"Hicksville Kiwanis Club News

The Kiwanis Club of Hicksville, a non-profit, community-service organization composed of local businessmen and professionals, recently received an annual progress report on their 11 year old Philippine foster son.

For more than two years, the Hicksville Kiwanis Club has provided financial support and assisted for the Philippine family of Esperdion Tomas. The Foster Parents Plan foundation which supervises the distribution of funds to this family reported that this youngster is a very active boy, in good health, and a member of the boy scouts. He presently attends a government school and is in the sixth grade.

Life today in the Philippines for the Tomas family is still extremely hard and full of difficulties. Esperdion is the oldest child in the Tomas family. He has four other brothers and sisters and his father is "suffering from a lung ailment and cannot regularly work for a living." Mrs. Tomas engages in laundry work and receives 50 cents a day. Without the regular financial support of the Hicksville Kiwanis Club, her earnings alone would be insufficient to keep the family fed and alive. The Tomas family



cannot afford their own house, so they share a small house with some relatives.

As a result of Hicksville Kiwanis' regular monetary contributions, the Foster Parents Plan foundation can provide adequate medical attention for the Tomas family through its own medical clinic. A Consumers

Cooperative store has also been established by the foundation to provide household commodities to families like Tomas at very low cost.

The Kiwanis Club of Hicksville will continue to help those individuals and families within and also outside its community who possess troubles, hardships, and problems too difficult to resolve totally on their own.

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Rezoning Sought In Hicksville & Plainview

Town Hall was virtually empty on Tuesday for the regular meeting, however there were a few people present to speak out in relation to two rezoning petitions in Hicksville and Plainview, asking for a change from Residence D to business zones.

Three persons spoke in opposition to the petition of Charles & Elizabeth Orlando for a change of zone to Business F District for their house and adjacent lots fronting on Cedar Street, one block south of Old Country Road with a corner parcel and residence on South Oyster Bay Road.

During the course of an hour-long presentation, Edward Schroeder, attorney for the petitioner and S.L.H. Fink, of Bethpage, a real estate expert, brought out that the rezoning was sought so that the residence on the corner of South Oyster Bay Road might be used for an insurance and real estate office.

Those who spoke were residents of Rose Street, one block south of Cedar, whose lots a but the subject parcels at the rear, and one who lives on the south side of Rose Street.

Earl Bowne took the trouble to come to the hearing to negate his wife's signature on a petition which had been circulated by Mrs. Orlando. He said he and his wife had been given to believe that only the residence and corner parcel were involved, not the adjacent lots which bring the total frontage on Cedar Street to

about 264 feet.

Dorothy Seaman, of 7 Rose Street, said "It is very difficult to hear Mr. Fink refer to our homes as 'old homes.' We keep our properties well. The only property which is not kept well is the Orlando's."

Mrs. Seaman pointed out that many stores in the vicinity are empty, and expressed the opinion that no more business zoning was needed in the community.

Mrs. Janet Vincente, of 4 Rose Street, also spoke in opposition

Business G Wanted

Only one person, Jacqueline Samoleski, spoke in opposition to the petition of John W. Merenda for a change of zone from Residence D to Business G for corner parcel fronting 129 feet on Old Country Road and 88 feet on East Avenue in Plainview.

According to John Coffey, attorney for the petitioner, Mr. Merenda proposes to erect a \$60,000 model home on the corner for the purpose of property sales in Arizona and New Mexico by the Horizon Corporation. He showed an illustration of the hacienda-style house.

Questioned about the request for Business G rather than F, which would allow the proposed use, Mr. Coffey said the zoning classification was sought to make this parcel uniform with the two parcels east of it on Old Country Road, both also owned by Merenda and presently occupied

by the Havendale Real Estate office and a cemetery monument company.

Merenda also owns property directly across from the subject parcel on the eastern corner of Underhill and Old Country Road. The latter parcel was the subject of a petition to erect an office building which was opposed by neighbors and later denied by the Town Board.

Historic Moment

What observers called "an historic moment" was observed by the Board when Supervisor John Burke expressed approval for a resolution proposed by Councilman Lewis Yevoli, the Board's only democrat, to support the week-long meat boycott scheduled to begin on April 1st.

Mr. Yevoli criticized Virginia Knauer, the president's advisor on consumer affairs, for suggesting that Americans start eating inwards, like tripe, and kidneys as standard meat prices increased.

"Marie Antoinette said 'Let them eat cake' when the people of Paris were starving," he said. "Mrs. Knauer says, 'Let them eat lungs.'"

Help-Aid-Direction (H.A.D.), Hicksville's own youth counseling and drug abuse prevention center, appeals to the residents of the Hicksville area for temporary housing for homeless youth.

H.A.D. provides individual and group counseling services for more than eighty youth and parents each week at its new storefront facility located at 389 New South Road, Hicksville. The H.A.D. staff sees the need for temporary homes for many youth that they presently counsel. These teenagers have undergone very emotional conflicts within their own families and need to live in homes where they can feel comfortable and accepted.

