Her primary occupation is that of Mathematics Instructor and Public Relations Consultant. She is a Child Care Specialist, presently serving on N.O.W.'s Child Care Task Force and member of the Committee for Universal Child Care. Ms.

Zimmerman has testified at City Planning and Child Care hearings; led the Child Care workshop at the Queens College Conference; participated at the New York State Legislative Conference, Nov. 1971 and submitted the Position Paper for Child Care. She is an active advocate for Child Care Expense tax reduction.

It was a long school board meeting last Thursday and a great deal of time was spent discussing various issues. However, much of the discussion does not seem to this reporter, to warrant repetition. Some major decisions were reached, most of these on items which have appeared before the board for several meetings.

The board set Wednesday, June 12 as the budget voting date. Mr. Clark abstained on this motion, Mr. Zindulka voted no, the remaining members voted yes.

The library vote was scheduled for Tuesday, May 1. Trustees Bello, Pappas and Bruno voted against this motion, stating they did not feel the library should have a separate vote. This is allowed by state education law, however.

The board approved, 5-2, the recommendation for restaffing at the Junior and Senior High Schools. Messrs. McCormack and Bruno voted against the motion. They felt the assistant principals should be replaced at each school and the recommendation did not call for this. The proposal does give recognition to those teachers who have been functioning as department chairmen in areas which do not have these specific positions designated. The reorganization also will provide for attendance officers and grade advisors.

Mr. Bruno's motion to abandon individualized instruction, modeled on Project

PLAN, passed, 4-3. Trustees Bello, McCormack and Pirrung voted against the motion. Mr. Zindulka stated that the motion seeks to "eliminate individualized instruction's organizational form but doesn't preclude individualization" in the classrooms.

Recommended changes in clerical staffing of the schools was tabled.

The board approved a calendar for the 1973-74 school year. School will open September 5 and the last day will be June 24. School will be closed the following days: September 27 and 28, October 8 and 22, November 6, 22 and 23, December 24 through January 1, February 11 and 12, 18 and 19, April 8 through 19 (April 9 and 10 are "snow days").

May 23 and 27 (the 23rd is a conference day—teachers attend, students do not).

Mr. Bruno attempted to close all district buildings April 17 and 18 (this year), allowing the custodial and clerical staff to be off the first two days of Passover. There was no second to his motion. His subsequent motion that administration draw up a clear policy on "snow days" passed unanimously.

Mr. Bruno's motion to eliminate all elementary school assistant principals, as of June 30, (except the one with seniority) was defeated by a tie vote the first time around. Mr. McCormack had to leave the

meeting early and was not present for this action. Trustees Zindulka, Pappas and Bruno voted for the elimination. Mr. Clark then moved to accept the superintendent's recommendation, setting a ratio of one assistant principal for 750 students in a school and eliminating the assistant principals through attrition. This was defeated 4-2—voting yes: Pirrung, Clark; voting no: Zindulka, Bello, Pappas and Bruno. Mr. Bruno reintroduced his original motion and it passed 4-3. Mr. Bello voting with the majority this time. This action eliminated all elementary assistant principals (except Mr. Penque at Lee Avenue School), effective the end of the school year.

At this point in the meeting, Mr. Bruno had to leave. It was now 11:50 p.m. and page one of the agenda had been completed (with two items tabled and four others deferred until a later date.) During the next hour, the board finished the remaining three pages of the agenda.

The board approved bills for routine expenses of the district, awarded bids and approved various personnel appointments, curriculum items new to the district and tenure recommendations. Also approved with the Title I, federally funded, summer school at the Junior High.

The next school board meeting is Friday, April 13 at 8 P.M. in the Administration Building.

## "Fire Report"

Eighteen Alarms were received during the period March 22 thru April 2nd. Two of the alarms were malicious false alarms, six rescue calls, and 10 fire calls.

Hicksville firemen made quick work of a smoky blaze in the tunnel at the Mid Island Plaza. The cause of the fire, which damaged some furniture, is under investigation. Firemen responded to the alarm on March 23rd at 1:00 P.M.

