General Alarm Fire Hits Another Lumber Yard

For the second time in two weeks a fire of suspicious origin has occurred in a Hicksville Lumber yard. The most recent blaze was reported on Nov. 4 at 10:12 PM when several alarm boxes were pulled for a fire, with flames 100 feet in the air, in the Schildknecht Lumber yard on South Broadway near Mineola Ave. Hicksville. 100 firemen, 11 pieces of apparatus from the Hicksville fire dept. responded under Chief Louis Mertz.

Upon arrival firemen launched a two prong attack on the fire and hose lines were set up to protect many dwellings on Mineola Ave. 50 feet from stacks of lumber. Years ago Hicksville firemen tried to get county officials to order the yard owners to keep their lumber a safe distance from the houses, but to no avail.

Due to the number of hose lines needed to protect these homes, several firemen suffered from exhaustion getting the hose lines in operation. Firemen and equipment were again requested from the Westbury, Jericho, Plainview and Bethpage fire departments. One out of town fireman was heard to say they

have come here so often in recent months that the trucks know the way automatically. Nassau fire Marshalls are investigating the blaze.

Damage was estimated at \$400,000. destroyed was a large lumber storage shed and many stacks of plywood and lumber. It took two hours to bring the blaze, which could be seen for miles, under control. Firemen were on the scene until 10:30 AM Sunday. 8th Pct. Police had to reroute traffic on South Broadway.

A similar fire occurred at the McKeon Lumber yard several blocks north on Oct. 22. That fire damage was put between \$125,000 to \$200,000. That blaze is still being investigated.

1972 has been a costly year for fires in Hicksville. 3 persons were killed by dwelling fires, Mid Island Plaza was hit by fire which destroyed 5 stores. Meadowbrook Paper Co. warehouse (owned by McKeon) was destroyed, the Limcco Warehouse on Tec St. was destroyed, and now two lumber yard blazes.

Police Group Starts Scholarship Fund

Nassau County Patrolmen's Benevolent Association President Daniel Greenwald has announced that the Police Reserve Association, a PBA auxiliary of businessmen, will launch a \$5,000 fund-raising drive to provide college scholarships for students of Nassau County policemen. Greenwald has appointed Reserve Association President, Rodney Eitman, an Old Brookville businessman, to serve as Chairman.

"This fund will be giving scholarships to the children of Nassau police officers annually," stated Greenwald. "I'm quite pleased that Police Commissioner Louis Frank has agreed to provide the Department's full cooperation in this

effort." The first scholarship funds will be distributed in February, 1973. At a meeting this past week, held at the Holiday Inn, Hempstead, a special committee was created within the Police Reserve Association, to determine scholarship eligibility and select recipients.

Rodney Eitman told the meeting participants that, "This is the largest scholarship fund ever made available, exclusively, to the children of Nassau County policemen. I'm very optimistic that the fifty businessmen affiliated with this drive, can go over the \$5,000 goal.

New Signal

A new traffic signal will be installed on West John Street at the exit road from the Mid-Island Plaza shopping center, Public Works Commissioner John H. Peters announced today. It will include a "WALK - DON'T WALK" signal that will benefit pedestrians going to and leaving the heavily used Hicksville Post Office on the south side of West John Street. Traffic-actuators embedded in the road will stop West John Street traffic only when vehicles are actually waiting to enter from the exit road.

The installations, which will be completed within the next seven to eight weeks, are part of a two-year contract between the County and Broadway Maintenance Corp.

Lt. Col. Joseph P. Waters

Lieutenant Colonel Joseph Patrick Waters was born on March 31, 1932 in New York City. Following high school his fascination for flying, prompted his enlistment in the United Air Force. Two years later he was awarded an appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point where he was graduated in 1956, number 11 in his class. He was the first boy from Hicksville to graduate from the Point.

Joe completed basic flying training at Webb AFB and advanced tactical fighter training at Luke AFB. Following a tour in F-100's at Cannon AFB, Joe attended the University of Michigan in 1962 and earned a Masters degree in both Aeronautical and Astronautical Engineering.

In Instrumentation Engineering, his subsequent assignments included Patrick AFB, RAF Lakenheath, England, Aerospace Research Pilot School, Edwards AFB, Holloman AFB, as a test pilot, a combat tour in SEA flying F-105's out of Takhli (TAI-3) and Edwards AFB as a test pilot and joint Test Force Director for the F-5E, International Fighter Aircraft. After he returned from

Thailand he received the Distinguished Flying Cross.

In 1963, Joe enhanced his blossoming career by joining in marriage the former Billie Fern Allison. On August 3, 1972 little Joseph Jr. was born into their home.

Joe's love of Aeronautics is most aptly represented in the development of the FSE, in which he exerted such a strong influence. August 18, 1972 he became the first USAF pilot to fly the trim International Fighter. On October 16, 1972, Joe's life was taken doing what he loved to do - flying. His untimely death represents an incalculable loss for his family and relatives, his many friends, his colleagues, his community, and to the United States Air Force.

