## Doolittle Chairs Three Town Board Committees

Oyster Bay Town Councilman Warren M. Doolittle has been selected to chair the Town Board's Standing Committee on Narcotics Education as well as to coordinate the activities of the Committees on Recreation and Parking.

"While these are the final committee assignments to be formally announced, they are by no means the least significant," stated Supervisor John W. Burke. "Councilman Doolittle's assignments have been carefully chosen and are based on his record of previous performance."

Doolittle, who is the senior Councilman on the Majority Board, succeeds himself as

chairman of the Narcotics Education Committee. He had gained first-hand knowledge in the field of narcotics and drug addiction while serving as the Nassau County District Attorney's Chief Trial Attorney, and has displayed continued concern in this area while serving as liaison between the Town Youth Bureau, local youth councils and the Town Board.

The Hicksville resident is assisted on the Recreation Committee by Councilmen Salvatore R. Mosca and Howard T. Hogan, Jr.

Doolittle has also been chosen to serve as a panel member on the Standing Committee on Safety.

## Full Program Of Summer School Activities

The Hicksville Schools will again provide a full program of summer school activities this summer. For the kindergarten and first grade children, the Primary Learning Centers will be operating in each of the neighborhood elementary schools during the month of July. Here, the children will have the opportunity to develop their perceptual and coordinating skills.

Also, during the month of July, those referred students,

presently finishing grades two through five, will be able to have concentrated work in reading so they will be better prepared to move to the next grade in September. This Summer Elementary School will be held at the Lee Avenue School.

Approximately one hundred members, delegates and friends attended and heard Council President Siegfried Widder make the following awards, in exactly this way:

"The Hicksville Community Council Award is given at each of our Annual Dinners for outstanding service to the community of Hicksville. This Award is decided upon by the Executive Committee of the Council. This year, during our deliberations, twelve names of organizations, groups or individuals were brought before the committee, and each was discussed at length. A process of elimination was used to whittle the list down to one name."

"The winner of this year's award was selected because this organization serves the entire community of Hicksville in a very effective manner."

"The Council has decided to begin a new tradition at these annual dinners, by asking the previous year's recipient to assist with the current presentation. Since the office of president has some privileges, I asked Glenn Munch, Commissioner Munch, of the Hicksville Fire Department, as a representative of last year's Award winner, to help with this presentation. The organization whose name is engraved on the plaque, serves all of Hicksville from pre-school children on up to our senior citizens. It provides services on or off the premises. It provides pleasure and entertainment. As its governing body, it has a publicly elected Board of Trustees. It is operated by a Director and Staff of personnel. Available to the public is a fine collection of books, films,

records and cassettes, as well as music, plays, meeting facilities, displays of local interest.

"The Cultural Center of Hicksville—none other than—the Hicksville Public Library."

"The Board of Trustees: Ellery Bean, President; Abraham Fishman, Vice President; Ruth Aron, Secretary; Joseph McCarthy, Trustee; and Kenneth Jones, Trustee."

"Also Director, Kenneth Barnes and his Staff."

"Now, we come to the President's Award."

"This award isn't as spectacular as the Council Award, but is very meaningful."

"Making a decision like this is one of the many pleasant privileges of being president of an organization like our Council."

"It was something I gave a lot of consideration to, privately."

"What I was looking for was the name of a person, or persons, who had given of himself, herself, or themselves, for the benefit of others—without any thought of reward or recompense."

"I was looking to give this award to someone in Hicksville, who had done something worthy of recognition, for others in Hicksville, whether it was generally public knowledge, or not."

"Many people care, — many people are concerned. But, I had to come up with one name."

"It came to my attention, some time ago, that a couple of Hicksvillians, had, in a very quiet, unadvertised manner, been demonstrating a very special type of caring and sharing."

"For a long time, I was thinking about this award by myself."

"During the past few weeks, I discussed the names and the wording of the award with Irish. With her help, we arrived at the all-important phrase, 'Special' Caring and Sharing."

"Many people's lives were affected by the recipients and I

am certain that their lives have been enriched, also."

