Seek Lifting Of Restrictions

There was little opposition to the petition of Fore Improvement Corp., Hicksville to remove a restriction to office building development on a 1.7 acre parcel of land on the east side of Broadway, Hicksville, about 202 feet north of Ludy Street.

A zone change for the rear portion of the parcel had been granted by the Town Board in 1969, making the parcel uniformly Business G. At the time, petitioners planned to construct

office buildings, and a restriction to this use was put upon the approval of the petition.

Since that time, according to attorney John F. Bogut, who presented the petition, there has been a glut of office development in the Hicksville-Jericho area, making such building unprofitable for the petitioner. Instead, said Bogut, he would like permission to build stores, possibly construct a small shopping center.

In the plans, he said, is a one structure providing about 24,000 square feet of space.

Harry Broadwin, Fore Improvement Corp. said he could not be certain exactly what use the property would be put to, but it would be nothing requiring a special permit use. Possibly something on the wholesale, retail or supermarket type, he said.

Alexander Beardale, a resident of Murray Road, spoke in opposition to the petition.

"In Fire, Smoke Is The Big Killer!"

So few people realize that smoke is the big killer when fire strikes, not the fire itself. Blistering, choking, poisonous smoke, reaches far ahead of the fire. This smoke can quickly block your escape and cut you down, though you may never be touched by actual flames.

A good thing to keep in mind, when you make up your escape plan take special care to protect against the deadly effects of smoke.

You should have two ways to leave any room in the house. Try the door first. Before opening, feel the door. If it's HOT don't open it. There is enough superheated air on the other side

to kill you instantly. When you can open a door, brace it and open it slowly, shut it if you feel heat rush in.

If you are caught in smoke, keep low to avoid the worst smoke. Smoke can be blinding. Use the Fireman's idea feel your way along the wall until you can locate a door or window you can locate a door or window.

A Basic Guide — Fire Escape — Home or Work.

1. Act quickly — warn other occupants — get out.
2. Know your exits — you should have at least 2 from each room. In Hi-Rise buildings — don't use the elevators, they normally

become stuck.

3. Plan — Have an escape plan. One for Home and one for Work.

Do you have a Home Escape Plan? If you wait until fire strikes — it may be too late. YOU might be lucky — but what about the kids? Children are helpless during a fire. A pre-planned escape could save them.

If you need help in planning your Home Fire Escape — contact your local Fire Department — Fire Prevention Unit.

Another thing — When in your car — please yield the right of way to emergency vehicles. And don't park in front of a hydrant.

REPORTS

Students from 14 high schools throughout the Town of Oyster Bay attended the meeting of the Town Board this week to witness and directly participate in the operation of local government.

The occasion was Career Day and Youth in Law Day, first established 40 years ago by Mr. James McLean of Brookville. Each student is assigned to accompany a Town official for the day to observe his role in Town government and learn something of the problems and issues involved in governing a municipality of over 365,000 people.

That day's calendar provided a good cross-section of the type of activities and responsibilities with which the Town must deal. There was a public hearing on a

petition to remove certain restrictions that had been imposed on a parcel of land that had been rezoned. The Town Board also acted on a wide variety of resolutions involving such things as road improvements, storm drainage, the Town-sponsored performing arts program, and setting a public hearing date to consider a request for a change in zoning.

Some students took part in the operations of the Offices of the Supervisor, Town Attorney, Receiver of Taxes and Comptroller.

May 1 was also Law Day, as proclaimed by Congress and the President, "a special day of celebration by the American people in appreciation of their liberties and as an occasion for

rededication to the ideals of equality and justice under the law."

It is a time when we might remember both our rights and our duties as citizens.

We maintain these rights through our commitment to respect and obey the laws of the land and to respect the rights of other people. As citizens, we have a duty to stay well-informed about the issues of our government and community and to exercise our citizenship by voting in elections according to our convictions.

I am always pleased to see these young people take the time to come to Town Hall to become more informed about their local government. Their interest bodes well for the future of our Town.

The year 1973 is marked almost daily by significant commemorations of one historically significant occasion or another, but two such events this year are particularly important to members of the Jewish faith, and uniquely related to one another.

Nineteen hundred years ago, the last visible Jewish presence in Palestine was erased in their confrontation with the Romans at Massada, in 73 A.D. Far more happily, to Jews and all peoples of the world with a stake in freedom, next Monday (on the Jewish Calendar) marks the beginning of the 25th year of existence of the modern State of Israel.