H.A.D. appeals to the residents of the Hicksville community for

help. H.A.D. hopes that concerned and interested adults will volunteer to open their homes up for placement of homeless youth until more permanent arrangements can be made.

These youth will be carefully screened before placement in any resident's home. While these youth live in temporary homes, they will continue to receive individual and group counseling services from H.A.D. staff and outside professionals. Eventually, H.A.D. hopes to either return these youngsters to their own families, place them in permanent foster homes, or help them secure jobs, independence, and their own apartments.

Any interested resident should contact Mr. John Maniac, H.A.D.'s Program Director, at WE 3-6858 or visit H.A.D.'s facility at 389 New South Road, Hicksville, anytime Monday through Friday, 2 p.m.-11 p.m., Saturday, 3 p.m. to 11 p.m. Individuals interested in opening up their own homes to these homeless youngsters will then be interviewed by H.A.D. staff to determine their compatibility to the teenagers needing temporary homes.

There is a tremendous need for temporary housing. H.A.D. hopes that kind-hearted, sympathetic adults in Hicksville will share their love and homes with these troubled youth.

Bicycle Jubilee April 14

New York State Commissioner of Parks and Recreation Alexander Aldrich and A. Holly Patterson, Chairman of the Long Island State Park and Recreation Commission, announced that because of tremendous interest and popular demand a second Bicycle Jubilee will be held on Saturday, April 14.

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Kingston Asks Higher Education Benefits For War Veterans

A bill that would boost the dollar value of state regents scholarships for war veterans was introduced today by Assembly Majority Leader John E. Kingston, (R-Westbury).

Under the bill the maximum award allowed would go from three hundred and fifty dollars to five hundred dollars per semester and the total aggregate from fourteen hundred to four thousand dollars.

Kingston explained that legislative intent in providing war service scholarships would be thwarted if the amount allowed is not increased to meet

the rising cost of education.

"Three hundred fifty dollars per semester is an outdated figure that does not reflect the true cost of education in 1973. The bill was prepared by the State Education Department at our request to bring the figure more in line with reality," Kingston said.

The awards are available to state veterans attending school on a full time or part time basis. The higher figures would begin July 1, 1973 if the measure is approved and signed into law during the current session.

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Celebrates 55th Anniversary

An eight - room house, built, painted and completed for occupancy for \$1,700, or a six - room bungalow for \$725, were offered in the early World War I Era, at about the time Long Island National Bank was founded in Hicksville.

To recall the life - styles, economy, social habits and fashions of the years when Long Island National Bank first came on the scene, the bank, in connection with its 55th Anniversary celebration, will distribute replicas of the 1184 - page 1908 Sears Roebuck Catalogue free to all persons opening new accounts of \$100 or more.

James C. Dinkelacker, president of the independent bank with 11 offices in Nassau and Suffolk Counties, said the catalogue, presented as a \$6.95 collector's edition entitled a "Treasured Replica from the Archives of History", will be offered as a gift, March 30th thru April 18th, to all new depositors of \$100 or more, at any of the bank's offices.

"For the youngsters the catalogue will be a revelation of a time when the dollar was worth 100 cents. For the oldsters, it will be an exercise in nostalgia that will bring sight of the good old days," Mr. Dinkelacker explained. "If a young new depositor isn't ready for the catalogue, we'll give him or her a musical bunny".

He scanned through the highly-illustrated pages containing 20,000 consumer items, offering dining room chairs for 64 cents; "mouse proof" pianos for \$87; and 20 - cent socks that were "insured to wear for six months."

At the time Long Island National was founded, a budding Long Island folk music group could have gone into business for less than 15, the total expenditure for two guitars and a drum. A more sedate orchestra would have had to spend more to do justice to Brahms or Beethoven but could have

acquired a piano, a "Stradivarius model" violin, and a clarinet for less than \$125.

There's an abundance of

chuckles in the thousands of illustrations in the catalogue. A professional "moving picture" projector (no price listed) that looks more complicated and massive than any Rube Goldberg invention, was touted as "just the thing for starting a movie theater in a vacant store". The catalogue also asserts, "after all-the 5-cent theater is here to stay!"


At least for one item, men's shoes, time marches backward. The catalogue offers a low - cut boot that looks remarkably like the type merchandised today. However, for all of \$2.50 a pair, you could buy the boot in "genuine Australian Kangaroo, made expressly for tender feet with soles cut from the very best leather and fitted with the best lining."

Pants suits in those days existed only for men and for \$10.65 the Long Island boulevardier could get a "made - to - order" Edwardian worsted - weave suit good the year - round that he would have had to pay "at least \$15 elsewhere." The cane was extra, of course.

For the college student, there was a 2.173 - page Webster dictionary for \$4.84 and for about \$2 more he could get it in "genuine Morocco leather and stamped in gold." A young lady interested in a bookkeeping career could spend \$4.89 for a six-month course in "double - entry" bookkeeping.

