Hicksville Chamber of Commerce News

A lively discussion on that most controversial of topics, the proposed Bayville-Rye bridge, was held at the latest membership meeting of the Hicksville Chamber of Commerce. At a luncheon at Old Country Manor on January 10th, more than fifty people heard Supervisor John Burke of the Town of Oyster Bay and representatives of the

Metropolitan Transportation Association present opposing views on the proposed crossing. Using charts and graphs, the MTA officials claimed that the population of Long Island would increase by two-thirds by the year 2000 and Westchester would increase by 60 per cent. Two Hicksville applications in close geographic, if not operational, proximity were approved by the Town Board of Oyster Bay on Tuesday. These were the application for continuation of the special use permit by Midhampton Asphalt Co., Inc. for its portable asphalt plant in the vicinity of Duffy Ave. and Charlotte St., and the approval of a proposed expansion of its facilities by the Jones Institute for the Poor, located at the corner of Charlotte St. and W. John St.

At its public hearing on December 5, 1972, Midhampton Asphalt, through its attorney Edward T. Robinson III, requested a ten-year extension of the permit, which was granted for an 18-month period in June of 1971. At the hearing, Mr. Robinson described a new sound suppressing device to be installed by Midhampton.

In its resolution, the Board granted the extension for a six-year period, on the condition that said sound suppressing device be installed. All the other 18 restrictions placed upon Midhampton Asphalt concerning smoke and dust control, diesel fuel, truck traffic and other conditions pertain in the renewal of the permit.

Jones Fund Expansion
Approval was unanimous, except for Councilman Doolittle, who was absent, of the application of the Jones Institute for the Poor to expand and refurbish its present facilities. Plans include a three-story addition for about 146 residents to the east of the present building, a six-car garage, and renewal of the present building. Total cost of the project is estimated at \$1,300,000. The proposed addition to the adult residence will consist of

semi-private and private rooms, recreation and sitting rooms, and necessary facilities. It will also include a residential apartment for the Superintendent, John Bertone, or his aide.

Most people know the Jones Fund as a stately Georgian mansion set on 13.22 acres of land on the corner of West John St. and Charlotte St. Also the owner of an additional 6 acres across Charlotte St., the institute is surrounded by industrially-zoned property, and is so zoned itself; thus the need for a special permit. The Jones Fund, originating from the will of Samuel and Walter Jones dating from 1836, serves as a residence for homeless and indigent adults referred by the Nassau County Dept. of Social Services. It is now home for about 70 residents, 10 of whom are women, who live dormitory style.

Oil Burner Fire Keep Vamps Busy

During the first two weeks of 1973 Hicksville firemen received nine heating unit fires. Several of these fires could have been prevented by periodic maintenance on the unit. The sudden cold spell caused the units to be overworked and fires resulted. It is a good idea to have your heating unit checked twice a year. Loose or worn drive belts caused some of the recent fires. Dust and dirt or short circuits or overflow of oil were the cause of the others.

Keep in mind, that it is not such a good idea to remove the metal cover from your oil burner and install a wooden one. Although some covers are well insulated, fire can involve the wooden covers much faster and in the case of the Levitt Homes, it can cut off escape from the 1st floor bedrooms.

In case of a fire in your oil burner turn off the emergency switch, call the fire dept. and relocate everyone to a safe part of the house near an exit.

New Home of the Gregory Museum To Open on January 27

On January 27, after appropriate ceremonies at the Knights of Columbus Hall on Heitz Place, a ribbon cutting will take place at the new home of the Gregory Museum, Inc., Long Island Earth Science Center, which will formally open its Phase I activities at its new location. Open house for the public will be from 1-6 PM.

Phase I consists of displays of rocks, minerals, fossils, jewelry, Indian artifacts, fluorescent minerals, sea shells, butterflies and moths, and historical artifacts of the Long Island Area.

Phase II, the construction of 4 classrooms on the second floor, and one in the basement to teach in mineralogy, geology, micromounting, and the lapidary arts, will begin soon after the building is open. Additional toilets and a mineral testing laboratory are also included in this phase.

Phase III, an addition to the building will begin after Phase III is completed. The addition will contain a library, scientific laboratory, more classrooms, display areas, and storage space.