Joe is survived by his wife and son, his mother, Mrs. John P. Waters, of Hicksville, three brothers, John, James, and Jerome, and four sisters, Sister Virginia, Mary Jane, Bernadette, and Celeste.

Interment took place at Arlington National Cemetery prior to which a Memorial Requiem Mass was held at Edwards AFB on Oct. 18.

Kennedy was not through however. John Prahals threw a 25 yard pass to Pete Thompson highlighting a 36 yard drive. After apparently tying the game with the two point conversion, the referee called holding on a Kennedy lineman which cost the Eagles what the announcer termed "15 big ones." Plainview stopped Kennedy's second try and retained a two point lead.

The fireworks were not over. Midway through the final quarter Plainview was forced to punt. Kennedy gained possession and moved the ball to the Plainview 11 yard line. But on the 4th and 8th, Prahals threw incomplete and the ball turned over.

Plainview was again forced to punt. The snap to Gio was low and Dom couldn't get the punt off. He was smothered by a horde of Kennedy tacklers. With a minute to go, Kennedy had possession on the Plainview 18 yard line.

All of a sudden, it was Yankee Stadium, ninth inning, bases loaded. The Kennedy backfield first lost 2 yards, then 5 for delay of game, then Prahals lost it vainly looking for a receiver. On third down, Prahals passed incomplete, leaving his team one more chance. Prahals again dropped back, he scrambled out of the pocket with much of the Plainview defensive line in hot pursuit. As his arm flung forward, he was hit by several members of the Gull on slough, forcing the pass incomplete. Plainview had held.

Something in a crosstown rivalry fires an athlete's heart like pepper, and the members of the 1972 squad will talk about and remember this game for a long time to come. Although it meant nothing in the standings, this game was the big one. They will remember how they won the "Subway Series".

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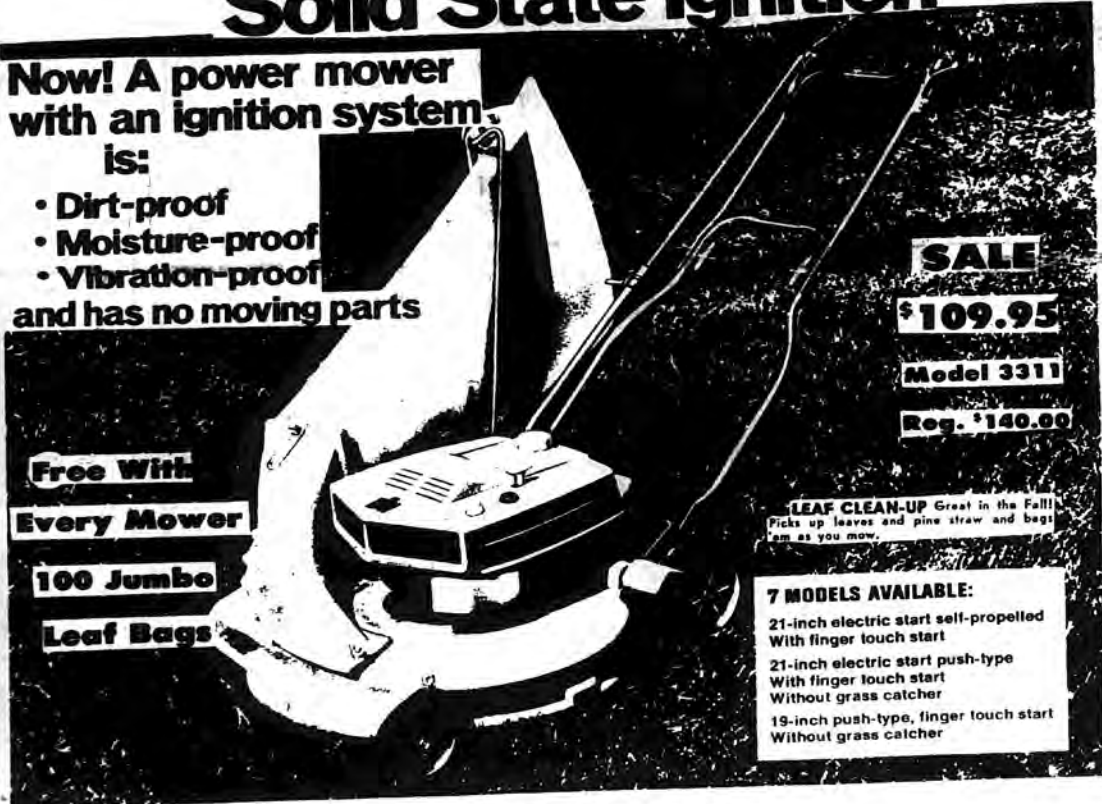

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School Board Holds Special Meeting

A special meeting of the Hicksville Board of Education was called last Thursday by trustees Clark, Zindulka and Pappas. The purpose was to handle two items which had been left from the previous week's agenda and another matter which had to be settled before November 6.

