Controversy and Conflict At School Board Meeting

It was a wild night. People were tense and tempers flared. Heated arguments and shouting It was a wild night. Propie were tense and tempers flared. Heated arguments and shouting filled the room. For many of the crowd of several hundred it was a disappointing night-especially for those who had come to learn the future of foreign language in the elementary schools. These people waited through all the irides and tantrums, but the Hicksville School Board meeting adjourned at 11:30 and agenda item No. 9-A (Foreign Language Program). The Board will be asked to consider certain aspects of the Foreign Language Program) was never covered. During the first public portion of Friday's meeting (the only one scheduled on the agenda). Barbara Rosman asked the board to allow for a second public session during the time foreign language was being discussed. Bugene Edelstein read part of a letter from the Hicksville Citizens for Better Education, in which it was brought out that the Flangan, report recommended extending foreign language to all elementary school students. The CRS report had advised to maintain the current program buy add an additional entering time. Mr. Edelstein asked the board to consider the strong community feeling about foreign language. He also suggested that the attribution rates and starting times, in other districts be studied.

Marge Giannelli stated there should be public mention of the fact that it was the teachers who filled in during the two-day layoff of school monitors in September.

of school monitors in September. John Maniec, program director of H.A.D., disagreed with the board's action last week regarding the National Institute for the Development of Community Drug Program. He asked the board to consider participating at a later date. Frank Brown questioned the agenda placement of an item to replace instructional typewriters at the High School. He felt it should be near the beginning since it had been postponed from previous meetings. However, the item was not moved up.

item was not moved up.
Thomas Clark, board president, proposed a weekend work session for board members. He suggested they meet out of the district, away from phones and families, and try to set up a plan for the district for the next ten years. Some of the topics of discussion could be individualized instruction, the tenporaries and truction, the board did not act on Mr. Clark's suggestion.

The board did not act on Mr. Clark's suggestion.
William Bruno asked when cable TV had been authorized in the district. Dr. Jerome Niosi, superintendent, said the board had approved it last November and it was set up with BOCES so that the district achools could get one cable. Lines were installed in each school, at no cost to the district. It was suggested that school board meetings could be telecast.

Mr. Bruno also asked if the board could require a urinalysis, as part of the school exam, to aid as part of the school exam, to air in determining drug usage. Harry Goebel, school attorney, said this would be an invasion of privacy and could not legally be required. Mr. Clark asked Mr. Goebel to get the opinions of the

Goebel to get the opinions of the school physicians.

The board approved payment of the October 31 payroll and routine expenses of the district. Mr. Bruno voted no. He criticized the payment of Mr. Clark's phone bill and stated there should be vouchers presented to the board before reimbursement is given to any individual.

vouchers presented to the board before reimbursement is given to any individual.

The board authorized the administration of a drug attitude inventory in the health classes at the Junior and Senior High, but stipulated that it be optional with parental permission, in writing. Dr. Niosi explained the attitude survey would give an indication of the extent of the drug abuse problem in Hicksville. Erwin Ruzran, administrative assistant, stressed that no names would be used on the test and he also warned of the danger of drawing wild conclusions from the test results. It is doubtful that the survey will be administered, however, because Dr. Niosi objected to the stipulation set by the board. He felt obtaining the parents' permission would becongrize the outcome of the test.

objected to the stipulation set by the board. He felt obtaining the parents' permission would leopardize the outcome of the test and would delay the whole procedure.

The board approved various changes in personnel and other appointments. But controversy arose over an agenda item entitled "transfer and appointments." Robert Pirrung saked why there was a deviation of hiring a higher-salaried teacher to fill a vacancy left by a teacher going on maternity leave. Dr. Niosi explained he tries to get the best teacher at the lowest price. He said the recall list (teachers who have been let go by the district) was exhausted. Dr. John Gadder, assistant superintendent, later said that all but one teacher had been promised highlest priority.

Mr. Pirrung then asked if Dr.

and she had been promised highest priority.
Mr. Pirrung then asked if Dr. Cadden had interviewed the teacher in question. He said he interviewed the man two years ago, at which time he was hired as a home teacher. He also interviewed him recently but not for any specific position. Mr. ierviewed him recently but not for any specific position. Mr. Pirrung asked if Dr. Cadden recommended this person for the vacancy. Before he answered, however, George Pappas intervened and said Dr. Cadden had never been questioned in this manner regarding other teaching rostitions.

Neil McCormack asked to see Neil McCormack asked to see the applicant's folder and then asked if the principal of the school involved approved the recommended appointment. Dr. Niosi said yes, But the principal later slated, publicly to the board that he did not recommend the person and had not recommend the person and had not interviewed lim. Dr. Niosi answered that he had spoken with the principal and understood the appointment to be

acceptable.

Mr. McCormack stated the recommendation for hiring did recommendation for hiring did not come from Dr. Cadden and this was contrary to usual procedure. Mr. Bruno asked if Dr. Cadden was always directed to interview job candidates. Dr. Niusi answered it is the superintendent's responsibility, by law, to recommend personnel, but "the board in its wisdom hires assistants to help him." He

said Dr. Cadden is not directed, but job applications for teaching positions are turned over to him. Mr. Bruno said the board should have spoken privately about this position. Mr. Clark responded that Mr. Bruno refused to come to a study session on the matter. on the matter.

on the matter.

