Solomon Newborn, Oyster Bay Town Receiver of Taxes will be honored at a breakfast on June 3 at the Congregation Shaari Zedek on Old Country Road and New South Road, Hicksville.

Mr. Newborn has been selected as the recipient of an annual award given by Yeshiva University to an outstanding individual which will be presented to him at the breakfast. He was chosen for his distinguished service to his community and in recognition of his efforts on behalf of his fellow man.

Any proceeds from the breakfast will go toward the continuation of the Rabbi Eli Skaist scholarship fund established several years ago at Yeshiva.

An author, a former instructor and a certified public accountant, Newborn has been Receiver of Taxes since 1967. He has been a resident of Plainview since 1953 and his activity in community affairs over this period has included serving as president of the Plainview Board of Education, first president of the Plainview Jewish Center and Lieutenant Governor of the New York District of Kiwanis International. He is also a past vice president of the Plainview B'nai B'rith and an organizer of the Annual Brotherhood of Plainview Service Clubs.

The Library Board of Trustees are to be commended for their support of library participation in this historic Hicksville festival.

Accolades should go, also, to the Director and Board of Trustees of the Gregory Museum and to the ladies of the Robert Williams Program Committee under the leadership of Mrs. Val Conover and Mrs. Nancy Palahuk for the Museum's readiness to serve as cosponsor of the festival. A great deal of work went into the preparation of the splendid exhibit of photographs by Edward Bady, into the arrangements for the delightful program of folk music which was provided to entertain the Boy Scouts and visitors during the reception at the Museum. Saturday, May 19th and into the efforts by Mrs. Anne Gregory and the charmingly costumed colonial hostesses of the Museum to provide refreshments for the scouts and public. Curator Ben Barley looked most sagacious in his Sioux Indian feathered bonnet and regalia, a stately contrast to the Pilgrim's outfit worn by the writer for the occasion and provided so kindly by Ruth Frank. Our thanks go also to Mr. Herbert Johnson and Mr. Paul Russo, Museum Trustees, to Mr. Neslor Palahuk and Richard Sullivan who made their services available in various capacities at the Museum.

Jack Landress, Boy Scout Commissioner for District 3 assisted by such Scout leaders as Steve Didier, Edward J. McCann, Jr. and many troop and pack leaders in Hicksville will be remembered for the extensive "pacing of the bounds" of the Robert Williams Purchase area boundary line engaged in by many troops. Hundreds of Boy Scouts had a chance to retrace parts of their community's explorer's journey of the 1640's. Cheers should echo also for the fine showing made by Cub Pack 158 which, under the leadership of Pack Leader, William Allgeier, twice reenacted the Williams Purchase from Chief Pugnapan. Saturday's event at historic Cantigue Rock, at the site of the original purchase, was well at-

tended. A Long Island Press photo was seen by many Long Islanders, showing the wonderful makeup and Indian outfits and 17th century colonial costumes of the Pack adult leaders and the Scout cubs.

Sunday's outstanding closing ceremony and program took place in spite of a downpour at 1:30. It was seen by nearly 600 people. Credits for the day are very numerous. Indeed, Deserving special recognition for the fine Town Proclamation designating May 20th as Robert Williams Day in Town of Oyster Bay and for their presence are Supervisor John Burke, Councilmen Warren Doolittle, Joseph J. Saladino and Hogan. George Lang, Medal of Honor holder, was impressive as he lead the pledge of allegiance. Credit for much of the smoothly functioning program must go to Sigfried Widder who was tireless at many meetings and in his leadership of the program at Trinity Lutheran School. Pastor Stammel and his Board of Trustees are to be commended for hosting this memorable day. Pastor Stammel was warm in his welcome and much appreciated as he recalled his many years in Hicksville, particularly invoking memories of his old friend, the late Monsignor George Bitterman, pastor of St. Ignatius Loyola Church for over 35 years. Assisting Sig Widder in arrangements with energy and grace was Mr. Weldon Endorf, Principal of Trinity Lutheran School. We thank, as well, Father Frederick Harter, Pastor of St. Ignatius Church and Rabbi Eli Skaist of Congregation Shaari Zedek for their prayers of invocation and benediction.

So many people helped make Robert William Day a success-one can mention but a few: thanks go to Gerald Barker and his wonderful young men of the Singing Boys of Long Island; to Tom Costa and his assistants for bringing the St. Ignatius Girls Cadets on stage for at least a suggestion of their fantastic "Pageantry in Brass" when they were kept from parading by rain. We want to express our delight with the children of Jericho's Robert Williams Elementary School reenactment of the Williams Purchase on stage. The first to six graders "came through" exactly as their enthusiastic teacher, Mrs. Andrea Wallman, coached. Thank you children, Mrs. Wallman and Mr. Verdone, Principal of the Robert William School, Jericho, who promoted attendance and intercommunity activity so well.

Many people attended meetings or worked behind the scenes for the greater success of the program. To mention but a few, salutes should go to Cathy Steckler of the Camp Fire Girls whose young charges placed the flags on Broadway on Sunday, stood honor guard at the Library historic display and furnished many hundreds of cookies and drinks for the refreshments needed in various programs. Girl Scout leaders, Mrs. Jean Schultz, Mrs. Leonore Owen and Mrs. Marite Hennessy were also active with ideas at planning meetings. Their charges furnished an abundance of cookies and pastries and also were part of library guard of honor and placed the flags on Broadway on Saturday. 