"When you give of yourself — inevitably, you get back more."

"These people were projected on their way to this moment, by a succession of Hicksville High School students, as well as other children in the neighborhood."

"It seems that the children recognized the natural warmth and love which these people had — and they came to share it."

"The children were looking for a place to meet outside of school. They found receptive ears and hearts — they found someone they could share their confidences with — they had RAP sessions, before RAP was a popular term — year after year, the succession of children continued — after they graduated, they came back to visit and discuss their job college progress — they came back with their fiancés — and later, with their wives and husbands — and then their children. When the boys were in the service, letters went back and forth all over the world. They had their own equivalent to a formalized youth center entirely on their own. The coke and pretzel bill was something else."

"All the while, he was a high school teacher and fireman; she was a devoted wife in the ladies auxiliary."

"The Citation — The Hicksville Community Council — 1973 President's Award — for 'Special' Caring and Sharing — presented on June 7, 1973 — to Esther and Glenn Munch."

## How to get the most out of your phone service

**1. Vacation savings.** If you are going away for more than a month, you may save money by temporarily suspending your home telephone service. Instead of paying the monthly service charge which includes any equipment, you may have, you would pay a total of \$6.68 for any period up to 5 months and \$1.34 monthly after that. If you wish, the operator will tell callers the number you'll be at during the suspension period.

**2. Moving day special.** When you move to a new home, have all your phones put in at the same time. Then the installer won't have to double back to add them. Each trip he makes costs you \$12.50, whether it's for one phone or several.

**3. Consider a jack.** You can make one phone do the work of several by ordering a portable phone that you can carry from room to room in your home. It plugs into jacks, which cost \$12.30 each to install, and you usually need at least two jacks. (We include a separate bell if all your phones are portable.) There is no monthly charge for jacks—an extension phone costs \$1.23 a month.

**4. The first bill after you move.** Your first phone bill after you move can be unusually high, what with service connection and other one-time charges. And most people make extra local and long distance calls when they've just moved.

One way to hold the bill down when you've moved from one neighborhood to another is to check the number of message units it costs to call back to friends in your old neighborhood. For example, if it's a 3-message unit call for the initial period, it's one message unit for each additional overtime period. So keep it short if you can.

**5. Once in a lifetime.** The premium charge you paid for a color telephone, Princess or Trimline phone is a one-time charge. If you move anywhere in the United States within the Bell System, you are entitled to the same equipment in your new location, without paying the premium charge again—even if you change colors.

**6. If you take more calls than you make.** Basic Budget Service, where available, is a possible alternative to your present service, but only if you make few outgoing calls. The monthly charge is only \$3.50 plus tax and local rates where they apply. For that you get a black wall or desk phone, a listing in the local telephone directory, and unlimited incoming calls. It does not include any message unit allowance for outgoing calls; each message unit is charged at 7¢. If you average less than 29 to 37 units a month, depending on where you live, you may save money with Basic Budget Service.

Basic Budget Service is for individual line residence customers only, and cannot be combined with any other service.

**7. Take what's in.** When you move, you may find a Princess or Trimline phone, or a phone with a long cord, at your new location. If you decide to keep any of these in place, you won't have to pay the \$6.15 premium charge just the regular installation charge and monthly charge.

**8. Your own special color.** If you want a special color for your phone, we'll make it up for you. Give us a 4-inch sample (material or paint chip) to match, and 6 weeks to deliver.

Our price is \$24.59 (plus \$6.15 if it's a Princess or Trimline, and you have not had one of these sets before). Installation charges also apply.

**9. Ask about Take and Save.** If you move any place served by New York Telephone, ask your service representative about the Take and Save plan. You may be eligible for a \$5 credit for each main line if you take your old phones (except wall or key phones) with you, and give them to the installer at your new address.

## Resurfacing Of Portions of County Roads

County Executive Ralph G. Caso has awarded a contract to Lizza & Sons, Inc., Oyster Bay for \$187,870 for the resurfacing of portions of 12 County roads in central and eastern Nassau with asphalt concrete pavement. Lizza was the lowest of six bidders.

