The Ecumenical Consultation Center received its charter from New York State on February 15 and has begun operation.

The Center, which is located at 30 Grand Avenue, Hicksville, is housed rent free in a building owned by St. Stephens Lutheran Church and sponsored by the Mid Island Ecumenical Council.

Since the churches of Bethpage, Hicksville and Plainview have cooperated in the Ecumenical Council, they have sponsored the development of many significant projects, H.A.D., the Hicksville Drug Program, the Hicksville Youth Center, the Fish Program, quarterly ecumenical services, the Week of Prayer services and Living Room Dialogue Groups are all their achievements.

This latest accomplishment, the establishment of a comprehensive counseling center, is the result of a survey of existing agencies serving our community. The study revealed two significant facts. The first was that our community does not

have sufficient mental health facilities to serve our population. The second fact was that there is a lack of services for moderate income families. The community

mental health clinic can not serve a family whose income exceeds \$12,000 a year. Families whose income is above this level must (Continued on page 15)

The League for Intelligent Financing of Education in Hicksville (L.I.F.E.), in its latest Bulletin, implies that I deliberately missed the February 19th School Board meeting in order to duck the issue of the

Christmas poem, "Mary's complaint."

As you may recall, the issue was whether or not the teacher who had written and distributed the poem should be brought up on charges.

Many people, myself included, felt the poem was repulsive, but the issue was larger than my personal feelings about the matter. Our late School Board Attorney had advised us that such action against the teacher would be of very doubtful legality.

Accordingly, I decided that it was my duty as a Board Member to vote against taking any such action against the teacher. As a matter of fact, I told Mr. Thomas, the President of L.I.F.E., what my position was. I did not hesitate to inform him of my views, even though I knew that he, as the leader of a powerful organization in the District, wanted the teacher punished severely and that I would be incurring his displeasure by taking the opposite stand.

Does the above sound like I was trying to duck an issue or that I was afraid to state my opinion honestly?

I was absent from the February 19th meeting for important personal reasons, not because I wanted to avoid the controversial vote. People who know me, know that neither controversy nor pressure have ever stopped me from doing and saying what I think is right as a Board Member.

I write this letter because I feel it is important for the responsible members of L.I.F.E. and Community, to know that I never made a secret of my views on the matter, that Mr. Thomas was informed of them prior to the issue of the latest L.I.F.E. Union Pact Speeds County Bus Takeover

A major stumbling block to county operation of a unified bus system in Nassau was removed this week when an amicable agreement was reached with the two transport unions involved guaranteeing full pay for up to six years for those drivers who would be laid off as a result of the takeover.

About 58 employees would be affected, according to County Attorney Joseph Jaspas, who spent two days last week in Washington negotiating with representatives of the Amalgamated Transit Union and the United Transport Workers Union.

Through his efforts, the seniority rolls of the two unions will be integrated and a joint bargaining agent will handle labor negotiations. The agreement also negates territorial boundaries in which the two unions operate permitting the county to move drivers about as needed. Top cost for salaries for laid off employees would be \$1,400,000, Mr. Jaspas said.

County Executive Ralph G. Caso, who announced the news at a press conference in his office on Monday, said that the fruit reaped by the County Attorney's efforts will be up to \$9,000,000 in federal aid.

The first step in the county takeover will be on March 28th, with the acquisition of the Bee Line, Rockville Centre Bus Co., Stage Coach and Utility Lines, Inc., on March 28th. There will be no interruption of service for riders. The other six privately operated lines will be taken over sometime in April, according to the county release.

The county operated bus lines will be under the direction of the newly formed Metropolitan Suburban Bus Authority, headed by Andrew Schiavone, now Nassau County Transportation Department head.

Bus service will improve and modernize under the county operation, said Caso. \$3,000,000 will be spent for new equipment at the outset. Agreement between the unions will permit greater flexibility in routes. Specialized services, such as mini-buses in residential neighborhoods will be considered.

Auxiliary Police After its regular meeting on Monday, the Supervisors heard Cliff W. Schmidt, president of the Nassau County Patrolmen's Benevolent Association, request

Supervisor JOHN W. BURKE REPORTS

As we approach the 200th anniversary of the birth of our nation, I am calling upon the teenage segment of our population to take a more active role in the celebration of this event.

