Tennis Building Petition Denied

In a 6 to 1 decision Councilman Howard Hogan abstaining, the Oyster Bay Town Board on Tuesday denied the application of Four Brothers Properties to construct a sizeable tennis building and shopping area on a 2,000-square foot parcel of land on Broadway north of the intersections of Murray Road and Lee Avenue.

While there was written but no voiced opposition to the major installation at its public hearing in December, residents of nearby Lawnview Avenue were very much against it, and he wrote petitions to the Town Board opposing it.

W. Nicholai Hearing Postponed to Mar. 29

An application before the Board of Zoning Appeals on March 8th which would put five families on an oversize lot on West Nicholai St. which now accommodates one family was postponed to March 29th because the applicant neglected to post notice of the hearing in the public library and with the school district.

Attorney for applicant Nathan Weingarten and Son, builders, had, however, notified nearby neighbors, as required, and some were present to see what it was all about.

Two of these were Mr. and Mrs. Edward Hahn, of East Marie Street, who were under the mistaken impression that the lot in question was a vacant 90' x 220' lot fronting on the north side of West Nicholai, and abutting their property in the rear. The actual piece is a larger, ¼ acre plot fronting 192 feet on the south side of West Nicholai, now occupied by a Mr. and Mrs. Mills, and under contract of sale to Weingarten.

The applicant proposes to put two two-family houses on the south and center portions of the property, with access via a roadway to be constructed along the easterly boundary of the land. The two-family dwellings would

be on lots with areas of 9,322 square feet and 9,672 square feet. Fronting on West Nicholai would be a one-family dwelling, which the attorney said would be occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Mills.

The existing Mills home would be demolished.

Also present to investigate the proceedings was Mr. George Conklin, of 247 W. Nicholai. "I

wouldn't mind if they were one-family homes," she said. Mr. Hahn wondered what might happen to the vacant lot abutting his property if the application was approved.

Public hearings at the Board of Zoning appeals are held on Thursdays at Town Hall, beginning at 8:00 P.M.

REPORTS

With the adoption of the development plan for the Jericho area and the scheduling of a public hearing on proposals for the Syosset-Woodbury area, the Town is rapidly approaching the final phases of the development of an overall Master Plan as an advisory guide for community development.

The adoption of a master plan does not signify the end of our planning efforts, but is in reality the beginning of a continuing process of review, evaluation and adjustment to keep in step with the community's desires and interests as they change with the times. This responsibility will rest to a great extent with the Planning Advisory Board.

supported by the professional staff and consulting assistance of the Town's new Department of Planning and Development.

In implementing the Master Plan, the Planning Advisory Board must carry out a publicity program to develop an awareness and familiarity with the Plan in the community. Detailed studies should be made of individual problem areas, such as traffic bottlenecks, to develop priorities in the Town's capital improvement program.

The Planning Advisory Board must maintain a continuing dialogue with the community by providing speakers, discussion leaders and public displays illustrating existing conditions

and desirable as well as the undesirable types of developments which the plan seeks to avoid. Another aspect of good planning is the maintaining of a close liaison with the various county, regional, state and federal planning groups and their plans and programs.

In order for us to derive the maximum benefit from the many hours and efforts that went into the development of the Master Plan, it must continue to be a viable, flexible, working tool used by the Townspeople, planners and Town Board alike as a guide in all matters affecting future development and growth of our Town.

Bids Out For GEICO Road

Mrs. Judy Jacobs, president of the South Woodbury Taxpayers Association and Mrs. Iris Ashenbult, an officer of the association, were present on Monday to hear the Nassau County Board of Supervisors approve a resolution authorizing advertising of bids on the construction of the north service road of the Long Island Expressway from the vicinity of French Farm Boulevard east to Sunnyside Boulevard, a distance of about 2000 feet.

The road, when completed, will lighten traffic on Woodbury Road coming from the Government Employees Insurance Co. building near Piquets Lane. It will also ease congestion for the residents of the housing development which borders on Woodbury Road opposite the GEICO building.