"House Fire Injure Two"

Two Hicksville residents suffered burns as a result of fires which struck their homes over the Memorial Day weekend.

On Sunday Hicksville Fire Fighters responded to a house fire at 232 Lee Ave. The alarm came in at 11:17 p.m. The blaze was slight and was confined to the kitchen, but Mrs. Mary Ritter was taken by Fire Department Ambulance to the hospital with burns of the right hand.

On Monday a general alarm fire caused heavy damage to a house at 61 Meyers Ave. 90 Hicksville Firemen, 10 pieces of apparatus under Chief Lou Merz responded. The fire, which started when the homeowner was cleaning an exhaust fan with gasoline in the basement. The fumes ignited and spread throughout the house rapidly. The rear of the house was fully involved in fire. The blaze chased Charles Hauck, 43, up to the 2nd floor, where he went out a window onto the roof. Pierce Malmquist of 55 Meyers Ave., a New York City fireman, heard the commotion and upon seeing Hauck on the roof got a ladder and removed him from the roof. Hauck suffered 1st and 2nd degree burnson the face and 3rd degree burns on the right arm. Hauck was rushed to the burn control center at the Nassau County Medical Center by firemen.

A house fire at 240 N. Broadway, Hicksville on May 24th caused heavy damage to one room. The fire started when a youth was cleaning a motor cycle inside the house with gasoline. He escaped unharmed. A fire chief from Roslyn, N.Y. passing by saw the smoke and removed the cycle from the house, averting a serious blaze.

We've said it over and over again and we'll repeat it again - Don't - under any circumstances bring gasoline into the house. Gasoline is deadly. The fumes travel rapidly throughout the building and all it takes is a spark to touch it off. I'll say it again - Don't bring gasoline into the house. Use it outside where it is

well ventilated.

During the period May 8 thru May 29 Hicksville firemen answered 53 alarms. 13 malicious false alarms, 15 rescue calls and 30 fires. I wish to thank those residents who have reported missing street signs. It is appreciated. Many precious minutes are saved when the streets are marked. Thanks again.

A reminder - Don't put it off any longer. Draw up a plan for your family - An escape plan - If fire strikes, be ready. Don't say it can't happen to you, it can, statistics prove it. If you feel you need help or some advice. Call us or drop us a note, we'll be glad to

help.

Sergeant Knight, son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Knight, 16 Loretta Lane, Hicksville, earned the decoration - the highest Air Force award for non-combat heroism - last Oct. 17 at Takhli Royal Thai AFB, Thailand.

Sergeant Knight pulled a fire

extinguisher under the flaming aircraft and managed to put out the fire, saving the lives of the two men and preventing further damage to the aircraft.

Sergeant Knight, who attended Hicksville High School, entered the Air Force in November 1965.

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Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:

As an Independent Candidate for the Board of Education of district 17, I would like to express my views to the community and address myself to some of the issues developing in our District.

My first responsibility is to the children of the District, that their education is first class with the use of the most modern, proven tools of learning coupled with dedicated teachers and administrators. I will rely heavily on the professional staff in developing the needs of our children in the educational field, and assist my fellow board members in evaluating their findings and recommendations. I am not an educator, but I can and will rely on my good judgment in applying my important 17th vote. The education of our children is not to be separated from the most important character building aspect of learning. The respect of each other and authority, both in the classroom and at home. Respect for teachers, superiors, and elders is most important. I will attempt to follow this aspect of the development of our children in the District. I am not implying that there is a serious deficiency here in our system, but it is common knowledge, that at times, discipline has gone astray, and it concerns the parents, teachers, and local property owners. Character building, respect for authority, and an appreciation of what we have to achieve, a good sound education, is essential if our educational goals are to be met.

I am for LANGUAGE in the schools for ALL CHILDREN in the fourth grade, and a re-evaluation at each subsequent grade for continuance. Thus enabling greater concentration on reading in grades 1 through 3. Individualized Education, modeled after "Project Plan" should not be entirely eliminated. If it has proven itself with certain students, than by all means it should be continued. However, the more traditional method of education should be the rule rather than the exception, since it has proven itself over the years. Here again we must rely on the suggestions and recommendations of qualified educators, not only from our District but from areas a round the country that have used "individualized education" in their system. I do not feel that we should use experimentation without limits in our District. If Project Plan (individualized education) has merit than we must capitalize on it.

In closing let me state I would like to promote "unity of purpose" on the Board.

I can barely wait for next month's chapter in this breathtaking serial so I can learn how much the children will suffer for the actions taken upon them by a Board of Education which cares not for the education and welfare of our student, but for ways in which they can waste our money on benches and trees and have one of the largest surpluses ever in Hicksville history.



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

On the Drug Labeling Bill

Assemblyman Stuart R. Levine hailed Senate passage of his prescription drug labeling bill as an extremely optimistic indication of enactment.

The measure would require that all prescription drug containers clearly identify the brand name of the drug used, the amount contained in the package and the strength of the drug, unless the prescribing physician specifically requests in writing that the information not be given. "Prescription drug labeling," said Assemblyman Levine, "would provide physicians, called upon to treat unknown individuals in emergency situations, with vital information which could be of life-saving significance. In cases of children who have gotten their hands on a strong medication, time-consuming investigative work could be eliminated; immediate identification of the ingested drug would allow immediate antidote treatment," Levine concluded.