At a press conference last Friday, held appropriately at the Old Bethpage Village Restoration—about 60 student leaders, school paper editors and faculty advisors were asked to help generate a greater interest in the Bicentennial commemoration.

This is more than just an occasion for recalling names, dates and places of a 200-year-old event. It is a time to review the principles underlying the Revolution later embodied in our Constitution, which are as valid to many of us today as they were 200 years ago.

These values have withstood the test of time and should be the basis for setting new standards and goals as we face the problems and challenges of

today.

It is our intention to encourage a view of the past to give perspective to our own time and help make sense of the future.

The youth of the Town of Oyster Bay can play a major role in this venture just as they did in the Revolution. About 20 percent of the enlistments in the American Revolutionary Army were teenagers. Many others served as couriers in General Washington's intelligence service. While still in his teens, John Paul Jones commanded American ships of war.

Your Bicentennial Commission is therefore proposing that an advisory group comprised of student government leaders from all schools, public, private and parochial, be formed to evaluate and coordinate suggestions and to assist the Bicentennial Commission in fostering its goals and objectives.

We also ask for the participation and support of the student news media to generate an interest in this program and

give everyone the opportunity to participate.

Last year, many Oyster Bay Town students participated in our Bicentennial Emblem contest and the official emblem adopted by the Oyster Bay American Revolution Bicentennial Commission was designed by a Bethpage High School student.

This year, the Bicentennial Commission is sponsoring a photographic contest based on the theme "The American Heritage: Oyster Bay." Categories include historic sites, scenes, buildings or memorabilia associated with the American Revolutionary period. The contest is open to junior high, senior high and college age groups, including the graduate level. Prizes up to \$200 will be awarded for the best color and black and white scenes.

Again, we ask the help of our young Townspeople in increasing our knowledge of a rich national heritage to renew our vitality in facing and shaping our future.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE TOWN OF OYSTER BAY

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, County of Nassau, State of New York, that Chapter 5, known and designated as Boats and Boating, of the Code of Ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay, New York, be and the same is hereby deleted in its entirety, and that the following Chapter 5, known and designated as the Waterways Ordinance be substituted in place and stead thereof:

Chapter 5
WATERWAYS ORDINANCE

Art. I In General, §§5-1-5-15

Art. II. Use and Operation, §§5-16-5-54

Div. I Generally, §§5-16-5-47

Div. 2. Mooring and anchoring, §§5-48-5-54

Article I. In General

Sec. 5-1. Boating or swimming prohibited at certain locations.
It shall be unlawful to boat or swim at the following locations:

- Berkley Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- Cleveland Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- Franklin Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- Garfield Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- Harrison Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- Jackson Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- Jefferson Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- Jetmore Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- Lincoln Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- McKinley Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- Roosevelt Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.
- St. Mark's Place, at its dead end at Seaford Creek.

Sec. 5-2. Mooring of boats and other activities along St. Mark's Place.

(a) The mooring of boats, the landing of boats for passengers for hire, bathing, fishing and crabbing, are hereby prohibited upon that portion of the highway of the town known as St. Mark's Place, from Ocean Avenue, east to the bay.

(b) As used in this section "mooring" shall mean the fastening of a boat to any part of the highway and leaving the boat unattended by a person capable of operating it, for a period longer than necessary to load or unload passengers or freight.

(c) A violation of this section shall be deemed an offense and shall be punishable by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or imprisonment for not more than fifteen (15) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Such violation shall constitute disorderly conduct as an offense, and the violator shall be deemed a disorderly person.

Sec. 5-3. Mooring of boats and other water activities along Clocks Boulevard.

(a) The mooring of boats, the landing of boats for passengers for hire, bathing, fishing and crabbing, are hereby prohibited upon that portion of the highway of the town known as Clocks Boulevard from Lincoln Avenue, southerly to the bay.

(b) As used in this section "mooring" shall mean the fastening of a boat to any part of the highway and leaving the boat unattended by a person capable of operating it, for a period longer than necessary to load or unload passengers or freight.

(c) Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this section shall be subject and liable to a fine and penalty of not more than ten dollars (\$10.00) for each such violation. Secs. 5-4-5-15. Reserved.

Article II. Use and Operation
Division I. Generally

Sec. 5-16 Definitions.

As used in this article, the following terms shall have the meanings ascribed to them:
Anchor or anchoring shall mean the attachment of, or to attach, a vessel to the ground by means of tackle so designed that, when such attachment is terminated, the tackle in its entirety is removed from the ground and taken under the control of the vessel.