Unfair Labor Practices Charged in Town Security

The methods and procedures taken during the change of contract for security services in the Town of Oyster Bay came under fire at Town Hall Tuesday, when William Lewis, formerly of the B.I. Group (Business Intelligence Group, security company based in Boston) charged unfair labor practices against the Town of Oyster Bay and Smith & Wesson, who took over the security contract from the B.I. Group on January 1st.

What Mr. Lewis, formerly supervisor of Long Island security for the B.I. Group, was protesting was the peremptory firing and subsequent firing of 20 B.I. Group men by Smith & Wesson, including himself. When Smith & Wesson took over the contract, they had no personnel, he said, and approached him, Mr. Lewis, to give them twenty of his men, and himself to fulfill the contract.

This Mr. Lewis did. Within a few weeks, he was then ordered to fire the men by Smith & Wesson. The source of the order was said to be John Conroy, Town Attorney, who wrote a letter requesting that the men be phased out. The letter, dated January 22 and addressed to Mr. Arthur R. Fisher, Vice President and General Manager of Smith & Wesson security services, Inc. on 42nd Street in Manhattan, states:

"I wish to thank you for your efforts in seeing to it that we had security coverage commencing

January 1, 1973. I realized that it was difficult for you to provide personnel on such short notice. Our calendar procedures coupled with the holidays prevented us from giving you even oral notice that you were deemed to be the lowest responsible bidder earlier than we did, to wit December 29, 1972. Formal Town Board approval was given on January 2, 1973.

"It is my understanding that you could not provide the coverage without making partial use of personnel formerly employed by B.I. Group and, perhaps, some town employees. It is also my understanding that at my request, our purchasing agent asked that you phase out any town employees and B.I. Group employees you may have needed during the transitional period.

"I would appreciate it if you would let me know when this has been accomplished."

No Prior Notice

According to Mr. Lewis, the men hired and fired were given no notice that the arrangement with Smith & Wesson would be a temporary one. One man gave up his life insurance when he left the B.I. Group and died soon after with no life insurance, he said.

It is not for me, but for my men that I am here, said Mr. Lewis, whose own employment with Smith & Wesson has been terminated as of Friday, March 10. He told his men to file a

complaint for unfair labor practices with the New York State Labor Board, and plans to file a complaint himself.

B.I. Group, he said, had been the lowest bidder on the contract in terms of dollars. Smith & Wesson, the third lowest bidder, would provide more patrol car service than B.I. Group, according to discussions of the bids. Mr. Lewis said that B.I. Group had been effective in its security, except for a bad incident of vandalism at Miller Place last year. He asked Tom Eary, Director of the Town's Security, if the service had not indeed been good. Mr. Eary did not answer the question.

Mr. Lewis reported Mr. Conroy as saying to him, "Why have a new service with old bodies?"

Mr. Conroy was called down to the hearing room from his office at the request of Supervisor Burke. In response to Councilman Lewis Yevoli that copies of all such letters should be sent to him, Mr. Conroy said. The practice of sending copies would become cumbersome, considering the volume of his correspondence.

Councilman Saladino said the matter had taken on the aspect of a hearing without all parties being present. He suggested that plans for such a hearing be made, which seemed agreeable to Supervisor Burke.

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At the Hicksville Board of Education Meeting

At its meeting on Friday, March 9, the Hicksville Board of Education approved a memorandum of agreement with the Hicksville Congress of Teachers which not only fixed the financial dimensions of their contract for the coming school year but also provided for the working out of mutually agreeable staffing patterns for the schools. The structure followed was the same as that pioneered last year when major economies were achieved without elimination of program or reduction in services. With the money package agreed upon so that work on the budget can proceed without hindrance, both sides are expected to intensify their efforts to

reach agreement on other issues. Among these are simplification of the salary schedule, limitation on sabbatical leaves, fringe benefits, and salary credit for prior experience.

Spokesmen for both the Board and the Teachers' Association expressed pleasure at the progress made to date and confidence that a mutually acceptable total contract would be achieved in relatively short order. "By their prompt action on the memorandum of agreement," said Mr. Thomas L. Clark, School Board President, "the Board has made it possible to present a firm budget figure to the public rather than a rough 'guesstimation' of teaching costs."
