School Board Ready, But Crowd Doesn't Show

Many parents had voiced their dissatisfaction with the elimination of elementary assistant principals and the discontinuance of individualized instruction, modeled after Project PLAN. They had been expected at Friday's board meeting, which was held in the High School Auditorium to accommodate the crowd. But no crowd appeared and only two people brought up the matter during the public session—both asking for the reinstatement of four elementary assistant principals.

The school board approved the legal wording of the budget referendum, but did not, as yet, set any figure for the June 13 vote.

The Board of education approved Junior and Senior High curricula for English, Math, Social Science, Foreign Language and Science. Mr. Bruno voted against the motion, stating the material should be studied more thoroughly and checked to see if there is any roleplay included in it.

A request from one of the supervisors for a reduction in summer work and pay, was tabled. According to the Administrators' Council principals, assistant principals, supervisors and department chairmen, extra work is scheduled for the summer for these personnel. There is some disagreement over the pay schedule for the extra month of work. There is also some question as to what work would be done. Mr. Pirrung pointed out that it's a

dangerous precedent to negotiate with one individual of a group. This matter will be discussed again at a later date.

The board approved bids for audio visual equipment for all schools. They again tabled clerical staffing patterns, the appointment of media aides and the discussion of responsibilities and public duties of the district clerk.

The board approved Mr. Bello's motion to direct Donald Abt, our professional consultant, to develop a system of accountability (with accompanying penalties) for all personnel.

Mr. Pirrung suggested an advisory committee, composed of three board members, who would meet periodically with employee and student groups for discussions.

The board approved Mr. Bruno's motion to close all school offices April 17 and 18. However, his motion to increase the hourly salary for lay help at the secondary schools by 20 cents, with 3 1/4 hours work and a reasonable coffee break, failed. The motion was tied, 3:3 eyes: Bello, Pappas and Bruno, no: Zindulak, Pirrung and Clark. Mr. McCormack was not at Friday's meeting.

Mr. Bruno also moved that the board abide by the superintendent's contract and role back the \$200 increase in salary he was granted last summer. There was no second to this motion.

The board directed Mr. Becker, supervisor of buildings and grounds, to consult with the Town of Oyster Bay electrical supervisor to see what is involved in increasing the lighting at Dutch Lake School. The board has

received many complaints about groups of young people "hanging around" in this area.

The board approved the library's use of the district addressograph to mail out information for its May 1 budget vote. All costs will be paid by the library. The board also approved new audio visual material for social studies, requests for maternity and sabbatical leaves payroll and routine expenses of the district.

Also approved was the redesignation of position for the supervisor of athletics and health, Mr. A. Tomaini. His title is now District Director of the same department. With this change, Mr. Tomaini is no longer part of the Administrators' Council bargaining unit and does not retain his tenure. The board directed the school attorney to explore contract possibilities with Mr. Tomaini.

Administration was directed to review the need for a reading supervisor and have the report by the next board meeting.

The board tabled a suggested policy on "snow days" which states these days "shall not conflict with religious or national holidays and if unused, shall be considered regular days of instruction."

The board approved a recommendation to include summer elementary and high school as a contingency item on the 1973-74 budget. Junior High summer school had previously been approved, as part of a Title I, federally funded program.

The next school board meeting is Thursday, April 26 at 8 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Career Day April 26

A group of more than 100 youths, recruited from all over Nassau County, is poised to take over Nassau County on April 26.

There's no revolution in the air, however. It's just the annual observance of Career Day in Nassau County, the day on which student leaders substitute for County officials and "run" the government at least for a few hours.

Sponsored by the Nassau County Boys and Girls Week Committee, headed by attorney James N. MacLean and Jericho Schools Superintendent David Nydick, Career Day is an opportunity for students to observe the workings of government first hand and to take a stab at running the whole show.

A highlight of the day will be a mock meeting of the Nassau Board of Supervisors beginning at 9 a.m. The students will consider a seven-item agenda running the gamut from construction of storm water drains to disposition of surplus moneys from dog license fees.

The Boys and Girls Week Committee invited every high school in Nassau County to send

one boy and one girl from 12th grade and one student from 11th grade—all honor students—to take part in Career Day.