Boat or vessel includes every description of watercraft or other contrivance used on or capable of being used as a means of transportation in water and in air, and shall be deemed to include any airplane capable of landing on water.

Channel shall mean main channels and cross channels connecting with them as delineated by navigation aids placed by the United States Coast Guard or by the town.

Courtesy Permit shall mean a permit issued to a shipyard, yacht club, or yacht service organization or a municipality for a mooring anchor buoy for transient vessels, to wit, vessels permanently moored or docked elsewhere and requiring mooring facilities in Oyster Bay harbor for not more than a two (2) week period.

Harbor Master shall mean the Harbor Master of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Moor or mooring, when used as a verb, shall mean the attachment of, or to attach, a vessel to a pier or dock or other structure, or the attachment of, or to attach, a vessel to the ground by means of tackle so designed that, when such attachment is terminated, some portion of the tackle remains attached to the ground and is not taken under the control of the vessel.

Mooring Permit shall mean a permit issued to a person for a mooring anchor buoy for a specific vessel.

Owner shall include the person under whose name a vessel was last registered with the United States Coast Guard or with the Commissioner, Park and Recreation, State of New York, or documented, or, in the case of a non-resident, by a bureau in the state of his residency, and in any other case the last known owner, or the person who claims lawful possession of such vessel by virtue of legal title or equitable interest therein which entitles him to such possession.

Person shall mean any individual, firm, partnership, corporation, company, association, or organization.

Skin diving shall include any person swimming with the intent to explore or photograph in local waters or to hunt fish therein, including any person using any self-contained underwater breathing apparatus commonly known as an aqualung, but shall not include bonafide salvage or other commercial operations displaying proper signals.

Town Board shall mean the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York.

Town Board shall mean the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, Nassau County, New York, within the jurisdictional limits of the Town of Oyster Bay, or any waters over which the Town has any jurisdiction by agreement, operation of law, or otherwise.

Yacht Service shall mean any boat yard, yacht club or yacht service organization engaged in such service or fraternity within the limits of the Town of Oyster Bay.

Mooring anchor buoy shall mean any float together with an anchor and connecting lines of any material used to moor a vessel.

Sec. 5-17. Legislative findings.

It is hereby declared and found that water sports and the operation of boats in the waters or waterways of the town are matters affecting the public interest and consequently should be subject to the supervision and administrative control of town authority for the purpose of safeguarding the public.

Sec. 5-18. Territorial application of article.

The rules and regulations contained in this article, except when prohibited by the laws of the United States or the state, apply to all waters or waterways under control of the town, and such other municipalities as have delegated their authority to control waterways to the Town.

Sec. 5-19. Applicability of state and federal laws, compliance.

All boats or vessels operating within the waters of the Town shall comply with all applicable laws, rules and regulations of the State and Federal governments.

Sec. 5-20. Authority of the town board to promulgate rules and regulations; posting; approval of operation regulations.

(a) The town board is hereby granted the power to promulgate reasonable rules and regulations, from time to time, as it may determine for the administration and enforcement of this article, such regulations to be made public by posting in a conspicuous place in or about the boating and bathing areas, and filed with the superintendent of the division of beaches of the department of public works for inspection by users or interested persons during regular business hours.

(b) The town board is hereby authorized to adopt rules and regulations governing the operation of boats and vessels in the waterways under the control of the town, subject to obtaining the approval of the Commissioner, Parks and Recreation, State of New York or its successor agency.

Sec. 5-21. Authority of the town board to permit aquatic events.

Nothing contained in this article shall prohibit the town board from issuing special permits through

the superintendent of the beach division of the department of public works for aquatic events, boat races or otherwise under proper supervision and in limited areas for limited periods, after prior approval by the United States Coast Guard or the State of New York, as required.

Sec. 5-22. Reserved.

Sec. 5-23. Polluting waterways.

The dumping or discharging of marine toilets, sewage, oil, chemicals, refuse, garbage or wastes or any pollutant in any waters or waterways from any boat or vessel or dock facility or otherwise, is prohibited.

Sec. 5-24. Water skiing and similar activities: Observer required; night skiing prohibited; prohibited skiing locations.

(a) No person shall operate a boat for purposes of towing a person on water skis, a surfboard or similar device unless there is in such a boat a person over the age of ten (10) years, in addition to the operator, and in a position to observe the progress of the person being towed.

