Hicksville School Board Budget Meeting

At last Thursday's scheduled budget session the school board tabled a resolution which accuses a ninth grade English instructor of "conduct unbecoming a teacher." Trustee Clark Zindulka and Pappas voted against the tabling motion. The resolution is a statement of charges against Joseph Scalia, who wrote and distributed to his student a poem, "A Christmas Story or Mary's Complaint." The board had already passed a resolution in relation to this incident which condemned and

prohibited such practice. The statement of charges will be discussed again this Thursday, February 8, when the board will decide what action it will take.

After tabling the resolution, the board proceeded with its budget discussion. William Bruno moved that administration be directed to cease all studies of any building program for the 1973-74 budget. This motion failed; yes: Pappas and Bruno; no: Bello, McCormack, Pirrung and Clark. The board approved a motion which directed administration to present a plan for phasing out the

temporary buildings at Burns Avenue, Dutch Lane, Woodland Avenue and the Junior High. This plan will include the facilities to be used instead, a schedule for phasing out and the proposed cost.

The board discussed state aid for the 1973-74 budget, but there is little information available now.

There was no discussion of any specific budget codes or figures, as the meeting started one and a half hours late and the board had to adjourn into executive session at 10:30 to discuss negotiations.

Vamps Battle Stubborn Blaze

Forty Hicksville Firemen, assisted by units from the Plainview & Westbury Fire Departments battled a stubborn blaze in a shopping center on Old Country Rd. at Lee Pl. in Hicksville for over an hour before bringing it under control.

The blaze which occurred on Feb. 1st, was reported at 2:16 pm, first arriving units under Capt. Richard Ritterg. Eng. Co. 2 encountered a smoky blaze involving three stores. A second and third alarm were subsequently sent in for more men and equipment. At that time mutual aid was requested from Plainview and Westbury. The main part of the fire was in the open space between the roof and ceiling.

Heavy smoke hampered Vamps as they fought the blaze. The fire is believed to have originated in a plastic trash can at the rear of a beauty salon spread upwards. Air vents at the East end of the center apparently caused the fire to spread in that direction. All of Hicksville's four fire chiefs arrived on the scene and Chief L. Mertz took command. Three stores were heavily damaged. House Chow Restaurant 350 Old Country Rd. All County Appliance Inc. No. 352, Elegant Hair Fashions No. 354. Smoke and water damage was suffered in the Pizza Shop at No.



356, and the A & W Delicatessen at No. 353. Although a fire wall existed between No. 354 and 356, the improper construction of it allowed flames to get past, but firemen anticipated it and removed part of the ceilings and prevented the spread of fire to the rest of the shopping center.

Firemen were on the scene till 5:30 PM. No injuries were reported and a routine investigation by the fire marshals

office was requested.

During the period of Jan. 30 thru Feb. 6 Hicksville Firemen responded to 15 alarms, 6 rescue calls, and 9 fires. A smoky house fire at 81 Meadow Ln. on Feb. 5th at 4:10 pm caused heavy smoke damage to most of the dwelling. While firemen fought the blaze, which was confined to the kitchen, the wife of the owner had an apparent heart attack and was transported by 8th Pct. Police to the hospital.

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EDITORIAL

Television And History

In addition to serious questions prompted by commercial television's reporting of the news, its presentation of U.S. history, in specials, raises basic questions related to the national welfare and future interests of the nation.

Most Americans rightly oppose censorship, oppose bureaucratic interference in television documentaries; never the less, television's impact has become so great the out-put of the three major networks in the field of teaching history can, to a shocking extent, influence public opinion.

Should there be a national commission, composed of eminent historians, to advise producers on the true facts of history—so that Americans would not be taught incorrect history? Is there no way to protect the national interest from inaccurate or misleading or intentionally slanted documentaries, designed perhaps to control public opinion, all billed as objective history?

These are good questions; the answers to them do not come easily. Obviously, few wish to entrust three small groups of commercial network officials with the power to teach Americans history via saleable television programs. Professional historians are better entrusted with this task.