Following the mock board meeting the students will move on to a department of the county in which they are most interested and observe and participate in the daily workings of government.

At noon the students will convene in the Nassau Supreme Court Building, for a seminar on the justice system in Nassau, to be presided by Justice Mario Pitoni.

Seminar panelists will include Frank, Altamari, administrative judge of the Nassau County Court, District Attorney William Cahn and Nassau County Attorney Joseph Jaspian.

The boys and girls who have been selected to play the parts of the County Executive, the six members of the Board of Supervisors, the County Attorney and the County Comptroller will be invited to sit with their government counterparts during an actual meeting of the Board of Supervisors on April 23.

Final Tobay Plan Submitted

The final document of the Town of Oyster Bay Planning Advisory Board, a 158-page book entitled "Master Plan Oyster Bay," was presented to the press at a conference called by the Town at the Maine Maid Restaurant in Jericho on Friday, April 13th.

The booklet is the last of several documents and follows plans already finalized for Jericho, Syosset/Woodbury and Hicksville by the Planning Advisory Board. The Jericho and Hicksville plans have been approved by the Town Board. The Syosset/Woodbury plan, on which a day and night public hearing was held in March, is still on the reserved decision calendar.

The plan, which is the result of more than 100 meetings by the planning advisory board with residents of the town, touches all other unincorporated areas of the Town.

In presenting the plan, Supervisor John Burke called this an "in future" document and "not a definitive" one. He said it is a "living breathing document which should be reviewed, perhaps every five years."

After saying that the planning advisory board had frequently been the target of "abuse," simply for trying something out, he said "There is nothing that cannot be changed" and that the conditions of the plan depended upon the local legislative prerogative.

Planning Grant

Supervisor Burke also announced at the press conference the award of a federal planning grant in the sum of \$75,000, word of which had been received by the Town the previous day. The money he said, might go to expanding the staff of the Office of Planning and Development, which now consists only of a director and a secretary. It might also go toward consultant fees. A decision on the disposition of the money had not yet been made, he said.

The federal grant is awarded only to municipalities who have shown keen interest in planning and have worked toward planning in their communities, according to Deputy Supervisor Steven R. Saunders, who was also present at the meeting.

Contents

The book, Master Plan Oyster Bay, is available in limited quantities at Town Hall, and is also available for reference at Town of Oyster Bay public libraries, school districts and chambers of commerce. The book is a major improvement over other products of the Planning Advisory Board by the inclusion of photos and illustrations to point up major planning goals and to break up the type. It includes a Land Use Plan; Circulation and Transportation Plan; Community Facilities Plan and Recreation and Open Space Plan. Also, Conservation and Preservation, Design Study, Detailed Plans for business districts and special areas, and Plan Implementation.

Particular dislikes of the planners are overhead telephone wires, high density apartment units and lack of uniformity in store front and sign placement and decor in shopping centers. The planners also dislike on-grade railroad crossings.

The planners approve the separation of pedestrian walkways from motor thoroughfares, lots of greenery around office buildings and a quiet decorating scheme for service stations.

Special proposals include new waterfront zoning districts to promote better usage of shoreline property, a Landmark Preservation Commission, and creation of historic districts.

Approval Timetable

The timetable for a public hearing on the plan is still to be set, said Supervisor Burke. As a first step, the Town will consider different aspects of the plan for approval and disapproval. It will then present its approved plan to the public for a public hearing, and will make its decision after the input of the public hearing.

In his letter to the public, Lawrence Ravich, M.D., Chairman of the planning advisory board, offered acknowledgments and gratitude to the many people whose efforts went into the 2½ year work, and said to the Town Board: "We hope the results of our deliberations over these years meet with your approval. We hope that you will use the Master Plan as a solid foundation and a firm guide for the future growth of Oyster Bay."

Robert Williams Is Liked To Jericho's Founding And Religious Liberty In U.S.A.

When Hicksville community groups and the Town of Oyster Bay American Revolution Bicentennial Commission celebrate the Robert Williams Plantation Purchase this May 18-21, they will be honoring a man of character and many interests. Friend of the Indians, explorer and land developer, Williams was also in sympathy with those actively pursuing the cause of religious liberty for all.