Mr. McCormack asked if Dr.
Niosi had reviewed the applicant's file and if he would want
the person in his school if he were
principal. Dr. Niosi said yes and
added he didn't think someone
should be condemned for the rest
of his life for one mistake. He
stated the matter is still in
his life. litigation.

The board then went into minute executive session, at the conclusion of which the item was withdrawn from the agenda and no action was taken.

no action was taken.

The school board unanimously approved the use of Title I federal monies for a non-English speaking project scheduled becember 4, 1972 through June 30, 1973. This program will enable non-English speaking students in Hicksylle to learn out language. The board also approved the purchase of equipment for a Title I remedial reading program. A request to approve the mandated Strand II (alcohol, smoking, narcotics) of the Junior High lealth curriculum was tabled again.

health curriculum was tabled again.

The board then voted to allow for an additional twenty-minute public session. Trustees Zinduka, Bello and Pappas voted against the motion.

Larry Wolfson criticized "the temerity of the board" regarding the proposed teacher hiring, which had taken up so much time on the agenda. "What does the loard and administration owe that requires them to jeopardize the children's education? What has he or his friends done as favors?" Mr. Wolfson gave some background of the person in question and said he was upset by what he saw in the district—the fear psychology and intimidation, the witchhunting and censorship. He accused the board of retrogression and rendering our educational system impotent. The public is no longer lethargic and apathetic, said Mr. Wolfson and his

"Hicksville will rise again."
Charles Fetta, in turn, criticized Mr. Wolfson and his remarks. He said the person in question was entitled to a job. Ne charged that other school board had given jobs to their friends and he criticized the "PTA pressure groups," stating he would name the members of that

Barbara Rosman said, "PTA is a pressure group and the group they pressure for is the children."

The meeting disintegrated into chaos. And at this point, the vote to continue the meeting was taken. Mr. Zindulka voted no and the meeting adjourned, leaving six agenda items still undecided

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At both locations, the signals will be responsive to traffic and will stop traffic on the main artery only when vehicles are actually waiting to enter from the less heavilytrafficked street. The

Thanksgiving Day, 1972

Our American Thanksgiving Day dates officially from 1863 when the nation was locked in a sectional struggle. At that time Mrs. Sarah J. Hale, who had been proposing a national day of thanksgiving for decades in Boston and Philadelphia as a magazine editor, wrote to President Abraham Lincoln - who in October of 1863 issued the first Thanksgiving Proclamation

There had been earlier thanksgiving days; some date the American observance to the days of the early settlers of the nation-who gave thanks for their food supply and the opportunity America offered. The first probably occurred in the Plymouth Colony in 1621. There have also been observances in other lands but

few countries had adopted annual thanksgiving days prior to the American custom. An international thanksgiving day was held in Washington in 1909, having been conceived by the Rev. Dr. William T. Russell of St. Patrick's Catholic Church.

Thus the American Thanksgiving Day, this year on the 23rd is unjustly American. In 1979, it finds us

the 23rd, is uniquely American. In 1972 it finds us blessed with great wealth and hope that peace with

honor is imminent. We can all give thanks for the many blessings all Americans enjoy. In doing so, we can resolve to build a better community and a greater nation-for in spite of our blessings and accomplishments, there is still much to be done in the building of our country

Help-Aid Direction (H.A.D.), Hicksville's own youth counseling and drug prevention center, appeals to the businessmen and residents of our community for financial help in solving a very serious problem. H.A.D. has outgrown its present storefront facilities. She needs to rent one serve large.

needs to rent one very large counseling and recreational

center. During the month of October 1972 alone, more than seventy totally new teenagers visited our facilities at 75 and 87 Broadway. These individuals came to find out about H.A.D.'s services. Many of these youngsters have since decided to join one of her weekly junior or senior high school age rap groups.

H.A.D.'s first storefront facility has been in operation since October 1970. In an attempt to acquire more space, H.A.D. rented a second facility at 87 Broadway toward the end of May 1972. However, with increasing numbers of youngsters participating in the H.A.D. program has come very serious problems too.

H.A.D.'s growth in yoothful participants has caused interruptions in the normal operating procedure of the lusinesses that share the same floor with H.A.D. at 87 Broadway. The H.A.D. organization has painfully realized that it must consolidate its two facilities into one large center. one large center

H.A.D. needs to find a store, old factory or business zoned house to rent, in Hicksville, which will not bother other businesses. She needs it immediately as H.A.D. has agreed to move out of its storefront at 87 Broadway by Friday, November 10. H.A.D.'s continued expansion of services and effectiveness with the young people involved in its program will be seriously curtailed unless adequate accommodations can be found. be found

Renting of acceptable business space in Hicksville will be highly expensive. For the contract period, April 1, 1972 through

March 31, 1973, state lunds available to H.A.D. will allow her to spend only \$375 per month toward rent costs. Most available business space

Most available business space in Hicksville far exceed that price range. The H.A.D. organization appeals to the Hicksville community for support. H.A.D. will need to raise additional rent money through donations unless a moderate priced facility can be found soon. Please help H.A.D. in her time of need. H.A.D. will thus continue to grow and help more Hicksville youth cope with and solve their own problems.