(b) No person shall ride on water skis, a surfboard or similar device, or use or operate a boat or vessel to tow a person thereon during the period from sunset to one (1) hour after sunrise.

(c) No person shall ride on water skis, a surfboard or similar device, or use or operate a boat or vessel to tow a person thereon in a marked channel or within 200 feet of the lifeline markers of any public or semi-public bathing area or public dock or mooring area or in other areas as so marked, or within 200 feet of any swimmer or bather, or within 200 feet from any channel.

Sec. 5-25. Careful operation.
Each person operating a boat or vessel shall at all times operate it in a careful manner, having regard of the existing hazards, both actual and potential, and at such rate of speed as not to endanger the property of another or the life or safety of any person, or so as to interfere with the free and proper use of the waterway by others.

Sec. 5-26. Maximum speed in certain locations.

(a) It shall be unlawful to operate a boat at a greater speed than five (5) miles per hour within two hundred (200) feet of the shoreline, a dock, raft, float, a moored vessel or channel system.

(b) A dead slow, no wake speed shall exist in any area used as a boat basin, marina, anchorage or mooring area.

Sec. 5-27. Dangerous wake.

No boat shall be operated in such a manner as to cause a wake which is dangerous to life or limb of a person or to other boats or other property.

Sec. 5-28. Operation while in an intoxicated condition: Prohibited; blood alcohol tests authorized; evidentiary value of tests.

No person shall operate a boat or vessel within the waters and waterways of the town while in an intoxicated condition. Upon the trial of any action or proceeding arising out of facts alleged to have been committed by any person arrested for operating a boat or vessel while in an intoxicated condition, the court may admit evidence of the amount of alcohol in the defendant's blood taken within two (2) hours of the time of his arrest, as shown by a medical or chemical analysis of his breath, blood, urine or saliva. For the purposes of this section:

(a) Evidence that there was, at the time of taking the sample, five-hundredths of one per centum (.05 percent), or less, by weight of alcohol in the defendant's blood is prima facie evidence that the defendant was not in an intoxicated condition.

(b) Evidence that there was, at the time of taking the sample, more than five-hundredths of one per centum (.05 percent) by weight of alcohol in the defendant's blood is relevant evidence, but it is not to be given prima facie effect in indicating whether or not the defendant was in an intoxicated condition.

(c) Evidence that there was, at the time of taking the sample, fifteen-hundredths of one per centum (.15 percent), or more, by weight of alcohol in the defendant's blood, may be admitted as prima facie evidence that the defendant was in an intoxicated condition.

Sec. 5-29. Skin diving: Prohibited diving locations; use of spear guns; warning flag.

(a) No skin diving shall be undertaken in any channel or in any waters where it may interfere with reasonable and proper operation of boats, or within two hundred (200) feet of any public or semi-public beach used for bathing and swimming, or within two hundred (200) feet of any person bathing or swimming within an area designated for bathing or swimming.

(b) No person shall use, operate or discharge underwater any spear gun or similar apparatus within two hundred (200) feet of any public or semi-public beach used for bathing or swimming or within two hundred (200) feet of any bather or swimmer.

(c) Any person engaged in skin diving shall maintain a visible red flag with a diagonal white bar on the boat or on the surface of the water in the area of the skin diving operations.

(d) No boat or vessel shall approach within a two hundred (200) foot radius of an area displaying a red flag with a diagonal white bar.

Sec. 5-30. Muffler required for internal combustion engines.

No person shall operate a boat propelled wholly or partly by an engine operated by gas, gasoline, naphtha, diesel oil or other fuel without having the exhaust from the engine run through a muffler or controlled by the introduction of water into the exhaust pipe or line.

Sec. 5-31. Town not liable for loss or theft.

The Town will not be responsible for loss, damage or theft to boats and or their contents or to any other private property.

Sec. 5-32. Hawkers and peddlers to obtain permission from town board prior to doing business from boats.

No person shall enter upon or engage in the business of selling, hawking, peddling or vending any property, article, produce, goods or thing, or otherwise engage in commercial activity from any boat, vessel or float on the waterways of the town without having first obtained permission of the Town Board through the Superintendent of the Beach Division of the Department of Public Works.

Sec. 5-33. Enforcement of article, right to stop boats.