It is believed that Robert Williams bought his "plantation" area from Sachem Paganpagan for speculation and land development purposes. Trained as a carpenter in Britain, becoming a cattleman and Hempstead proprietor, Williams seems to have risen to the opportunities and stimuli afforded by the New World. He aspired to leadership in settlement and land development. The 1650's were years in which the ever-restless English in America were engulfing their rivals, the Dutch towns in Connecticut and Westchester, and moving on to central and eastern Long Island. Men of vision and leadership might hope to share in the English creation of a New Zion in the wilderness.

Unfortunately for Robert Williams, the New England emigrants to Long Island preferred to settle along the necks and coves of places such as Oyster Bay. At the meeting place at fresh water streams and salt water resources, the newcomers chose to put down their roots rather than inland on the glacial

moraine of hills or the outwash plain to the southern sea, where Williams' holdings lay. His lands to the east and south of Centigau Wood, therefore, went unsettled for almost fifteen years after his land deal with Sachem Paganpagan.

In 1664, the English drove the Dutch out of New Amsterdam (New York), and Colonel Richard Nicholls became the first English governor. As did other leading land holders and colonial proprietors, Robert Williams promptly sought and eventually, in 1666, received confirmation of his purchase. Later, Governor Andros' patent for the Town of Oyster Bay, in 1677, included the Williams plantation lands.

After prospering in Hempstead for twenty years, Williams, in his middle age, decided to develop his land around what the Indians called Tusam (Jericho of today). On high ground, near ponds of fresh spring water, he built the home for his declining years. Here, with plenty of firewood, water and nearby grazing land for his cattle, he spent his last years.

Williams and his wife, Sarah, were the parents of six children, among whom are counted the earliest settlers of Jericho. The site of his home is not known for certain, although there is some evidence that it was located quite close to where today's Milleridge Inn stands.

We know Williams was able to get some settlers for his lands because he appealed, in 1668, to Governor Nicholls to have the men of his plantation excused from military duty (militia training) in Oyster Bay village. Nicholls complied with this request, granting exemption that one man in each family of

the plantation shall be free and exempted from such attendance at trainings, neither shall they be subject to any fine or penalty for their absence on this occasion."

Robert Williams is worthy of honor, also, because of his association with the Quakers and others seeking religious liberty for all. The records do not indicate particularly that Williams was pronounced in his religious affiliation, but he chose to associate with Quakers who had suffered persecution for their faith. Daniel Whitehead of Hempstead, the Wright brothers of Oyster Bay, the Townsend brothers who moved to Oyster Bay from religious bigotry in Jamaica, all these staunch Quakers were Williams' friends and acquaintances. Moreover, such a celebrated foe of religious intolerance as John Bowne of Flushing was known to Williams and listed as one of the executors of Williams' will after his death in 1681. He died while visiting Maryland, another colonial place associated with America's religious freedom.

Jericho, with its long tradition of Quaker workaholic and tolerance, has its roots in the generous attitudes of Williams as a land proprietor and those of his descendants in the Society of Friends, whose meeting house is a venerable landmark at Jericho.

The 325th anniversary of the Robert Williams Land Purchase this May 20, will afford Hicksville, surrounding villages and the Town of Oyster Bay American Revolution Bicentennial Commission a fine opportunity to consider again the town's historic roots and the deeds of one respected by Indians and pioneer settlers as well.

A unique work-study program is being initiated by the Town with the Board of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES) that will be mutually beneficial to the students and the Town.

Under the agreement, selected students studying automotive repair in the BOCES program will work alongside mechanics of the Town's Department of Public Works on the wide variety of vehicles and equipment operated by the Town. The program will not only give the students the benefit of working with skilled mechanics, but also will provide the opportunity to gain experience in the maintenance and repair of a wide variety of equipment.

On any given day, there will be from four to ten vehicles of assorted types in the shop for routine maintenance or repair. These can range from power-driven lawn mowers to 10-wheel dump trucks or a crawler crane. The students will work on both gasoline- and diesel-powered equipment.

