Interference Charged by Union in Town Security

The Town of Oyster Bay's security protection came up again at Town Hall on Tuesday, when union organizer Ray Garcia charged that town officials had interfered with his attempts to organize employees of Smith & Wesson, who took over the security contract from the BI Group as of January 1st of this year.

Several weeks ago, Mr. Lewis, former BI Group Supervisor and later local Smith & Wesson supervisor until he was released from his duties, charged unfair labor practices against Smith & Wesson for having hired and subsequently fired several BI Group employees after getting the contract. Such firing was at the request of Town Attorney John Conroy, he said.

A copy of the letter from Mr. Conroy to Smith & Wesson asking that BI Group employees be "phased out" was distributed to

the press at that time. The employees had been hired, he said, on a pro tem basis by Smith & Wesson in order to fulfill the contract, which was awarded to the company on December 29th for a January 1st starting date, with no advance warning to hire personnel.

Mr. Lewis at the time charged that Smith & Wesson was the third lowest bidder for the contract. Mr. Conroy later said that the BI Group was found financially unstable at the time of awarding the contract, and also had some history of poor performance. He later said the company was deemed financially unstable because it evidently did not have sufficient funds to put up the bond required with the bid, using the check of another company.

Mr. Garcia, who represents Local 112 of the Security Watchmen and Allied Workers, said that he had been promised a meeting by Smith and Wesson, but later found out that the men

had been fired before contract discussions could begin. He said many of the men who had been fired had been rehired.

"What kind of company is this anyway?" he said. "They're operating out of somebody's house, they have no uniforms or cars." It was later said that Smith & Wesson had since moved into an office.

Job actions are going on now, he said, in the form of pickets at some town facilities and sick calls.

He protested that the town had put in "scabs" to replace the men. Supervisor Burke, who said he would arrange a meeting for Mr. Garcia with Mr. Conroy and the town's labor relations director, said he had nothing to do with the union's negotiations with Smith & Wesson. However, he said, it remains his duty to see that town facilities are protected. "We are paying for this contract in good faith for services to be rendered. Why should we be paying picketmen?" said the Supervisor.

Safety Reminder To Boat Owners

Town Supervisor John W. Burke issued his annual reminder to owners of inboard powerboats to exercise caution in preparing for the coming boating season.

Burke, a well known landlubber, said that under certain conditions the hydrogen gas given off by electric storage batteries can cause an explosion. "The result is damage to a boat or to the people on or near it," Burke said.

"When it comes to providing for the ventilation of closed spaces in auxiliary sailboats and powerboats the problem of hydrogen gas is frequently overlooked," Burke said. "Most conventional vent systems deal only with gasoline fumes, which are heavier than air and seek the

bilge spaces. On the other hand, hydrogen gas is lighter than air and seeks the upper levels."

Since many vent systems do not take this into account, Burke offered the following remedial suggestions in the interest of safety:

- Arrangements for engine air intake away from high closed spaces within the engine compartment.
- Wait as long as possible before installing a recently-charged battery in any boat.
- If boats are not equipped with vents for the upper spaces, such vents should be installed.
- Check the fluid level of the battery regularly since hydrogen gas can build up in the void space.
- When batteries are being

charged with an external charger, the engine room blower should be operated.

Since these safety suggestions deal mostly with hydrogen explosions initiated during engine operations, boatmen are cautioned that accidents can also happen while installing or inspecting batteries. As a further safety precaution, all switches for lights, ignition and accessories should be turned off when installing a battery. As it is important not to cause sparking when tightening battery connections, the "hot" lead should be connected before the ground.

These precautions apply equally to storage batteries for vehicles as well - but afloat, the hazards are greater than on the road.

Letters To The Editor

Dear Mrs. Noeth:

You were present last Thursday night at the Hicksville Community Council held at the library to hear Dr. Jones Niosi, Supt. of the Hicksville Public Schools (one of three important speakers) address a disappointingly small number of citizens about the proposed school budget. What he said disturbed me and I thought I perhaps could explore the content of what he said in your paper.

Dr. Niosi began his remarks by saying, "What happens in the schools affects everyone." He then proceeded to enumerate the budget items for next year wherein, after "searching scrutiny" by his staff and the elected board of trustees cutbacks could be effected to bring Hicksville's school costs more in line with its ability to pay. (In former years, Hicksville's school costs evidently far exceeded its ability to pay. — You only get what you pay for!) According to Dr. Niosi reductions in teaching staff by attrition would eliminate 30 positions, abandonment of the individualized instruction program "modeled on Project Place, elimination of all assistant principals (except the one at Lee Avenue) in the elementary schools, etc. would give Hicksville one of the lowest tax rates on L.I.