The Harbor Master, Supervisor of Conservation and Waterways, Bay Constable, or any person duly authorized by the Town Board, or any member of the County Police Department is hereby empowered to enforce the provisions of this article and any such person shall have the right to stop any boat for the purpose of enforcing this article.

Sec. 5-34. Removal of boats, vessels or floats in violation of this article; cost.

Any boat, vessel or float moored in violation of any part of this article, or the rules and regulations adopted by the Town Board pursuant to this article, or any boat, vessel or float which sinks, grounds, or becomes otherwise disabled or becomes so located as to endanger life or property in any way or becomes a menace to navigation, shall be removed forthwith by the owner or person in charge thereof, on order of the Town Board or Harbor Master or agent thereof, or by the Nassau County Police Department. If said boat, vessel or float is not removed after notice to remove it, or if notice cannot reasonably be given after diligent effort is made to effect such notice, it may be removed by or at the direction of the

a) Town Board,

b) Harbor Master or agent thereof,

c) Nassau County Police Department

at the expense of the owner or person in charge of the boat, vessel or float, the expense of removal pursuant to this sub-section shall be recovered by civil suit, such expense to be in addition to such penalties as may be prescribed by or imposed under this code or other ordinances of the Town of Oyster Bay and the laws of the Town or the state, and the town or the county shall not be responsible for any damage that may occur to such boat, vessel or float in the course of removing it.

Sec. 5-35. Form of summons: court having jurisdiction of offenses under this article.

A summons issued and served pursuant to this article shall be returnable in the District Court of the County of Nassau, Fourth District, Oyster Bay and the form of the summons shall be substantially the same as the form of summons known as the "Uniform Navigation Summons" prescribed by the Commissioner of Parks and Recreation of the State, or in such form as may be prescribed by the commissioner of the county police department.

Sec. 5-36. Injunctive relief.

In addition to other remedies prescribed in this article, the town board may maintain an action or proceeding in the name of the town in a court of competent jurisdiction to compel compliance or to restrain by injunction the violation of this article, or rules and regulations promulgated hereunder by the Town Board.

Sec. 5-37. Penalty for violation of article.

A violation of this article, or rules and regulations promulgated hereunder by the Town Board, is hereby declared to be an offense and shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for a first offense; and by a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200.00) or imprisonment not exceeding fifteen (15) days or both such fine and imprisonment for a second or subsequent offense.

Division 2. Mooring and Anchoring

Sec. 5-48. Prohibited locations. (a) No person shall moor or anchor a boat in any channel and in no case shall any person moor or anchor a boat within fifty (5) feet of any channel marker or within two hundred (200) feet of any public beach...

Sec. 5-51. Authority of the Town Board to designate mooring areas. The Town Board may from time to time designate by ordinance the authorized mooring areas wherein the mooring or standing of boats shall be permitted as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 5-52. Anchoring and mooring Rules and Regulations for Oyster Bay Harbor. (a) It is the intent of these rules and regulations to implement the pattern established for the anchoring and mooring in the waters of Oyster Bay Harbor.

(b) A chart, duly adopted by the Town Board of the Town of Oyster Bay, showing anchoring areas in the waters of Oyster Bay Harbor is annexed hereto and is made a part hereof.

(c) A copy of this Ordinance shall be posted in a conspicuous place in or about the boating and bathing areas, an filed with the Superintendent of Beaches for inspection by licensees during regular business hours.

(d) The following procedures shall apply to the application for issue and use of Mooring and Courtesy permits.

1. No person or yacht service or other entity shall place a mooring anchor buoy in the waters of Oyster Bay Harbor designated on the mooring grid established by this Ordinance without having first obtained and having then in force a mooring or courtesy permit.

2. At any time, subsequent to the 15th day of March in each year, a person or yacht service may make written application to "Superintendent of Beaches, Attention: Harbor Master Town of Oyster Bay" upon forms to be furnished by the Harbor Master for a mooring permit or a courtesy permit.

3. A mooring permit shall be issued for the exclusive use of the permittee of a specific anchorage space therein designated for a specific vessel therein stated and such permit shall not be transferable to another person, or to another space, or to another vessel.

4. Courtesy permits may be issued for the use of a boat yard, yacht club or yacht service organization or municipality for anchorage spaces for transient vessels (to wit, vessels permanently moored or docked elsewhere and requiring mooring facilities in Oyster Bay Harbor for not more than a two (2) week period), upon the following terms and conditions:

(a) In no event shall the aggregate number of courtesy permits issued exceed five (5) percent of the total number of spaces for moorings shown on the grids established by this ordinance.

