Board Sets Budget Figure

The Hicksville School Board set a final budget figure at last Thursday's meeting—\$22,847,855. The Board did NOT accept the line-by-line items in the various codes nor did they reinstate the positions of four elementary assistant principals (even though the additional funds to cover their salaries were added to the budget). William Bruno voted against the motion, because he felt the Board, in adding to the monies, was allowing itself to be ruled by pressure groups.

The Board approved the hiring of media aides for each of the schools. These part-time employees will assist the school librarians and will handle audio-visual equipment. They will not replace clerks or librarians in the schools.

The Board also approved a raise of 20 cents per hour for the school monitors, retroactive to

May 1, and extended their working hours to last year's level, with a maximum of 2½ in the elementary schools and 3½ in the secondary schools.

The Board gave permission to H.A.D. (Help-Aid-Direction) to send out flyers through the schools about its summer movie schedule. The board also approved various bills for routine expenses of the district, approved various personnel appointments, leaves, etc. and awarded bids.

The Board stopped a purchase of textbooks which was intended to replace TLUs in the individualized instruction classes. This \$30,000 item will be taken up at this Friday's meeting which is scheduled for the Administration Building at 8 P.M.

Voting for school board candidates and the school budget is Wednesday, June 13 from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. in the local elementary schools.

EDITORIAL

For over twenty-one years we have been pro-education and have supported school budgets which we felt were educationally and fiscally sound. This year's budget, however, does not fit into that category. There is no line-by-line guide which has been accepted by the school board. The literature you received in the mail was never approved. Although \$85,000 was added to the final figure to allow for the reinstatement of four elementary assistant principals, these positions are, in fact, still eliminated. There has been no clarification on the status of individualized instruction.

We cannot vote for this "blank check" and we do not see how the Board and Administration can ask the people of Hicksville to place such trust in their hands. We must, with regret, but of necessity, vote "NO" on this proposed budget.

Nine Seek Election To School Board

There are three school board seats up for election in the Hicksville School District. Voters will go to the polls Wednesday, June 13, to decide on the successors for Thomas Clark, Frank Zindulka and George Pappas. In previous issues of this paper, a number of the candidates have expressed their views and reasons for wanting to serve on the school board. We present, now, a wrap-up of the educational, occupational and civic backgrounds of all the aspirants.

Thomas Clark, the only incumbent seeking re-election, is currently president of the school board. He has been a board trustee for three years, during which time he served as community relations liaison and vice-president. Mr. Clark and his wife have lived in Hicksville for eight years and have seven children. Among his community activities, he lists membership in the Mid-Island Conservative Club, Ancient Order of Hibernians and the Knights of Columbus. Mr. Clark is a customer engineer for IBM.

Opposing Mr. Clark for a three-year term is Thomas Nagle, also a former school board member for three years. During his term he served as vice-president, secretary and community relations liaison. Mr. Nagle has a BS in marketing from Fordham University and is a personnel manager for a retail food chain. He has been a Hicksville resident for eighteen years, is married with five children. Mr. Nagle has been active in Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, CYO, is a member of the Community Council, a former president of the Holy Name Society of Holy Family Church and was the first president of H.A.D., Inc. (Help-Aid-Direction).

The three candidates vying for the one-year seat vacated by the

resignation of George Pappas are Mary Carton, Eileen Jackson and Joseph Madden.

Eileen Jackson is a 23-year resident of Hicksville, where her six children have or are attending public school. She is a graduate of Roslyn High School and has worked as a bookkeeper and an office manager for a builder of custom homes. Her community activities include work with PTA, Cub Scouts, Gregory Museum, Community Council, H.A.D., Head Start, T.E.A.C.H. and B.E.S.T.

Joseph Madden, coordinator of Health, Physical Education and Recreation in the Roslyn Public School system, holds a BS degree in physical education from Manhattan College, an M.A. from Columbia University and a Doctor of Education degree from New York University. Dr. Madden's three children attended and graduated from the Hicksville public school system. He is a founding member of Holy Family Church, and has been active with Scouts, Little League, Police Boys Club, H.A.D. and PTA.

There are four candidates seeking election to the three-year term now held by Francis Zindulka—William Bennett, Harry Kershner, G. Thomas Muratore and Iris Wolfson.

William Bennett has been a resident of Hicksville for nine years and has two children in the public schools, the youngest to enter in September. He attended Pratt Institute and is a graduate of Deleahanty Institute. Mr. Bennett works as manager of the estimating department for a manufacturer of laboratory furniture and equipment. He was a charter member and past chairman of Holy Family Parish Council and is a third grade teacher in the church's confraternity program.