The roads are:  
Duffy Avenue, Hicksville-From the east side of Charlotte Avenue easterly to the west side of Newbridge Road (Route 107).

Marie Street, Hicksville-From the east side of Jerusalem Avenue easterly to the west side of Massapequa-Glen Cove Road (Broadway).

Hicksville-Woodbury Road, Hicksville-From a point of 350 feet west of Bay Avenue easterly to a point 100 feet east of Harrison

Avenue.

Hicksville-Woodbury Road, Woodbury-From the north side of Jericho Turnpike northerly to Syosset-Woodbury Road. Also, Syosset-Woodbury Road for a distance of 200 feet west of Woodbury Road.

Syosset Cold Spring Road, Syosset-From the east side of Nevada Street easterly to a point 100 feet east of, and 100 feet north of the intersection with Syosset-Woodbury Road.

Jackson Avenue, Syosset-From the north side of Edward Avenue northerly to the north side of Railroad Avenue.

Berry Hill Road, Syosset & Village of Oyster Bay Cove - From the north side of Syosset Cold Spring Road northerly to North Hempstead Turnpike.

## County To Apply For \$51,000 Grant

Nassau County Executive Ralph G. Caso today disclosed that the county is applying for a \$51,000 grant to greatly increase the police department's capability to search for evidence at crime scenes.

Caso explained that approval of the application by the State Division of Criminal Justice Services would permit the county to purchase three mobile units with all the necessary equipment to search a crime area. This would include crime scene photography, "on scene" testing apparatus, fingerprint equipment, X-ray equipment for bullet recovery, casting for foot and tire

prints, silicone casting for toolmarks and dermal swabbing for firearms discharge.

"Often it is the most minute articles, impressions or inconspicuous materials that contribute to the final solution of the crime," Caso observed. "The mobile units also will provide for the safe and efficient transportation of evidence without the danger of contamination."

Police Commissioner Louis Frank said the department's crime scene section presently handles primarily photography and latent fingerprint identification at the scenes of major crimes such as homicide. Scenes

involving more sophisticated investigations require the calling of a laboratory chemist, with the resulting loss of his time at the police laboratory.

"The mobile units will have trained police personnel assigned to them on a 24-hour-a-day, seven-day-a-week basis," Frank explained. "This will permit a greater number of crime scene searches and also relieve the investigating detective of much of the work he is now performing so that he will have more time for investigations."

The application for the grant has been submitted by the Nassau Crime Council.

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## Margiotta Re-Elected GOP Chairman

Assemblyman Joseph M. Margiotta last week was reelected as Chairman of the Nassau County Republican Committee at the Committee's reorganization meeting held at the Hofday Inn, Hempstead.

In addition, each of the three Town Republican Committees met to reorganize prior to the County Convention. At the Town conventions, Margiotta was reelected Chairman of the Town of Hempstead Republican Committee, Thomas Pierce was elected Chairman in North Hempstead and James Picken in Oyster Bay.

The reorganization meetings are held every two years as required by the Election Law to name new officers of the Party.

At the County Convention, Margiotta was unanimously reelected to his third full two-

year term as Chairman. He was first elected to the powerful post in 1968 to complete the one-year left of the term of the late Sen. Edward Speno who resigned. He was then reelected in 1969 and 1971 to two, two-year terms.

With the exceptions of G. Wilbur Doughty and J. Russell Sprague, Margiotta's tenure as party chairman is the third longest of the six men who have served as head of the Republican Party in Nassau County.

The first acknowledged County Leader of the Republican Party was G. Wilbur Doughty who served from 1923 to 1933. After Doughty, a five man steering committee directed the party until 1933 when Sprague emerged as the County Leader. The five member steering committee consisted of Sprague, A. Holly Patterson, Edwin Wallace,

James L. Dowsey and Leonard W. Hall.

After Sprague resigned in 1959, former County Executive A. Holly Patterson succeeded him serving from 1959 to 1961. Former Speaker of the State Assembly Joseph F. Carlino followed Patterson, serving from 1961 to 1963, and Speno from 1963 to 1968.

