. I look

to vote "Yes."

During the month, we have availed ourselves of the media to get the facts of the situation to the public. To date, we have had over 50 speaking engagements at which myself, one of the Town Councilmen, the Director of the Environmental Control Division, or the Town Attorney has discussed the question with various groups throughout the Town.

We have been fortunate to have the assistance of Homeowners and Environmentalists for a Landfill-Park, (H.E.L.P.), an independent group of concerned citizens who have volunteered their services to this important ecological program. The organi-

zation has put together an excellent fact sheet that answers many questions on this issue. The proposed landfill-park project also has received the endorsement of the Nassau County Parks, Recreation and Conservation Association, and the Town's Environmental Control Commission.

We are also grateful for the many positive responses we have gotten from all areas of the Town. It is a non-partisan support, cutting across many political, ethnic and community lines, from people who recognize that this program is the best solution available to meet our needs for the next 15 years.

The acquisition and initial preparation of the landfill site may cost as much as \$6 million, but any alternative - if there was one - would be equally expensive. Solid waste disposal doesn't come cheaply; for example, North Hempstead is planning to spend \$23 million for a new incinerator, and Hempstead Town has approved a \$35 million bond issue to upgrade its waste treatment facilities and programs.

The Town of Oyster Bay Proposition, for which we are asking

your support, will authorize a bond issue of nearly \$6 million. This will cost the average homeowner about \$3 more a year in taxes—which does not seem to be an excessive price for this important program.

EDITORIAL

TOB Bond Issue

On Tuesday, November 7, voters in the Town of Oyster Bay are being asked to approve a \$8 million bond issue to finance the acquisition and initial preparation of 65 acres of vacant land in Plainview for development of a landfill-park site.

We have heard and seen a great deal of information - and misinformation on this project during the past month, some fact and some fiction; some objective and some emotional. We have attempted to evaluate this program objectively, taking into account all the aspects of the problem and this proposed solution.

We have concluded that the essential facts are these:

The present landfill will be filled in less than a year from now. At present, there is no proven, operational alternative to burying incinerator residue and nonburnable material. Despite the most modern incineration equipment, the Town must still dispose of some 300 tons of such material every day.

Nobody likes the idea of a landfill in his backyard, but of all the available potential sites investigated, the Plainview location is the more remote from residential areas as well as meeting the other criteria established by the state and county consulting engineers.

A bond issue of nearly \$6 million is a significant sum, even in this day and age, but it must be considered as an investment in the continued health and welfare of our Town.

In our opinion, the proposed landfill-park project represents the most feasible solution to the critical solid waste disposal problem, and we urge you to vote YES on the Town of Oyster Bay Proposition on the ballot next Tuesday.

It is interesting to see that the owner living farthest away from Hicksville should care the most about the welfare of the community.

H.A.D. has tried in every conceivable way to gain this needed, written permission. This project is destined to fail unless residents and businessmen of the Hicksville area write the five remaining owners. H.A.D. appeals to the Hicksville community for support and help.

H.A.D. asks that individuals concerned about the eventual successful completion of this project write the five owners who have not yet responded to this specific need of our community. A short letter emphasizing your

desire to see H.A.D. beautify this ugly parcel of land will greatly aid in the final success of this project.