Harry Kershner is a former school board member, serving in that capacity for six years. During this time he was secretary and president of the board. Dr. Kershner is currently assistant superintendent of schools in a Westchester County school district. He is a former public school teacher and head of a department for the State Education Department. Dr. Kershner has lived in Hicksville for twenty years and has three children attending or graduated from the public schools.

G. Thomas Muratore served on the school board three years and was last year's president. He has lived in Hicksville twenty years and has two children who have gone through the public school system. Mr. Muratore attended Queens College, is a Nassau County deputy sheriff and also licensed insurance broker and notary public. He is a member of the Sons of Italy, the Knights of Columbus, the American Legion, and a past president of the Holy Name Society at St. Ignatius. Mr. Muratore is a past vice-president of the Nassau County Deputy Sheriff's Association and a past board member of the New York State Deputy Sheriff's Association.

Iris Wolfson is a fourteen-year resident of Hicksville with two children in the public schools. She has a B.S. degree in accounting from New York University, School of Commerce and is a Registered Public Accountant. She is active in the Community Reform Temple, having served as secretary and assistant treasurer. Mrs. Wolfson was a member of the Citizens Budget Advisory Committee for the Hicksville School board and has served in many capacities in the Burns Avenue, Junior High and Senior High PTAs.

I have been a resident of Hicksville for 23 years. My husband and I have six children ages 23 to 10. Two have graduated and two are in Jr. High and two in Dutch Lane. As you can see I still have a big stake in this district. Four to get through the Sr. High School, God willing.

As for the budget, I in good conscientious can not support a blank check budget of an increase of \$937,497.00 over last year, of which \$6000 is earmarked for the Superintendents raise in salary and the district as of June 1 has a surplus of \$800,000.00. There is no guarantee of 1:1 no guarantee of Asst. Principals, (which is drastically needed) no guarantee of any kind to insure our Childrens education to be better than ours was.

If our school tax dollar rises in proportion to the costs as outlined above, then we lose the taxpayer, his children in the classroom, then the teacher must go, and other reductions found to meet the Districts needs. It's a gloomy picture, but certainly not exaggerated. If we remain prudent and practical and account for every dollar and spend it wisely, then we will be doing the taxpayer parent and teacher a service. The property owner will have confidence in our fiscal responsibility, the parent will be assured of their offsprings education and the teacher will still have a job. If we must spend additional money to achieve quality education then I am for it, providing our professional educators see the need.

I will like to see more participation on the part of the community at our Board meetings. Much too often the same familiar faces, and groups presenting programs and views of only one segment of the community are represented. We hardly hear from our property owners, and many parents who are dissatisfied with our school curriculum. If our people in the community complain about high school costs, or when unruly students destroy private property around our schools, let's hear from them. If we are to have a line of communication with the community at our board meetings, then let's hear from them. We are too one sided at the present time, I would like to reach out and get others interested in our District and have them take an active part at our meetings.

I pledge to you in the District devotion to the welfare and education of our children, honesty, and dedication to the ideals and principles that made our Country great, fairness and respect to all regardless of political or philosophical views. This I pledge and base my entire platform on.

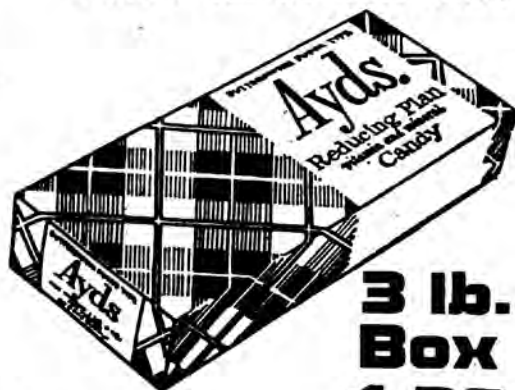

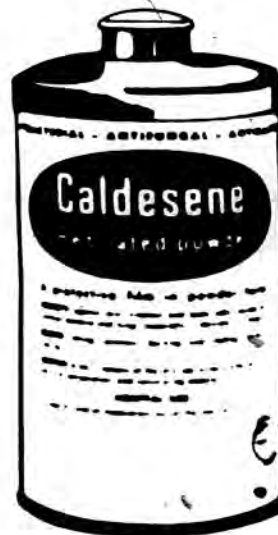