The leader of the Republican Party was entitled County Leader until 1963 when the Committee's bylaws were changed and the leader was designated as County Chairman.

Other County officers elected at the County Convention were Commissioner Isabel Dodd of Sea Cliff, as Secretary and Stanley Krause of Mineola, as treasurer.

A total of 26 vice chairmen were elected.

Saved from sinking, she was towed across the Pacific without power of her own, through a typhoon, to the U.S.A.

An insurance adjuster for some years, Mr. Evers came to Hicksville some ten years ago. He was well known bartender at such taverns as the Broadhollow Inn, Melville and at the Firehouse Inn and John's Tavern Hicksville.

When the "Silverfox", as his friends called him, cashed in his partium tickets and hung up his softball glove and cue stick for the last time, this past week, some of the fun and good natured camaraderie known to the sporting set retired with his general unassuming gentleman.

He leaves his son, Scott Evers of Lindenbush, his brother, Richard of Hicksville, his sister Mrs. Eleanor P. Hodgkinson of Hicksville and many relatives.

## Cash Register Gift

"I'm so excited I can't wait for the man to teach me how to use it. So we can have a real food store." This was the reaction of a junior at the John F. Kennedy High School, here today on seeing a cash register in her classroom.

The cash register was a donation from the National Cash Register Company to a special education class for slow learning students. Mr. Fred Marks, Field Technical Manager, branch of the Brooklyn Queens branch presented the register to Mrs. Elizabeth Footer, the teacher. He expressed great satisfaction in being able "to help these handicapped youngsters move ahead in their learning experience" to be able to make change and to learn the value of money.

He observed that this was a "change of pace" for him, since he associated the register with making profit. Here the machine was being used to help youngsters find themselves. Mr. Marks added that this particular model used in many and popular stores, was selected "because it will be easy for the kids to operate."

Mrs. Elizabeth Footer was delighted with the gift, which indicates that "the people out there care." She said that the class planned to make shelves and to use the cash register to "stimulate a school situation store." The register will help the students put into practice what they have been learning, she continued. "Until now, we've been using small plastic containers for storing coins and bills. This was an awkward arrangement and not a real life situation."

These students are in a school-work learning program, Mrs. Footer said. Now they will learn how to make change, and they'll "be tuned in to the value and use of money," she continued. They'll have a better understanding of prices, of ounces and pounds of canned items. We will teach them to figure the sales tax and at the same time to be aware of quality in consumer items. The register can be a stepping stone for jobs as checkout clerks in retail stores and in preparing them for out-of-school activities.

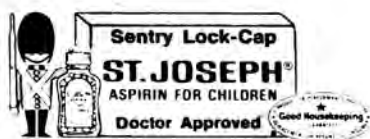

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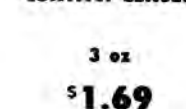

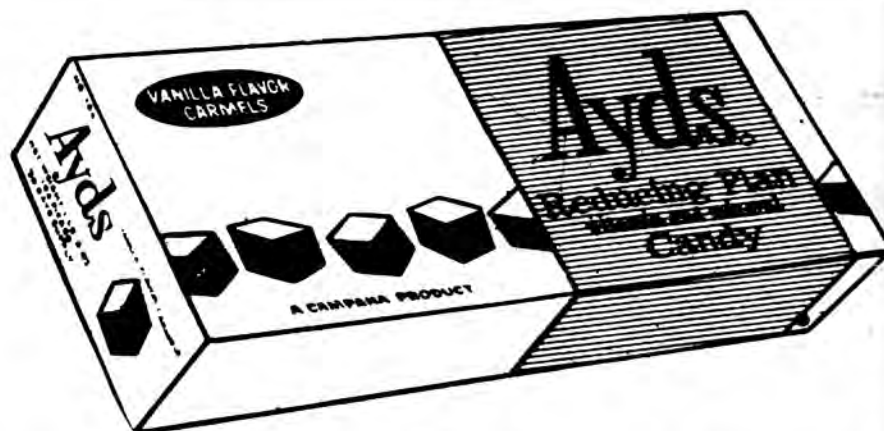
