All boats or vessels operating within the waters of the Town shall comply with all applicable laws, rules and regulations of the Softe and Federal law governments.

Authority of the fown board to promulgate rules and regulations; posting: approval of operation regulations of the state and Federal laws in the administration and enforcement of this article, such regulations to be made public by posting in a conspicuous place in or about the boating and behing areas, and filed with the superintendent of the davision of beaches of the department of public works for inspection by users or interested persons during regulations governing the operation of boat is hereby authorized to adopt rules and regulations governing the operation of boats and vessels in the waterways under the control of the town, subject to obtaining the approval of the Commissioner, Parks and Recreation, State of New York or its successor agency.