Firemen were called in to shut off an ammonia leak that

developed at the General Instrument Co. Plant at 600 W. John St. The tank line was shut down with no problems. The call was received on March 27th at 5:32 P.M.

Two house fires kept Hicksville vamps busy. The first one occurred on March 29 at 3:00 P.M. at 13 Marvin Ave. One fireman was injured fighting that blaze. One room in the attic was damaged by fire caused by a cigarette. Two rooms on the ground floor suffered some minor water damage. A smoky basement fire at 59

Fordham Ave. on March 30th at 2:53 P.M. caused minor damage. Although there was several minutes delay when an alarm box at Fordham and Croyned was pulled and failed to ring in at fire hq on Marie St, the fire was then called in by phone. Repair crews were called into locate the problem which knocked out a portion of Hicksville's 280 fire alarm boxes. Firemen managed to confine the fire to one area. Funny how those troublesome alarm boxes work perfect for a false alarm, but don't work for the real thing.

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## Bicycle Jubilee Set

New York State Commissioner of Parks and Recreation Alexander Aldrich and A. Holly Patterson, Chairman of the Long Island State Park and Recreation Commission, announced that because of tremendous interest and popular demand a second Bicycle Jubilee will be held on Saturday, April 14.

The Long Island State Parkway Police will again be hosts and directors of this event which once again will be held on the Wantagh State Parkway. The first Bicycle

Jubilee held in October of 1972 brought out in excess of 2500 cyclists, and it is anticipated that the event this spring will bring out more than double that figure.

The Wantagh State Parkway will be closed to vehicular traffic 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and bicycle enthusiasts will be permitted to ride from Merrick Road to Parking Field 5 at Jones Beach with no interference.

Additional details will be announced prior to April 14.

## EOC, Mitchel Field Occupy Supervisors

Another step toward completion of Mitchell Field's acreage was taken by the Nassau County Board of Supervisors on Monday, when they approved unanimously a resolution authorizing \$16,150,000, in serial bonds and \$850,000 in capital notes to finance the construction of a central reference library there.

The library is expected to cost \$12,000,000, to build and \$3,000,000, to equip, figures estimated by County Executive Ralph G. Caso. The library will be especially for use by students, businessmen and professionals, and is expected to open in 1975.

The Supervisors also approved bidding for signs and graphics for the Veteran's Memorial Coliseum at an estimated cost of \$10,000.

### EOC Head Speaks

In other business, the Supervisors heard an urgent plea from John Kearse, Executive Director

of the Economic Opportunity Commission for continuance of the Community Action Programs in about a dozen communities, offering youth services, drug prevention, English language lessons for Spanish speaking people and other services.

Federal allocation of \$1.3 million annually, which is scheduled to be cut off as of June 30th, amounts to one twentieth of all federal funds received by the county, Mr. Kearse said.

The county has already agreed to provide funds to continue CAP to December 31, 1973. It has not, however, agreed to provide funds to continue the Commission.

Although, he said, community action agencies were mandated legislation until June 30th, 1975, no funds were allocated for such agencies.

Instead, they are "moving forward with the force of a steam roller to assure that there will be no community action programs left by June 30, 1973," said Mr. Kearse.

In pleading for the Commission, he said, "The Commission is the only agency in Nassau County with the experience, expertise, and track record to continue these programs."

Programs referred to by Mr. Kearse under CAP's jurisdiction are in Hicksville, Hempstead, Manhasset, Great Neck, Westbury, Inwood, Long Beach, Port Washington, Roosevelt, Freeport and Elmont.

### PBA Chief

The chief of the Patrolmen Benevolent Association spoke, urging the county to intervene in the case of 128 men who wished to take tests for promotions in June, but who fall four days short of the required four years' service to take them. By 1974, the same test will require a two-year college education, which will disqualify most of these men, he said.

Caso said the Board would look into the situation.

## Over 200 Expected At GOP Youth Conference

Albany — More than 200 young people from throughout the State are expected to attend the first two day Republican Youth Conference in Albany next Sunday and Monday, April 8 and 9, George Van Riper of Spencer, Conference Chairman, announced today.

## Hicksville Celebrates A Birthday The 325th Anniversary of Robert William's Purchase

Editor's note: This is the first of several articles providing insight into Williams' life and contributions to mid-Nassau history.