Members from Carpenters

Local Union No. 1772, under the direction of Mr. Glenn Kerbs and Mr. Walter Gebhardt, have been busy completing the carpentry work necessary to open the building. Members of International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local No. 25, under the direction of Mr. Charles Fisher, have been busy completing the wiring on the first floor. They have been assisted by Richard Sullivan and Mr. Herbert Johnson. Lou Merz, member of the Sheet Metal Workers Local Union No. 55, and Hicksville Fire Chief has finished installing the diffusers.

Mr. John Specht, former Hicksville Fire Chief, and presently President of Nassau County Fire Chief's Council, assisted by Explorer Post No. 778, installed the fire alarm system, which will be connected to the central fire alarm box.

Painter's Local Union No. 798, under the direction of Arthur Morelli, painted the building in the fall of 1971, and have promised to scrape and paint the building in the spring of 1973. Mr. George Schack, assisted by Richard Sullivan has installed the "burglar alarm system."

Mr. Benjamin Barley, Curator, assisted by Val Conover and Rosemary Barrow, have been

busy transferring mineral specimens, etc. from the present site of the museum at 207 Cottage Boulevard, Hicksville, and installing them in the new display cases at the former Hicksville Village Hall. Mrs. Anne Atwood has been busy typing the labels for the specimens.

Mr. Richard Evers, Historical Chairman of the museum, assisted by many others has been busy converting the jail area to a museum.

Mr. Glenn Kerbs and members of Carpenters Local Union No. 1772 are finishing construction of a ramp to be used by handicapped people who wish to use the facilities of the new museum at its new location on Heitz Place.

Also, many local citizens are spending all their spare hours working to help get ready for the Jan 27 Grand Opening.

Mr. Paul Rousseau, Building Committee Chairman, of The Gregory Museum, is responsible for coordinating all of the construction work being done at the former Hicksville Village Hall.

The New York State Council on the Arts did not review our request for a grant for 1972-1973, since it arrived late, funds will have to be raised to pay the curators salary.

"SCHOOL BUS ACCIDENT. KILLS GIRL 7"

Hicksville firemen rushed to the scene of a tragic accident on Jan. 11 at South Gate and Alling St. The alarm was received at 3:47 p.m. Little Patricia Baggia of 26 South Gate was struck by a school bus as it pulled away from the curb. Patricia age 7, was rushed to Central General Hospital in Plainview via the fire dept. ambulance, but was

pronounced dead on arrival. 2nd Pct. police units did an excellent job of clearing traffic from Old Country Road for the ambulance.

"RESCUE CALL AND MUTUAL AID CALLS"

Hicksville firemen responding to a rescue call Sunday, Jan. 14, arrived on the scene to find the patient had stopped breathing. Firemen administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation enroute to Syosset Hospital and the patient's breathing was restored. It was reported however that the patient Charles Moore aged 64 died of another attack on Tuesday, Jan. 16.

Hicksville vamps were called to assist Jericho vamps on Monday January 8th. The first

call occurred at 10:03 a.m. A large mansion off Route 107 was heavily damaged. At 1:54 p.m. a second call was put out to relieve firemen at the mansion fire when another serious house fire occurred in Jericho. The relief crew responded to that alarm along with other units of the 9th Battalion.

The postponement of the hearings on the Oyster Bay - Rye bridge was a fitting climax to an eventful day last Thursday, January 11. The judge's ruling came after a hearing in a legal action brought against the Metropolitan Transportation Authority and the State Dept. of Transportation by the Town of Oyster Bay, the City of Rye and several villages and civic groups in an attempt to block the hearings.

It was our contention that among other things, the MTA failed to provide the public with sufficient factual information on the location and environmental impact of the bridge and its approach roads as well as inadequate time to review such material as required by federal law.

While the Town Attorney's staff was fighting this legal battle, members of my staff and I were

conducting members of the press on a tour of the areas through which the bridge approach roads would cut.

Although our local Long Island papers are familiar with the area, and aware of the bridge's destructive impact, our efforts were particularly directed at some of the New York City based and New York City-oriented news media. It was felt that a first-hand look at the area and contact with some of the people affected would be a meaningful experience for them.