However, before we sit back and congratulate ourselves on our evident good fortune perhaps we should ponder further to determine how these cutbacks will indeed affect our community. (Incidentally, Dr. Niosi, when queried, gave no indication of new programs to replace the void created by these cutbacks, except the seeming shrug of the shoulder that "business would go on as usual.") There is a movement to cut back and retrench and re-examine many programs in health, education and welfare. Certainly the sad economic state of our business community with resulting losses of jobs has forced us to economize. However, I think at this point the question could be raised: Is Dr. Niosi in his zeal to reduce the budget, cutting out the very heart of an educational program that was once highly admired? Many people buy homes in a community just because of its educational system.

During his remarks Dr. Niosi referred to several men, evidently excellent educational leaders, who had taken positions of responsibility elsewhere. They had not been replaced. So, a further question could be asked: Does this trend mean our school system will be known as offering little advancement for gifted and innovative educators who will have to go elsewhere to move ahead? Will this condition fail to attract gifted teachers? Or can we expect that salary alone will be the motivation for teaching in Hicksville.

Further, although Dr. Niosi did not refer to what affect these proposed reductions have had on many concerned parents, let me state that many are depressed, I may be dead wrong but since coming into this community I have not noticed any evidence that parental thought and support is sought out at all. I have attended many board meetings but have yet heard any parental voices at all. A scant 15 minutes is given at the end of long and somewhat tedious meetings. Before coming to this community I had a position of leadership in a Queens public school PTA. The experience was often discouraging but as I look back it was exceedingly gratifying. Parents, through many demands, were given the chance to give briefs at public meetings

BEFORE issues were decided and they had to be consulted before supervisory staffing was hired. Recently, I received a letter from the principal of this school saying, "You should be proud that you were part of the PTA ex. com. that initiated the movement to be involved in the upgrading of education at our school. You (along with others) were instrumental in assisting me to implement many of our new programs. I shall always be indebted to this group of parents for their great involvement." This happened under the much-maligned decentralization in New York City. I have been impressed that at public meetings God's divine counsel is sought. Prayer never opened any of our meetings. However, after the prayer and salute setting the tone for public school board meetings there is still bitter and rude conduct between board members. All of us owe a debt of gratitude to these men who devote so much time and sheer physical energy to unpaid jobs. But long hours of effort mean nothing if we cannot see that the educational leaders of our community are striving for a higher standard of excellence not personal vendettas.

Mr. Thomas Clark, President of the board, appeared for questioning later in the evening. I may be wrong but it appeared that the board had many doubts as to where it was going. Upon questioning Mr. Clark said the archaic and ludicrous film PHOEBE had been removed from the curriculum. However, here again, a void remains. It was the consensus of our board members sex should be taught at home. This is the idealistic hope. But with many grownups perplexed and adopting life styles far different from a few years ago, with VD and teenager pregnancy, a divorce rate at 1-4, can we expect that any modern educational system will not offer instruction in such an important matter. If parents do resist it, then offer it as an elective or as an adult education course.

I may be wrong but now is the time to use all our available and certainly considerable educational resources built up over a long period of time to meet the demands of this world. Certainly parents can demand their children learn the basic skills of reading, writing and math. But they must know what is going on, too. Perhaps your paper could call upon leaders to express their views on this most important issue that does affect us all.

The Library Budget will appear before us for a vote on May 1, 1973. How many of us have taken the time to appraise it before we set out to cast our vote — not many I am sure. When the Library held an open meeting on the budget, only five interested citizens attended. Certainly this was the time to ask our questions, to satisfy ourselves as to the necessity of items appearing in the budget. True, we also felt different about the allocation of certain items that we personally did not deem necessary — but to those using these services, they are very important. We must remember that the Library is serving the needs of all the people of Hicksville — that it is there for YOU!

How many people of Hicksville realize that we, the parents of Pre-School children in the District are vividly aware of what the lack of a passing budget

meant to us last year. How many people realize that in the year 1971 there were three pre-school story hours for children ages 3 to 5 in our District and this involved approximately 90 children. These story hours ran from October through May. It was not necessary to hold a restricted registration — all the children appearing were made a part of this program. Due to the lack of a passing budget, the Library was unable to replace a part-time professional librarian in the Children's Room who, among her other duties, held these story hours. Therefore, it was necessary to limit the registration this year. Children could only attend for a ten week session and only if they made one of the two registration lists — my child was lucky — she made the second. But what of the others? Should they not have the same rights as mine? Are they not children who need these Story Hours to introduce them to the wonderful world of books? Do we fail to realize that this is an important educational tool available to our children? I have seen my child grow with this program. I have seen her miss the first ten weeks and cry, yes, cry, because she could not attend her "Library School... Make this available once again to all the children of the District for the entire school year. If for no other reason but this, vote YES for the Library Budget on May 1.