As Hicksville community groups make plans with the Town of Oyster Bay American Revolution Bicentennial Commission to celebrate the 325th Anniversary of the Robert Williams' historic land purchase on May 20th, interest is being generated anew concerning this explorer and settler of Colonial America.

Robert Williams was one of the original proprietors of Hempstead, although not one of the first settlers, in 1643. Arriving on Long Island about 1645 from New England where he had emigrated from England or Wales (the records are obscure), Williams soon won a notable place in the

community.

Old records suggest that he was a successful carpenter and owned a herd of seven cattle. He was an enterprising man with a tendency to be involved in land transactions with the local Matinecock Indians. The research of such Long Island scholars as the late Nassau County Historian, Jesse Merritt, and the late Town of Oyster Bay Clerk, Edwin M. McQueen, as well as the studies of retired teacher, Gertrude Wetters, during the Tercentennial Celebration in Hicksville in 1948, indicate that Williams had the personality and ability for dealing with the Indians.

Historic records contained in the Robert Williams Plantation Book reveal that, by 1648, this enterprising leader was exploring the lands to the east of Hempstead's boundaries. What Williams saw there — broad

prairie land for cattle, wooded knolls to the east and north with ponds of fresh water — excited his imagination. Negotiations with Sachem (chief) Pugnapan, whose numerous Matinecock tribe populated the northern harbors and necks of Nassau, lead to a land purchase which is the recorded historical beginning of today's Hicksville and much of the communities of Jericho, Plainview and parts of Woodbury and Bethpage.

On May 20, 1648, at a point the Indians called Cantiaug (Cantiague) (under a notable oak landmark) where today's John Street and Cantiaug Rock Road meet in Hicksville, Williams bought about 5,000 acres, or nine square miles of plains and hilly woodland, for an unspecified quantity of English cloth, a material much prized by the Indians.

## Hicksville Library News

The Hicksville Public Library will submit the annual budget request for voter approval on May 1. The proposed budget of \$465,447.59 represents an increase of approximately

\$24,000.00 over the budget defeated last June 14. Since the 1972 defeat, the library has been operating on an austerity budget which has severely curtailed book purchasing and programs during 1972-73. The new budget, if approved, will enable the Hicksville Public Library to resume normal book purchasing and provide for the numerous other services that have long been a part of the library program for the community. The tax rate will be approximately 42.4 cents, a 4 cents increase over the proposed tax rate in 1972-73.

The Library Board decided to submit the budget for a separate vote in advance of the school budget vote because the Board wanted the voters to judge the library program separate from the public school program and budget. School and public libraries may have similar objectives, but they are separate institutions, separately governed and with important differences in function, methods and service.

The Board feels this is an eminently reasonable budget, costing the average family about \$20.00 a year to support a library which provides information, public education and recreation to citizens of all ages. The library has 185,000 volumes, one of the larger collections on Long Island. In order to maintain this

collection, however, a community the size of Hicksville needs to add 12,000 - 15,000 new volumes and replacement titles yearly. In 1972 due to the budget defeat and the fact that book costs have increased an average of 30 per cent, we were able to add less than 9,000 titles.

Registration dates are Wednesday, April 18, 12 noon to 8 p.m. and Saturday, April 21, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Conference Room of the Administration Building of the Hicksville Public Schools on Division Avenue. Vote on Tuesday, May 1, from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. at your local school.

If you have not voted or registered since 1971 you must register.

## Town Clerk Reminds Residents To Obtain Dog Licenses

Town Clerk Ann R. Ocker reminded residents today that all dog owners who have not purchased a license for their pets should do so immediately or run the risk of a heavy fine.

State law requires that all dog owners obtain a license by January 1 of each year," Mrs. Ocker explained. "Oyster Bay allows a certain amount of leeway, though, and a person is

not considered delinquent until after February 10.

Applications for licenses can be obtained in person or by mail at Town Hall on Audrey Avenue in Oyster Bay or at either of the Town Hall Annexes located on Broadway in Hicksville and on Grand Avenue in Massapequa. The cost is \$2.35 for males and spayed females and \$3.35 for an unspayed female.