(b) In no event shall any one entity receive or use more than twenty (20) courtesy permits at any one time.

(c) Five (5) such permits may be issued to each such entity for each season on or before May 30 of such season. After May 30 and to the extent space is available and limited by subparagraphs (a) and (b) above, up to fifteen (15) additional courtesy permits may be issued each season to each such entity. Such permits shall not be cumulative from season to season.

5. A mooring permit shall become effective on the 1st day of April, or from date of issue, if application be made subsequent to the 1st day of April, and said permit shall terminate on the 31st day of December in each year, unless sooner suspended or revoked. A courtesy permit shall be effective from the date of issue to date of termination therein stated.

6. Subsequent to issuing a mooring permit the Harbor Master shall attach an anchorage area identification tag to the after half of the starboard side of the vessel for which the said permit is issued. The identification tag shall indicate the said permit number.

7. No person shall attach a vessel to an anchor mooring buoy unless an anchorage area identification tag has been attached to the vessel as required herein.

8. The issuance of a mooring permit shall not give a right of access across private property.

9. Each vessel anchored to a mooring buoy shall be anchored so that no part of the vessel shall, at any time, extend into a dredged or marked channel.

10. No anchor mooring buoy or courtesy anchoring buoy shall be placed or remain within any permitted space unless such buoy meets with the approval of the Harbor Master.

11. Each mooring, chain, line, pennant, anchor, cleat, bit, eye, chock, anchor mooring buoy and courtesy anchoring buoy etc., shall be inspected by the Harbor Master, or his designated representative and shall be determined to comply with these regulations before the mooring is placed in the harbor.

12. Each mooring found to be in compliance with these regulations will be marked by the Harbor Master with a permanent tag indicating mooring permit number and mooring weight.

(e) Mooring tackle shall meet the following minimum requirements:

1. Tabulation and Dimensions

Table with columns: Registered Boat Length-ft., Mushroom Anchor-lbs., Bottom Chain, Top Chain, Nylon Dacron Line, Chain, Stainless Steel Wire. Rows list specifications for various boat lengths from Under 16' to 76-100'.

2. The effective length of each of the above pennant lines shall be two times the distance from the bow chock to the water plus the distance from the bow chock to mooring cleat, or shall be two times the distance from the stem mooring ring to the water.

3. All anchor shackles, swivels and other hardware used in mooring hook-up shall be proportionate size to chains used. Minimum of one swivel shall be located between bottom chain and top chain. Chains of one size throughout shall have a minimum of one swivel located below main buoy not more than halfway to mushroom anchor.

4. Length of top chain shall be determined by the depth of the water in that area assigned and the total scope shall be 2-1/2 times the depth of the water at high tide as determined from local charts.

5. All pennant lines shall be nylon, dacron, chain or stainless steel wire. Each pennant line running through a chock or any other object where chafing may occur shall have adequate chafe guards.

(f) Mooring buoys shall meet the following minimum requirements:

1. An anchor mooring buoy or a courtesy anchoring buoy shall extend at least twelve (12) inches above the surface of the water.

2. An anchor mooring buoy or a courtesy anchoring buoy shall be white with a blue horizontal stripe

New County Program To Help Elderly

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso today announced the development of a new program to help the elderly citizens of Nassau County.

Caso said that through the cooperation of the Nassau County Department of Senior Citizen Affairs and the U.S. Internal Revenue Service, a corps of specially trained senior citizens has been made available to help other senior citizens with the preparation of their income tax form 1040 free of charge from March 12 through April 15.

"This is just another way that we are striving to help senior

citizens in Nassau," Caso said. "These specially trained volunteers will help many individuals, particularly those with limited incomes, those who cannot afford to have their returns prepared by tax consultants and accountants," he said.

Mrs. Adelaide Altard, the director of the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs, said that the volunteers would be made available under a program to be called VITA - Volunteer Income Tax Assistance. The volunteers will be on duty from 10 AM to 4 PM every Monday, Wednesday,

Thursday and Friday at the Carle Place office of the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs at 1 Old Country Road.