As for groceries, prices were enough to make today's harried housewife grind her teeth in envy. The best coffee was listed at 19 cents a pound while six cans of good salmon cost 69 cents and six cans of shrimp went for 59 cents. For 2 cents she could buy a stove lid lifter and for 4 cents, a handy potato masher.

No doubt about it - those were the days when Long Island National Bank was founded, the Sears Catalogue brings them back for hours of ambivalence - sadness because of the contemporary high prices, and gladness over the vast progress society has made since the horse and buggy days of more than a half - century ago.

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Common Cause President Visits Long Island

Jack Conway, president of Common Cause, the national citizens lobby, spoke to seventy-five members of the steering committee of the Nassau-Suffolk Common Cause Region. Klavens of Plainview, temporary chairman of the Nassau-Suffolk organization, introduced Mr. Conway at the March meeting and discussed the progress in organizing the 4000 members of Common Cause who live on Long Island.

Mr. Conway discussed the organization and goals of Common Cause from the beginning two years ago when John Gardner, founding father and present Chairman, stated that "Everyone is organized but the people," and proceeded to build an organization to lobby for the people.

This national citizens lobby now has well over 200,000 members and new member activity has had a remarkable surge since the first of the year with membership growing at a rate of five to six hundred a day, according to Conway. A new \$7 youth membership for persons up to 25 years of age has added three to four thousand since January.

Mr. Conway discussed the role of Common Cause in regard to the campaign finance law, by first pressuring Congress to adopt it and the resulting task of monitoring reported contributions. "We have files on campaign contributions that exist... nowhere else in the country. We can now connect campaign contributions and political favors," stated Conway. He went on to say, in light of its

experience with campaign contributions, that Common Cause now feels there must be a definite limit on contributions in this country as well as supported air time available equally to all, and the need for a shorter campaign period with debates made possible. Common Cause also feels that the campaign finance law should be extended to state and local levels.

Conway said that Common Cause will continue with its Congressional reform program even though there have been some breakthroughs in the areas of seniority rule and committee secrecy. There are two important areas that will have increased Common Cause attention: the erosion of the First Amendment and tax reform. According to Conway, "Common Cause will work towards closing tax loopholes. 34 tax loopholes account for approximately 50 billion dollars of lost tax revenue a year. Common Cause feels any recaptured revenue should be returned to the people in the most direct form possible — through reduction of the payroll tax." He went on to say that the apparent 12 billion dollar deficit in the current budget is in reality a 27 billion dollar deficit. The 15 billion income cover-up is coming from the people who are overpaying their social security tax by that amount.

Of particular interest to Long Island members is the current Common Cause effort to "Bust the Trust." In this effort, according to Conway, Common Cause is one of many civic organizations trying to convince

Congress to divert funds from the Highway Trust into mass transit needs. A vote on this issue may come up in April and Conway urged all present to be sure to find out where their Congressman stands.

The organizational basis for Common Cause is the Congressional District and at present 228 out of 435 are organized, according to Conway. An organized Congressional District is one where all members can be quickly contacted through a telephone network and informed of pending votes on legislation in which Common Cause is interested. The National Board of Governors determines the priority of interests based on responses to questionnaires sent to all members. At present the national board consists of 40 members elected by the nation wide membership from the membership. Common Cause is now beginning to organize at state levels, according to Conway, with Policy Advisory Committees making policy decisions at state and regional levels.

Murray Klavens closed the meeting with the reminder that all present should continue to inform their friends of the information available through Common Cause, stating that an informed constituency is the best assurance of wise representation in Congress. 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Increased Activity At The Powell

Sunny days and drying soil at Old Bethpage village restoration will bring increased activity around the Powell Farm. During the spring months the fields and gardens are plowed and harrowed, the various crops and vegetables must be planted and pasture fences mended in anticipation of grazing livestock on lush grasses.

The farm is operated much as it was when Richard Powell and his family and hired hands worked it in 1850. The farm primarily used man and animal power. It was this type of operation that helped produce food for the rapidly growing nineteenth Century New York City.

Today the plowing and harrowing are again done with horses and seeding, planting and cultivating depend on hand methods. The spring field work

requires deliberate on-the-spot decisions to outguess the weather and to work with the soil.

This work must be coordinated with necessary daily chores which always accompany animals. The Powell farmers expect to be plowing for oats as soon as the soil dries enough for proper tillage.

The farmers are training a set of two year old steers as a working team of oxen, and a goal is expected from one of the working mares this spring. Old Bethpage village restoration, operated by the Nassau County Department of Recreation and Parks, is a pre-Civil War farming community located on Round Swamp Road, Old Bethpage, exit 48 on the Long Island Expressway. Visitation fees are \$1.50 for adults and \$.75 for children.

From 10am - 3pm there will be an open market. From 3pm - 5pm there will be an auction. All members and friends are invited. Refreshments will be available.

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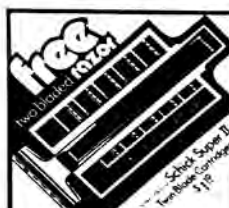