"We are sending notices out to owners on our list who have not yet applied for their licenses," Mrs. Ocker said, "but there are many more people who do not appear on any list because they are new owners. If you have not applied for your dog license, I urge you to do so as soon as possible. Heavy fines are levied if a dog is caught without a license."

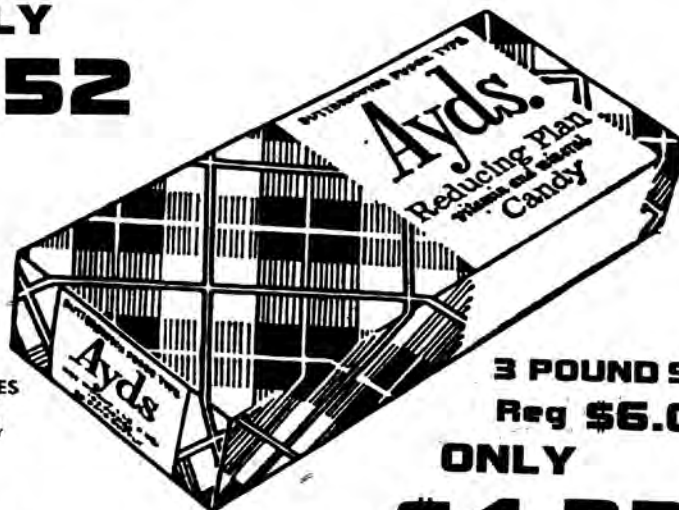

## Shuttle Sub-Contracts Awarded

Congressman Angelo D. Roncallo (R-Massapequa) announced from Washington that two Long Island firms are to build sub-assemblies for the NASA space shuttle.

It is estimated that during the life of the contracts, a total of 750 new jobs will be created by the two companies.

The sub-contracts, awarded by the prime NASA contractor, North American Rockwell Corporation of California go to Grumman Aerospace Corpora-

tion of Bethpage and Fairchild Republic Company of Farmingdale.

Grumman will receive \$40 million to build the space shuttle wing, while Fairchild Republic will build the vertical tail. Both firms are located in Roncallo's Long Island District.

"Once again the high quality of Long Island's contribution to our nation's aerospace and defense efforts has been recognized," Roncallo declared. "I am greatly pleased at the positive impact

that these contracts will have on the economy of the area," Roncallo concluded.

The space shuttle will be launched into space on top of a regular rocket and be able to maneuver in space with its own engine. On its return to Earth, conventional jet engines swing out and it can be flown like a regular airplane.

The shuttle can then be used again for additional trips into space.

Considering myself one of the responsible members of Life, I react to School Board Member Mr. Bruno's invitation to examine his revelations as follows.

Besides the implication that Mr. Bruno "deliberately missed the Feb. 19th Board meeting in order to duck the issue of the Xmas poem," the minutes of the previous Board meeting will confirm, as a matter of fact, his attempt to "duck the issue." In those minutes, he publicly proposed the hackneyed counter-part of another legislative act to balance another wrong, instead of utilizing existing, and in this case, effective State Education Law.

Whether or not the responsible teacher should have been "brought up on charges" was only a small part of the issue! Yes, our late, and highly respected school attorney did indicate the "doubtful legality" of an action against the responsible teacher! However, we must certainly, also, indicated that in order for the Board to legally have a "Hearing," charges must first be brought against the teacher!

The "Hearing" was then to be used as the only legal tool available to enable the Board to bring all responsible parties together in an effort to ascertain, and correct, the weaknesses of the school supervisory structure. After all, this teacher reportedly

distributed this objectionable poem on at least three occasions!

This is exactly what Mr. Thomas was concerned with, and not the severity of teacher-punishment, but certainly not the white-washing either!

I do not know what Mr. Bruno told "Life" President, Mr. Thomas. However, I do know from the many people that Mr. Bruno surveyed, (who had written letters to him objecting to the poem) that he completely agreed with their desires for effective deterrents and controls, yet Mr. Bruno failed to perform. Yes, Mr. Bruno incurred Mr. Thomas' displeasure, as he did mine, and may other people who had faith in him.