The return of the Jewish people to lands in the Middle East first entered by the Hebrews under Abraham almost 20 centuries ago was met, on the very first day of the proclamation of Israeli in-

dependence on May 14, 1948 by incursions across her newly-partitioned borders by her Palestinian Arab neighbors. Her continued existence since that day has provided vivid proof of the Jewish peoples' determination.

The history of the Jewish people can be built around a list of persecutions including virtually every race, religion and national group to ever inhabit or dominate the Middle Eastern region, and most tragically of all, around the inhuman persecution they suffered during the period of their dispersal throughout Europe and elsewhere during the first half of this century.

Now at last, within their own borders, and despite the incredible pressures imposed upon them by the constantly restated aggressive intentions of their

neighbors, the people of Israel have succeeded in building a viable nation, providing their own needs for food, clothing, education and many other amenities of 20th century life.

Only a few obligations to her people cannot possibly be met under current circumstances by the will, inventiveness and productivity of her population alone, and one is the provision of adequate weaponry to deter future incursions across her borders and implied threats regarding the annihilation of her people. For that, and the right of Jewish people anywhere to emigrate unimpeded to the State of Israel at their will, the United States must continue to lend its support. These are obligations which I am pledged to support, and ones which all of us should recognize, as we congratulate the people of Israel on her 25th Anniversary Year.

Social Security Question Box

QUES: I'll be 72 in August. Although I signed up for Medicare when I was 65, I couldn't get any monthly retirement benefits because I was working and earning too much. However, after I'm 72, I understand I can keep right on working and still get my full benefits. Do I have to apply for these payments after my 72nd birthday?

ANS: No. Your payments will start automatically with the month of your 72nd birthday. Since you continued to work without getting benefits after 65, you can now qualify for special delayed retirement credits. These credits will increase your benefit amount one-percent for each year-or 12 of one percent for every month after 1970 that you worked and didn't collect monthly payments.

QUES: My husband and I will both be retiring at the end of this year. Since I have always worked under social security, I'll be able to get a monthly social security retirement check. My husband, who works for the post office, will be getting a civil service annuity, and, as his wife, I am also eligible for a check from the civil service. Can I collect both a social security payment and a wife's civil service payment?

ANS: Yes, if you are eligible for both payments, you can receive both.

Continuance of EOC Asked of Supervisors

Protagonists of the continuance of the Economic Opportunity Commission in Nassau County were out again at the Board of Supervisors meeting Monday for the fourth straight week seeking a commitment on funds.

Although they received the verbal support of Francis T. Purcell, Presiding Supervisor, Town of Hempstead, their pleas for the most part fell on deaf ears than usual, since County Executive Ralph G. Caso was not present. Caso was in Washington Monday, Purcell said, seeking funds to continue the anti-poverty programs in the county.

As noted, Congress voted the Office of Economic Opportunity out of existence earlier this year, an action which was later declared unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court, which said it must continue until June 30, 1975, as originally planned.

The Supreme Court's decision did not come quickly enough, however, to stop the federal government from notifying all local poverty programs that their funds would be cut off as of June 30, 1975.

The poverty programs are now in a never-never land where they

have been told that they will continue, based on the Supreme Court Decision, but also told that they will have no funds after June 30, based on the earlier actions of Congress. The 11 Community Action Programs in Nassau County have been guaranteed funds for continuance to December 31 by Caso, should federal funds not be forthcoming.

Those favoring the continuance of the Economic Opportunity Commission made statements on Monday, including Gregory Foster, Nassau EOC Youth Services Project Director, who accused the Board of neglect and apathy toward the poor community. Present from Great Neck were Arnold Prenskey, of the Chamber of Commerce, a member of the EOC Board and William Jones, of the Great Neck Manor Civic Association, who said it was the wrong time to drop any part of the poverty programs and wanted them saved for a "strong and healthy community."

Armando Meneses, of the Long Island Spanish American Civic Organization said that without the poverty programs "The

Spanish community will flounder." Lorenzo Merritt, Director of Community services for the Family Service Association, noted a "growing anxiety in the black community."

Levy Bill

Present for the second week was Jonar Rand, of Freeport, asking the board to endorse a bill introduced by Congressman Norman Levy in the state legislature which would require the Social Services Dept. to make sure a house complied with the building ordinance before allowing a welfare family to move in.

In other business, the Board unanimously approved an application for federal funds to make a 4.8 gift of land from the City of Glen Cove at Morris Avenue and Shore Road into a county park.

The estimated cost of the project, which is to include a swimming pool, wading pool, athletic field and outdoor basketball, tennis and handball courts, is estimated at \$990,000. The county is applying for half that amount under the Outdoor Recreation Development Act.