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Robert Williams' Indian Land Deed Important Early Nassau Record

Editor's Note: This is the second of three articles tracing the historic importance of Robert Williams' Purchase, the subject of a 325th Anniversary Celebration in Hicksville, this May 20.

Robert Williams' purchase in 1648 of what are now considered the Central Nassau communities, is an historic and instructive event. It is historic for being the earliest recorded event in the communities of Hicksville, Jericho, Woodbury, Plainview and Bethpage. It also conveys to modern viewers much information about our 17th century forebears.

It tells us, for example, that Williams was determined to adhere to sound English custom regarding land transactions. He prepared a written document setting forth the physical features of the land in which he was interested and transferring ownership from Sachem Pugnapan and his people to "Robert Williams of Himstead" (sic). The land deed was properly signed and witnessed by two of Williams' Hempstead neighbors and eight Indians, all of the latter "making their marks" after Williams had set down the Indians' names phonetically.

One learns from this early Long Island document that terrain features instead of mathematically surveyed distances established property boundaries. It is seen that the local tribe of Indians were Malinecks and that the leader's name was Pugnapan. Mentions made that the Englishman gave "trading cloth" for the Indian's land.

The Europeans' concept of land

ownership is explicit enough in Williams' text that Pugnapan and his people were bargaining, selling and making over to the settlers and their heirs and successors perpetual ownership of the territory. Unfortunately for Pugnapan, he was unable to convey to Williams that, by the customs of his people, a sachem was not able to "sell" or even give away for another's permanent possession the lands provided by the Manitou (Great Spirit).

Pugnapan, acting with the Indian's traditional generosity, assumed that the settlers wanted to use the land temporarily, for hunting or fishing. In this misunderstanding of customs were planted the seeds of future disillusionment and enmity.

However, it is not wise to employ the hindsight provided by countless Wounded Knees to demean Williams' land deed or to bemoan the ignorance of Sachem Pugnapan. History records that they were men of their time and worthy examples of their races. Both came away from the Catiague land purchase site convinced that he had "given generously what the other fellow wanted" and congratulating himself on a fair and profitable bargain.

Be it knowne to all men at these presents that I pugnapan Sachem of Motinnacok do for my Selfe and in the beehalfe of Nanamorous and Neponhew and pocipupon bargain and Sell and make over unto Robert Williams of Himstead parte of the grete pleains lying northeast from hemsted or there abouts beginning at A pointe of Tres

Called by the Indianas Ciscascate or Catiague at Awht ouke marked by me pugnapan and from thence upon a South line to the Middel of the plaine and from thence uppone A. Est line to the End of the plaine bounded with the Wodes one the Este and Northeste and North or there aboutes all which tract of Lande I the sayed Pugnapan do for Miselle and In beehalfe of Nanamorous and Neponhew and pocipupon bargain Sell and make over, unto the Sayed Robert Williams his Ares Executors administrators and Asines for tene (them) pesaibly to ingay forever from us our ares and Sucksessors for ever also wee the boue Sayed do acknowledge that we have Reseved fülle Satisfacktion of Roberte Williams in Trading Cloth for the fore menchaned Tract of Plaine Lan in witness hereunto wee have Set ouer handes this twentith day of May in the Yere of one Thousand Six Hundred forty Eight.

New "Survival" Swimming Program For 2nd Level Youngsters

With the summer months approaching, a new 6 week aquatic "survival" program is being offered at the Plainview-Old Bethpage High School pool here for 2nd level students.

According to Mr. Louis I. Flego, Director of the District's Recreation Program, "the main objective of the new course will be to learn survival techniques, such as treading water and floating". At the same time, he continued, we want the youngsters to enjoy the water program safely, and to build confidence in their ability to handle themselves in the water. - 12. Registration fee is \$10.00. Mr. Flego said that this was the first time the district was offering the aquatic program to 2nd level students. Previous classes had been cut-off at 3rd level, but there had been so many requests to extend the classes to 2nd level youngsters, he noted, that we are trying this new approach, which we feel will be well received.