The volunteers will also be available in Freeport, Hempstead, Long Beach, Hewlett-Woodmere, Manhasset, Massapequa, Plainview, Rockville Centre, Seaford, Syosset, Valley Stream and Westbury.

above the water line. Each buoy shall also carry a stripe of white reflector tape or white reflector paint at least one inch in width, all around the uppermost part of the buoy.

3. An anchor mooring buoy or a courtesy anchoring buoy shall have the permit numbers painted thereon in black paint four (4) inches high, and, in addition thereto, a courtesy anchoring buoy shall have the weight of mushroom anchor clearly painted thereon in black paint two (2) inches high.

g) The following procedures shall apply to the termination of mooring and courtesy permits and to the removal of such moorings:

1. Unless an anchor buoy is placed in a space designated pursuant to a mooring or courtesy permit (thereof prior to Memorial Day) such permit shall automatically terminate, unless the time to so place such buoy has been extended in writing by the Harbor Master.

2. Unless used for a period of thirty (30) days between Memorial Day and Labor Day, mooring or courtesy permits shall automatically terminate, unless prior to such termination the Harbor Master grants an extension in writing to the permit holder after the latter's application in writing to the Harbor Master.

3. The Harbor Master may revoke in writing a permit at his discretion for a violation of any of these rules or regulations, or may, at his discretion, order in writing the anchor mooring buoy and attachments relocated to another position, in connection with the implementation of the anchoring and mooring pattern established in the waters of Oyster Bay Harbor.

4. Upon the termination, expiration or revocation of a mooring permit, or the ordering of the relocation thereof, an anchor mooring buoy and all attachments shall be removed or relocated by the person to whom the mooring permit has been issued. Upon the failure of such person to do so within 10 days after receipt of said notice, the Harbor Master may remove or cause same to be removed or relocated at the sole expense of such person.

5. Any vessel anchored or any mooring placed in violation of these Rules and Regulations may be removed by the Harbor Master or by the Marine Division of the Nassau County Police Department at the expense of the registered owner of the vessel. The expense of removal constitutes a maritime lien against the vessel and its mooring, and it may be proceeded against in rem for costs plus interest at the prevailing rate.

6. In specific situations where the immediate removal of a boat and the relocation of a mooring is required to prevent serious damage to surrounding boats or property, the Harbor Master may require that such relocation be completed.

7. A person whose application for a mooring permit hereunder has been denied or whose mooring permit has been revoked or suspended by the Harbor Master, or who has been ordered to relocate his mooring, shall comply within 10 days after receipt of such notice, or shall then be considered in violation of these Rules and Regulations and subject to the penalties prescribed by these Rules and Regulations.

Sec. 5-53 Supervision of mooring facilities. The location of mooring facilities, the use thereof, and the types of mooring shall be under the supervision of the Harbor Master, and regulated by the Town Board.

Sec. 5-54 Manner of mooring floats, supervision.

All floats shall be moored in such a way as to be secure at all times and under all conditions, and such mooring shall be subject to supervision by the Harbor Master.

Members Launch Committee

Under the guise of promoting employee health and safety, the federal government has started a new program that could destroy all private business in this country. With this trese warning, Mr. John Costello, a local member of the John Birch Society, today announced that the group was forming the Mid-Island "Nix On Osha" Committee, to expose and then defeat the federal Occupational Safety and Health Administration. "Our purpose is to show the public the

damage that is being done to business by OSHA, and to show businessmen what can be done to get this latest bureaucratic monstrosity repealed," Mr. Costello declared.

Although many Americans have never heard of OSHA, the Nix On Osha Committee contends that tens of thousands of businessmen across the United States have already felt its impact. According to the "Nix On Osha" Committee, OSHA Compliance Officers, armed with

a mountain of regulations and documents, can enter any firm or shop without a warning or a warrant, to inspect for violations of federal regulations. Businessmen are subjected to fines or imprisonment without a hearing or a trial, and OSHA even has the power to order their business closed.

The committee chairman pointed out, "OSHA officials act as the prosecutor, judge, and jury in each case. In the first six months of operation, OSHA Compliance officers visited some 9,300 businesses. Of these, over twenty-five percent were found guilty of violating some OSHA regulations. And OSHA officials admitted that the remaining companies could also have been found guilty of something if the OSHA officials had looked hard enough."

The Mid Island "Nix On Osha" Committee is planning to conduct an educational campaign about OSHA in the area, through literature distribution, public programs, and letter writing.