The Town will also benefit from the temporary addition of these students to its vehicle maintenance work force. Skilled automotive mechanics are in short supply and the BOCES students will make a real contribution in keeping our equipment in operating condition. We are also looking at the long-range benefits of assisting in a

program that will assure a source of skilled manpower that is currently in short supply.

Two groups of students will be assigned to the four-week work-study program which will commence May 30. Each student will be paired with a Town mechanic who will assist in his training and provide BOCES with periodic evaluations of the student's progress. During this period, the students will be paid for their work by BOCES through a federal grant.

We look forward to welcoming these young men to our Town work force and are pleased to be able to supply the special facilities and experience that will add to their skills.

Traffic Signal Set For Parkway School

PLAINVIEW, N.Y. Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced this week that the County of Nassau will erect a traffic signal at the intersection of Parkway School Road and Central Park Rd.

The signal illuminates more than a half of a mile of road and is the first of its kind in the Nassau County Division of Traffic Engineering. Burke said the County has already begun engineering designs for the light

which will be at the intersection of Manetto Hill Rd. and Central Park Rd.

Burke said the COUNTY AT THE Town's request, conducted vehicle and pedestrian volume studies, investigated the physical characteristics of the intersection, studied the traffic flow and reviewed accident records of the last three years before deciding that the signal was warranted.



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Coliseum Contract Tops County Agenda

The Veteran's Memorial Coliseum and a new contract for maintenance and show staffing was the outstanding item on the agenda for the Nassau County Board of Supervisors' meeting this Monday. Off the agenda, the continuance of the Community Action Programs by the Office of Economic Opportunity and continued rent control for senior citizens were topics brought up by speakers from the audience.

Vincent Suzzo, the Mayor of Glen Cove, opposed the awarding of the coliseum contract to Olympic Maintenance Corp., which, he said, did not file its incorporation papers until March 14th, a day after the bids were opened. He believed this action contrary to Olympic's claim that it had a year's maintenance experience at the Coliseum.

Olympic was the low bidder at a charge of cost plus 3.85 per cent. County Executive Ralph G. Caso said the county was obliged to take the low bid.

The question of the year's experience, as clarified by the county attorney's office, was justified by the president of Olympic, James Heelan, Jr., having directed maintenance at the coliseum for another contractor.

Under the contracts, which run for a year, Olympic will provide all maintenance, including carpentry, plumbing, heating, etc. in the first award, and ushers, box office personnel, stagehands, parking attendants and other show staff for the second bid award.

Also on the agenda, the county approved an expenditure of \$5,525,000, which added to \$58,000 cash on hand, will finance the \$5,583,000 total cost of reconstruction and additions to the Nassau County Medical Center in East Meadow. The supervisors also a \$275,000 expenditure to replace Boiler No. 2 at the Coliseum and \$1,000,000 for improvement of Roslyn's William Culen Bryant Park and Preserve of Nassau County, including public park, playground and recreational area established and maintained by the county of Nassau including the use of the main mansion and existing laboratory building as fine arts center by the Office of Cultural Development.

Community Action Programs
Mrs. Campbell, a resident of Roosevelt, was present to ask Caso for a definite timetable on receipt of funds for the summer job programs in her community, a federally funded Community Action Program. The director of the Economic Opportunity Commission in Nassau County and the Neighborhood directors in 11 communities had been informed that funds would be cut off as of July 31st by the Federal government. Caso had assured the local community action boards that the county would provide funds through December 31, 1973.

Cecil Johnson, Roosevelt EOC Director, was also present to stand behind Mrs. Campbell. Caso said the community would

be informed as soon as the information was available.

Senior Citizens

Henry Doliner, of Hempstead, was present to ask the supervisors to emphasize in their behalf with New York State legislators that rent controls

must be mandatory, and all-inclusive and should include a reimbursement clause for those tenants whose rents went up before the passage of the bill.

Ruth Furman, president of the Nassau County Senior Forum, also spoke.

As a special feature, however, there will be an Israel Expo with products in every conceivable area including especially an Israeli Fair and Fashion Show directed to college students, with colleagues serving as models.

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