The board approved a resolution drawn up by school attorney Harry Goebel, respecting attendance of board members at the New York State School Boards Association Convention and other conferences and meetings held outside the district. The resolution requires that prior board approval must be obtained for two or more board members to attend conferences at district expense.

The board of education set November 30 as the public hearing to raise the senior citizen tax exemption from \$5000 to \$6000. The board can only vote on an increase in the exemption

after due notice and a public hearing. This item will appear near the beginning of the November 30 agenda.

The school board did not approve a community drug program training session. Hicksville has been awarded \$3000 from a federal grant to send six people to a two-week symposium on drugs. The program will provide training and exchange of ideas for the two teachers, two students and two parents from all the communities participating. Amadeo Tomaini, head of the health education department, explained this is a plan to help communities help themselves. The participants will be trained and will return to their respective communities and set up some sort of drug abuse prevention program.

There was objection to the hours of the training session-- all attending are asked to stay "on campus" from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. for the full two weeks. Trustees Clark, Zindulka and Pappas think

the participants are being "locked up" and don't like the "secretiveness" of the program. Mr. Tomaini explained that no one is forced to stay against his her will and no one will be "locked up."

Mr. Zindulka also objected because he had received no information until October 9 and he thinks the district is rushing into the program. Mr. Tomaini said this has been planned since last spring and former school board president, Thomas Muratore, signed forms approving the request for federal funds. The other board members said they, too, had not seen the material prior to last month.

Those voting in favor of the drug training program were trustees Bello, McCormack and Pirrung. Messrs. Clark, Zindulka and Pappas voted against. Mr. Bruno was not at Thursday's meeting.

The next school board meeting is Friday, November 10 at 8 p.m. in the High School Auditorium. The board is scheduled to discuss foreign language in the elementary schools and reach some decision about the program's future.

for the two days they were laid off through no fault of their own. Dr. Fred Hill, assistant superintendent, said this would be illegal and reminded the board it had set aside a specific amount of money in the teachers' contract (which Mr. Bruno helped negotiate) to cover all expenses for school monitors.

Two subsequent motions on this matter - allowing for overtime work to make up for the money lost the two days the monitors didn't work and hiring more help at the Junior and Senior High - failed to receive second. Later in the evening, Mrs. Phyllis Rankel read into the minutes a letter sent by the High School monitors to Mr. Bruno. The letter listed the various difficulties the monitors encounter in their day and pointed out the fact that even though these employees received a raise last year, their working

hours have now been cut so they are now making less money. Dr. Niosi stated he saw no need for having monitors.

The board approved new library books and new textbooks for foreign language and language arts. The school board also approved extension of the itinerant learning disabilities program so that more Hicksville students can be trained in the district (at Woodland Avenue School), rather than referring them to BOCES. Several building requests and the establishment of health services fees at \$33 (charged to other district for treating their students) were also approved.

The board again defeated the purchase of 42 replacement instructional electric typewriters. The vote was split - yes: Bello, Pirrung, McCormack; no: Bruno; abstain: Clark. The money for purchase was to come from the equipment bond issue and budgeted monies in the general fund.

The board also defeated the mandated Strand II of the Health Curriculum for the Junior High.

This material, dealing with drugs, alcohol and tobacco, has been approved by the Health Education Curriculum Committee. The material for intermediate grades in currently being taught at the Junior High. Mr. Bruno wanted to table the item until the board received more information on films and filmstrips recommended for use in the curriculum. Trustees McCormack and Pirrung voted to approve Strand II, Bello and Bruno voted against and Mr. Clark abstained.

The board was given in-

formation regarding additional duties assigned by the superintendent to the professional consultant, Donald Abt. Mr. Bruno objected to the one-month vacation Mr. Abt took this summer, stating it was not in his contract. But Harry Goebel, school board attorney, explained that arrangements which were made with the previous board would hold. He added that he felt Mr. Abt should be allowed vacation time. In answer to Mr. Bruno's question about what the consultant was doing, Dr. Niosi said he has been involved in an "exhaustive survey of district facilities."

The board approved a code of conduct for maintenance of public order on school property. This is required by the State Education Department and must be in by December 1 or our state aid can be withheld. Dr. John Cadden, assistant superintendent, chaired a committee of students, parents, teachers and principals which had drawn up in similar code, but the latter is designed as a legal instrument which can be used in court.

The meeting was adjourned at midnight during a discussion of the attorney's resolution regarding attendance of board members at conferences and meetings outside the district. Mr. McCormack voted not to continue. At this writing, a special board meeting has been called for Thursday, November 2, to finish the items from last Friday.

The next regularly scheduled school board meeting is Friday, November 10 at 8 P.M. in the Senior High School Auditorium. The discussion of the foreign language program is on the agenda.

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
