

Town Board Sets Hearing On **Dangerous Bulding Ordinance**

Town Supervisor John W. Burke announced that the own Board has set a July 24th hearing date for a proposed ordinance to give the Town power to repair or remove buildings that are considered dangerous to the safety, health and welfare of the com-

munity
Under the proposed ordinance
a complaint concerning any
building in the Town will be in-

vestigated by the Building

Upon determination that the structure presents a dangerous condition, the owner will be notified and will be expected to respond within seven days.

If the owner indicates that he will correct the condition, he will be given 72 hours to begin the work. However, the owner can request and will be given a hearing if he disagrees with the Building Division's determination. The hearing will be held within 14 days after it is requested.

Should the owner refuse to act

on the notice from the Building Division, the Town Attorney will take court action to have the structure declared a public nuisance and the Town will then act to repair or demolish and remove the building.

The Town will be reimbursed for the cost of the work by placing an assessment against the land

The ordinance would also empower the Town to order residents of a dangerous structure to vacate the building if it is beleived necessary

A hearing on the ordinance is scheduled to begin at 10 a.m. at Town Hall Audrey Avenue, Oyster