I believe it was. That evening, you and thousands of other Long Islanders watching TV saw these same areas and heard the comments of local residents and businessmen whose lives would be devastated by the bridge. Newsmen and camera crews from every major television

network, as well as radio and newspaper reporters, made the tour.

For many of them, it was their first visit to our Town, and from

some of their comments, it was apparent that they were equally as appalled as we are at the specter of this concrete and steel monster.

It also was evident that they realized that its impact would not be restricted to the northern part of Oyster Bay. As one major network commentator said on his news telecast that evening, "They'll have to add another 12 lanes to Sunrise Highway to handle the traffic generated by this bridge."

The fight has just begun and with the continued support of our residents we hope to prevent this mutilation of our Town.

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Levine Named To Committee On Environmental Conservation

Citing Assemblyman Stuart R. Levine's avid interest in ecology, Assembly Speaker Perry B. Duryea appointed the newly elected Bethpage legislator to the

Assembly Standing Committee on Environmental Conservation.

Assemblyman Levine (R-Bethpage) at 25 is one of the youngest members ever to serve in the Legislature and is currently the youngest member of the New York State Assembly majority. Levine has been prominently involved with youth and their participation in protecting the environment.

In January, 1970 when Mr. Levine joined the teaching staff of the Plainview-Old Bethpage School District, he started the first ecology club. The popularity of the club and its activities, including bike hikes and community clean-up projects, grew rapidly drawing three to four hundred youngsters.

"Enthusiastic acceptance of the club," said Assemblyman Levine, "indicated the need for a course in environmental conservation. I thought that a community environmental program, focused on basic local environmental problems, would make the course attractive to students and one which they could relate to their day-to-day experiences both in and out of the home."

Levine developed his own curriculum; his program was approved and he presented the first mandatory ecology course in Plainview-Old Bethpage Junior High School. The course lives on, despite his departure from the teaching profession.

Lane, (R-Windham) chairman of the Assembly Subcommittee on Environmental Conservation. The young Bethpage legislator was recently appointed to the Committee by Assembly Speaker Duryea.

This course enjoyed such success that Levine developed a credited environmental college course which incorporated seminars with environmental experts. Assemblyman Levine also feels that the environment and its relation to each subject should be introduced into every academic course.

The young Bethpage legislator will file legislation to include

mandatory courses on environmental conservation into New York State's high school curriculum.

Quality Scouting for boys in this area does cost money, but the dividends are the 30,000 members who are getting a practical program of character development, citizenship training, and mental and physical fitness.

Francis B. Looney, Council President explained that the cost to bring the BSA Program to boys in the Nassau County Council is shared by the boy himself, his unit, the organization that is chartered to use the program, and the local and national organization.

etc. to the Long Island bottleneck come by truck, all using the present roundabout route that has caused massive traffic jams. By the year 2000, with an estimated 90 per cent of the area jobs outside New York City, the problem of supplying people and industry with the necessities will be all but impossible without additional connections between Long Island, Westchester and upstate New York. This region must function as a transportation unit, said the MTA, in order to handle the influx of people and send the extremely heavy truck and automobile traffic around New York City directly to its eastern destination. Jobs, (an estimated 22,000 of them), lower freight rates and greater mobility for the crowded Long Island citizen, are some of the additional reasons for building the bridge, said the MTA presentation, which minimized the damage to the wetlands and the environment. Mr. Burke, in reply, claimed the damage to the wetlands would be considerable, both on the North and South Shore, as the plan would necessitate a new expressway on the South Shore connecting with Highway 135 from the North, and the Verrazano Bridge to New Jersey and the south. He said that Route 135 could not handle traffic adequately and that the air and noise pollution in the Town of

Oyster Bay would be equal to a 500 ton a day incinerator. He also cited possible damage to the shellfish industry and suggested the bridge may be better located elsewhere, perhaps parallel to the Throgs Neck bridge. Mass transportation, rather than excessive use of the automobile, may be the answer to our problem, said Mr. Burke. He predicted the future urbanization of the Township if the bridge is built. Both sides stressed that the brief presentations covered only the highlights of their case.

The meeting was presided over by Mr. Kingsley Kelly, president of the Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Kelly stated that the Chamber's efforts to bring owners of property in the downtown Hicksville area together for development of a pilot project to rehabilitate the area was proceeding satisfactorily.
